<u>Economic</u>: Positive Outlook for Phoenix in 2014. The Phoenix economy has turned the corner after suffering a devastating collapse in real estate values. Metro area economic growth is outpacing the national average and is expected to remain strong in 2014.

Arizona cities bounce back. Arizona has spent years struggling and slowly recovering from the recent housing crisis and worrying unemployment rates, but a new study shows proof that some smaller towns in the state are making a comeback. Surprisingly, NerdWallet ranked Phoenix in 38th place out of 56 Arizona cities in terms of growth, but smaller areas like Queen Creek, Sahuarita, Eloy and Coolidge are among the places with highest growth rates. NerdWallet ranked the growing cities based on population, employment and income growth statistics over a few years. The city with the highest growth rate of all 56 cities was Florence, Ariz. Second and third place contenders were Queen Creek and Surprise, followed by Buckeye, Somerton and El Mirage.

New Phoenix tourism ad hopes to motivate new visitors. A new ad was put together by the Phoenix tourism leaders to motivate people to come and visit Phoenix. "This is Phoenix," the new ad was put together by Visit Phoenix and the Greater Phoenix Convention and Visitor's Bureau. Many local hotspots are showcased in the two-minute spot. Including Camelback Mountain, Papago Park, Downtown Phoenix and Crescent Ballroom. Tourism officials said the goal of the video is to attract new visitors to the area during the Fall. Valley tourism has been a growing industry so far in 2014. Employment numbers vary depending on the season, but so far Phoenix has averaged 7,000 more jobs a month than in 2013. Tourism is one of Arizona's leading industries. Officials said the industry generates 19.8 billion dollars a year in Arizona, and 12 billion dollars here in the Valley.

South Phoenix light-rail planning gets \$1.6M boost. Efforts to bring light rail to south Phoenix just got a major financial boost. The city is expected to receive a \$1.6 million grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation to ramp up planning for a rail extension south of downtown along Central Avenue to Baseline Road. Councilman Daniel Valenzuela, who lobbied for the grant during a recent trip to Washington, D.C., said bringing light rail to the low-income area is critical given that many residents rely on mass transit to get to work, school and medical appointments. "In some neighborhoods, more than 50 percent of households do not have a vehicle," Valenzuela said. "It absolutely helps speed things up. It's the first major step in the right direction."

Bridgestone subsidiary debuts guayule-rubber operation in Mesa. Bridgestone Americas Inc., a subsidiary of the Japanese tire giant, opened a 10-acre manufacturing facility in Mesa that will turn a woody shrub grown in Eloy into rubber for tires and other products. The Bridgestone Biorubber Process Research Center in Mesa and Bridgestone's 281-acre Agro farm employ about 30 people growing guayule. Soon, they will begin converting the plant to rubber. Nearly all the world's supply of natural rubber is harvested from trees grown in Asia. Guayule, native to Mexico and the Southwest, could offer an alternative supply. Bridgestone officials want to learn to produce a sustainable crop to supply rubber as the company, which sold \$31 billion in tires last year, faces growing global demand. "This is an exciting day for Bridgestone Corporation, Bridgestone Americas and the people of Arizona," said Yoshiyuki Morimoto, senior vice president and chief technology officer. Bridgestone has a corporate goal of producing tires with sustainable materials by 2050. "It is just as important to be good corporate citizens as to advocate for more sustainable businesses," he said.

PetSmart lays off 176 employees. PetSmart, one of nation's largest pet retailers, said it laid off 176 employees Wednesday in an attempt to cut costs and position the company for future profitability. The Phoenix-based company said the cuts involved headquarters jobs and leadership positions in the field. PetSmart has embarked on a cost reduction program that targets all areas of the business, including goods sold, logistics, sourcing, store operating costs and overhead, company spokeswoman Erin Gray said in statement. Earlier this year, Petsmart faced pressure from shareholders demanding a sale of the company. Investment firm Longview Asset Management and hedge fund Jana Partners both publicly called on PetSmart to sell itself, a move they say will benefit shareholders. Longview has about a 9 percent stake in PetSmart, while Jana holds nearly 10 percent, according to FactSet. PetSmart CEO and President David Lenhardt acknowledged during its second quarter earnings call that overall consumer spending is down and that the company is operating in a competitive market where customers have more choices for their pets' needs. PetSmart is Arizona's fourth-largest public company by revenue. It operates 1,249 stores and has 52,000 associates, according to the company's website.

Employment/Jobs: Phoenix year-over-year payroll employment growth has consistently outpaced the national average over the past two years. Annual job growth for the region is expected to maintain its positive trend at around 2.2 percent for 2014 and 2015. Arizona will add 59,000 jobs in 2014, with the growth rate increasing from 2 percent in the two years prior to 2.3 percent, according to a report by the state's Office of Employment and Population Statistics.

