### Section I. Issues

The stations have identified the following topics as significant issues facing our community in this quarter:

- A. **Ecology:** K2 Radio covers topics and stories about the invasive animals in our community including feral cats, grasshoppers and Mormon crickets, and the wild turkeys. We also talk to experts about invasive plant species not limited to Russian Olive trees.
- B. **Local Food Supply:** K2 Radio covers stories of our local food supply and how businesses are trying to increase more localized food sources through business connections. Casper was once described as a “food desert,” but foodpreneurs are working to change that, in tandem increasing community-focused events and partnerships. We’ve also looked at food insecurity and the efforts of the Wyoming Food Bank to help bring more food to those in need across the state.
- C. **Addiction:** K2 Radio covers stories about addiction from multiple angles. We’ve talked to the police about fentanyl as it pertains to our community and how that is affecting everyone from seniors to children in the community. We also examine the work of individuals who are trying to create pathways for recovering addicts to get back on their feet and become productive members of society. Herein there are always challenges, which we also discuss.
- D. **Community Awareness:** K2 Radio speaks with local agencies about community issues like spring fire hazards, the open-container laws that affect downtown spaces, our veterans and what’s being done to help them cope with PTSD. In general, we talk to real people in the community and attempt to get to know them better so our listeners might, too.
- E. **Healthcare:** Director of the Cancer Coalition, Katie Reed, talks about the problem of cancer in Wyoming, and the difficulty finding specialists in-state.
