**Economic:** Positive Outlook for Phoenix in 2014. The Phoenix economy has turned the corner after suffering a devastating collapse in real estate values. Metro area economic growth is outpacing the national average and is expected to remain strong in 2014.

Arizona governor candidates spar in final debate. Different philosophies on improving the state's economy and rebuilding an education system damaged by budget cuts dominated the debate between the Republican and Democratic candidates for Arizona governor. Republican Doug Ducey said he hopes to make the state more business-friendly by freezing and then rolling back state regulations and creating what he called a personal and business income tax code as close to zero as possible. But Democrat Fred DuVal called Ducey's tax-cutting plan unrealistic at a time when the state is facing a deficit of more than \$1.5 billion in the coming two years. He said more money isn't getting to classrooms because of cuts in state funding, and that the economy will grow when businesses know qualified graduates are available to hire

Doug Ducey talks jobs, economy with ABC15 Mornings. Governor-elect Doug Ducey joined ABC15 Mornings for his first television interview since being elected. Ducey answered several questions from ABC15 viewers. Ducey mentioned that Arizona has a budget issue and that he is grateful in the trust Arizonans have put in him to get the economy growing again in the Grand Canyon State. Ducey said he wants companies to see Arizona as a perfect place to move their business to.

Big data health company opening Scottsdale offices. A New Zealand health care analytics company plans to open a Scottsdale office to serve its clients in North America, bringing at least 100 jobs in the next year. Orion Health, based in Auckland, is already looking for more software engineers to staff its Center of Excellence, which will help analyze health care data to provide "decision support to clinicians and patients." Orion plans to expand to 500 jobs within four years, said Joseph Valdez, a spokesman for the Arizona Commerce Authority, which helped Orion locate in the

state. Orion becomes a tech-heavy addition to the state's growing health-care industry, which has been a bright spot in the Arizona labor market in recent years.

Hayden Flour Mill to be transformed into amphitheater, hotel and restaurants. The site of the old Hayden Flour Mill in Tempe has been desolate and empty for years, but it will soon become a shiny, new mixed-use development. Phoenix Business Journal reports that if a Tempe City Council action to negotiate a contract to redevelop the site goes through the abandoned building will be demolished to make way for the new project. Chicago-based Baum Development has plans to completely redevelop the historic site on Mill Avenue and Rio Salado Parkway.

Phoenix Police Chief Daniel Garcia fired after Thursday press conference. Phoenix police Chief Daniel Garcia has been fired less than an hour after he held a fiery press conference. Phoenix City Councilman Sal DiCiccio tweeted the news saying, "Pleased to hear that the City Manager is relieving #Phoenix Police Chief Garcia of duty." Minutes later, Phoenix Vice Mayor Jim Waring also confirmed the news to ABC15. During a 15-minute news conference an hour earlier, Garcia spoke passionately about his role as the chief of police, his officers and the department's goal of building trust with the public. He also asked the City of Phoenix to write him a two-year contract, "It is time to silence the police union critics," said Garcia, speaking about the "no confidence" vote the Phoenix Law Enforcement Agency and Phoenix Police Sergeants and Lieutenants Association unions threatened to deliver to him that month. The police unions have alleged that Garcia has lost credibility with his officers. They spoke out last month after a former officer committed suicide after battling PTSD.

Employment/Jobs: Phoenix year-over-year payroll employment growth has consistently outpaced the national average over the past two years. Annual job growth for the region is expected to maintain its positive trend at around 2.2 percent for 2014 and 2015. Arizona will add 59,000 jobs in 2014, with the growth rate increasing from 2 percent in the two years prior to 2.3 percent, according to a report by the state's Office of Employment and Population Statistics.