Unemployment rates fell in 22 US states in June. Unemployment rates dropped in 22 U.S. states last month and stayed the same in 14, as the nation at large posted a fifth straight month of solid hiring. The Labor Department said Friday that unemployment rates rose in 14 states. Meanwhile, employers added jobs in 33 states and cut back in 17. The biggest drop in the unemployment rate occurred in Illinois, where it fell to 7.1 percent from 7.5 percent. The state's rate has fallen by 0.8 percentage points in the past two months, partly because more people have given up searching for work. Stronger hiring has helped lower unemployment in many parts of the country. Nationwide, employers added 288,000 positions last month, capping the healthiest stretch of job gains in 15 years. The robust increases have helped cut the unemployment rate to 6.1 percent, the lowest in nearly six years. (11am newscast on 7/18, 1:30 in length)

Arizona ranks low in the progress of woman in work force. According to the Phoenix Business Journal, Arizona has the fifth lowest percentage of women in the workforce among U.S. states and the District of Columbia. The August 2014 report from the Institute for Women's Policy Research (IWPR) reveals that just over 55 percent of Arizona women are working. Only West Virginia, Alabama, Arkansas and Mississippi scored lower according to the report, while The District of Columbia, Minnesota, and Nebraska have the highest percentages of women in the workforce. The report based its findings on the percentage of woman in the labor force, as well as median annual earnings, wage between men and woman, and the number of woman in managerial or professional positions, according to The Washington Post. Arizona ranked 30th, while also given a "C" grade, the report states. Arizona women have small salaries compared to other states, according to the report. The median income of working Arizona women is \$36,000 per year while the national median rests at \$37,000. Just next door in California, the median wage is \$41,600. Arizona women make smaller earnings compared to other states, however, wages more closely match what men earn. The report shows that in Arizona women make 80 percent of male wages while the national average is 78.6 percent. Woman in Utah make 69 percent of male wages, while Nevada women make 83.3 percent. The IWPR report reveals that states still vary considerably when it comes to their progress toward women's employment and wages. However, it's worth noting that the status of women in the workforce is strongest in D.C. and the Northeast.

Banks trim 1,600 branches to cut costs, redirect assets. Banks closed more than 1,600 branches across the nation over the past year, as companies directed more attention to dealing with customers through digital channels. The 1.7-percent reduction in the number of branches between mid-2013 and mid-2014 was reported by researcher SNL Financial and based on reports filed with the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. SNL said the consolidation was fueled by banks' desire to cut costs. It was the largest annual branch reduction since the FDIC began reporting electronic records in 1994, midyear, up from \$7.6 trillion when the number of branches peaked in 2009. Among the big three banks operating in Arizona, Chase cut 15 branches nationally while Wells Fargo added 17, according to SNL Financial. Both moves represented changes of less than 0.5 percent in the branch totals of those two institutions. But Bank of America shaved 305 offices of its nationwide total. <u>Immigration:</u> High levels of illegal immigration and crimes committed by unauthorized immigrants are among the key rationales cited by some supporters of a tough new immigration law in Arizona. According to our Governor, Jan Brewer; border violence and crime due to illegal immigration are critically important issues to the people of our state.

Court halts denial of licenses for Arizona immigrants. A federal appeals court has dealt a new blow to Arizona in its series of immigration-related crackdowns, ruling that the state cannot deny driver's licenses to young immigrants who are allowed to stay in the U.S. under a 2012 Obama administration policy. Arizona was one of two states that refused to issue licenses to the immigrants, sparking the latest court fight over the issue. Republican Gov. Jan Brewer called the ruling misguided and said she was considering appeal. The decision follows other high-profile battles between Arizona and the federal government over immigration, including court decisions that struck down much of a 2010 enforcement law but upheld its most hotly debated section, which requires police to check immigration status under certain circumstances. "We hope that this ruling signals the end of what has been an unfortunate anti-immigrant period in Arizona," said Karen Tumlin, one of the attorneys representing the immigrants. A three-judge panel of the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals found there was no legitimate state interest in treating young immigrants granted deferred action on deportation differently from other noncitizens who could apply for driver's licenses. Instead, the panel suggested the policy was intended to express hostility toward the young immigrants, in part because of the federal government's policy toward them. The decision should remove any barriers young immigrants face in getting a driver's

license in Arizona, Tumlin said.

