Issue: Those in West Michigan without warm clothing items.

Station Response:

• Held our annual "Share the Warmth" drive. We collected warm clothing items from listeners to be given to area shelters and missions to be donated to those who don't have the funds to purchase coats, hats, mittens, boots, etc.

Issue: Families that need help during the holiday season.

Station Response:

Station Response:
