At a public hearing on April 10 and April 11, cancer advocates will share personal stories and testimony about the devastating impact of tobacco use on their families, including losing fathers and other loved ones from tobacco-related cancers.</p> <p>Lawmakers are considering House Bill 2270 to raise the price of cigarettes by \$2 per pack and increase the tax on electronic cigarettes by an equal amount. The tax will help fund the state's Medicaid program. Revenue will also help fund critical tobacco prevention and cessation programs in the state.</p>

The Sheriff explains the rationale and needs behind replacing the old jail. It is being proposed that the jail would cost 166 million dollars, and the cost to taxpayers at .84 per \$1000 of property valuation.
<b>Importance of volunteering and community service</b>	<b>Bill Meyer Show</b>	4/28	0530	10	According to a NEW REPORT from Independent Sector - in OREGON, every hour a volunteer contributes to their community is worth \$26.22 and that's up 5.3% percent from last year's figures. Unfortunately, federal law hurts nonprofit organizations' ability to attract this valuable resource by severely limiting how much they can reimburse volunteers for donated mileage. Businesses can reimburse their employees at a rate of 54.5 cents per mile, but volunteer mileage has been fixed at a mere 14 cents per mile for over two decades. Real life stories combine with an overview of common diagnoses, advice on navigating your health insurance or school system, and help with setting expectations at home to give practical steps to bring order to the chaos and hope to the future. <b>Gender Issues, government school policy, cultural values</b>	<b>Clear Connections</b>	5/12	0545	15	Carrie Lukas President of the Independent Women's Forum poses the question - Do Girls and Women Deserve Single-Sex Sports? Is the existence of single-sex teams just another manifestation of our culture's propensity to put girls in pink tutus while handing boys trucks? Carrie says No. These distinctions are made, not to discriminate against girls and keep girls out of athletics, but to encourage and facilitate their participation in it. There are separate girls' and boys' teams to help girls, to make sure they are competitive, and to prevent boys from dominating athletic competitions. Women simply don't have the same physical capacities. Recognizing this isn't rejecting women's equality. It's accepting reality, which we have to do if we are to protect women's interests and ensure that they can fairly and fully participate in athletics.
<b>Energy and power costs, reliability, environmental issues and personal economy</b>	<b>Clear Connections</b>	5/19 and 5/26	0530	30	<p>Scott Bolton, Pacific Power's senior Vice President for External Affairs and customer solutions joins us to discuss power policies, smart meter rollouts, and more. PacifiCorp has released an updated economic study of its coal fleet that will inform how the company meets the long-term customer energy needs of its customers. Bill asked Scott to explain how the rollout of green energy and closure of reliable coal plants will affect power reliability. He says there is so much green that it is more than enough to make up for the lack of conventional base load. Time will tell if this is an accurate assessment.</p> <p>The study was conducted as part of the company's 2019 Integrated Resource Plan, which is still under development and anticipated to be completed in August. The IRP, which is updated every two years, identifies actions the company anticipates taking over the next 20 years to provide reliable and least-cost electricity to customers.</p> <p>The study reviewed coal units that are part of PacifiCorp's broader resource mix to determine if customers would benefit from closing a unit or combination of units earlier than currently planned. Most of the company's coal units will reach the end of their depreciable lives at different points over the next 20 years. Dave believes the actual fire danger is unknown, but on the upside, more firefighting resources, planes, helicopters, crews, are available.

She released the following statement in reaction to the recent Legislative Council opinion regarding the constitutional implications of the natural gas tax in HB 2020.</p> <p>"Any revenues from the taxation of natural gas in Oregon must be deposited into the Common School Fund and cannot be used to mitigate climate change. HB 2020 spends millions, but certain natural gas taxes are constitutionally protected. This money belongs in our classrooms.</p> <p>"Cap and Trade will unconstitutionally divert money away from our children's education, into the pet projects of unelected bureaucrats. We cannot let that happen," Rep. Drazan said.</p>

					The recently released Legislative Counsel opinion includes a requirement that the tax on natural gas not exceed 6% and that the tax on natural gas must abide by the dormant commerce clause, none of which is included in the language of HB 2020. These additional challenges to the funding and structure of HB 2020, come on the heels of the revelation that cap and trade will harm Oregon's bond rating and in a matter of years cripple the Highway Trust Fund — effectively reversing recent bipartisan, bicameral legislation adopted to strengthen Oregon's economy by funding a functional transportation system that efficiently moves people and goods.
<b>Support for the arts, local economy and entertainment industry</b>	<b>Clear Connections</b>	6/9	0550	10	Gary Lundgren, producer of the new film "Phoenix, Oregon" is here to discuss the artistic and economic impacts of this locally filmed and produced movie. Joma Films has produced three feature films in Southern Oregon that went on to wider festival and theatrical release— Calvin Marshall in 2009, Redwood Highway in 2014, and Black Road in 2016. Phoenix, Oregon's World Premiere was at the Ashland Independent Film Festival April 13. According to Richard Herskowitz, AIFF Artistic and Executive Director: Phoenix, Oregon is "an entertaining film, with a genuine regional soul.

Lee suffered from Lyme disease for about 10 years before diagnosis, and discusses her history with the disease. Adds that Lyme disease rates are growing dramatically in southern Oregon.
<b>Public education curriculum and accountability, federal funding for education</b>	<b>Clear Connections</b>	6/30	0530	15	Dr. Vicki E. Alger, Senior Fellow at the Independent Women's Forum iwf.org is our guest and we delve into it being the 10 <sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the birth of "Common Core". Alger is the author of "Failure: The Federal Miseducation of America's Children". Alger opines that Common Core turns ten this month, but results from a new report suggest there's not much reason to celebrate.  Researchers with the federally-funded Center on Standards, Alignment, Instruction and Learning (C-SAIL) examined fourth- and eighth-grade reading and math performance changes from 2010 through 2017 on the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP). Chalkbeat's Matt Barnum reports that the CAIL study: "...shows that states that changed their standards most dramatically by adopting the Common Core didn't outpace other states on federal NAEP exams. By 2017 — seven years after most states had adopted them — the standards appear to have led to modest declines in fourth-grade reading and eighth-grade math scores. "It's rather unexpected," said researcher Mengli Song ... "The magnitude of the negative effects tend to increase over time. That's a little troubling."
<b>Religious Liberty, civil liberties and property rights, state and federal government regulation</b>	<b>Clear Connections</b>	6/30	0545	15	Jeremy Dys, attorney with First Liberty analyzes the 6/16 news from the Supreme Court of the United States. The court announced that it reversed a decision the state of Oregon that forced bakers Aaron and Melissa Klein out of business by penalizing them \$135,000 for refusing to create a government-approved message. The case was sent back to the Oregon courts for further review in light of its Masterpiece Cakeshop, Ltd. v. Colorado Civil Rights Commission. The Kleins are

				<p>represented by First Liberty Institute and Boyden Gray &amp; Associates.</p> <p>The State of Oregon's Bureau of Labor and Industries (BOLI) found that the Kleins had had violated Oregon's public accommodations statute after Aaron and Melissa declined to design and create wedding cake celebrating a same-sex marriage. In addition to the \$135,000 penalty for "emotional damages," BOLI issued a gag order, preventing them from even talking about their actual beliefs. As a result, the Kleins were forced to shut down their bakery. Aaron and Melissa appealed the BOLI ruling to the Oregon Court of Appeals in April 2016. The Oregon Court of Appeals reversed the gag order but otherwise upheld the decision of BOLI in December 2017.</p>
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
