4/2/08	4/5/6/10/11PM	On April 1, 2008 the Kentucky State Police arrested Russell G. Bramlage, 22 yoa, in conjunction with the November 2007 murders of Terry and Lynda Bramlage. Russell is the son of Terry and Lynda Bramlage. Bramlage was picked up on an unrelated charge and confessed to his involvement in this crime.
4/4/08		At a probation revocation hearing for Jeni Lee Dinkel the judge ordered Dinkel to reapply to the sex offender training program she was terminated from. The most recent class has already begun, and the next course does not begin for 10 weeks, but the judge ordered Dinkel to apply immediately. She is also required to schedule a date to take a polygraph that she refused the last time she was in the program. The judge said if she doesn't take the polygraph, she is going back to jail. He also stated that if she appears in this judge's courtroom again she will return to jail. The judge said the boy she is convicted of sexually abusing was the victim, not Dinkel.
4/10/08		Kentucky State Police in Dry Ridge and the ATF teamed up to round up drug suspects in Grant County. The roundup, designated operation "Spring Cleaning" was the culmination of a joint investigation between the KSP and the ATF. The investigation identified nineteen individuals that were engaged in either manufacturing methamphetamine, obtaining the materials to manufacture methamphetamine or trafficking in a controlled substance. Investigators obtained sealed indictments for the arrests in Grant County, KY. The operation began at 6:00am with area police officers assisting the KSP and ATF in locating and arresting seventeen of the nineteen suspects. Two suspects remain at large.
4/15/08		Authorities confirm Michel Veillette committed suicide at the Warren Co Jail. Veillette was being held on murder and arson charges. He was accused of murdering his wife and children and setting fire to their home in an effort to cover up his crime.
4/24/08		Two suspects have been arrested in the string of recent residential burglaries in Madison Twp (Butler Co). Over the past three months, investigators have been diligently working to identify the persons responsible for approximately thirteen daytime residential burglaries. Wednesday, with the assistance of the City of Franklin Police Department investigators executed a search warrant on a residence in Franklin. Sheriff's Office Detectives have arrested Bradley Alcorn, age 28 and Johnny Sorrell, age 27 and charged the men with felony burglary and receiving stolen property.

5/1/08		<p>Deb Dixon reports on a cutting edge high tech crime fighting tool the Cincinnati Police Department has started using. It's a computer program called a Geographical Predictor. They enter all kinds of information on a serial offender (rapist, burglar, bank robber, etc.) and the program tells them in what area the criminal likely lives and where they will likely strike next. They recently used this to help successfully track and catch a serial burglar.</p>
5/2/08		<p>Clermont Co Deputies responded to a report that a 16 year old girl had been assaulted. A subsequent investigation by Clermont County Sheriff's Office investigators revealed that a 16 year old girl had been walking along Bear Creek Road when the suspect walked up to her from behind and asked if he could walk with her. The girl told investigators that the suspect stayed behind the girl as they were walking and when they came to a secluded area of the road, he grabbed her from behind, threw her to the ground, and attempted to rip her clothes off. The girl who had a knife with her stabbed at the suspect, striking him 3 times. The suspect was arrested and charged with Attempted Rape a Felony II and Assault Misdemeanor I. He was then taken to Clermont Mercy Hospital to get medical treatment for his wounds.</p>
6/2/08		<p>The Hamilton Police Department is releasing the name of the female victim found this morning in the 500 block of South 11th. Street alley. The victim has been identified as Gloria M. Applegate, a 32-year-old female white from Hamilton, Ohio. The cause of death will not be released at this time; it is being investigated as a Homicide. She was shot in the head, and found naked except for her shoes. People in the immediate neighborhood are concerned about the human trafficking going on there. We spoke with a minister who was trying to help Applegate turn her life around.</p>
6/4/08		<p>Butler County Sheriff Richard K. Jones announces the results of an investigation by his Drug and Vice Investigation Unit and Criminal Alien Team. Recently, the Butler County Sheriff's Office received information that an illegal alien, using the name Primo, was supplying prostitutes to other illegal aliens, within Butler County. There was also information of the possible involvement of a minor in the prostitution. The Sheriff's Office also obtained information that prostitutes were coming from New York City. During the investigation, undercover agents requested multiple prostitutes. "Primo", later identified as Logan Carrasco-Zambrano, stated that the agents would have to go to a residence of his for multiple prostitutes. Agents later arranged for a prostitute, Violeta Urena-Deluna, to be brought to a Hamilton hotel for the purpose of engaging in sexual activity with two men. The arrangements were made with Carrasco-Zambrano by an undercover agent. On June 3rd, at approximately 7 p.m. Carrasco-Zambrano and Urena-Deluna met with an undercover agent and agreed to provide sexual activity in exchange for money. Both subjects were taken into custody and charged. Carrasco-Zambrano would only provide his name, age, and the fact he came to the United States, illegally, 2 years ago, from Honduras. Urena-Deluna stated she has been in the United States, illegally, for 28 years, and is originally from the Dominican Republic. Urena-Deluna recently moved from New York City to Alabama. The Butler County Sheriff's Office has contacted Immigration Customs Enforcement in</p>

