The following is WWLP programming addressing Crime during the 3rd quarter of 2013. These issues were addressed through our locally produced news programming.

News 07/01/13 6pm : 30

Springfield Police need the public's help in identifying a suspect who allegedly broke into a home on St. James Ave last week. The owner of the home had installed a video surveillance system that would activate when the house alarm was tripped. Springfield Police Sgt. John Delaney says this suspect could be responsible for other breaks in the neighborhood. Anyone with information should call contact Springfield Police.

News 07/01/13 6pm : 30

Springfield Police say they arrested a man outside department headquarters after he followed his alleged-sexual assault victim there. Springfield Police Sgt. John Delaney told 22News 36 year old Samuel Aponte tied up his ex-girlfriend's son with an extension cord before sexually assaulting her inside her home early yesterday morning. According to Delaney, Aponte followed his victim to the police station when she went to file a report. Aponte has been charged with aggravated rape, armed burglary, kidnapping and threat to murder.

News 07/01/13 5pm : 30

Police say seven people have been arrested in connection with a late-night shooting in Springfield that left the window of a city bar riddled with bullet holes. Gunfire was exchanged outside the "Punta Cana Restaurant" on Chestnut Street around 11:45 last night. No one was struck. Springfield Police Sgt. John Delaney told 22News police followed the two suspects in the shooting to the "Dogshop Music Stop" on State Street where they allegedly found a marijuana growing operation, guns, and a large amount of cocaine. That's where they made the seven arrests. Sgt. Delaney says the store was serving as a "front" for the drug operation.

News 07/02/13 6am : 30

More details of violence in Aaron Hernandez's past are emerging. The Wall Street Journal reports the former Patriots tight end ruptured a man's eardrum in a bar fight when he was 17. The paper says Hernandez ordered two drinks at a bar in Gainesville, Florida and then refused to pay. When an employee confronted him, Hernandez punched him in the ear. He never denied it, but prosecutors did not file charges even though police asked them to. Hernandez is also being sued for allegedly shooting a friend in the face last year.

News 07/03/13 6pm : 30

Five people were arrested during a drug raid in Springfield last night. Springfield Police Sgt. John Delaney told 22News police suspect the occupants were selling heroin, cocaine and oxycontin out of the home at 130 Washburn Street. In addition to the drugs, police also seized cash and a handgun that was stolen in a housebreak in Cleveland, Ohio. Sgt. Delaney said a sixth suspect was summonsed to court and not arrested because she is eight months pregnant.

News **07/03/13** **6pm** **: 30**

Springfield Police need your help identifying three suspects who allegedly broke into the Pride Gas Station on Page Blvd. Springfield Police Sgt. John Delaney told 22News the suspects smashed out the front window, ransacked the store and stole more than 35 cartons of cigarettes.

News **07/03/13** **6pm** **: 30**

State Police shot a 23-year-old man during a drug raid in Orange this morning. A State Police tactical team was executing a search warrant at 18 Mechanic St. when they say the man confronted them with a gun. The man has not yet been identified, but was targeted for the alleged sales of oxycodone and Percocet. Police went into the second story apartment around 5 a.m. this morning. When troopers saw the man had a gun, he was shot. It is unclear how many troopers shot the man. He was later pronounced dead at the hospital. A 25-year-old woman that was also targeted in the raid also suffered an eye injury and was taken to a nearby hospital. A neighbor 22News spoke with said it isn't the first time a raid has occurred at the apartment.

News **07/05/13** **6pm** **: 30**

A 22 year-old man is facing murder charges in Springfield's 11th homicide of the year. He's accused of killing his 19-year-old girlfriend and dumping her body on the sidewalk. It's Springfield's 11th homicide of the year. 22 year-old Terrance Brown is now facing murder charges. He's accused of killing his girlfriend, 19-year-old Tyshianna Atkins around 3 in the afternoon on the 4th of July. Police say Brown was inside an apartment here at 60 Federal Street when he shot Atkins. Then he reportedly took her body to the back of the building, where he dumped it on the sidewalk and ran away. Springfield's Brandon Kelly went to high school with both the victim and the suspect he says he saw them both just hours before the deadly shooting. Brown was arraigned in court today. He's pleaded not guilty to murder and firearms charges.

News **07/05/13** **7am** **: 30**

Chicopee Detectives have issued a warrant for a man they believe stole \$4,000 dollars from an elderly Chicopee woman earlier this month. Chicopee Detective Bob Kalisz told 22News, the man they're looking for is 29 year old Michael Shumway. He's believed to have left Chicopee and is somewhere in Western Massachusetts. Shumway is accused of not only

stealing the woman's money, but also her medication. If you know anything you're asked to call Chicopee police at 594-1735.

News **07/05/13** **7am** **: 30**

A man shot in Springfield was taken to the Hospital last night. Police Captain Cheryl Clapprood told 22News a man was shot on Carew Street in the Hungry Hill section of Springfield around 2:30 Saturday afternoon. He was taken to Baystate Medical Center and is expected to be ok. Clapprood said when police got there they found the victim on the back porch at 741 Carew Street. The victim told police he doesn't know who shot him. No arrests have been made.

News **07/05/13** **11pm** **: 30**

State Police have identified the man who was shot and killed by troopers during a drug investigation. A State police news release said 23 year old Corey Navarette was holding a firearm when he confronted a state police tactical team executing a search warrant on his Mechanic Street home early yesterday. State police say they will not release more information until the Northwestern district attorney's office determines whether the use of deadly force was justified.

News **07/05/13** **11pm** **: 30**

We now know the identity of the man accused of shooting and killing a 20 year old woman during a domestic dispute on Federal Street this afternoon. Springfield Police Sgt John Delaney told 22News that police have arrested 22 year old Terrence Brown and charged him with murder. We still do not know the name of the victim.

