## **SECTION 1. ISSUES**

The above stations have identified the following as some of the more significant community issues addressed by this station for the quarter specified. This listing is by no means complete, nor is the order in which these issues appear intended to imply any degree of priority or significance of the issue.

- A. **Environment.** Besides the pandemic, people are fighting some strange weather patterns this year. We took a look at those issues, including the impacts of possible climate change.
- B. **COVID-19.** Most of our reports this quarter dealt with the COVID-19 pandemic. We dealt with vaccine distribution, how the economy has been affected, emergency responses and schools.
- C. **Infrastructure.** Winter has brought out more gaps in our area infrastructure. While bridges are getting some attention, we also looked at other street issues. Montana's construction season starts as soon as the snow disappears.
- D. **Economy**. The economy of Montana has been challenging, including cost of housing, which has been rising steadily and how businesses are attracting young employees, instead of them leaving the state. The film industry has discovered Montana and we examined a tie-in with college sports.
- E. **Law Enforcement.** We constantly keep in touch with law enforcement. We also looked at the underlying crime problems that include addictions and the economic situation that many people are enduring, due to the pandemic. The stress can cause them to make the wrong decisions and find themselves in a criminal situation.

He also talked about some of the benefits and what to expect in 2021. Missoula Chamber of Commerce Director of Membership Mark Losh joined us as well and talked about how the community can support local businesses during this difficult time.
