Schools are finding out how they rated on the state's Annual Performance Report.

Columbia, Jefferson City and Mexico are all seeing their scores going up from previous years.

Columbia earned 93.3 percent of the possible points on the APR, which is significantly higher than recent years in which the scores averaged the 80's.

Jefferson City Public Schools scored 87.9 percent a four year high.

The Mexico School District scored 97.9 percent which was up from 2017 when they scored 91.8 percent.

The test determines school's accreditation status each year and measures categories such as standardized test scores, college and career readiness and graduation rates.

The NCAA imposed a post season ban for the football, baseball and softball teams, a reduction in scholarship and recruiting as well as probation.

The NCAA investigation stemmed from a tutor reportedly completing coursework for student athletes.

The rezoning is due to a new middle school being built on Sinclair Road scheduled to open in the fall of next year.

The University of Missouri released their most recent Title IX report today [Wednesday] indicating reports of discrimination are up from 2016 and 2017.

According to the report, 750 reports were received in the department in the 2017-2018 school year, up from 693.

Of those reports, 59.3 percent were related to sex or gender discrimination, up from 52.9 percent in the previous report.

Title IX noted a drop in the number of reports made regarding race discrimination. In 2017 and 2018, 15.7 percent of the reports alleged racial discrimination, and in the newest report that number has decreased to 13.2 percent.

According to reports from the Columbia Missourian the university's Office for Civil Rights and Title IX received 750 reported violations of its anti-discriminatory policy during the 2017-2018 school year.

That is up from the 693 reports from the previous year.

The office also saw reports of sex and gender discrimination, accounted for nearly 60 percent of all the reported incidents last year.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, TB is most often spread when an person with active tuberculosis of the lungs coughs near other individuals. The disease is spread only through the air.

An official appeal is now filed by the University of Missouri to the NCAA Committee on Infractions.

MU Athletic Director Jim Sterk filed the appeals brief yesterday (Monday) and in a statement outlined the following points of contention.

The penalties handed down were contrary to NCAA case precedent.

They were not supported, or appropriate, given the nature of the violations.

And they could have a chilling effect on future NCAA enforcement processes.

The NCAA banned MU football, baseball, and softball programs from postseason play for one year, in addition to several recruiting restriction and fines due to a former tutor completing work for 12 student athletes.

The NCAA now has 30 days to respond to the appeal, and following that, an in person hearing date can be established for MU to appear before the appeals committee.

MoDOT is working to obtain materials and equipment to make temporary repairs to seal the road, but weather conditions make the timing uncertain.

Once the weather is good, the department will work with the pipeline and a contractor to make permanent repairs.