Forecast: Arizona 2015 job growth unspectacular. Arizona will likely see lackluster economic growth in the coming year as the hangover from the housing bust continues to dampen the economic recovery, economists presenting at an annual forecast meeting. The lack of a rebound in the construction industry is one of the major reasons the state continues to see lower-than-normal job growth, according to presentations at the Arizona State University business school's annual forecast luncheon in Phoenix. The forecast calls for about 68,000 new jobs next year, meaning it will take another 18 months for Arizona to finish replacing all 312,000 jobs lost in the Great Recession that ended in June 2009, ASU economist Lee McPheeters said. "It looks like we have a very slow-growth economy,"

Pima County mulls not hiring smokers. Pima County will consider later this month whether to no longer hire smokers and put a price on workers who do smoke. The Pima County Board of Supervisors is scheduled to vote Dec. 16 on a policy that would refuse the hiring of any smokers, the Arizona Daily Star reported. The proposal would also impose a 30 percent health-insurance surcharge on employees who smoke or consume other tobacco products. According to county health officials, the policy could lead to more than \$1 million in savings annually in health-care costs. Pima County Administrator Chuck Huckelberry said there will likely be significant saving if smokers and tobacco users are gradually replaced with healthier workers. "Our taxpayers pay for our health insurance because we are self-insured," Huckelberry said in an interview. "Anything we can do to reduce the cost is beneficial."

Immigration: High levels of illegal immigration and crimes committed by unauthorized immigrants are among the key rationales cited by some supporters of a tough new immigration law in Arizona. According to our Governor, Jan Brewer; border violence and crime due to illegal immigration are critically important issues to the people of our state.

Mom of Sgt Brandon Mendoza pens emotional letter on immigration to President. The mother of Brandon Mendoza, the Mesa police Sergeant who was hit and killed by a wrong-way driver in May, has penned an emotional letter to the President on immigration. In her letter addressed directly to President Barack Obama, Mary Ann Mendoza claims the federal government knew that Raul Silva Corona, the wrong-way driver, whose blood alcohol content was nearly three times the legal limit at the time of the crash, was in the country illegally. She said prosecutors were "lenient" when

Oracle residents concerned over undocumented youth violence. Three bars of soap stuffed into a sock; that is the weapon the Pinal County Sheriff's Office says a 13-year-old from Columbia used to assault a 74-year-old staff member back in October. That is one of the recent calls, according to a log from PCSO, 13 calls total compared to eight calls during the same time last year. "When you compare the types of calls last year, one of them related to acts of violence. This year, eight of them related to acts of violence. Five of them were assaults and either student onto staff or student onto student," said Sheriff Paul Babeu. Arizona joining Texas-led immigration lawsuit against Obama executive action. Texas and 16 other states filed a suit in federal court in the Southern District of Texas. They argue President Barack Obama's move to spare up to 5 million immigrants from deportation "tramples" key portions of the U.S. Constitution. Brewer considered several

actions before signing onto the Texas-led suit, spokesman Andrew Wilder said. "Gov. Brewer was reviewing all the state's options to fight President Obama's illegal amnesty for 5 million illegal aliens, one of which was joining this multi-state lawsuit and one of which was Arizona pursuing its own legal course of action," Wilder said. Many top Republicans have denounced Obama's move. Before the lawsuit, the only legal action came from Maricopa County Sheriff Joe Arpaio, who sued the president the day he announced the action. The suit filed by Texas attorney general and governor-elect Greg Abbott alleges Obama is failing to faithfully execute the laws enacted by Congress by attempting to rewrite immigration laws. The suit also said the action will cost states money because it will worsen the humanitarian crisis along the southwest border.

Sheriff to halt squad targeting immigrant ID theft. An Arizona sheriff known for arresting hundreds of immigrants in the country illegally on charges of finding work using fake or stolen identities is planning to close the controversial squad that investigates such cases. Maricopa County Sheriff Joe Arpaio's decision to disband the criminal employment squad will end his last major foothold in immigration enforcement after the courts and federal government have gradually reined in his powers in recent years. Since 2008, Arpaio has raided 83 businesses, leading to more than 700 immigrants being charged with using fake or stolen IDs to get jobs. The raids have been criticized as focusing too heavily on the workers instead of employers. "Here is guy who abused these laws and twisted them in such a sick way to do it for political gain. But I am glad that the reign over immigrants is over," said Lydia Guzman, a civil rights advocate who documented many of Arpaio's business raids and immigration patrols.

Young immigrants allowed to get driver's licenses. A judge cleared the way for thousands of young immigrants in Arizona who are protected from deportation under an Obama administration policy to get driver's licenses. The preliminary injunction issued by U.S. District Judge David Campbell bars the state from enforcing Gov. Jan Brewer's policy of denying the licenses to about 20,000 immigrants. The injunction that takes effect on Monday was a formality that carries out instructions issued in July by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. The move in Arizona to deny the licenses was a reaction to steps taken by the Obama administration in June 2012 to shield thousands of immigrants from deportation. Brewer's move marked the nation's most visible challenge to the Obama policy. She has asked the U.S. Supreme Court to review her appeal of the 9th Circuit decision. Nebraska is the only other state to have made similar denials, and a federal judge this year dismissed a lawsuit contesting that state's policy.