News **07/07/13** **6pm** **: 30**

Enfield Police are closing in on a gunman who's allegedly desperate for drugs. The man pulled a gun on a clerk at the Rite Aid Pharmacy at 71 Palumba Drive this weekend; he got away but not before the store's surveillance camera took a good picture of him. The man was unshaven and has dreadlocked hair and was wearing a green, black and orange hat. Police estimate his height at being somewhere between 5'8" to 5'10". While holding the clerk at bay at the point of a gun, he's believed to have scooped up a quantity of prescription drugs. If you recognize this man get in touch with the Enfield Police.

A man from Lee has pleaded not guilty to child pornography charges. Michael Cahalan was released after his arraignment Tuesday in Berkshire Superior Court to one count of dissemination of visual material of a child in a state of nudity or sexual conduct and three counts of possession. The Berkshire Eagle reports the charges arose from an Internet Crimes against Children Task Force investigation in January. Prosecutors say the incidents are alleged to have occurred between January 13 and February 11.

Longmeadow Police are searching for two brazen thieves who allegedly stole prescription drugs from the CVS Pharmacy on Longmeadow Street. It happened just before 1:30 this afternoon. Two dark skinned men reportedly went up to the pharmacy counter. Longmeadow Police Captain John Stankiewicz told 22News one of them handed the pharmacist a note demanding drugs. The man then jumped over the counter and starting filling a trash bag with prescription pills. Both men then ran out the back of the store, but not before store surveillance video captured their pictures. One of the suspects was wearing gray t-shirt that read "Shake that Laffy Taffy." James Albert told 22News police found 19 bags of heroin, 3 bags of cocaine and 6 bags of marijuana.

A 24 year-old man from Holyoke is dead after he was shot in Springfield early this morning. Captain Thomas Trites told 22News the shooting happened behind a bar near 1146 State Street. This is the city's 12th homicide of the year. Lt. Henry Gagnon told 22news no arrests have been made but they have a lead on a suspect. The victim has not been identified.

News **07/18/13** **5am** **: 30**

A man was stabbed and another was placed under arrest last night in Springfield. This happened around 10:30 Wednesday night. Springfield Police Sgt. Chris Hitis told 22News the victim was seriously wounded in the attack at 75 Long Hill Street. Sgt Hitis said police quickly arrested a suspect. We called Springfield police overnight, but there is no word on the condition of the victim.

News **07/20/13** **6pm** **: 30**

A medical examiner is working to identify a body that was found in a duffel bag in the woods of Suffield, Connecticut. The body was discovered around 1:45 PM Friday by two teenagers who were hiking in an area known as Quarry Ridge. Suffield Police told 22News they believe the body was dumped, but that the crime occurred someplace else. They could only say the body was that of a white man. Chief Mike Manzi urges the public to contact the Suffield police Department with any information, their number is 860-668-3870.

Holyoke Police Lieutenant Isaias Cruz told 22news that a man entered the Rite Aid on 15-04 Northampton Street in Holyoke just before 6:30 Saturday night and stole several bottles of oxycodone at gunpoint. The suspect is a Hispanic man, around 5'7" and 150 pounds. He is described as having straight dark hair with bright highlights, and could have possibly been wearing a wig. Police are reviewing the surveillance footage in order to further identify the suspect.

News **07/22/13** **6pm** **: 30**

Four people were arrested during a drug raid in Northampton early this morning. Northampton Police Lt. Jody Kasper told 22News police found 68 grams of crack cocaine with a street value of \$7,000 inside the apartment at 260 Main Street in the Leeds section of the city. Police also found \$5,000 in cash, a stolen firearm and ammunition in the apartment. Lt. Kasper says the arrests followed an investigation spanning several months.

News **07/22/13** **12pm** **: 30**

Holyoke Police are still searching for a man who they say, stole bottles of oxycodone from a Rite Aid Pharmacy over the weekend. He is believed to be armed and dangerous. Lt. Isaias Cruz told 22News a man came into the Northampton St. Rite Aid in Holyoke around 6:30 Saturday night, flashed a gun in his waistband and hopped over the counter forcing the cashier to open a safe containing oxycodone pills. He grabbed several bottles and ran out of the store. The suspect also matches the description of a man who robbed a Rite Aid in Chicopee, two weeks ago. He's a Hispanic man, around 5'7" and weighing 150 pounds. He had straight dark hair and bright highlights, and it's possible he was wearing a wig. He wore jean shorts and dark sneakers. If you have any information, you're asked to call the Holyoke

Police Dept. right away, at (413) 536-6431.

News **07/23/13** **12pm** **: 30**

Springfield Police are searching for the man who robbed a gas station this morning. Springfield Police Lt. Henry Gagnon told 22News the man was holding a knife when he robbed the F.L. Roberts Station at 833 East Columbus Avenue right around 6 this morning. According to Lt. Gagnon police are looking for an African American man, 5' 5" tall, and hair in cornrows and wearing a blue jacket and a Yankees cap with a bandana over his face.

News **07/24/13** **6pm** **: 30**

Amherst Police need your help identifying a robbery suspect. Amherst Police Lt. Ronald Young told 22news this man went into the Hess Gas station on West Street just before three this morning, reached into the register and stole some cash. No weapon was shown. Lt. Young described the suspect as a black man, between 25 and 30 years old.

