Section I. Issues

The stations have identified the following topics as significant issues facing our community in this quarter:

A. Economic Revitalization: Local businesses, organizations and governments working to get an economic plan in place for 2022 are handed Covid variant surprises as the year comes to an end. Not sure if this will have a negative economic impact but businesses went full steam ahead with their holiday plans. One of the biggest economic shots in the arm to the region this quarter, if not the biggest came from Edmeston-based Greek yogurt giant Chobani. This privately owned company in Chenango County filed for an Initial Public Offering with the federal Securities & Exchange Commission. That would make Chobani a publicly traded company, trading on the Nasdaq exchange under the ticker symbol CHO. The estimated value of the offering could be more than \$10 billion.

B. Education: The students are back in the classrooms and that was our main focus this quarter. We talked to a number of people including non-classroom educators but as I mentioned we honed in on area high schools and colleges. Suny Oneonta was in the national spotlight last year for how they handled Covid on campus. They have A new President this year and we sat down to talk to him. Dr. Alberto Cardelle outlined the goal for his first year is really to complete this academic year without any major disruptions. So far, the college accomplished just that. They are currently on break. But they had a successful first semester.

C. Poverty: Always a huge topic this quarter as the cold sets in. Opportunities for Otsego and the Oneonta Police Department are exploring strategies to get homeless people sheltered. An executive order says that after temperatures go below 32 degrees, the homeless must be sheltered. Catholic Charities, the Main Street Baptist Church, Otsego County Department of Social Services, and other religious groups opened a new warming station in Oneonta in March 2021 to allow those outside to warm up during the cold weather. Homeless who are found in other areas of Otsego County, including Cooperstown, are typically taken to the warming station in Oneonta. The only problem, the warming station has been at full capacity. While that continues to be an issue, local people in need also got an early Christmas Present when it was announced New Yorkers enrolled in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) will receive the maximum level of food benefits for December. Governor Kathy Hochul said all SNAP households, including those already at the maximum level of benefits, will receive a supplemental amount in December.

D. Environment: We took a look at an environmental issue that we have not before. This was brought to our attention by a SUNY Oneonta professor. The damage the fashion and textile industries are doing to the environment. Here are some of the facts that they provided. Clothing production has roughly doubled since 2000. While people bought 60% more garments in 2014 than in 2000, they only kept the clothes for half as long. In Europe, fashion companies went from an average offering of two collections per year in 2000 to five in 2011. Some brands offer even more. Zara puts out 24 collections per year, while H&M offers between 12 and 16. A lot of this clothing ends up in the dump. The equivalent of one garbage truck full of clothes is burned or dumped in a landfill every second.

E. Healthcare: While this was a big quarter for COVID re-emerging and making the most impact since it all began. We focused on breast cancer awareness month and some stats that really hit home with listeners on the importance of early detection. About 1 in 8 U.S. women will develop invasive breast cancer over the course of her lifetime. About 43,600 women in the U.S. are expected to die in 2021 from breast cancer. Death rates have been steady in women under 50 since 2007, but have continued to drop in women over 50. The overall death rate from breast cancer decreased by 1% per year from 2013 to 2018. These decreases are thought to be the result of treatment advances and earlier detection through screening. Breast cancer became the most common cancer globally as of 2021, accounting for 12% of all new annual cancer cases worldwide. Breast cancer incidence rates in the U.S. began decreasing in the year 2000, after increasing for the previous two decades. They dropped by 7% from 2002 to 2003 alone. One theory is that this decrease was partially due to the reduced use of hormone replacement therapy by women after the results of a large study called the Women's Health Initiative were published in 2002. These results suggested a connection between HRT and increased breast cancer risk.