Mom of Sgt Brandon Mendoza pens emotional letter on immigration to President. The mother of Brandon Mendoza, the Mesa police Sergeant who was hit and killed by a wrong-way driver in May, has penned an emotional letter to the President on immigration. In her letter addressed directly to President Barack Obama, Mary Ann Mendoza claims the federal government knew that Raul Silva Corona, the wrong-way driver, whose blood alcohol content was nearly three times the legal limit at the time of the crash, was in the country illegally. She said prosecutors were "lenient" when Corona was convicted of crimes in Colorado. Court records show that Corona pleaded quilty to a 1994 criminal conspiracy charge in Adams County, Colorado, and prosecutors dismissed charges of burglary, assault and leaving an accident scene. His sentence and more details about the charges against him weren't available. "When he was convicted of these crimes and 1994 and the government knew he was in the country illegally, why wasn't he deported? Why are any of these illegal criminals in this country?" she said in her letter. In her letter, the mother calls for changes to immigration laws.

Battle lines are drawn in immigration debate. The ball is now in Congress' court. Less than one week after President Barack Obama asked Congress for \$3.7 billion to address the tens of thousands of immigrant children who have crossed the southern border in recent months, Congress is now tasked with doing something about it. It can pass it, do nothing or craft a new bill. It looks as if the latter approach is the most likely. The path to a solution, however, doesn't appear easy. Democrats and Republicans are deeply divided on both the causes of the problem and the ways to solve it. Republicans appeared on the political talk shows Sunday with a mostly unified message, and their message contrasted starkly with the Democrats' position. Republicans indicated that Obama's request, which includes \$1.8 billion to care for the children in U.S. custody, is not going to advance beyond their in-boxes. While they support the allocation of some money, numerous Republicans said Sunday that any money should be "targeted" to quickly deport the youths and to beef up border security.

US closing emergency child immigrant shelters. The U.S. government is closing emergency shelters at military base shelters in Texas, Oklahoma and California being used to temporarily house unaccompanied immigrant children caught crossing the border. Health and Human Services spokesman Kenneth Wolfe says operations at the shelters will soon be suspended because there have been fewer child immigrants caught at the border and the government has expanded capacity at other shelters. Oklahoma's shelter at Fort Sill is expected to close by Friday. Shelters in Texas at Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland and in California at the Naval Base Ventura County-Port Hueneme will wrap up operations in the next two to eight weeks. The shelters have housed a combined 7,700 immigrant children since opening in May and early June.

Tucson police pressured to end immigration calls. Immigrant rights activists have demanded the Tucson Police Department end its enforcement of the state's immigration law after two men were turned over to Border Patrol agents. Activists staged protests after Tucson police pulled over a man for a traffic infraction and then called Border Patrol after he admitted to being in the country illegally. Norlan Flores Prado was driving back to the hospital to visit his newborn daughter. Tucson police say they have no choice but enforce the SB1070, also known as the "show me your papers" law. The law requires local police to check the immigration status of people they encounter while enforcing other laws.

Crime/Drugs: Arizona crime statistics indicate a total downward trend in crime based on data from 10 years when violent crime was increasing and property crime was decreasing. The crime rate in Arizona for 2014 is expected to be lower than in 2010 when the state violent crime rate was higher than the national violent crime rate average by 31.73% and the state property crime rate was higher than the national property crime rate average by 80.08%.

Phoenix man gets prison term in exploitation case. A Phoenix man who pleaded guilty in a sexual exploitation case involving juveniles has been sentenced to 30 years in prison. A Maricopa County Superior Court spokesman says Judge Peter Reinstein sentenced 28-year-old Christian Salvador Turcios to lifetime probation. Turcios pleaded guilty in May to attempted molestation of a child, molestation of a child, aggravated assault and attempted sexual exploitation of a minor. He was jailed in January 2012 on suspicion of 10 counts of sexual exploitation of a minor, child molesting and unlawful surreptitious video recording. Police searched Turcios' home in December 2011 and found child pornography images and videos. According to police, some images showed Turcios engaged in sexual acts with children believed to be between the ages of 13 and 16.

Tempe man faces felony charges for pointing AR15 at 2 people inside Sky Harbor. Phoenix police officers arrested a 54-year old man after he pointed an AR15 rifle in the direction of two people at Sky Harbor International Airport, according to court documents. In the paperwork, the Tempe man told officers he went to Sky Harbor International Airport to buy a cup of coffee and had no other business at the airport. The incident took place at Terminal 4, which is the busiest terminal at Sky Harbor, in front of the 'B' gates on the non-secure side. ABC15 has learned it's not the first time the man has been spotted at the airport with the rifle. In November 2013, several people alerted officers a man armed with an AR15 was standing in the baggage claim area apparently waiting for a passenger to arrive.