**Crime/Drugs:** Arizona crime statistics indicate a total downward trend in crime based on data from 10 years when violent crime was increasing and property crime was decreasing. The crime rate in Arizona for 2014 is expected to be lower than in 2010 when the state violent crime rate was higher than the national violent crime rate average by 31.73% and the state property crime rate was higher than the national property crime rate average by 80.08%.

Tempe Town Lake light poles stripped of copper wiring. More than 30 light poles along the northern edge of Tempe Town Lake have been stripped of their copper wiring, amounting to \$15,000 in damage, Tempe police reported. An electrician working for Tempe discovered the damage. The 32 poles, just east of the Mill Avenue Bridge, were near the pedestrian and bike path by the Town Lake Marina. Police said it's possible visitors in the area might have seen the thieves stripping the poles, but didn't

know that they were committing a crime. Tempe police said officers will work closely with salvage yards and neighboring law-enforcement agencies to help find traffickers of stolen metals.

Isabella Grogan-Cannella update: Police execute search warrant at murdered girl's home. Bullhead City Police have arrested the parents of Isabella Grogan-Cannella, the young girl who was reported missing and then found dead in a shallow grave near her home in September. Tania Ann Grogan, 29, and her husband, Ralph Pat Leroy Folster III, 28, were taken into custody for felony drug charges. Police said they started investigating the couple back in September after receiving information they were dealing meth and heroin in their neighborhood near Lakeside and Riverview drives. Authorities say Folster refused to come out of his house. After a two hour stand-off with police, Folster climbed up the attic and attempted to gain entry into the house next door. He eventually came out of the house voluntarily. Police said Grogan and Folster were arrested for possession of dangerous drugs, possession of dangerous drugs for sale and the sales of dangerous drugs.

PD: Man stabbed several times in Phoenix. Officials are investigating after a man was stabbed in Phoenix. Phoenix police said a man was assaulted by three Hispanic males in their twenties near 32nd Street and Roosevelt Road. During the attack the victim was stabbed multiple times, police said. The victim was taken the hospital with non-life threatening injuries. He was unable to tell officials any other information.

Phoenix police shooting of unarmed, black man ignites outcry. The deadly shooting of a black, unarmed drug suspect by a white Phoenix police officer who mistook a pill bottle for a gun demonstrates the challenges law enforcement agencies face at a time of unrest over police tactics. Community members gathered in Phoenix to protest the shooting of 34-year-old Romain Brisbon. Phoenix police say the officer feared Brisbon was armed, but some critics say the officer went too far. The protest lasted for a couple of hours. The marchers stood and laid down in front of the Phoenix Police Department chanting for change. No arrests were made, police said. They asked for people to get on their cell phones and document everything police are doing. They also said they want officers to start wearing body cameras.

PD: Woman shot in head at home in west Phoenix. Police say a woman in her 50s was shot in the head at her home in west Phoenix. Phoenix Police Sgt. Trent Crump said officers were called to the home near 67th Avenue and Van Buren Street to investigate a domestic violence call. Crump said when officers arrived on scene, the woman was standing outside and told police her husband shot her and was still inside the house. Officers immediately took the woman to the hospital where she remains in critical condition. At 9:55 p.m., Crump said the man had been found dead inside the home of an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound.

Man shot after throwing knives at Phoenix officers, police say. Phoenix Police are investigating a reported officer-involved shooting. According to Sgt. Jonathan Howard, the shooting took place near 24th Avenue and Union Hills in Phoenix. Police say a man in his 20s confronted a worker in the area and began throwing rocks at him. When police responded to the worker's call for help, the man began throwing rocks and knives at officers. The officers then opened fire at the man. Phoenix Fire Department Capt. Mark Vanacore says one patient has been transported in extremely critical condition.

