Justin McCarthy. Director for Smile Train, an international children's charity that repairs cleft lip and palate for children in the developing world. I am the first representative for Smile Train to be based on the West Coast and work with individual donors, schools, community organizations, corporations and foundations across the West to fund the surgeries and change lives forever. I am coming to Seattle to meet with donors and partners and would like to be part of your public affairs programs (I think you are responsible for four public affairs radio shows) to share information about Smile Train, some of the physical and social issues related to cleft AND update about what people in Seattle and Washington ARE doing and can do to change the life of a child forever. Last year Smile Train teams repaired 125,000 smiles and just a year ago we celebrated our one millionth smile repair for a 6 year old boy from Tanzania named Osawa Owiti. Our model is based on the "teach a man to fish" philosophy whereby we partner with local medical facilities in the developing world, train their teams to perform the surgery, and then pay for the surgeries which are roughly \$250 in the developing world. Some might wonder why audiences only see these world-class players, like Abby Wambach, who holds the international goal-scoring record—for women and men—for a few weeks every two years at the World Cup or the Olympics. But most, even those who care about equality for women, won't consider how different these athletes' careers are compared to those of men who do the exact same thing for a living. Today, the gap between men's and women's wages, the tiny fraction of female CEOs at Fortune 500 companies, and the lack of respect for Hollywood actresses and directors receive regular and impassioned coverage in both the mainstream and feminist media. I believe this concept helps us as a society to break down stereotypes and be less judgmental and more compassionate to each other and ourselves. It is my hope that this becomes a tool to help each of us remember that we are not alone, that there is support and there is hope. Changing the world starts with having courage to be vulnerable, with having compassion for ourselves and others, and with establishing meaningful connections with each other. We are all in this together. We can each be someone's hero by sharing our story. Over the years I have suffered bouts of depression, anxiety, and addiction, and have been hospitalized for becoming

suicidal twice. I faced challenges as a teenager with accepting my sexuality and dealing with my parents' divorce. I dropped out of school during my second year in high school to begin working and supporting myself. I spent many years pursuing a culinary career that was unfulfilling to me, only to convince myself that money and security were enough to make me happy. It wasn't until I picked up the camera almost five years ago that my life and the way I see the world around me began to change."

Amos Kamil's book Great Is The Truth: Secrecy, Scandal, and the Quest for Justice at the Horace Mann School. The book is based on Amos' investigative reporting in a 2012 cover story for the New York Times Magazine. It has an important social justice message — not just the obviously urgent need for us to create a culture in which abuse does not happen, and in which survivors are supported to report abuse. But also the need to change public policy so that justice prevails, even long after the crimes have been committed. Amos is interesting in exploring cultures that either breed or ignore sexual abuse of minors.

12-20-15 Hand to Mouth: Living in Bootstrap America, by Linda Tirado. The real-life Nickel and Dimed—the author of the wildly popular "Poverty Thoughts" essay tells what it's like to be working poor in America. As the haves and have-nots grow more separate and unequal in America, the working poor don't get heard from much. Now they have a voice—and it's forthright, funny, and just a little bit furious. Here, Linda Tirado tells what it's like, day after day, to work, eat, shop, raise kids, and keep a roof over your head without enough money. She also answers questions often asked about those who live on or near minimum wage: Why don't they get better jobs? Why don't they make better choices? Why do they smoke cigarettes and have ugly lawns? Why don't they borrow from their parents? Enlightening and entertaining, Hand to Mouth opens up a new and much-needed dialogue between the people who just don't have it and the people who just don't get it.

12-27-15 Orange Is the New Black: My Year in a Women's Prison by Piper Kerman. With a career, a boyfriend, and a loving family, Piper Kerman barely resembles the reckless young woman who delivered a suitcase of drug money ten years before. But that past has caught up with her. Convicted and sentenced to fifteen months at the infamous federal correctional facility in Danbury, Connecticut, the well-heeled Smith College alumna is now inmate #11187–424—one of the millions of people who disappear "down the rabbit hole" of the American penal system. From her first strip search to her final release, Kerman learns to navigate this strange world with its strictly enforced codes of behavior and arbitrary rules. She meets women from all walks of life, who surprise her with small tokens of generosity, hard words of wisdom, and simple acts of acceptance. Heartbreaking, hilarious, and at times enraging, Kerman's story offers a rare look into the lives of women in prison—why it is we lock so many away and what happens to them when they're there.