Christian Cunningham speaks out after Ahwatukee attack. A Valley teen is recovering in the hospital after he says he was brutally attacked. Police say Christian Cunningham was walking to a gas station near 44th Street and Knox in Ahwatukee when the driver of a yellow Hummer attempted to run Cunningham and his friends over. "They were a half a foot from hitting us. The second time, my friend threw a rock at the Hummer and that's when it stopped." Cunningham says a group came out of the Hummer. "One of the guys said 'I want to hurt you. I want to see you bleed," said Cunningham. Cunningham says he was repeatedly punched. He said his head kept hitting the ground and he started to have a seizure. "I thought I was going to die," said Cunningham. Police say they arrested two 19 year olds and charged them with Aggravated assault and they are looking for one more. Cunningham will be transferred to a brain injury rehab facility for therapy. The family has set up an account at Wells Fargo if anyone is interested in donating to help pay for his medical bills. The account is under Caring for Christian Cunningham.

Jury convicts Ian MacDonald of manslaughter in stabbing death of Tyrice Thompson. A jury has convicted a 26-year-old man in the 2013 stabbing death of a former ASU football player and Scottsdale bouncer. Ian MacDonald, of Tempe, was found guilty of manslaughter in the death of Tyrice Thompson, 27, on Thursday, August 14, 2014 according to court officials. MacDonald stabbed Thompson multiple times around 1 a.m. Jan. 27 in the parking lot near Martini Ranch in the area of Scottsdale and Camelback roads. Thompson was working as a bouncer for Martini Ranch. Prosecutors say MacDonald stabbed Thompson five times in the back, hip and arm after a fight. Thompson died several days later. MacDonald pleaded not guilty to second-degree murder. Thompson played on the ASU football team from 2003 to 2007. He played tight end and wide receiver. (11am newscast on 8/14, 1:30 in length)

<u>Education</u>: Arizona parents have more choices for educating their young children than ever before. Choice, quality education – that's what Valley residents have learned to expect from Phoenix area schools. The success of our students impacts us all. A skilled, well-educated workforce contributes to a strong economy and the overall quality of life for all Arizonans. As other states and nations become more competitive and successful at producing highly skilled individuals, it's more critical than ever to expect more of our own education system and the results it delivers. This begins with making education a top priority for Arizona.

Arizona judge orders inflation funding for schools. A judge ruled that Arizona public schools are entitled to at least \$317 million in additional state funding for inflation this year and set the stage for further proceedings that could bump the total to \$2.9 billion over the next five years. Maricopa County Superior Court Judge Karen Cooper's ruling is a partial win for school officials who argued that the state violated a voter-approved law by failing to provide mandated inflation funding since the 2009 budget crunch. Cooper ordered the state to reset funding levels for the current fiscal year, and she said she'll hold hearings on whether to order retroactive funding requested by school districts for past fiscal years. With coming years' per-student funding raised to include inflation funding and possible retroactive funding for past years' funding, the five-year cost could reach an estimated \$2.9 billion. The current state budget has \$9.2 billion of spending, and the state's lawyers argued that retroactive payment of inflation funding could blow a hole in the state finances.

ABC15 goes inside Phoenix Amazon Fulfillment Center. It is back-to-school time and online back-to-school shopping is in high gear. ABC15 got an inside look at the Amazon Fulfillment Center at 51st Avenue and Mohave Street. Stacey Keller with

amazon.com says it is the second busiest time of year, second only to the Christmas shopping season. Amazon is starting new deals and has several back to school specials that continue through the end of August. (11am newscast on 7/24, 1:30 in length)

5 ways to make sure a college education pays off. Around this time every year, there is usually a barrage of stories in the media about the ever-escalating amounts of student loan debt. These are accompanied by news of the college majors that pay the most — and, conversely, those that pay the least. Don't pay any attention to the advice embedded within those stories. If you want your child to be miserable, encourage them to pick a college major based on what career pays the most when they are a high school senior. Nothing could be more short-sighted than picking a major based on the earnings for one year. Your child might work for 50 years after graduation. How likely is it that the major they pick based on one year's earnings will pay well for a half-century? The field might not even exist in the future. Many of the highest paying entry-level jobs today didn't exist 10 years ago.

2014 Arizona AIMS test results released: Where did your school rank? The Arizona Department of Education released the 2014 AIMS test results with letter grades for each school in the state. Superintendent John Huppenthal said 65 percent of Arizona's schools received a letter grade of 'A' or 'B'. The test results show 61 percent of students passed the math portion of the test, which remained the same compared to last year. Seventy-nine percent passed the reading assessment, a 1 percent increase from last year. Tenth graders increased two percentage points in math and three percentage points in reading over last year, according to ADE. Writing scores improved by 5 percentage points to 75 percent. ADE said 600 students are at risk of having to repeat third grade, a significant drop from 1,600 back in 2011. The A-F letter grades are based on the weighting of student performance and academic growth from year to year, according to ADE.