**Education:** Arizona parents have more choices for educating their young children than ever before. Choice, quality education – that's what Valley residents have learned to expect from Phoenix area schools. The success of our students impacts us all. A skilled, well-educated workforce contributes to a strong economy and the overall quality of life for all Arizonans. As other states and nations become more competitive and successful at producing highly skilled individuals, it's more critical than ever to expect more of our own education system and the results it delivers. This begins with making education a top priority for Arizona.

Arizona teacher shortage forces schools to go international. Casa Grande schools has hired 11 teachers from the Philippines this year. There are more than 500 unfilled teaching positions statewide. Low pay and stressful working conditions blamed for the teacher shortage. Shannon Goodsell was downright scared when he saw the number of teacher openings. The superintendent of the 3,800-student Casa Grande Union High School District had 19 faculty openings at the end of last school year. He had no applicants, not even a resume from a new college graduate. "When you have no applicants in your job pool, it is scary," he said. Low pay and tough new expectations for teachers have led to a shortage of qualified people willing to take jobs in Arizona's classrooms. Arizona has approximately 95,000 certified teachers, but only about 52,000 are teaching this year, according to the Arizona Department of Education. At the start of the summer,

Arizona law leads to 'edit' of biology textbook. School district staff in Gilbert, Arizona will "edit" a high-school honors biology textbook after board members agreed that it does not align with state regulations on how abortion is to be presented to public-school students. Gilbert Public School board members, backed by a conservative religious group, voted 3-2 to make the change, arguing that they are complying with a 2-year-old state law that requires public schools to "present childbirth and adoption as preferred options to elective abortion." The board made its decision after listening to a presentation from Natalie Decker, a lawyer for Scottsdale-based Alliance Defending Freedom. The advocacy group brought the chapter to board members' attention. Apparently, in 2012, Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer (R) signed into a law a measure that requires public schools to present childbirth and adoption as preferred options to elective abortion. What's wrong with that? In Gilbert, the honors biology class uses a textbook with a page that told students, "[C]omplete abstinence, avoiding intercourse, is the only totally effective method of birth control." The same page includes information – rather clinic information – about the morning-after pill and medically-induced abortion. The procedure, the text says, "requires a doctor's prescription and several visits to a medical facility." The state Board of Education and its lawyer said the paragraph in question isn't a problem – it doesn't advocate or encourage abortion – but apparently that didn't matter.

University of Arizona receives funding for public health training. The University of Arizona has been awarded a four-year, \$3.6 million grant to establish public health training centers. The money comes from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Health Resources and Services Administration. The university's Mel and Enid

Zuckerman College of Public Health will work with organizations and colleges in Nevada, California, Hawaii and the U.S. Affiliated Pacific Islands to open training centers there. Each center will assess what type of training is needed for public health professionals in their states. The focus will be on rural areas that have the greatest health disparities and where training opportunities are limited.

One Course Without Pay. When it comes to first-year writing courses, how many sections are too many for one instructor to teach? Full-time, non-tenure-track faculty members at Arizona State University say five per semester, and they're protesting their department's plan to increase their teaching load to that number (up from four) each term, starting next fall. They say they're worried the service work they'll give up in exchange for the extra course won't be taken up by tenure-line faculty, and that they won't be able to give needy students the same level of attention. In effect, the university has just increased instructors' teaching workload by 25 percent, without offering an extra dollar for the effort.

Arizona awarded \$20M federal education grant. Arizona officials say the state will receive \$20 million in federal funds to enhance early childhood education. The state Department of Education announced that the grants have been awarded as part of the Preschool Development Grant program. Officials say the funds will go toward ensuring preschool programs are more accessible to children in at-risk communities throughout the state. Superintendent of Public Instruction John Huppenthal says preschool education can improve the chances of success for more vulnerable children. The U.S. Department of Education and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services jointly oversee the grant program.

Teacher says Common Core views led to retaliation. A Tucson teacher who says he suffered retaliation from state Department of Education staffers because he opposed Arizona's new Common Core standards is suing the state.. The lawsuit filed by the Goldwater Institute in Maricopa County Superior Court Tuesday seeks to have teacher Brad McQueen reinstated to state testing committees and notes placed in his state file removed. The suit says McQueen was removed from his committee roles earlier this year after he spoke out against Common Core and its accompanying tests in a newspaper story. Goldwater attorney Kurt Altman says the removal and notes placed in his file violate McQueen's free speech rights. An education department spokeswoman said neither the department nor Superintendent of Public Instruction John Huppenthal could comment on the lawsuit.

