April 1, 2018

Aired 6:15am to 6:45am 30 minute program

Issues Covered: Health issues, Economic and Education Issues and Emergency Preparedness.

Guests: Mary Frances Hoover the Executive Director of Susan G. Komen North Texas, Sylvia Sanchez a breast cancer survivor who will be taking part in the upcoming Komen Race for the Cure, also Michael Garrrett the CEO of Trusted World and Janet Smith the Development Director of Trusted World.

Topic: Mary Frances Hoover and Sylvia Sanchez joined me to talk about the Race For the Cure which will be held May 19th in Frisco. The event not only raises awareness about breast cancer but also raises important research dollars to find a cure and to fund programs that serve those in our community with breast cancer, from free mammograms to education programs to wigs for women impacted by the disease. Sylvia shared her personal story of being diagnosed and the journey through treatment and the fear that she has that she may not survive this disease and why Komen is important to her and how they have been a support for her and her family. For the second segment of the program I was joined by Michael Garrett and Janet Smith with Trusted World a nonprofit that helps people who have been affected by disasters. The spring storm season is in full swing with several severe storms already sweeping across our area causing quite a bit of damage to homes and businesses and Michael and Janet and I talked about ways to be prepared for spring storms and we talked about the work that Trusted World does to help people in the aftermath of destructive storms. They provide clothing, diapers, formula, food and other necessities. We talked about how people can volunteer to help and the work that Trusted World did in the aftermath of Hurricane Harvey to mobilize North Texans to help with donations and sorting of goods and the importance of always having items on hand for the next disaster.

April 8, 2018 Aired 6:15am to 6:45am 30 minute program

Issues Covered: Emergency Preparedness, Education, Economic Issues, and Arts Education

Guests: Ed Martelle with the American Red Cross North Texas and Tobi Berman and 11th grader at North Crowley High School who received a scholarship from the Texas Cultural Trust also Amber Pickens from Dallas who lives in New York and who is a past recipient of a scholarship from the Texas Cultural Trust.

Topic: It is spring storm season in North Texas and we have already had several strong storm systems move across the area and although last week we focused on the work of nonprofits that help after a disaster this week we are highlighting emergency preparedness before the storms move through Ed Martelle with the Red Cross talked about how the Red Cross helps educate people about the ways to be Red Cross Ready and how every family should have a kit in their home in case the worst happens, have a plan, have a kit and know what to do in the aftermath. We also talked about the other services and programs that the Red Cross has for the community. Tobi Berman and Amber Pickens joined me to talk about the Texas Cultural Trust an arts education scholarship program that promotes the arts and also helps students with their higher education Tobi talked about what the scholarship means to him and how the arts have helped h im be a better student while Amber talked about what the scholarship did for her when she first received it and how she is now a working actress and singer in New York City and is paying it forward by donating to the Texas Cultural Trust to provide more scholarships and opportunities for people wanting to pursue an education or career in the arts.

April 15, 2018 Aired 6:15am to 6:45am 30 minute program

Issues Covered: Mental Health Issues and Suicide Prevention.

Guest: Dr. Christine Moutier the Chief Medical Officer for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention.

Topic: Recently a lot of high profile celebrities have committed suicide and here locally many schools are dealing with a rise in teen suicides and so this morning I was joined by Dr. Chrisitine Moutier with the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention to talk about what we all need to know about suicide ideation and how to prevent suicide and how there is help and hope. We talked about signs to look out for in case you are worried about a loved one, ways to deal with sadness and depression and how to know the difference, ways to cope with loss and how the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention is working on research in to the brain to see why some people are more susceptible to thoughts of suicide. We also discussed the programs that AFSP has in place locally to help those who have been impacted by suicide, educational programs for outreach into schools and church outreach and we talked about the upcoming Out of Darkness Overnight Walk in Dallas which will benefit AFSP and their work. The Out of the Darkness Overnight Walk will take place Saturday, June 1st and Sunday, June 2nd in downtown Dallas. We talked about how people can get involved and we shared stories of people who have lost a loved one to suicide.

April 22, 2018

Aired 6:15am to 6:45am 30 minute program

Issues Covered: Health Issues, Education and Economic and Community Involvement

Guests: Brandon and Rachel Knight with Head for the Cure and Jacquelin Leach the Executive Director of the Crohns and Colitis Foundation of North Texas and Natalie Brown the 2018 Honored Hero for the CCFA North Texas Walk.