Webster's College Dictionary adds selfie, hashtag in first update since 1999. It's a new world, indeed. It's been 15 years since Merriam-Webster updated its New World College Dictionary, and a lot has changed since 1999. According to a release from the Associated Press, publisher Houghton Mifflin Harcourt is launching only the fifth edition of that language glossary since the 1930s. It will be available Aug. 26. Among the book's nearly 5,000 new words will be social media terms like selfie and hashtag, according to the AP's preview. The New World College Dictionary is the official dictionary referenced by the AP Stylebook, a manual for journalists across the world. The recently published 2014 AP Stylebook also added selfie as a new entry, as well as emoil. Snapchat and Vine.

PCSO: San Tan Valley teacher drunk in classroom. A Poston Butte High School teacher was cited for public intoxication, according to police officials. The Pinal County Sheriff's Office identified the teacher as 57-year-old Kathleen Jardine. PCSO learned from a student that Jardine was intoxicated and yelling at a classroom full of students. The 57-year-old teacher initially told authorities she was not drinking but later admitted to drinking the night before, the morning before school and during a lunch break in her classroom. She said she took a cab to work that morning. PCSO said Jardine registered a .205 BAC. A security officer at the school discovered a half full bottle of vodka, an empty single serving size of wine and a half bottle of orange juice in her purse. The Poston Butte High School teacher was cited with Consumption of Alcohol in Public and released to her daughter. PCSO Sheriff Paul Babeu said, "Learning math

can be hard enough, I can't imagine trying to learn it from a drunk teacher." Jardine had also been arrested for DUI in Gilbert. (4pm newscast on 8/14, 1:30 in length)

Two Valley colleges, Anthem College and Bryman School, could close. Students at two Valley colleges are scrambling to figure out what to do after finding out their schools may close. Both are private vocational schools in Phoenix; Anthem College and Bryman School Student Dafine Fernandez says staff told everyone when they showed up for class. "They said if they don't get the stamp of approval from the (U.S.) Department of Education, they're going to be shutting (the) doors," she said. Fernandez has been enrolled at the school for the past three months and is studying to be an X-ray technician. The mother of four says she paid nearly \$20,000 in grants and loans, and wonders what will happen to her money. She also wants to know why students are only now finding out. "I don't understand why they are barely telling us," said Fernandez. "I'm sure they knew about this." We found out both schools are owned by Anthem Education, which has total a of three schools in Arizona and dozens around the country. A week ago, they agreed to sell the schools to a company called International Education Corporation, a move that has to be approved by the U.S. Department of Education.

Universities join forces to help lower-income students. Universities usually compete fiercely for students, research dollars and even bragging rights on the football field. But a group of universities, including Arizona State, is banding together for a common goal: improving graduation rates for lower-income students. The unusual alliance, announced today, brings together 11 major research universities to develop and share proven strategies for increasing student retention and graduation. Arizona State University spearheaded the initiative. "Rich kids have a better chance of getting college degrees," ASU President Michael Crow said. "We're going to even out that playing field so family income is no longer a predictor of college success. We're going to innovate together." Schools in the University Innovation Alliance have raised \$5.7 million to create a national "playbook" of ideas that can be shared. Among those involved in the alliance are Ohio State, Michigan State, Purdue, University of California-Riverside and University of Texas- Austin. Crow is the alliance's chairman. Nationally, about 59 percent of students earn bachelor's degrees within six years. Students from higherincome families have significant advantages. Wealthier families often prepare their children to go to college, Crow said. Lower-income and first-generation college students can have a tougher time adjusting. A 2011 study found that only one in 10 people from low-income families has a bachelor's degree by age 25, compared with half of all people from high-income families. Plans for Arizona school funding short on details. Both Doug Ducey and Fred DuVal talk a lot about education as they campaign for governor. But neither has a long-range plan to deal with the funding crisis facing Arizona's K-12 system. Ducey, a Republican, and DuVal, a Democrat, agree more money should be directed to classrooms. They link Arizona's future economic success to an educated workforce. They talk about the need for high standards, and they support school choice. Both are fathers who send their sons to private schools. But neither candidate has explained how he would address the biggest education-related challenge to face state government in recent history: how to pay for a court-enforced voter mandate to increase school funding at a time when state government is projected to run a deficit as soon as June. The annual inflation adjustments to school funding pencil out to about \$317 million for this year,

and a similar amount in future (11am newscast on 9/29, 1:30 in length)

Housing: The metro Phoenix housing market has been in recovery mode for two years, and it's been a roller coaster every step of the way. Local real estate experts are confident the rebound will continue in 2014, but at a much slower, and even more "normal," pace than we've been experiencing lately. Experts say the 25 to 30 percent year-over-year price spikes Phoenix saw consistently throughout 2013 will look more like 6 or 8 percent in 2014. According to Arizona State University October's median price — \$200,000 — was 27 percent higher than a year earlier, but up by only one-half percent, or \$1,000, from September. Last year, the median price climbed 4.6 percent between September and October.

