### Section I. Issues

The stations have identified the following topics as significant issues facing our community in this quarter:

- A. **Public Safety:** K2 Radio covers topics and stories we think are important to Casper such as the need for security screenings in government buildings before city council meetings and potentially adding more officers to public schools.
- B. **Local Economy:** K2 Radio covers stories of our local economic situation and where local government spending is done. Most recently we have been focused on the changes that could affect local one-cent funds and how certain non-profit organizations may be losing out on funding they have been depending on for years.
- C. **Infrastructure:** K2 Radio covers stories about infrastructure and how the local decisions made are affecting the Casper community, such as the potential to allocate additional one-cent funding for much needed street repair and to improve the current systems of road and bridge upgrades.
- D. **Community Awareness:** K2 Radio covers and promotes the need for the public to get involved with community issues at city and county meetings to ensure they are informed of the decisions being made by elected and appointed officials and to make sure their voice gets heard before the decisions are made.
- E. **Local and State Legislation:** K2 Radio has been covering at length the Wyoming legislation and polarity of Wyoming congressional races. We keep our audience informed of everything being introduced into legislation and have been covering and speaking with those who are making decisions that impact Wyoming as a whole.
