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## HURRICANE STATES UNPREPARED

One thing apparent during Hurricane Katrina was that emergency first responders were unable to effectively communicate with one another. Cops, firefighters and medical personnel, state and local officials – they were generally communicating on different systems.

The First Response Coalition, a non-profit organization supporting the first responder industry, conducted a broad overview of communications in eight hurricane prone states. The FRC found Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina and Texas to be “dangerously unprepared for another disaster.” The FRC notes that the 2006 hurricane season may be as devastating as 2005.

The FRC is concerned that without an effective national blueprint, federal, state and local communications interoperability may be slow in coming. The FRC is correct. The Department of Homeland Security is just now conducting a baseline communications survey. And there does not appear to appear to be the necessary level of collaboration among the feds, state and local officials in order to achieve effective interoperability.

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## WAL-MART, EXXON & THE ANGRY LEFT

## CUNNINGHAM – SHOT DOWN IN FLAMES

Navy Lieutenant Randy “Duke” Cunningham was the first American ace in the Vietnam War, shooting down five enemy aircraft. He received the Navy Cross, a decoration second only to the Medal of Honor.

He went on to be a Top Gun instructor and he ended two decades of service as the Commanding Officer of an F-14 squadron.

Cunningham was the talk of San Diego, where he was an icon in that Navy town. He parlayed his fame into winning his first Congressional race in 1990.