Topic: Brandon and Rachel joined me to talk about the upcoming Head for the Cure 5k Run and Walk which will be held on Saturday, May 5th at Oak Point Park in Plano to benefit brain cancer research. Brandon was diagnosed with a brain tumor five years ago and continues to battle the disease and so he shared his own personal journey with brain cancer and talked about the importance of research and the work that Head for the Cure does. Rachel talked about the support that she has received from Head for the Cure and talked about the impact that a brain cancer diagnosis has on a family but they believe a cure will one day be found and in the meantime it is the medical research taking place that has allowed her husband to survive thanks to advancements in medication. Jacqueline Leach and Natalie Brown joined me to talk about the work that the Crohns and Colitis Foundation is doing in North Texas for those impacted by these digestive diseases. Natalie shared her story of diagnosis and treatment and how she is managing the disease living with ulcerative colitis. We talked about signs and symptoms of the disease and the embarrassment of dealing with a disease that can lead to frequent bathroom breaks and episodes of diarrhea or constipation. We also promoted the upcoming walk that will take place on Saturday, May 19th in Dallas to raise awareness and money for research and for the programs that CCFA has in North Texas for families like Natalie's.

April 29, 2018

Aired 6:15am to 6:45am 30 minute program

Issues Covered: Criminal Justice Reform, Education and Economic Issues.

Guests:.Jim Buffingon the Chief Operating Office of Bridges To Life and Charles Fisher the DFW Regional Coordinator for Bridges To Life.

Topic: It has been a tough week for law enforcement in North Texas as they grieve the loss of Dallas Police Officer Rogelio Santander who was gunned down on Monday while responding to a shoplifting call at a Home Depot in Dallas. The suspect in the shooting has been arrested and is behind bars. This morning we focused on crime and violence in our city and we highlighted a group that works with incarcerated individuals to help them while they are behind bars so that they do not harm others in the future and that organization is Bridges to Life. Jim Buffingon and Charles Fisher talked about the programs that their nonprofit has in prisons around the state and Jim shared his own personal story of being a crime victim since his mother was killed by his dad and how that affected him and how his work in prison reform and with those behind bars has helped him see the humanity in those who are in prison. Charles Fisher shared his story of being behind bars because of felony theft while he was on drugs and how Bridges To Life helped him. The Bridges To Life programs include not just incarcerated individuals but also crime victims who share how being the victim of the crime affected them. Research has shown that those who take part in the programs offered by Bridges To Life have a very low rescidivism rate.

May 6, 2018

Aired 6:15am to 6:45am 30 minute program

Issues Covered: Education and Economic Issues and Mental Health Issues

Guests: Lou Jones and instruction with Generation.org and Mary Lynch a graduate of the nonprofit program also Bonnie Cook the Executive Director of Mental Health America of Greater Dallas.

Topic: Lou Jones and Mary Lynch joined me to talk about Generation a nonprofit based in Dallas that helps young men and women by educating and training them in careers that are lacking qualified individuals in our area. Lou talks about the skills that he teaches and how Generation works with employers in North Texas to find out what is needed and how to train individuals to be the best candidates possible for those jobs. Mary talked about her own experience with the nonprofit and how they were able to line up an interview with the job that she currently holds as a hospitality hostess at Hilton downtown Dallas. We talked about how people can get involved and help and also how young men and women can take part and what is expected of them. Bonnie Cook with Mental Health America of Greater Dallas joined me to talk about May being Mental Health Awareness Month and how MHS Dallas helps those who are dealing with mental health issues and their families we discussed their services and programs and we also talked about the upcoming hoarding conference that will take place in Dallas on June 8th and 9th for people who are dealing with a loved one who is a hoarder which is a mental health issue.

May 13, 2018

Aired 6:15am to 6:45am

30 minute program

Issues Covered: Child Welfare Issues, Economic Issues, Education, Foster Care and Adoption

Guests: Allicia Graham Frye the CEO of Jonathan's Place, Jennifer Maddox the Assistant Director of Foster Care and Adoption and Andrea Mulewa an adoptive mom.

Topic: The month of May is Foster Care Awareness Month and since today is Mother's Day I asked Allicia, Jennifer and Andrea to join me to talk about the importance of people stepping up to become foster parents and also the importance of adopting through foster care. Allicia talked about the work that Jonathan's Place does as an emergency shelter for kids who are taken from their families due to neglect and abuse and how Jonathan's Place helps those kids and we talked about their other programs aimed at helping the kids with education and mental health. We talked about their foster care and adoption programs and Andrea shared her story of becoming a foster parent along with her husband and how that experience led them to want to adopt through the foster care system. We talked about educational classes for fostering and adopting and we talked about ways the community can help Jonathan's Place throughout the year.

May 20, 2018

Aired 6:15am to 6:45am 30 minute program

Issues Covered: Mental Health Issues, Veterans Support, Education and Community Involvement.

Guests: Lili Kellogg the Executive Director of Equest and Tammy Richards the CEO of Volunteer Now.

Topic: Memorial Day is coming up so I wanted to highlight a group helping veterans and one group that is helping through equine therapy and is one of the beneficiaries of this year's Carry the Load March in Dallas that will be held on Sunday, May 27th and on Memorial Day, May 28th is Equest. Lili Kellog joined me to talk about this nonprofit that provides hope and healing through horses and she talked about the programs that help children and adults and veterans. They help veterans with their Hooves for Heroes program. Lili shared how equine therapy helps and the history of equine therapy and she shared stories of autistic children speaking for the first time after taking part in the therapy sessions, she talked about the help it provides to those who have physical disabilities and the mental health benefits for those with PTSD including veterans. Tammy Richards joined me to talk about the upcoming Voly in the Park a volunteer festival that will highlight the good that is done when people volunteer in their community. More than 75 nonprofits will be on hand in Dallas for the Voly in the Park event looking for volunteers. Tammy also shared the economic impact that volunteer hours have on a community and how Volunteer Now connects those who want to volunteer with a whole slew of agencies looking for volunteers.