**Housing:** The metro Phoenix housing market has been in recovery mode for two years, and it's been a roller coaster every step of the way. Local real estate experts are confident the rebound will continue in 2014, but at a much slower, and even more "normal," pace than we've been experiencing lately. Experts say the 25 to 30 percent year-over-year price spikes Phoenix saw consistently throughout 2013 will look more like 6 or 8 percent in 2014. According to Arizona State University October's median price — \$200,000 — was 27 percent higher than a year earlier, but up by only one-half percent, or \$1,000, from September. Last year, the median price climbed 4.6 percent between September and October.

Ahwatukee homeowners told get ready to move; the 202 is coming through. The price of progress is the possibility of nearly 200 Ahwatukee homeowners having to move out of the way of the Loop 202 South Mountain Freeway. It's been a controversial topic for more than two decades and now the Arizona Department of Transportation is letting homeowners know it's finally happening. The long fabled shortcut around South

Mountain is one federal approval away from moving forward to the construction phase that could begin as early as 2016. "It's kind of sad because all my kids were born in this house," said James Voss, holding a letter from ADOT to homeowners who are in the freeway's path. Voss said he has known the freeway might come through his front door since he bought the house in 2000. But now, holding his ADOT letter, he has quite a few questions. The highway project's \$1.9 billion budget includes the price of the state buying those properties and it already owns a handful. ADOT expects the final federal approval for the project to come through in the first part of 2015. (11am newscast on 10/22, 1:30 in length)

Child homelessness on the rise in Arizona. The number of homeless children in the U.S. has surged in recent years to an all-time high. A comprehensive state-by-state report by the National Center on Family Homelessness says one child in every 30 is homeless. It blames the problem on the lack of affordable housing and the impacts of pervasive domestic violence. The new report calculates that nearly 2.5 million children in America were homeless at some point last year. The number is based on the Department of Education's latest count of 1.3 million homeless children in public schools, supplemented by estimates of homeless pre-school children not counted by the DOE. The problem is especially severe in California, which has one-eighth of the U.S. population, but accounts for more than one-fifth of the homeless children -- that's nearly 527,000 homeless kids. **Health & Medical Care:** Phoenix is the nation's fifth largest city and has a wide range of hospitals to serve the growing population. To keep up with the Valley's amazing growth, health care institutions continue to add services and facilities. We have excellent health care institutions in the Valley, a list that includes the world-renowned Mayo Clinic and Barrow Neurological Institute.

Department of Health: First case of Enterovirus D68 confirmed in Arizona. The Arizona Department of Health is confirming its first case of Enterovirus D68 in our state, a virus that had led to the recent deaths of children around the country. Laura Oxley, spokesperson for the Arizona Department of Health Services, said a total of 44 cases have been sent to the Centers for Disease Control since August 5. Of those cases, one tested positive for Enterovirus D68, a virus that causes respiratory problems and appears to be affecting kids with breathing issues. Of the others, six tested positive for Rhinovirus, six tested positive for another form of enterovirus or rhinovirus, and 14 tested negative. Seventeen additional test results are still pending, said Oxley. The Health Department said the patient who tested positive for EV-D68 has "recovered." Specifics about the case, or where it occurred, were not released. Enteroviruses are very common, especially in the early fall. (6pm newscast on 10/22, 1:30 in length)

Report: Soft drinks speed up aging process at the same rate as cigarettes. Drinking soft drinks and smoking cigarettes both speed up your body's aging process, at about the same time, according to a recent study from the American Journal of Public Health. As you get older, your telomeres, which are caps on the end of your chromosomes shrink. Drinking one 20-ounce serving of soda per day is linked to 4.6 years of additional aging, the same effect cigarettes have on your body, as reported by The Washington Post. The study's lead author, University of California at San Francisco postdoctoral fellow, Cindy Leung spoke to the Washington Post. Along with other researchers, Leung sampled DNA from more than 5,300 healthy Americans, ages 20 to 65, in the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey from about 14 years ago. The study found that people who drank soft drinks had shorter telomeres. Once a telomere starts losing length, it becomes more difficult for cells to regrow, and so, your body ages. The study pertained to the large amount of sugar stuffed into one serving

of soda. According to the study's senior author Elissa Epel, sugar is toxic to metabolism, as is smoking cigarettes..