News **07/25/13** **12pm** **: 30**

Amherst police made an arrest in a convenience store robbery after a disturbance call at an apartment complex led them to the suspect. Lt. Ronald Young told 22News that 33-year-old Michael Edwards of Amherst was arrested for Wednesday morning's robbery of the Hess Station on West Street. According to LT. Young police were called to the Village Park Apartments just after 2:30 for a report of a disturbance there. While officers were investigating the incident, they found Edwards who matched the description of the suspect in the Hess robbery. During that robbery Young says the suspect entered the store around 3:00 Wednesday morning and grabbed cash from one of the registers before running away. Edwards will be arraigned in Belchertown today.

News **07/25/13** **12pm** **: 30**

Springfield Police are investigating a shooting in which two victims were wounded in Mason Square. Lt. James Rosso told 22News two men were shot at about 10:15 last night at 540 Union Street. Lt Rosso said he had very little information. but that the wounds were likely to the victims' legs.

News **07/25/13** **12pm** **: 30**

A woman from Wilbraham was killed in a violent attack in Boston and now Police are asking for help to find her killer. Boston Police believe 24 year old Amy Lord was on her way to the gym when she was abducted Tuesday morning and forced to ride to several ATM's to withdraw cash. Lord was found stabbed to death in the stony brook reservation in the Hyde Park section of Boston. Her car was later found on fire. Wednesday night those who knew and loved Amy were at Gazebo Park in Wilbraham for a candlelight vigil.

News **07/25/13** **5pm** **: 30**

Police have arrested Edwin Alemany for two attacks on women in South Boston. The 28-year-old is also a person of interest in the brutal murder of Amy Lord. Alemany's arraignment was postponed after a court psychiatrist said he was suicidal. Lord, a 24 year old Wilbraham native and Minnechaug High School graduate was found dead in Boston's Hyde Park neighborhood on Tuesday. Police say Lord was kidnapped, carjacked, robbed and murdered. They now believe she was beaten first inside her home before being taken to five different ATM's. Police believe Lord was chosen at random.

News **07/26/13** **6pm** **: 30**

Two people are under arrest after a shooting in downtown Springfield overnight. Springfield Police Sgt. John Delaney told 22News 21 year old Junito Batista was arrested after he allegedly fired several shots at a group of people in Sterns Square just before two this morning. A second man, 29 year old Manuel Melendez, was also arrested after he allegedly almost struck an officer with his car while trying to leave the area. Sgt. Delaney says Melendez was driving a gunshot victim to the hospital, but was also carrying a large amount of drugs.

News **07/26/13** **5pm** **: 30**

A Springfield police sergeant was hit by a stolen rental car while he was busy chasing a shooting suspect, police say. Springfield Police Sergeant John Delaney told 22News that just before 2 this morning Sergeant Julio Toledo was chasing Junito Batista after he allegedly fired shots on Worthington Street. As Toledo was chasing Batista, he was almost hit by a white Dodge Charger. Other officers tried to pull the car over but it turns out the driver Manuel Melendez was taking a victim of the shooting to the hospital. Melendez was also arrested after Delaney says police discovered drugs in his car and found out that the car had been stolen. The shooting victim had only been grazed by a bullet.

News **07/26/13** **11pm** **: 30**

A Pittsfield ice cream truck owner and driver has been charged with trying to hire someone to kill his wife. Recep Sarikcioglu was in jail for violating a restraining order. While in jail, prosecutors say he offered another inmate \$10,000 dollars to either cut the brakes on his wife's car or tamper with the natural gas line at her home. Instead of following through that inmate notified police.

News **07/26/13** **11pm** **: 30**

Two Springfield shootings occurred as recently as one o'clock this morning. The man had two bullet wounds in his chest and stomach and one in the arm. He was operated on at Baystate medical center. He's now recovering. Springfield police captain Trent Duda told 22News someone shot the victim in the middle of the street near 162 Main Street in Springfield's South End neighborhood.

News **07/29/13** **6pm** **: 30**

Three men were arrested over the weekend after getting "caught in the act" steeling roofing shingles and other building supplies from the ABC Supply Company. Springfield Police Sgt. John Delaney told 22news, two officers noticed the three men with a U-Haul truck at 152 Fisk Avenue around 1A.M. Saturday morning. The officers saw the business had been broken into and the men were loading pallets of roofing shingles onto the truck. Gabriel Acosta, Ruben Santiago, and Alexis Figueroa, all from Springfield, are being charged with breaking and entering, larceny over \$250, and resisting arrest.

News **07/30/13** **6pm** **: 30**

Springfield Police say officers shot and wounded a man who allegedly came at them with an axe. According to Sgt. John Delaney, 28- year-old Nicholas Mondel allegedly swung an axe at one of three police officers who responded to a call at 74 Irvington Street on Monday night. Delaney said that the suspect knocked the officer down and again swung at him with the axe. The other officers shot Mondel, who faces charges of assault with intent to murder and assault and battery on a police officer. He is now in serious but stable condition at Baystate Medical Center.

News **07/30/13** **11pm** **: 30**

And these two men were arrested by Springfield police, charged with breaking and entering into a home on Hamilton Street. Springfield Police Sgt. John Delaney told 22News the homeowner called police after she came home to find her two flat screens ripped off her walls and stolen. A short time later, Sgt. Delaney said officers found 19 year old Jordan Collins and 22 year old Troy Dubose both of Springfield in the area with two TVs in their car. Detectives are now looking into whether the pair is responsible for other break-ins in the area.

A state trooper on duty in Springfield as part of that community action team was called to try and help find a stolen scooter. Trooper T.J. Tudryn said he tracked down the scooter and after a foot chase arrested the driver. 25 year old Joshua Landrom of Springfield was booked on several charges including carrying this .25 caliber handgun and ammunition without a license.