Phoenix area faces housing shortage. Researchers at Arizona State University say the Phoenix metropolitan area's housing supply is lower than usual, pointing to a possible shortage if demand picks up. The report by ASU's W.P. Carey School of Business says demand has been low, down from 20 percent from May 2013. The lack of demand is masking the fact that the market's supply of homes is 10 percent below normal and could lead to a shortage if demand picks up. Researchers say the median single-family home price has stabilized at just under \$205,000 in May, almost unchanged for three months. That's up 11 percent from last year. Rental homes also continue to be popular alternatives to purchasing and developers are building more multi-family properties to fit demand.

Save Our Home AZ: Principal Reduction Program Helps Arizona Homeowners Thrive Again. The mortgage crisis hit many Arizona homeowners harder than most: In February of 2010, the White House pledged \$1.5 billion in funding to the five states that were suffering the most: Nevada, Michigan, Florida, California, and Arizona. (The list of states has since been expanded.) Not long thereafter, the U.S. Treasury Department awarded the Arizona Department of Housing \$268 million to assist in the prevention of foreclosures on Arizonans' homes. The result: the Save Our Home AZ program, which helps struggling Arizona homeowners in several ways, including reducing the outstanding principal on their mortgages. The program "is committed to helping homeowners avoid foreclosure, reduce negative equity, and stay in their homes," says Daniel Romm of the Arizona Department of Housing, which runs the initiative. "We were tasked with putting together a program that would deal with assisting troubled homeowners, to prevent foreclosure." For those who qualify, the state's help can be significant. Indeed, principal reduction can be a lifesaver. Cookie Coleman received \$98,000 in principal reduction after suffering a heart attack in 2010 and seeing her income drop when she switched to a waitressing job. "My payment dropped from \$800 a month to \$293 a month," says Coleman, who was facing mortgage payments beyond her means. (11am newscast on 8/28, 1:30 in length)

Error costs some Phoenix property owners extra \$5.2 million. A calculation error cost property owners in Phoenix's core an extra \$5.2 million in taxes over the past few years. The state cut funding for the district after a 2009 budget policy added some properties with tax abatement agreements to calculate school districts' local revenue share. The problem is fixed for this fiscal year: A city consultant found the error, which will drop taxes for property owners in the jurisdiction. An accounting error has cost property owners in Phoenix's core an extra \$5.2 million in taxes over the past few years, according to the Phoenix Elementary School District. About 21,800 properties between Thomas and Buckeye roads and 23rd Avenue and 16th Street overpaid to compensate for reduced state funding for the school district. And although a consultant caught the error, those taxpayers won't get a refund for the mistake. They will, however, likely see their property taxes drop slightly moving forward. Don Keuth, president of Phoenix Community Alliance, said his group was one of the associations

to raise concerns with the city about rising property taxes, which triggered the consultant study that found the error. But if the property owners wanted to recoup their losses, they would find that filing a lawsuit would cost more than the refund is worth, he said. (6am newscast on 9/18, 1: 30 in length)

Arizona health director allows use of pot for PTSD. Arizona residents who suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder will be able to legally use marijuana to help alleviate their symptoms under a decision announced by the state's top health official. The decision by Department of Health Services Director Will Humble adopts the findings of an administrative law judge's recommendation issued last month. The decision was made public on the day Humble was required to accept, modify or reject Judge Thomas Shedden's decision. It takes effect on Jan. 1. Humble denied adding PTSD to the list of ailments that qualified for a medical marijuana card in December, after a public hearing and comment period where 700 people supported the effort to add the disorder and only two people spoke in opposition.

Arizona health program concerned about merger plan. Arizona's Medicaid program is expressing concern about Phoenix-based Banner Health's planned acquisition of the University of Arizona's hospitals and medical clinics. The board that oversees the state university system in June approved the merger that could make Banner the state's largest private employer. Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System Director Thomas Betlach (BET'-lack) says the state system is requiring University Health Care and Banner to submit documents related to the planner merger. Betlach notes that Banner last year failed to win an AHCCCS contract and he says the planner merger means the state system has "tremendous concerns regarding the integrity of the competitive procurement process." Acording to Betlach, the system may terminate, modify or continue its existing contracts with University Health Care's network in response to the acquisition.