4/7/08		Chelsea Clinton appeared in Lawrenceburg, along with campaign Senior Adviser Ann Lewis and former Indiana First Lady Judy O'Bannon, to kick off the Hoosiers for Hillary Early Vote Program.
4/10/08		Mayor Mark Mallory today appointed President and CEO of the Urban League of Greater Cincinnati, Donna Jones Baker and City of Cincinnati Director of Planning, Charles C. Graves III to serve as co-chairs of The Complete Count Committee. The committee will focus on developing a comprehensive plan that will use every method and available resource to ensure that every resident is counted during the 2010 Census. The plan will include an awareness campaign to educate residents about the importance of participating in the Census as well as an outreach component to hire local census workers.
4/14/08		A meeting was held this afternoon to discuss how to finance the \$3-billion needed to replace the Brent Spence Bridge. Senator George Voinovich was to meet with local leaders and the head of ODOT and OKI. Voinovich and others on capital hill have been under growing pressure to come up with ways to pay for the \$3-billion bridge replacement.
4/15/08		Today is Tax Day and Paula Toti takes a look at where the three major Presidential Candidates stand on Tax issues. The candidates position on tax incentives for industry, the tax policies of the Bush administration and the impact of the Iraq war on taxes and the economy are examined.
5/1/08		Hillary Clinton's campaign opened an office in Northern Kentucky this evening. Jeff Hirsh reports. The opening of the office and Obama having opened office recently is indicative of them turning their attention to the upcoming Kentucky Primary.
5/5/08		A report on a rally on the Public Landing as part of the effort to save the Delta Queen. The exemption allowing the Queen to carry overnight passengers is set to expire. The Save The Delta Queen Campaign rally in Cincinnati is in support of legislation that would extend an exemption to the technical provisions of the Safety at Sea Act of 1966.
5/12/08		Chelsea Clinton made a 12:45pm campaign appearance at Dixie Height H.S. in Northern Kentucky. She's stumping for her mother in several spots around the Bluegrass today in advance of next Tuesday's Presidential Primary election in Kentucky.

5/19/08		Democratic Presidential hopeful Hillary Clinton continues her Bluegrass Blitz with an appearance in Maysville. The primary election in Kentucky is May 20 th .
5/20/08		Cincinnati City Council's Economic Development committee heard from a lot of people before deciding to "hold" a proposal that would change the city's zoning laws governing social service agencies. A lot of the supporters of Citilink think the city is using this in an attempt to put more restrictions on social service agencies. The city's planning commission originally considered these proposals and has still not taken any action on it yet.
5/22/08		The group Bridges for a Just Community (formerly National Conference for Community Justice) release progress report this morning on Human Relations in Cincinnati. Their findings will include: *Race relations are no longer at the top of the public agenda in Greater Cincinnati. *Hispanics cite race or police relations as top issues, while unfair treatment is generally declining. *Unfair treatment of African American remains a chronic problem and *Majority of women and men say women are not treated as well as men when it comes to pay.
5/27/08		The Cincinnati Neighborhood Enhancement Program (NEP) received the prestigious honor of winning the national 2008 Program of the Year at the Neighborhoods, USA (NUSA) Annual Conference. Through focused, integrated and concentrated city service delivery and community redevelopment efforts, the NEP program seeks to improve the quality of life in a targeted area of a neighborhood. The city initiated program, which has been successfully deployed in the Cincinnati neighborhoods of Price Hill, Avondale, Northside, and CUF (Clifton Heights/University Heights/Fairview), won the award specifically for efforts in the community of Northside.
6/13/08		Barack Obama will be in Columbus today while his wife plans a fundraiser here in Cincinnati this evening.
6/16/08		Members of City Council's Finance Committee decided to refer the red light cameras back to law committee. They were presented with a motion to allow the City Manager to negotiate a contract to bring red light cameras to the city. Instead they decided there are still too many questions surrounding this issue... especially with a group collecting signatures to put this issue on the ballot in November. Some members are also still not convinced cameras are a good idea.
6/16/08		On Monday, June 16th Steve Chabot will be joined by community leaders to voice their opposition to Planned Parenthood's move into its Ferguson Road location. Planned Parenthood purchased property at 2016 Ferguson Road and is planning to relocate to that location in the coming months. Rev. Arnold Culbreath (director of Protecting Black Life) and life advocate Jane Hoffman also attend the conference to speak about their opposition to Planned Parenthood's move. The press conference will also kick-off a grassroots campaign aimed to further mobilize the surrounding residents to ensure their voices are heard. During Monday's event, participants invited guests will sign the first petitions against Planned Parenthood's move.