News **07/31/13** **6pm** **: 30**

Springfield Police say a man who allegedly tried to cash a stolen check in front of a uniformed police officer also left his license with the teller. Springfield Police Sgt. John Delaney told 22News 22 year-old, Marcus Cadogan allegedly tried to cash a \$3,000 dollar check at the TD Bank on State Street on Tuesday night. Delaney says the teller recognized the stolen check and notified the officer on duty at the bank. Cadogan allegedly ran, but left his license with the teller. He was found a short time later hiding in an attic crawl space on Westford Circle.

News **08/01/13** **6pm** **: 30**

The Suffolk District Attorney's Office announced today that 28 year old Edwin Alemany will be charged with the murder of Amy Lord. Alemany was previously named as a "person of interest" in the case. Suffolk District Attorney Daniel Conley announced this afternoon that Alemany will be formally charged with Lord's death in West Roxbury District Court after his mental health evaluation is complete. Alemany was ordered to undergo a psychiatric evaluation after being charged with attacks on the two other women last week.

News **08/02/13** **6pm** **: 30**

Athol Police say they busted a significant marijuana growing operation in town this week. Sgt. Kent Hager told 22News, officers with a search warrant found about 90 marijuana plants inside at duplex at 164-166 Allen Street Wednesday afternoon. The plants have a street value of between \$40,000 and \$50,000. The warrant was for 21-year old Joseph Cuticchia but he wasn't home. But, his father, 48-year-old Joseph Cuticchia was arrested on several charges and was released on \$5,000 cash bail. Charges are pending against the son.

News **08/02/13** **6pm** **: 30**

A convicted sex offender from Holyoke tied to crimes in multiple states was arrested last night in Colorado. The U.S. Marshal Service says 34-year old Joseph Trombley was wanted on felony warrants for larceny from several local communities and failure to register as a sex offender in Holyoke. The Marshals say Trombley was traveling with his girlfriend and her two small children. Authorities tracked the couple to several states, including Alabama, Nebraska, Florida and Wyoming. Trombley is currently awaiting extradition back to Massachusetts.

News **08/02/13** **6pm** **: 30**

Right now the state police are working with police in Westfield to track down whoever robbed a Rite Aid pharmacy on Silver Street this morning at 11AM. It's not clear what was stolen, and there's no description of the suspect. This is not the first pharmacy to be robbed recently. There was a robbery of the Northampton Street Rite Aid in Holyoke on July 22nd, the Longmeadow Street CVS in Longmeadow on July 13th, the Walgreens on Northampton Street in Holyoke on July 9th and a Rite Aid in Enfield, Connecticut on July 6th in all of those robberies prescription pills were what was stolen.

News **08/02/13** **7am** **: 30**

A man is in the hospital after being shot early this morning in Springfield. Springfield Police say it happened around 1:00 in the morning in the middle of the road, near 162 Main Street. Springfield Police Captain Trent Duda told 22news that the victim was shot in the torso and the arm, and was transported to Baystate Medical Center.

News **08/03/13** **6pm** **: 30**

A 27 year old stabbing victim from Indian Orchard is in stable condition tonight at Baystate Medical Center in Springfield. Captain Trent Duda told 22News it was just after 1AM this morning, when a neighbor found the man in his apartment at 316 Oak Street. Captain Duda said the victim didn't cooperate when it came to naming the person who had stabbed him twice.

News **08/03/13** **6pm** **: 30**

Springfield police continue searching for the driver who crashed a stolen car into the side of a house early this morning in the Brightwood section of the city. Springfield Police Captain Trent Duda told 22News the man driving the stolen car slammed into a house at 104 Lowell Street; but not before almost hitting an eight year old girl with the Silver Toyota Corolla just after midnight. Captain Duda said the driver then ran away.

News **08/04/13** **11pm** **: 30**

Springfield Police tonight are still searching for whoever shot a man three times in the city's South End. It happened near 163 Main Street at around 1:00 this morning. Captain Trent Dooda told 22News the victim was shot in the middle of the road. The bullets hit him in the chest, stomach and arm. 22News talked to a man who was in the area at the time of the shooting.

News **08/04/13** **11pm** **: 30**

Springfield police are trying to find whoever robbed the Mobile Station at 833 East Columbus Avenue. Captain Cheryl Claprod told 22News at around 7:30 tonight a black man with dark hair, a blue jacket and blue jeans walked into the store with a large knife. The man allegedly threatened the clerk and demanded she open the cash register. The man stole a small amount of money and then ran toward Main Street. Part of his face was covered by a scarf but police detectives are reviewing the station's surveillance cameras to see if they can identify him.

News **08/05/13** **5:30pm** **: 30**

A Southwick man is charged with allegedly hitting a police officer with his car. The incident happened in Granby, CT. The Associated Press says Officer Mark Garofalo was hit on Route 10 & 202 early Sunday evening while he stood outside his cruiser while helping the driver of a disabled tractor trailer. Thirty-one-year-old Daniel Kupruck is charged with operating under the influence, operating without insurance, operating under suspension, possession of drug paraphernalia, and striking a police officer with a vehicle. Police say Officer Garofalo was treated and released from a local hospital after suffering unspecified injuries.

News **08/05/13** **5am** **: 30**

Police in East Longmeadow say they've identified the person who stole a vehicle and then led them on a brief chase into Springfield. It started just after 10:15 last night on North Main Street near the Big Y. East Longmeadow Police Sgt. Steven Manning says they chased the suspect into Springfield, where the vehicle crashed on Kimberly Ave. The suspect got out of the car and ran away and was then chased by police dogs. East Longmeadow Police say the chase was called off because they believe they know who this man is. He'll be charged with stealing a car and many driving infractions.

