Efforts To Rehabilitate Fire-Scarred Land Near Pocatello Will Begin Monday, Weather Permitting.

The Bureau Of Land Management Will Conduct Helicopter Operations And Mulch Application Treatments Around Chinese Peak For About Two Weeks. It Follows A Similar Aerial Seeding Contract That Was Completed On December 1st.

The Pocatello Field Office Awarded A Contract To Columbia Basin Helicopters To Apply Wood Straw Mulch To About 128 Acres Of Land That Was Burned By The 1,546-Acre Chinese Peak Fire On July 19, 2020. The Project Will Rehabilitate And Stabilize The Land To Prevent Further Resource Damage. The Entire Operation Is Expected To Take 12 Days, With 6-8 Days Of Helicopter Activity Planned Within That Time Frame.

An Emergency Stabilization And Rehabilitation Plan Was Developed To Address Erosion And Vegetation Concerns Immediately Following The Fire.

According To Blm, The Earlier Contract Seeded Approximately 460 Acres With A Grass/Forb Mixture And An Additional 1,363 Acres With A Sagebrush/Forb Mixture. The Mulching Operation Beginning Next Week Is Similar To A Successful Treatment That Was Conducted After The 2011 Drive-In Fire, In Which Wood Straw Mulch Was Applied Following Aerial Seeding.

If Conditions Allow, The Helicopter Will Begin Applying Wood Mulch In Strategic Areas By Dropping Wood Straw From A Cargo Net. The Helicopter Will Be Based At The Old Drive-In Theater Location Off South 5th Avenue.

Front Doors, But They Cant Get Into The Second Doors, They Have To Come Right Into The Office. So It's A Nice Security Measure For That."

Miller Also Says The Classroom Pods They Have Set Up Not Only Provide Additional Safety For Students And Staff, But Allow For More Space For Learning And Working.

"So There Are Six Of These, Each Pod Has Five Classrooms In It," He Said. "They All Have One Science Lab, And Then Four Other Classrooms. So Students Will Be In Here For All Their Core Classes, Science, Math, English And History. And Then We'll Have An Elective Class In Each Pod As Well."

This Makes It So Students Are Staying In One Area For Most Of The Day. The Door To The Pods Lock, Allowing The Students To Use The Exit To Escape In Case Of An Emergency Situation.

Miller Also Says The Thing He's Most Excited For Is To Just Fill The School With Students In The Fall.

"I Think Our Focus This Next Year Is Really Going To Be About Building Relationships And Working With Students On The Social Emotional Side Of Their Health," Miller Said. "Because With The Pandemic And Everything Else Going On In The Last Year, Kids Are So Used To Being Behind A Screen And Not Interacting With People As Much As They Need To Be." Miller Expects There To Be About 800 Students When The New School Year Starts.

For The Wastewater Capacity Fee. The Incentive Will Take Effect April 1 And Continue For 12 Months.

Chubbuck Officials Said They Were Pleased To Do Their Part To Boost The Housing Market To Assist Those Living In The Community.

Teton County To Oversee \$300,000 Teton Pass Corridor Plan

Teton County, Wyoming Has Received \$300,000 To Conduct A Teton Pass Corridor Planning Effort.

The Grant Will Review Transportation, Outdoor Recreation Access, And Wildlife Safety.

"Teton Pass Is A Critical Transportation Corridor. That Also Traverses Extraordinary Public Lands Access And Wildlife Habitat," Said Teton County Engineer Amy Ramage. "This Grant Will Allow Us To Develop A Cohesive Plan To Address Unprecedented Levels Of Recreation And Commuter Use, While Also Looking At Ways To Reduce Wildlife/Vehicle Collisions And Improve Pedestrian Safety."

Recreational Use Has Risen Sharply In The Corridor Since The 1990's. There Are Multiple Trailhead Facilities Linking To High-Use Trails During The Summer And Backcountry Ski Terrain During The Winter. Along With Growth In Commuter And Commerce Traffic, The Demand Has Increased Parking Congestion, Conflict, And Safety Concerns.

The Bridger-Teton National Forest And Caribou-Targhee Natonal Forest Manage Most Of The Public Land Adjacent To Highway 22. The Forests Will Work With Teton County, Wyoming, Wyoming Department Of Transportation, And Advocacy Groups, Including Wyoming Pathways And The Teton Backcountry Alliance, Will Work To Balance The Demands. "The Use Of This Area Is Not Going To Decrease So We Need To Develop A Solid Corridor Management Plan That Looks At The Issues Holistically From Idaho To Wyoming," Said Jay Pence, Teton Basin District Ranger For The Caribou-Targhee National Forest.

Teton County Applied For The Grant Because Of Concerns For The Escalating Conflict Between Pedestrian Safety And The Highway Corridor.

An Early Plan Proposes Designs To Improve Pedestrian Safety, Define And Separate Recreation Parking And Improved Signage. The Federal Lands Access Program (Flap) Was Established To Improve Transportation Facilities That Provide Access To Federal Lands, With An Emphasis On High-Use Recreation Sites And Economic Generators. The Teton Pass Corridor Hosts Up To 200,000 Visitors Per Year, 3 Major Trailheads, And Thousands Of Acres Of Public Land.

"A Lot Of The Households Have Kids Who Are In School And, You Know, They All Need A Place To Just Be Stably Housed And Not Be Evicted Because Of Something That Was Out Of Their Control," States Brady Ellis. He's The Vice President Of Housing Support Programs For The Idaho Housing And Finance Association.

He Says Money Has Been Tight For Many Idahoans During The Pandemic, But The Housing Preservation Program Helps Renters Keep A Roof Over Their Heads.

"There Was An Additional Stimulus In December That Was Approved And Dedicated To An Emergency Rental Assistance Program," Explains Ellis.

The Housing Preservation Program Got \$175-Million To Help Cover Rent Across The State.

"It's Easy To Apply," Adds Ellis. When Renters Go To Https://Www.Idahohousing.Com/ One Of The First Things They Will See Is A Moving Banner. One Of The Moving Banner Headlines Reads: "Need Help Paying Rent?" There Is A Large "Apply Now" Button Under The Headline That Takes Website Visitors Straight To An Application. For Those Who Don't Have Access To The Internet, There's Also A Phone Number They Can Call: 1-855-452-0801.

Ellis Says All Applications Should Be Fully Processed Within Seven Days Of Being Submitted.

So Who Qualifies For Help? "Individuals, Or Households, At The 80 Percent Median Area Income Level, Or Below," Explains Ellis. "They Have A Covid-Related Financial Hardship, And They're Renters." If Approved, Renters May Get Assistance For Up To 15 Months. The

Money Is Sent Directly To The Landlord Or Utility Companies. Landlords Can Even Apply On Behalf Of Tenants.

So Far, 3,000 People (1,000 Households) Have Been Approved For This Latest Round Of Rental Assistance Totaling \$3-Million.

Ellis Encourages Anyone Who May Qualify To Apply. He Adds, "You Know, If They Do Have Some Source Of Income They're Able To Use That For Things Like Food, Health Insurance, Health Care, Those Kinds Of Things That Are All Also Necessities."

Ellis Explains In The Last Round Of Aid (Which Began Last Summer And Was Used Up By January), 50 Percent Of Help Went To Ada County, Where They Saw The Most Applicants. However, He Says Any Region Is Eligible And Encourages More Southeast Idahoans To Apply This Round.

Compost Generated From The Program Is Available For Purchase For \$35 Per Ton At The Bannock County Landfill Monday Through Saturday From 9 A.M. To 5 P.M.