May 27, 2018

Issues Covered: Military and Veteran support services and Mental Health Issues.

Guests: Jacob Schick the Executive Director of 22 Kill

Topic: It is Memorial Week end a time to remember those who have fallen while protecting our country and this week end in Dallas the annual Carry the Load March will once again be held at Reverchon Park in Dallas. The March begins this afternoon at 4 and ends tomorrow, Memorial Day at 12:16pm. One of the beneficiaries of this year's Carry the Load March is the nonprofit 22 Kill and Jacob Schick the Director of the nonprofit joined me to talk about how his agency is helping with the mental health needs of our veterans. 22 Kill was started as a result of the alarming number of suicides amongst our veterans with national statistics showing that on average every day 22 veterans take their own life. 22 Kill raises awareness about the suicide epidemic plaguing our country's veterans and offers support programs that provide services to our vets so that they can overcome depression and anxiety. Jacob shared his own personal journey. He was severely injured in Iraq and lost his leg to combat but it was the invisible wounds of battle that almost cost him his life and that is why he is committed to helping those who are dealing with suicidal thoughts. We also let people know that if they are in crisis that there is help and how 22 Kill can be a resource for those veterans who feel hopeless.

June 3, 2018

Aired 6:15am to 6:45am

30 minute program

Guests: Linda Goelzer and Loretta Morgan with Carter Blood Care and Daphne Lynch a epidemiologist with Collin County Health Services.

Topic: Linda Goelzer and Loretta Morgan joined me to talk about the upcoming Summer Blood Drive which will take place June June 18th through June 23rd at various locations around the Metroplex. It is estimated that every two seconds someone in the US needs blood and during the summer months when people head out of town for vacation and high school students are out of school for summer break the need for blood donors rises. Linda and Loretta talked about the work that Carter Blood Care does in our area to educate people about the need for blood and how to help out and encouraged people to donate blood or to hold blood drives at their churches, schools or place of business this summer. We talked about misconceptions about giving blood and who

is elibible to donate and how many people are impacted by one donation since blood is used for burn patients, patients undergoing chemotherapy and victims of car accidents or gunshots. Daphne Lynch with Collin County Health Services joined me to raise awareness about mosquito borne diseases during the summer months in particular zika and West Nile. We talked about how we should all protect ourselves and steps we can take to reduce the risk of mosquitos in and around our homes.

Issue Covered: Economic Issues, Food Insecurity and Education.

Guest: Anita Foster the Communications Director for the Tarrant Area Food Bank

Topic: Now that school is out area food pantries are gearing up for what they call the hungriest time of year and so Anita Foster with the Tarrant Area Food Bank joined me to talk about the issue of summer hunger that is caused by school being out and kids who benefit during the school year from free breakfast and lunch programs going without. We talked about summer food programs and raising awareness about the programs so that no child goes hungry during the summer. We also talked about volunteer opportunities to help out at food pantries and the food bank and the importance of food drives to make sure the food pantries have enough food to deal with the increased demand during the summer months. We talked about all of the services and programs that the Tarrant Area Food Bank offers to help the needy including their cooking classes for better nutrition and we also promoted upcoming events that will benefit the Food Bank including the Gear Up To End Hunger a bike ride that will be held in August.

Guests: Paul Gravely the Executive Director of The Parenting Center in Fort Worth

Paul spoke of their co-parenting classes that help parents who are divorced and who may be dealing with issues that are detrimental to the child's welfare because of arguments and using the child as a bargaining chip in the divorce. We also spoke of their HEAL program and their parenting hotline as well as their programs aimed at helping parents of children with physical and developmental disabilities.

Guests: Rafael McDonald and Leslie McMurray with Resource Center Dallas and Dave Kroencke and Becca Leanard with

Topic: Rafael and Leslie joined me to talk about the work that Resource Center does to help those in the LGBTQ community here in North Texas. June has been Pride Month a time to highlight the issues that face the gay community including civil rights issues, discrimination, violence against gays, health issues and more. Rafael and Leslie talked about programs helping gays and trans people from children to seniors and they talked about the advocacy work that Resource Center does. Coming up on June 29th at North Park Center in Dallas the annual Parade of Playhouses will be held benefiting Dallas CASA the nonprofit that provides court appointed advocates to children who have been abused or neglected and are in the foster care system. Dave Kroencke and Becca Leonard joined me to talk about the Parade of Playhouses and how people can see these amazing playhouses and buy raffle tickets to win one with the proceeds all going to Dallas CASA to help the kids. We talked about how people can become volunteers for CASA and the desperate need.