6/24/08		The City Council's Transportation and Infrastructure Subcommittee, chaired by Councilmember Roxanne Qualls, will hold a public hearing tonight to gather testimony in opposition to two Brent Spence Bridge/I-75 rerouting alternatives that would come through Queensgate. The purpose of the hearing is to gather testimony from business owners, public officials and others in an effort to remove the Queensgate alternatives from consideration.
6/26/08		Senator John McCain met with undecided voters in a Town Hall at Xavier University at Noon. Joe Webb provides coverage and analysis of the Town Hall meeting, which we also set up to stream live on the Web. He'll do live at Noon and Piece for Early PM. After three years of programmatic data on 37 Kentucky counties, the Kentucky Department of Health indicated that the highest risk for lead poisoning resides in seven counties which include Kenton and Campbell counties. Data shows that between three and four percent (31,000) homes in those two counties were designated as being at high risk for significant lead hazards that could poison children.</p>
6/10/08		<p>St. Elizabeth Medical Center and the St. Luke Hospitals announced today that the Federal Trade Commission will allow the merger of the two organizations to move forward. Prior to this announcement, the FTC conducted a thorough investigation into the impact such a merger would have on the community. Hospital business data from both organizations as well as interviews with businesses and individuals in the community were considered during the investigation. Joseph Gross, St. Elizabeth President and CEO stated, "The favorable decision from the FTC is a major milestone toward our merger. With that accomplished, I am optimistic we can move forward. 4/4/08		The Metropolitan Sewer District says that the red coloration in the Mill Creek is a non-toxic discharge from a regulated company in Woodlawn. The red is a pigment and is part of the rinse water from that company. MSD would not name the company but said that when there is too much rain water from the sewers overflows into the Mill Creek. The main health concern is not the pigment, but the fecal matter released in the mix by the overflow. Some of the waste will settle to the bottom, and the rest will be released into the Ohio River.
4/15/08		We look back at the problems caused by Cicadas that blanketed the tri-state just a few summer's ago. A new brood will be hatching in the eastern half of Cincinnati and Northern Kentucky (and several other states). Areas east of I-71 (Milford, Terrace Park, Montgomery, Madeira, Kenwood, etc.) will experience the return of Brood 14 which last hit these areas in 1991. Also included is an interview with Dr. Gene Kritsky who's been studying cicadas for 34 years.
5/13/08		The Smart Car can save you money on gas, but is it safe to drive. We have new information on how the Smart Car fared in vehicle crash tests done by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety. This is the first time they've tested this vehicle. They're releasing results of the crash tests which rate how well cars hold up in a collision.
5/16/08		The City kicked off a 3-month blitz this morning to improve the quality of life in Westwood. This is one of those concentrated efforts to remove blight, lower crime and improve live in the community. This is the fourth neighborhood targeted by this program.
5/16/08		Howard Ain shows us a new vehicle that can get 100 miles to the gallon of gas. Featured is a local company is doing this with a new breed of Hybrid. It's called a Plug In Hybrid Electric Vehicle and it even has a rechargeable electric battery that plugs into a standard outlet.
5/21/08		Ohio Department of Transportation officials will begin work immediately to repair and reopen the eastbound Interstate 74 bridge at I-275 that was severely damaged after a tractor trailer carrying an 80-ton train engine slammed into three bridge support columns Tuesday night. With work expected to begin today, officials estimate eastbound I-74 could reopen in 60 to 90 days.