Arizona children may be sickened with enterovirus. Doctors have confirmed that Arizona children have been sickened with some type of enterovirus, a family of more

than 100 strains that typically circulate during the summer and fall. Officials have sent samples to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to test for the severe D68 strain that his sickened children elsewhere and seems to leave children with asthma or other breathing illnesses particularly vulnerable. The CDC said that there have been 104 confirmed cases in 10 states. Arizona public health officials said today that a severe respiratory virus which has sickened children in at least 10 states may have reached Arizona. The Arizona Department of Health Services has reported an increase in the number of children who have been hospitalized for upper-respiratory illness. The state has sent samples to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to test for a particular strain of a common virus Doctors have confirmed that Arizona children have been sickened with some type of enterovirus, a family of more than 100 strains that typically circulate during the summer and fall. (11am newscast on 9/16, 1:30 in length)

New surgical robot gives doctors better vision, flexibility. Have you ever been working on a project around the house or garage and thought if you just had another hand to hold this or turn that it would make a task easier? Well, it turns out doctors feel the same way, but thanks to a brand-new robot at Abrazo Health's West Valley Hospital, now they do have an extra hand. It's not quite as handy as an octopus, but it's halfway there. The previous robot also had four arms, but Dr. P.J. Jain said the four arms on the brand-new da Vinci® Xi robot are designed to get doctors exactly where they need to go. "The arms here are much more ergonomic," Jain said. "They're not as large. They can be put closer together." Not only does the entire robot move, but the arms can rotate and spin on a boom. Dr. Miles Howard said that lets doctors see and go wherever they need inside the body.

Child Abuse/Parenting: Arizona promotes healthy parenting among individuals and in communities raising children. Two reports set the stage for the daunting work facing the state task force charged with reinventing the state's child-welfare agency. They confirm in numbers and trend lines the continued issues confronting child safety in Arizona: an increasing number of reports of child abuse and neglect, a growing number of kids in foster care and a revolving door for a quarter of the children caught up in the child-welfare system.

Baby Gabriel update: Elizabeth Johnson released from Arizona prison. Elizabeth Johnson, the mother of an infant commonly referred to as "Baby Gabriel", who vanished in 2009 and hasn't been seen since, was released from an Arizona prison. Johnson was freed from Perryville prison in Goodyear after spending five years in jail. Johnson's attorney, Marc Victor, said that she was in good spirits when released from prison. Victor said Johnson was looking forward to rejoining society and had plans to help single mothers in need. The attorney did not provide specifics related to those plans. Victor said that Johnson has no idea where Gabriel is and assumes he is with a good family. He said even if she could find him, she wouldn't be sure it would be in his best interests. "Everything else speaks to that she was a very dedicated, loving mother to Gabriel," Victor said. The 27-year-old has been placed under supervision of the Maricopa County Adult Probation Department. Shanesha Taylor update: Mom who left kids in hot car accepts deal to avoid prosecution. Prosecutors and a Phoenix woman reached a deal Friday that would allow her to avoid prosecution for leaving her two young sons alone in a hot car while she was at a job interview. Maricopa County Attorney Bill Montgomery said his office and 35-year-old Shanesha Taylor have an agreement under which he'll dismiss two felony child abuse charges against her if she meets several conditions. Those include

completing parenting and substance abuse treatment programs and establishing education and child care trust funds for her children. Authorities arrested Taylor after bystanders in Scottsdale reported seeing her two sons alone in her car in March. (11am newscast, 1:30 in length)

PD: Kaleb Gage Pence left 2-year-old son home alone to go look for wife. A 21-year-old man is facing charges after he left his toddler son home alone while out looking for his wife. According to police, Kaleb Gage Pence was seen riding his motorcycle around an apartment complex near 55th Avenue and Indian School Road wearing a sidearm and carrying a rifle. When confronted by management, Pence allegedly told them he was undercover and showed a badge that said "officer." Police said Pence told management he was looking for his wife in one of their units. Pence's 2-year-old son was found home alone by Pence's grandfather and when he could not find the boy's father a neighbor came over to take the child until a family member came home. Police said they found two loaded rifles in the garage where Pence told officers he left them, and a BB gun that he was wearing. Pence's motorcycle was parked in the home's driveway, and the apartment managers identified him as the person they'd seen at the complex.

