Racquel felt compelled to find a way to help them get back on their feet. In just ten days, with the help of social media, supportive friends, and local businesses, Racquel filled her garage half full of clothing, furniture, and so much more. Thanks to the support of so many, Racquel and her community were able to help nearly 85 families start again through the Black Forest Marketplace at the Sundance Mountain Athletic Center in Monument. As often happens when you take the first step, what started as a one-time effort on behalf of a few has continued to evolve and grow into a community-wide program helping many families through all kinds of hard times.