5/29/08		Laughing Brook is an important work of public environmental art, with a functioning wetland that will cleanse storm water runoff from a portion of Salway Park. The wetland contains one hundred Biosculptures of human hands, fish and salamanders, created by Brookner. The project demonstrates sustainable design and eco-friendly storm water management practices, including beautiful rain gardens.
6/9/08		For the first time ever, the Cincinnati Recreation Commission will have most city pools open on Monday, June 9th. After several years of staggered pool openings, CRC made a strong push to have all pools open by June 9th. Many large cities have only a few pools to open. Cincinnati has 39 pools with most of them being decades old. It takes an incredible amount of maintenance and staffing to get the pools open. 34 of 39 pools will be open on Monday.
6/17/08		Tanker truck carrying fuel flipped on the ramp from westbound 122 to southbound I-75 in Middletown. The tanker was leaking. A containment dam was set up to keep the fuel from sewers and local creeks. Another tanker arrived to begin off-loading the remaining fuel from the overturned tanker. This process and the clean up will affect traffic in that area all day. East bound 122 is closed from Dixie Hwy to I-75. There are two intersections in that area and both are open, but traffic is *not* being allowed to continue eastbound toward the interstate.
		Three local State Senators held a news conference this morning to push for a bill they're introducing to change Ohio's Smoking Ban. State Senator Gary Cates (R-Butler County) joined State Senator Bill Seitz (R-Green Township) and State Senator Bob Schuler (R-Sycamore Township) who want to exempt private clubs from the state's indoor smoking ban. The conference was held at the Middletown Moose Lodge which has experienced significantly less traffic and revenue since the smoking ban took effect.

4/2/08		Howard Ain reports on a problem that could cause your car insurance company to deny your accident claim even though you're fully insured. We profile a man who has full insurance on his brand new car, has an accident while delivering Pizza and his insurance company refuses to pay. Howard reports this is not unusual and that most insurance companies will tell you the same thing because the man is using the car as a delivery vehicle. He needed a special insurance rider in order for his insurance company to cover his claim.
4/8/08		Paula Toti reports on "starting your own business" and where to get help and money for the start-up. When faced with the loss of their job many people consider starting their own business. We profile a mother/daughter team that got help from the SBA and are taking off. The SBA will back bank loans and their SCORE counselors offer free advice. It is getting harder to get a bank loan but there is still money out there if owning a business is your dream.
4/15/08		Merger talks between Delta and Northwest Airlines has caused speculation on the impact to the Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky economy. We report on the proposed merger's impact to consumers and Delta employees. Among the questions to be answered are the future of Delta's hub at CVG, the future of Comair, ticket rates and route service and potential problems if the pilots object to the terms of the merger.
4/17/08		Delta's President and CFO, Ed Bastian met today with Delta employees and local leaders about how the merger with Northwest Airlines would impact our area. Included are reports on Ky Governor Steve Beshear, Ohio Lt Governor Lee Fisher and Mayor Mark Mallory's meeting with Delta officials.
4/21/08		The City of Cincinnati and Hamilton County today jointly appointed John F. Deatrick as the public parties' project executive for The Banks, Cincinnati's new premiere riverfront development. Deatrick will provide the City and County with professional oversight administration regarding public funding and financing, infrastructure and mixed-use development and the Joint City-County Small Business and Economic Inclusion Policy. As the Banks project executive, Deatrick will provide oversight and direction to the master development team for the Banks Project as well as the City and County's Development Manager for public infrastructure development.