News **08/05/13** **11pm** **: 30**

A routine traffic stop led to the arrest of five people including two from Holyoke. State Police Trooper Matt Stone stopped a car for a lanes violation in West Springfield. When he searched the car, he allegedly found a loaded, fully-automatic Tech-9 machine pistol similar to an Uzi. 26 year old Jose Espinosa-DeJesus of Holyoke was arrested along with another teenager from Holyoke and three more teenagers from Philadelphia. All five are being held at the State Police barracks in Springfield. They'll be in Springfield District Court in the morning.

News **08/08/13** **5pm** **: 30**

Lee's Police Chief has been indicted on federal money laundering and extortion charges. This is the 11 page federal indictment against Lee Police Chief Joseph Buffis. The indictment claims that the Chief allegedly sought out and received a \$4000 dollar donation from two people who were accused of running a house of prostitution. Federal documents show that the Lee Police were conducting an undercover prostitution investigation at an unnamed Inn. The police submitted criminal complaints against the owners of the Inn. But in February 2012, the Chief met with the owners before they went to court. That's when the indictment claims that the Chief extorted \$4,000 dollars from the owners. The "donation" was made to a holiday toy fund that Buffis controlled, but the justice department says Buffis then withdrew the money and put it in his own account. 22News first reported this story in November when the FBI searched the police department headquarters. If convicted, Buffis faces a maximum of 20 years in prison on each of the counts and \$250,000 fine. No word yet on when Buffis will be in court.

If convicted, they could get up to 20 years in prison on the obstruction count and up to five years on the conspiracy count. They also could be fined \$250,000 dollars.

In Massachusetts, that's an estimated 158,000 students.

Groundbreaking ceremonies took place this morning for the new Elias Brookings Museum Magnet School in Springfield. The new school will be on Walnut Street. It will replace the tornado damaged building on Hancock Street and will have a lot more space than the old one. The senate voted to move forward on a bipartisan student loan deal. It passed with an 81 to 18 vote. The plan will restructure government student loans and lower rates for students heading to college this fall. New regulations could make the food we grow safer to eat. Farmers from all over Hampshire County met at a forum today to learn more about the FDA's proposed produce safety regulations. The government says they hope to prevent an estimated 1.75 million cases of food born illness every year. Farmers gathered in Hadley Thursday to speak out to representatives from the FDA and Congress. They're worried about added costs of proposed safety regulations on growing, harvesting, packing, and storing, produce. The representative of the FDA spoke said they hope their role in the proposed regulations will be less about inspecting and enforcing and more about education the farmers about food safety. State Secretary of Energy and Environmental Affairs Rick Sullivan told 22News he's concerned the added bookkeeping will take farmers away from what they do best, farming! Sullivan also said farmers in Massachusetts already spend \$7,000 to \$10,000 dollars a year just to meet current regulations. Congress will take public comment until November 15th.

News **09/02/13** **5pm** **: 30**

The state health department is advising four more southeastern Massachusetts communities to curtail outdoor evening events because of risk from mosquitoes with Eastern Equine Encephalitis. Health officials said Thursday that mammal-biting mosquitoes carrying EEE were found in Easton, Raynham, Taunton and West Bridgewater. Belchertown in western Massachusetts was earlier deemed at "critical" risk after EEE was found in two horses, and nearby Amherst was rated "high." Officials say people should use insect repellent, protective clothing and avoid being outdoors at dusk and nighttime when mosquitoes are most active.

News **09/03/13** **6pm** **: 30**

Now that we're into September we have less than 3 weeks until the official end of summer. September is very much a transitional month with a combination of fall and summerlike weather. August brought another wet month with higher than normal rainfall. So far this year we've had over 31 inches of rain, that's more than 6 inches wetter than a normal year through this point. The latest outlook from the climate prediction center is for a wetter and warmer than normal rest of the month.

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health said today there is a third case of Eastern Equine Encephalitis in a horse this year. The horse with EEE was stabled in Tyngsborough in Middlesex County. The threat level has now been raised to critical there and surrounding areas have been raised to moderate. There has been one case of EEE in a human this year.

Even though it was cool it wasn't quite cold enough to take care of the pollen or the mosquitoes. You'll see adult mosquitoes out and about. They'll drop off significantly in the colder temperatures and they won't be able to fly as well, but you'll still see them out and about until mid to late October. Things that have been cancelled because of the mosquito scare and the EEE and everything else hopefully now with the cooler weather coming in people can put that behind them and enjoy the fall. If you are an allergy sufferer we would really need the temperatures to dip down into the 20's for a number of hours to get rid of the weed pollen. Right now rag weed pollen is still at moderate levels.

With a frost advisory in effect for tonight, some of us could see frost earlier than usual. A frost tonight would be about 2-4 weeks early. News 07/01/13 6pm : 30

The state Legislature has approved the final version of the state budget. State lawmakers have approved the 2014 state budget for the fiscal year that starts today. It includes spending increases for education, cities and towns and other state programs. The state Legislature approved a \$34 billion dollar state budget, a \$1.5 billion dollar increase from last year. It includes nearly \$480 million dollars for higher education that will prevent tuition and fees from going up at all University of Massachusetts campuses this fall. The budget increases funding for cities and towns by about \$21 million dollars to \$920 million dollars. It withdraws \$350 million dollars from the state's rainy day fund, but leaves the account with a balance of more than one billion dollars. The budget relies on roughly \$500 million dollars in new revenue from a tax hike on gas, tobacco, and computer services. But those taxes are in a separate transportation-tax bill that Governor Deval Patrick won't sign. Patrick believes it doesn't raise enough money and plans to send the bill back with an amendment. Until then, the money that the state budget depends on hangs in the balance. All House Republicans voted against the spending bill. Governor Deval Patrick has 10 days to review the state budget before he signs, vetoes and sends it back with amendments.