Mesa preschool employee pleads guilty to abuse. A Mesa preschool employee accused of child abuse after police found a 2-year-old girl restrained in a sleeping area has changed her plea to guilty. Maricopa County prosecutors say 22-year-old Lauren Miller pleaded guilty to three counts of child abuse. Her sentencing is scheduled for Sept. 18. Miller was arrested last October on suspicion of two counts of child abuse and two counts of unlawful imprisonment and pleaded not guilty. She was accused of wrapping the girl in a blanket and tying the ends of the cloth so tightly that the toddler couldn't move. A co-worker at the Cholla Montessori child-care facility took photos of the tied-up girl and sent them to Mesa police. (11am newscast, 1:30 in length)

Shanesha Taylor update: Phoenix mom regains custody of her 2 young sons. A Phoenix woman who left her two children in a hot car while she attended a job interview has regained custody of her two children. Shanesha Taylor was barred from seeing her two young sons after her March 20 arrest and only had visitation rights before Thursday's court decision. Bystanders reported seeing Taylor's children alone in her car in Scottsdale and authorities say the temperature inside the car was above 100 degrees. Taylor told investigators that she didn't have anyone to watch her 2-year-old and 8-month-old sons. Last month, Maricopa County prosecutors agreed to dismiss abuse charges against the 35-year-old single mother if she successfully completes a diversion program. Taylor told a judge Wednesday that she's establishing trust funds for the future education and child care needs of her sons. (11am newscast on 8/28, 1:30 in length)

<u>Safety</u>: As a television station we try and report on how Arizona works with the citizens to assure a degree of safety in our community. The success of our students impacts us all. A skilled, well-educated workforce contributes to a strong economy and the overall quality of life for all Arizonans.

<u>DPS: Wrong-way driver stopped on Loop 202.</u> Officials were able to stop a wrong-way driver in the East Valley. According to DPS, a wrong-way driver was reported traveling eastbound in the westbound lanes near the Loop 202 and McQueen. DPS said they first received a 911 call of a person passed out at the wheel, the caller said the vehicle sat at the intersection of Alma School and the Loop 202 while the intersection's traffic lights cycled twice. While DPS was en route a caller reported the driver traveling the wrong way on the Loop 202. DPS said they did not pursue the driver, but DPS did use

stop sticks to stop the vehicle. The 24-year-old female driver eventually stopped near Val Vista Road and was arrested. The woman was driving the wrong-way for about 10 minutes, DPS said. DPS used a traffic break along the Loop 202 east of Val Vista Road to bring traffic to a stop.

Laundry, dishwashing detergent pods sending kids to the hospital. They look harmless. Almost joyful, especially to children. But highly concentrated single-load laundry detergent packs are sending thousands of children to emergency rooms after mistaking the colorful product for a teething toy or a piece of candy. Four children were seen in the emergency room at United Regional Health Care System in July after biting into the water-soluble packet that contains the caustic chemicals. Dr. John Hilmi, medical director of emergency services at the hospital, said 70 percent of toxicity ingestion cases now come from laundry detergent pods as well as similar dishwashing products. The pods were first seen in Europe in 2001, and were introduced in the United States in 2010. The emergency physician said poison victims have ranged from 18 months to 5 years old. "They cause a very specific kind of irritation and also what's called liquefaction necrosis of the mucosa, or the lining of the esophagus and lining of the airway as well," he said. "So it literally will liquefy that tissue." Hilmi said not only does the high pH levels of some of the chemicals damage tissues, but there are other contents in the pods that alter mental status.

Parents frustrated over possibility of mold in classrooms. A meeting between parents and Deer Valley Unified School District officials turned heated over fears of mold in an elementary school. School officials decided to move classes out of the school. In a letter to parents, school officials wrote: At the conclusion of the meeting, it was determined in the best interest of students, teachers and parents of Terramar, school will be in session at an alternative site. Students that come to Terramar in the morning will be relocated to Christ's Church of the Valley (CCV) for September 16th and 17th. Terramar Elementary, near 70th Avenue and Happy Valley Road, is a relatively new school, but it has a chronic problem with leaks when storms move through. School officials say, despite their best efforts, contractors have been unable to solve the water leakage problem over the years. While school officials say their air quality tests last week came back clear, parents insist the school has a major mold problem. (6am newscast on 9/16, 1:30 in length)

<u>DPS cracking down on distracted driving</u>. The Arizona Department of Public Safety is cracking down on distracted driving by stopping thousands of people not paying attention. DPS officers reported that they made nearly 20,000 traffic stops for distracted driving between Jan. 1 and Sept. 16. Officials said distractions included cellphone use, eating or drinking, reaching for objects, pets, smoking or applying makeup. DPS said 3,642 drivers were stopped for cellphone use, 3,508 drivers were stopped for other occupant-related issues and 2,385 were stopped for outside distractions. DPS officers investigated 2,400 collisions attributed to distracted driving during the eight-and-a-half-month period.