What happened on December 14, 2012, at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Connecticut, where she hid fifteen first-grade students in a tiny bathroom and ultimately saved their lives. In Choosing Hope, Kaitlin Roig-DeBellis candidly and compassionately addresses one of the most difficult questions each of us must face in life—how to cope with true tragedy and suffering, whether our own or someone else's. Offering guidance to those who are struggling, she assures readers enduring hardship that they are not alone and that when you choose hope in dark times, you re-establish personal control and lay the groundwork for positive action that heals you as you help others. In his new book, Quantified: Redefining Conservation for the Next Economy, Freshwater Trust President Joe Whitworth argues that to solve the environmental problems of today, we have to rethink conservation on a major scale, applying 21st century tools and technologies to accelerate the pace and scale of conservation. Whitworth draws lessons from the world's most tech-savvy, high-impact organizations – Google, Apple, Amazon and others – to show how we can make real gains for the environment.

Can wild places compete with a planet of 7 billion people, global climate change, Amazon drones and Google chat almost everywhere? Called a "rebel with a cause" by Time, Bay Area author Jason Mark was intrigued by opinions in academia and among professional land managers that "wildness is dead, and we best get over it." An environmental journalist, (covering "everything to do with the intersection between industrial civilization and wild nature"), Jason went looking for answers in some of the most rugged, remote, road less and unforgiving places in America. Satellites in the High Country: Searching for the Wild in the Age of Man is the resulting book. Jason Mark tracked Mexican gray wolves in the harsh Gila Wilderness of New Mexico, rafted through the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, and experienced the quietest place in the continental United States in the Hoh Rainforest. Topics covered: Why we need wildness now more than ever, the very definition of "wilderness" and how he was inspired to explore it and write about it. How there can still be "wildness" when wilderness areas are heavily managed to control visitors, control the wildlife, and put out wildfires. How government agencies and environmental and conservation organizations can approach managing wild places in the face of disruptions like global climate change.

The new arena of biologics, the current darlings of the pharmaceutical industry, and how it plays into the corporate mantra of short-term profits and maximizing returns. When author Mulvaney joined an expedition on the icebreaker Arctic Sunrise, he planned to watch polar bears on the ice along the Alaskan shoreline, but most of the ice was gone. After days of searching, he finally saw an emaciated bear swimming far at sea. Such may be the fate of the species if global warming continues unabated, for the polar bear is a marine mammal that lives more on ocean ice than on land, hunting seals and scavenging beached whales. The author found more bears in Churchill, Manitoba, but they were stranded waiting

longer each year for the ice to form on Hudson Bay. Mixing historical accounts, research data, and his own observations, Mulvaney skillfully describes the harsh nomadic life of polar bears. Readers who enjoy nature writing will appreciate this sympathetic report on the endangered state of the great white bear.

	Community Matters with Lee Callahan 20 minutes 6am-6:20 10-11-15 Victoria Champion, business owner, Champion Party Supplies - Seattle, Washington – the nation's second-oldest party store and Seattle's premier party and costume supply company for 79 years, is relocating after 21 years on Denny Way in Lower Queen Anne. Third generation owner, Victoria Champion, was forced to prepare for the move after the building that housed Champion's for two
	decades was sold to a real estate firm with plans to demolish and redevelop the property into an apartment building in the fall of 2015. Despite the sudden change, Victoria and the rest of the company feel very excited and optimistic about the new location. Starting out as a sign-making and retail display business in 1936 at the Pike Place Market, Champion has sponsored the St. Patrick's Day Dash benefitting the Detlef Foundation 2012-2015, the Big Climb benefiting the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society 2013-2015, and the Run Scared 5K benefiting the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society 2013, as well as donating supplies to numerous theatre's and organizations throughout the greater Seattle area.