Governor Deval Patrick has signed a mid-year spending bill. Governor Deval Patrick has signed a \$125 million dollar midyear spending bill; a good portion of it will pay for last winter's snow and ice removal costs and other expenses. But Patrick is sending back sections related to welfare reform. Instead of requiring photo identification on EBT cards, he's asking the Department of Transitional Assistance to study its effectiveness and report back to the Legislature in three years. Last week the governor said many opponents of EBT card photo ID were concerned about the cost. Former Governor Mitt Romney rejected EBT photo ID out of concern that it was not cost-effective. Items that were approved in the spending bill include \$13 million dollars toward the June 25th U.S. Senate special election and \$10 million dollars toward summer jobs for at-risk youth.

News 07/12/13 5pm : 30

Governor Deval Patrick signed a \$34 billion dollar state budget today, but vetoed \$417,000,000 dollars in transportation and local aid pending the results of a separate transportation financing bill. The spending plan is for the fiscal year that started July 1st. Patrick said he hoped some of the vetoed spending could be restored if a dispute over the

transportation bill is resolved.

News **07/15/13** **6pm** **: 30**

The governor has slashed hundreds of millions of dollars from the state budget. Transportation funding, cities and towns stand to lose hundreds of millions of dollars, but the state Legislature is confident they can override the governor's cuts. Cities and towns stand to lose \$177 million dollars. Road and bridge repair money could be slashed by \$240 million dollars. Governor Deval Patrick says the state budget is unbalanced and so the cuts are necessary. But state lawmakers view the actions as old-fashioned politics. But the governor's vetoes forces the state Legislature to reconsider his concerns. The budget relies on money from a transportation-tax bill that hasn't been signed into law yet. Patrick says the tax bill doesn't close an \$800 million dollar gap needed to repair the state's roads and bridges. He says state budget money will be restored if the Legislature approves of a gas tax increase should Massachusetts stop collecting turnpike tolls in 2017. Lawmakers told 22News they'd be reluctant to balance the budget by cutting funding to cities and towns. They're confident they can override the governor vetoes with the necessary two-thirds majority. The House of Representatives will vote on the governor's state budget vetoes on Wednesday, the Senate will follow-up with a vote on Thursday.

Massachusetts eliminates a new sales tax. The state potentially left \$160 million on the table it planned to use when Governor Patrick repealed the tech tax today. The tech tax is gone, less than two months from when we started getting taxed on computer and software services. Governor Deval Patrick, who was touring the Zanetti School in Springfield, says the legislature needs to figure out how to replace the \$160 million the tech tax was expected to bring in. The Governor wanted to use that tax money to invest in transportation and education. Now the state is going to have to find another way to pay for those things. The responsible thing for the legislature to do is to do with the hole created in this budget. So far they're looking the other way and hoping for the best. These stores, however, aren't allowed to be too close to places where kids gather, like churches, parks, or daycares, according to Chicopee planning director.

He also wants to know what to expect after they go up, so they choose the best location. He says one thing he's not trying to do it slow the process down for those who need it.

Springfield Mayor Domenic Sarno wants to put a hold on the process of bringing medical marijuana dispensaries to the city. Mayor Sarno is recommending a moratorium until the city can fully assess the law and craft a comprehensive plan. There are state regulations that deal with how to administer the law, but municipalities do have the ability to regulate the medical marijuana treatment centers. The applications to apply to be a dispensary agent have not yet been released.

Protesters are opposing state regulations that create barriers to medical marijuana. For about five months, medical marijuana patients have been able to access cannabis through caregivers, but new state regulations are making it more difficult to obtain their medicine that way. A handful of medical marijuana supporters are protesting the state's new regulations that limit caregivers from selling pot to more than one patient. Michael Malta uses marijuana to treat his OCD and severe panic disorder. He says the Department of Public Health's rules are forcing him to seek medical pot through other means. Medical marijuana was legalized in January following a voter approved ballot initiative. But in May, the state release new regulations that encouraged pot access through dispensaries. There was a brief period where they could get medical cannabis from caregiver. Sometime in the next year when dispensaries finally open their doors the patients will now have greater more consistent access to medicine. But pot activists say some patients just prefer accessing pot through caregivers. The new regulations effectively prevent caregivers from selling pot because it's too expensive to grow the medicine for only one patient. The DPH is currently creating the application process by which medical marijuana dispensaries can apply for a license to sell pot in Massachusetts.

State health officials are making preliminary applications available for non-profit medical marijuana dispensaries in Massachusetts. A law approved by voters last November allows for up to 35 dispensaries around the state to provide marijuana for people with certified medical conditions such as cancer, Parkinson's disease and AIDS. The applications are available online and must be submitted by August 22. Applicants must submit a non-refundable \$1,500 submission fee.

Non-profit companies can now begin applying to become a dispensary of medical marijuana. Under the new law, the state can issue up to 35 dispensary licenses. Each county has to have at least one dispensary but can't have more than five.

The state's public health agency is moving ahead with the licensing for medical marijuana dispensaries. The Phase I forms released by the Department of Public Health are meant to determine the financial stability of applicants seeking a dispensary license to sell cannabis in Massachusetts. Background checks will be conducted and applicants must disclose whether any member of their group has been subject to a felony drug conviction. Applicants who pass this first round of the application process can move onto the second round in the fall. During Phase II, a committee will thoroughly vet dispensary applicants based on a competitive selection process. Attorneys representing dispensary applicants are pleased with the progress the DPH is making. Applicants will have to pay a \$1,500 dollar fee with their Phase 1 application. They'll have to pay another \$30,000 dollars if they qualify for Phase 2 of the application process.