4/24/08		Howard Ain reports on the newest trends in saving money with coupons. The Kroger Co. has started a new program which allows you to use all the coupons you want without having to clip them out of the paper and without having to bring them with you to the store. You can load them onto your Kroger Card.
5/14/08		Howard report on a local woman who went to a Sheriff's Auction hoping to get a deal on a house in foreclosure. Now she's getting hit with a lot of other costs because she didn't know enough about the home. Howard shows us what we need to know before buying anything at a sheriff's auction so we don't end up with all kinds of hidden costs.
5/19/08		Paula Toti reports on the latest trend in these times of rising food prices. You think you're paying the same price for that ice cream or bag of snacks or other item---until you take closer look at the package. A lot of food manufacturers are shrinking the size of their products. You're paying the same, but getting less.
5/21/08		How would you like an electric bill that tells you what appliances in your home are using the most electricity? Howard gets a look at Duke Energy's House of the Future. The home is set up so the power use of every appliance in the home is measured and you can find out where you're wasting money. When you receive the bill it breaks down how much each appliance cost you to run that month. Your bill is broken down by appliances. Even the Troubleshooter says "It's just amazing"
5/29/08		A deal announced on Wednesday between UPS and DHL could have big impact because ABX is very large employer in Wilmington (7,000 people). DHL, the struggling U.S.-based express shipping unit of German postal service Deutsche Post AG, wants UPS to carry some of its air packages. The collaboration between rivals with past legal battles would give UPS a hefty new revenue stream and help DHL cut costs. The deal could deal a significant blow to ABX Air and Astar, which are DHL's current vendors for the air shipments UPS is seeking to take over. Air Transport Services Group, Inc., ABX's parent, said in a statement Wednesday that the UPS deal could lead to the assumption by UPS of substantially all of the services that ABX Air currently provides to DHL. It said its agreements with DHL accounted for roughly \$280.8 million, or 74 percent of ATSG's consolidated revenue, in the first quarter of this year.
5/29		What you need to know before you swipe that bank card again to pay for your gas. A local dad got his teenage daughter a \$50 Visa "Bucks" card to help teach her about money and it actually teaches him a hard lesson. After using the card to put \$10 or \$20 gas into her tank --- she's surprised to find she gets rejected when she tries to buy a couple of other small items. Howard says because of the rising cost of gas a lot of stations are now increasing the holds they put on debit or credit cards to \$75 or \$100. The holds often stay on a couple of days. He'll also tell you what other businesses will put a hold on your money when you use one of these cards.

6/2/08		Paula Toti reports that the Digital TV converter boxes are selling out fast and if you have a government coupon you want to make sure it doesn't expire. She takes a look at what you need to know if you are buying one. Is there any reason to pay more than the \$40 dollars you'll get with the government coupon?
6/2/08		The U.S. Department of Defense has awarded BAE Systems a contract for the supply of up to 10,000 Family of Medium Tactical Vehicles (FMTV), worth up to US\$2.2 billion, with US\$1.65 billion of funding already agreed. The new contract includes a one year option for the procurement of 10,000 additional vehicles. Production of the LTAS cargo vehicles will be performed at BAE Systems' facility in Sealy, Texas and Cincinnati, (Butler Co.)Ohio. Deliveries of the base contract are expected to be complete by February 2010 and deliveries of the option, if exercised, will be complete by November 2010.
6/23/08		In an effort to help Ford Motor Company's national dealership consolidation plan, John Nolan Ford, Inc has entered into an agreement to sell its Ford franchise back to Ford Motor Company. The Nolan family will continue to operate a Ford dealership in Georgetown, Kentucky.
6/26/08		Today was the last day of business for the BIGGS at Cincinnati Mills. The store was one of the original anchors of the Mall when it opened as the Forest Fair Mall 20-Years ago. How will losing one of its original anchors impact Cincinnati Mills? What's the future hold for the mall which has long had problems with vacant storefronts?
6/26/08		Ohio's residential utility consumer advocate today will ask the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO) to reconsider its May 28 decision restructuring Duke Energy's natural gas delivery rates, which would result in its customers' flat-rate charge increasing by more than 300 percent over the next year while lowering the portion of the delivery charge that varies according to how much natural gas a customer uses. The Office of the Ohio Consumers' Counsel says in its filing that with the importance of saving money on energy bills, the PUCO has gone in the wrong direction by essentially charging low-usage customers the same amount as large users for the delivery of natural gas.

4/4/08		Deb Dixon reports on a waiter and former Scott High School wrestling star and assistant coach. Jason Daviaux was paralyzed after a crashing his car on his way to work at Jeff Ruby's Steakhouse. Ruby has already donated \$20,000 towards his medical bills.