Pima County records 1st flu case of the season. Pima County has confirmed its first flu case of the season. County health officials says the case involves a young child who lives in Pima County. Dr. Francisco Garcia of the county Health Department says the confirmed case serves as a reminder that everyone should get vaccinated to protect themselves, their families and others in the community.

New hope for spinal cord injuries; valley docs first to try new device. Doctors at Barrow Neurological Institute recently performed a first ever surgery. They implanted a new device into the spinal cord of a 25-year-old man who was severely injured after a motorbike accident. The surgery performed here in Arizona could set a precedent for other surgeries around the globe. Doctors implanted what they call a scaffolding; they hope it will act as a bridge across the injured portion of the spinal cord in an attempt to heal it. It's a daily routine now for 25-year-old Jordan Fallis, working out with physical and occupational therapists. They're hopeful that slowly but surely he'll regain the use of his legs after a devastating dirt-bike accident last month.

Flu in Arizona: Flu season could be tough, Arizona health official says. Arizona's top health official says this flu season may be more difficult than others. Health Services Director Will Humble says the flu strain causing the most cases so far this year is one whose variations lead to more hospitalizations and death. Humble also says the strain circulating now has changed from the strain included in this year's flu vaccine and that the change may reduce the vaccine's ability to fully protect against the flu. He says it's too early to know whether it'll be a severe flu season or one in which the vaccine provides great protection. But according to Humble, what is known is that it's better to have some protection than no protection. He urges people to get vaccinated now. It takes two weeks to get immunity.

Child Abuse/Parenting: Arizona promotes healthy parenting among individuals and in communities raising children. Two reports set the stage for the daunting work facing the state task force charged with reinventing the state's child-welfare agency. They confirm in numbers and trend lines the continued issues confronting child safety in Arizona: an increasing number of reports of child abuse and neglect, a growing number of kids in foster care and a revolving door for a quarter of the children caught up in the child-welfare system.

Child dies after being left in hot car in Phoenix church parking lot A 3-year-old boy has died after being left in a car by a family friend over the weekend. According to Phoenix Police, the victim was found in a car at Abundant Life Church near 20th Street and Roeser Road around 2pm. . Police say Hayden Nelson had been left in the car for around three hours. Police initially said Nelson was 3 months old, however, later corrected the child's age to 3 years old. The baby's mother arrived at the church early for choir practice, leaving the child with a family friend, a 27-year-old woman who is now a suspect in the case. The suspect arrived at the church around 11 a.m. She was reportedly running late, but her and two other children exited the car and went inside. After choir practice, the mother and friend realized the child could not be found and searched the church and parking lot. The suspect checked the car and found the boy inside in "medical distress," police say it was approximately 95 to 97 degrees outside

A federal judge has found a 45-year-old Arizona man and a 35-year-old

Massachusetts man guilty of running a child exploitation enterprise and conspiracy to advertise child pornography. Prosecutors say Joshua Peterson of Prescott, Arizona, and Steven Grovo of Shirley, Massachusetts, promoted the sexual exploitation of children with an online bulletin board containing photographs and videos. U.S. District Judge Donald Molloy of Missoula found the men guilty in a bench trial Wednesday. Sentencing has been set for Jan. 22. Prosecutors say the site was created in 2009 and members exchanged files containing child pornography. It also was used to solicit more pornography to share and broadcast on the Internet. The investigation included law enforcement from the U.S. Department of Justice, Montana, Helena, Polson and the Isle of Jersey near the United Kingdom.

Tucson PD: 7-month-old girl dies after being left in hot car. An infant left in a hot car in Tucson has died, according to authorities. Tucson Police Sgt. Chris Widmer said police were called to a parking lot near Grant and Country Club. According to KGUN9, when officers arrived on scene, the baby's father told police he was driving and didn't realize the 7-month-old girl was in the car. Police said when he noticed the baby in the backseat unconscious, he pulled over and called 911. Authorities say they are still trying to determine where the baby was left in the vehicle. They said they don't know how long she was there, but said it was for a "long period of time." The child was taken to the hospital with life-threatening injuries, where she later died. Widmer said the investigation is ongoing. "We do have our dependent child unit on scene. They're going to be examining the vehicle, speaking with the family and that's going to take some time.