Town leaders in Middletown, Connecticut have approved the use of a city-owned building for growing medical marijuana. The town's common council voted in favor of using the space Monday. A year ago Connecticut adopted legislation to allow medical marijuana. The law would allow anywhere from three to 10 secured marijuana growing facilities in the state. Middletown's plan still needs state approval.

The town of Amherst will soon start considering where to place medical marijuana dispensaries. When it comes to establishing and operating a dispensary, there are many phases to this process. First it starts at the state level. The Department of Public Health has issued guidelines those looking to operate a dispensary must follow. The state will allow at least one, but no more than five dispensaries in each county. There is also a local process to this new law and that is the re-zoning of neighborhoods. Local planning boards will approve the use of a dispensary in their respective communities. On Wednesday, the town of Amherst will hold a meeting to start talking about possible locations. Some people are pushing for these treatment centers to be away from schools.

Will higher priced cigarettes help people quit? The Hampshire Council of Governments believes that the one dollar increase on a pack of cigarettes will prevent some 27,000 Massachusetts teenagers from starting to smoke. Plus another 25,000 will quit. Not everyone agrees the extra dollar will be enough for smokers to kick the habit.

Children and teens would be banned from buying electronic cigarettes under a bill being proposed on Beacon Hill. The bill would restrict the sale of any tobacco or nicotine delivery product to minors and prohibit use of the products on public school grounds. The bill's chief sponsor state Rep. Jeffrey Sanchez said the goal of the legislation is to modernize Massachusetts' tobacco laws which don't take into account the rising popularity of electronic cigarettes.

The applications are in, and more than 180 people want a license to operate a medical marijuana dispensary. There is some confusion from residents who say they have already been prescribed marijuana. A Springfield father and son were arrested for growing marijuana in their backyard, but say that a marijuana card allowed them to. To get a card you must have a debilitating medical condition. Until dispensaries open, doctors say you can obtain a limited cultivation license and a card that allows you to posses or grow a 2 month supply of medicine. It's been defined by the state as 10 ounces. And they can grow it, but it must be in a secure location and not visible. Northampton physician Jill Griffin says the system has flaws.

Massachusetts is beginning the process of vetting possible marijuana dispensaries. State lawmakers say some cities and towns are just not prepared for the voter-approved referendum law that legalized medical marijuana in Massachusetts, and now they're scrambling to develop regulations to address it. Nearly 200 applications have been submitted to the Massachusetts Department of Public Health for one of 35 licenses to build a medical marijuana dispensary in the state. The state health department is advising four more southeastern Massachusetts communities to curtail outdoor evening events because of risk from mosquitoes with Eastern equine encephalitis. Health officials said Thursday that mammal-biting mosquitoes carrying EEE were found in Easton, Raynham, Taunton and West Bridgewater. Belchertown in western Massachusetts was earlier deemed at "critical" risk after EEE was found in two horses, and nearby Amherst was rated "high." Officials say people should use insect repellent, protective clothing and avoid being outdoors at dusk and nighttime when mosquitoes are most active.

News **09/04/13** **6pm** **: 30**

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health said today there is a third case of Eastern Equine Encephalitis in a horse this year. The horse with EEE was stabled in Tyngsborough in Middlesex County. The threat level has now been raised to critical there and surrounding areas have been raised to moderate. There has been one case of EEE in a human this year.

News **09/10/13** **6pm** **: 30**

The pros and cons of legalizing marijuana were the focus of a landmark hearing on Capitol Hill today. Members of the senate judiciary committee heard testimony related to conflicts between state and federal marijuana laws. The hearing comes just a month after Attorney General Eric Holder announced that the federal government would no longer interfere in how individual states deal with medical marijuana laws. The Deputy Attorney General says the justice department is working with bank regulators to allow for credit card and check transactions in this currently cash only business.

News **09/13/13** **6pm** **: 30**

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health announced another case of West Nile Virus has been found in a human. A woman from Suffolk County was hospitalized, but then discharged. The investigation by the DPH showed that the patient was most likely exposed to infected mosquitoes in the county. This area is considered to be at moderate risk from West Nile Virus. Last year, thirty-three cases of West Nile were detected in Massachusetts residents.

It's been almost a year since Massachusetts voters approved the use of medical marijuana. Springfield is the largest city in the Commonwealth with a moratorium, or a period of delay

before opening a dispensary. One Hampshire County town has also taken steps to delay the process. 65% of Massachusetts voters supported the medical use of marijuana last November. But almost a year after the passing of the law, one-third of the state's 351 cities and towns has instituted delays. Just west of Northampton, Williamsburg's administrator says the town needs more time to plan. Currently, about a third of the state's cities and towns have enacted temporary moratoriums designed to provide more time to develop new zoning and other regulations.

Flu vaccines are now available at drug stores or your doctor's office, but you'll probably have to pay. Older adults often find it convenient and cost effective to get their flu shot at their senior center. The Northampton Health Department is sponsoring just such a clinic next month.

Medical marijuana is legal in Massachusetts, but some groups want pot legalized completely. Former police officers say putting people in jail for drug offenses makes it harder for them to get a job in the future and doesn't address drug use as an underlying health problem. With plans to support legislation next year that will legalize marijuana in Massachusetts, a group called Law Enforcement Against Prohibition or "LEAP" is warning state lawmakers that sending drug offenders to jail creates more problems than it resolves. LEAP believes it takes attention away from violent crime. According to the FBI, in 1963, police solved 91 percent of murders in the country, today they solve 61%. Like prohibition, LEAP says illegal drugs create an underground economy that drives up crime, shootings, and murder. Like anti-tobacco campaigns, LEAP says anti-drug campaigns should be focused on education and

regulation, not incarceration. While they hope to introduce a bill next year to legalize marijuana, ideally, they believe all drugs should be legal. So far, Colorado and Washington State have legalized marijuana through ballot petitions. Even though it is listed as an illegal substance by the federal government, the Department of Justice has said they will let the laws go into effect.

Massachusetts Attorney Martha Coakley and other attorney generals are urging the US Food and Drug Administration to meet its own deadline and regulate electronic cigarettes in the same way it regulates tobacco products. In a letter it says e-cigarettes are portrayed as safe alternatives to traditional cigarettes. They are also becoming more affordable and available. But it says they are addictive and capable of delivering high doses of nicotine.

Attorney General Martha Coakley says sales of e-cigarettes have doubled every year since 2008. 40 attorney generals, including Martha Coakley here in Massachusetts, sent a letter today to the Federal Drug Administration, urging the FDA to place age and advertising restrictions on electronic cigarettes. Electronic cigarettes or vaporizers are battery-operated products that heat liquid nicotine and produce a vapor. Some people say can help smokers quit smoking. There's no carcinogen. There's no carbon monoxide. There's no second-hand smoke, so it's not dangerous. But Massachusetts Attorney General Martha Coakley is concerned too many young people are using e-cigarettes. She said in a letter to the Food and Drug Administration, the e-cigarette use among students doubled between 2011 and 2012. Right now there's no nationwide age restriction on buying e-cigarettes. Coakley and 39 other attorney generals believe vaporizers should be regulated by the FDA, just like any other tobacco products. People think that's a safer version of the drug, but it's actually the drug, an even more lethal power of the drug. Young people looking for summer jobs will be getting help from the state. The state Legislature has approved \$10 million dollars within in a midyear spending bill for a youth summer jobs program. The program, called YouthWorks, will provide roughly 5,000 jobs for teenagers from low-income households. They'll gain valuable job experience, training and in many cases, help their families make ends meet. Earlier this year, funding for the program was under threat of being cut in half, but Springfield state Representative Cheryl Coakley-Rivera pushed to continue funding the program at about \$10 million dollars. YouthWorks pays teens \$8 dollars an hour for 25 hours a week to work in government, private or non-profit companies. The report is expected to show that the economy added 155,000 jobs in June, and the unemployment rate could fall to 7.5%. It remains to be seen if recent high school and college graduates are entering the workforce in high numbers. Some economists are hoping for a modest report because too much job growth could lead the Federal Reserve to end its stimulus program.

Some welcome news for those searching for a job, more companies are hiring. This hiring boom is happening in the temp industry. There are so many temp jobs, new research says today's figures are just 2% below the industry's record peak in 2000. And the number of temporary work has jumped more than 50% since the recession ended four years ago. Masiello Employment Agency's Recruiter, Scott Kenfield, says that from manufacturing to office work, more companies are turning to temporary workers. He says many of their clients are not hiring temps to replace full time employees but rather creating new positions.

A number of community groups are asking for a ballot question to raise the minimum wage from \$8 to \$10.50 an hour. According to the Hampden County Regional Employment Board there are more than 15 thousand people in our area who work for the minimum wage. It's \$8.00 an hour now but there are some people who want to change that. A coalition of community groups filed proposed ballot questions for the November 2014 election. One would raise the minimum wage from \$8.00-\$10.50 over the next two years and there are some people who think workers need the boost. The issue remains controversial, while it

may better the worker; others say it could hurt small businesses. Bill Ward, CEO of the employment board says it hasn't been raised in 8 years and wherever you stand on the issue; it's time to at least talk about it. In order for this to be on the ballot, the groups must collect 200 thousand signatures in support of the question by December 4th.

Good news on the job front the number of Americans seeking unemployment benefits dropped substantially last week. According to the labor department, the number of people seeking jobless benefits dropped 15,000. This brings the number to 320,000, the lowest in almost six years. In March of 2009, thought to be the height of the recession, applications for unemployment benefits reached 670,000. Hiring is not recovering as quickly. Employers hired an average of 4.3 million people a month through June of this year that is below the 2006 monthly average of 5.3 million.

A glitch in the new unemployment filing system has many jobless people struggling to file their claims. State Secretary of Labor and Workforce Development Joanne Goldstein told 22News the new online system was launched six weeks ago. Right now less than one percent of claimants cannot get their benefits processed because of a system error. Secretary Goldstein said the department is hoping to resolve the issue soon.

Hard Rock Vice President of Human Resources Kim Creighton told 22News the jobs available could range from food and beverage to casino gaming to management. The average salary could be anywhere from \$30,000 to \$120,000. Current Hard Rock employees from several departments will share their experiences tomorrow at the job fair. Creighton said she's encouraging people without any hospitality experiences to come learn about job opportunities as well.

The number of Americans seeking unemployment benefits last week remained near the lowest level in more than five years. According to the Labor Department, the number of first-

time applications fell 6,000 to a seasonally adjusted 331,000. However, the four week average increased by 750 to 331,250 after falling to its lowest level since November 2007 the previous week. According to analysts, the broader trend suggests that companies are laying off fewer employees.

Applications for unemployment benefits last week dropped to a near five year low. According to the labor department, the number of Americans applying for jobless benefits dropped 9,000 to a seasonally adjusted 323,000. That is near its lowest level since June 2008. Weekly applications came in just 1,000 above a five year low reached last month.

The employment gap between America's rich and poor is the widest on record. Rates of unemployment for the lowest income families have topped 21%. A study of U.S. government data shows that households with more than \$150,000 a year have an unemployment rate of 3.2% meaning most have full employment. But middle income workers are taking lower-wage jobs displacing lower-skilled or income workers. People that have jobs say it isn't always easy to make ends meet.