(5pm newscast on 10/22, 1:30 in length)

6 people arrested while protesting police brutality. Six people protesting police brutality were arrested in downtown Phoenix. Police spokesman Sgt. Jonathan Howard said they were arrested in the area of First and Washington streets for obstructing roadways and failing to obey officers regarding traffic control. Howard said the protest was organized through social media, and about 40 to 50 protesters gathered on Van Buren Street between Central and First Avenues. He said the protesters repeatedly walked in roadways against traffic signals and against commands from officers. Several events were happening downtown at the time, and police say people associated with the group, Wave of Action Phoenix, have a history of becoming increasingly disruptive in crowded environments. Howard said several members of the group interfered with the arrests and threw flagpoles at officers. They reportedly fled the area when officers discharged pepper balls. "What they should have done is block traffic," said a protester who concealed his identity. "Make sure that we were out there being able to do whatever we wanted with our First Amendment rights protesting them killing people but instead we saw what the state does. They crack down in the most vicious, brutal way as fast as they can,"

PD: Chandler dad admits to forcing his son to sleep in backyard. A Chandler father admitted to forcing his teenage son to sleep in the backyard as a form of discipline, according to court records. The 16-year-old male victim told police he had slept in the backyard for at least a month, and that he had to use the hose for drinking water and use the yard as his restroom at night. Brian Wayne Romine and Shelly Anderson-Romine "treated their dog better than they treated [their son]," said the teen's uncle, Tray Romine. The teen left his North Meadows Street home after at least 30 days of the sleeping situation, and went to Tray's home. Tray, who said he was unable to get his brother to talk through the situation, called police. Authorities charged the Romines (Shelly is the teen's stepmother) with child abuse. The teen triggered the backyard

discipline by doing things like taking loose pocket change from his parents, and smelling cake frosting, according to the uncle and court records. The suspects did not answer the door when ABC15 stopped by. The outdoor sleeping was done during June and July, records said; the teen was forced to sleep outside during monsoon rains and thunderstorms, according to Tray. "It's going to take my nephew a while... for him to pull out of this," Tray said. The teen's mother died years ago, Tray added. The teen is now staying with a foster parent.

One in every five US cars recalled this year. There have been 52 million car and truck recalls in the United States so far this year. Even accounting for millions of the same vehicle being recalled more than once, that's roughly the equivalent of one car out of every five on the road. The recalls are far above the previous record of 30.8 million in 2004. The 2014 estimate comes from Stericycle, which helps automakers manage their recall process. It says there have been 544 separate recalls announced, or the equivalent of about two a day. The leader by far in recalls has been General Motors, which has accounted for just more than half of the recalls in the industry -- 26.5 million in the United States so far this year. The company has been hit by a recall crisis, admitting it made a mistake by waiting a decade before ordering a recall of millions of cars with an ignition problem now tied to 27 deaths.

Survey finds people text and drive knowing dangers. Nearly everyone agrees that texting and driving is dangerous. Most people do it anyway. In a new survey, 98 percent of motorists who own cellphones and text regularly said they were aware of the dangers, yet three-quarters of them admitted to texting while driving, despite laws against it in some states. Two-thirds said they have read text messages while stopped at a red light or stop sign, while more than a quarter have sent texts while driving.

Police: Scottsdale teen stuck in chimney; was locked out of house. Technical crews rescued a teenager that became trapped in the chimney of a Scottsdale home Tuesday night. Scottsdale Battalion Chief Brian W. Read said the 13-year-old got locked out of the house near Oak and Hayden and tried to get into the house through the chimney. Air15 video showed multiple emergency vehicles outside the home, including a ladder truck. Firefighters could be seen on the roof shining a light down the top of the chimney. The teenager was rescued shortly before 8:30 p.m. Firefighters said the teen tied an electrical wire to a vent on top of the chimney and used that to steady himself as he hopped inside. He got stuck in the flue area where a firebox blocked his way into the home. That's when he panicked and called 911. Firefighters could see and hear the teen as they tried to rescue him. They gave him a mask and goggles to wear. Crews pulled him out after more than an hour. They took apart the firebox from inside the house. They said the teen was okay but covered in soot.


