Administered by the Social Security Administration, it could become the first government benefits program to run out of money—due in large part to aging baby boomers, the effects of a bad economy, as well as questions of fraud by legal, medical and judicial professionals. “Super 6-1” – a report on America’s first battle against al-Qaeda, in Mogadishu, Somalia on October 3, 1993. The film, “Black Hawk Down” recounted the conflict. 60 MINUTES obtained never-before-seen footage of the mission, battle, and downing of “Super 6-1,” the call sign of the doomed helicopter. David Snelson, and his wife, Alisha Ryu, who now run a private security company together in Somalia have since recovered pieces of Super 6-1, and the remaining parts now reside in the Airborne and Special Operations Museum in Fayetteville, North Carolina. Includes interviews with David Snelson and wife, Alisha Ryu; Norm Hooten, Special Operations team leader in Somalia; Matt Eversmann, Army Ranger; Tom Matthews, battalion commander for 160th Special Operations Aviation Regiment. - 10/05/13 **48 HOURS: "Spies, Lies & Secrets"** - a report about the death of Shane Todd, a brilliant, high-tech engineer at a Singapore company who, according to his parents, was murdered because he was unwilling to share secrets that could harm the United States. But, to the police in Singapore, he was just an American who committed suicide. In 2012, Todd, then a research engineer at the Institute of Microelectronics (IME), was found dead in his Singapore apartment. His parents believe he was killed because he was unwilling to go along with a plan to share cutting-edge American technology with China. He was scheduled to leave Singapore in a matter of days when he was found dead. Journalist and 48 HOURS consultant Ray Bonner, who broke the story in London's Financial Times, says police made mistakes in the investigation, and that he is quite surprised, because Singapore is a sophisticated place. With pressure mounting, Singapore expanded a coroner's inquest into Shane Todd's death. In all, seventy witnesses testified over the course of ten days of testimony. The state's coroner ruled that the cause of death was suicide by hanging. He also found nothing legally wrong with the IME- Huawei relationship, yet determined that the meeting Shane's boss had with IME colleagues was "improper, but not witness tampering." Shane's family feel betrayed, and plan on taking their quest for truth to Washington, pressing for a congressional investigation and a meeting with President Obama. **On-Screen Text Graphic:** The Todds are expecting their first grandchild. - 10/12/13 **48 HOURS: "Death at Cottonwood Creek"** - a report on this week's jury decision in the murder trial of Frederick Mueller, who was charged with 2008 murder of his wife, Dr. Leslie Mueller, while the two were out for a walk near their vacation home in Lake City, Colorado. According to what Frederick Mueller told police, while the Muellers were out hiking, Mueller stopped to take a photo of his wife near the edge of a cliff. His wife lost her footing near the waterfall and plunged into a creek. Her body was swept away downstream. It appeared to be an accident, but investigators were skeptical and believed it was murder. Four years later, Mueller was arrested for first degree murder. His first trial ended in a mistrial. The second trial ended this week in another mistrial. 48 HOURS examined the incident and the trials through interviews with the Mueller family, investigators, prosecutors, and jury members. **On-Screen Text Graphic:** On Tuesday, the prosecution and defense will meet with Judge Wasserman to discuss the future of the case. If the prosecution decides on a third trial, it must begin within ninety days. - 10/19/13 **48 HOURS: "aka Rockefeller"** - a report about the mysterious life of Christian Gerhartsreiter, a con-man, who had pretended, since he came to America from Germany, to be a bond trader, a TV producer, a baronet and even Clark Rockefeller, a member of the famous and wealthy Rockefeller family. In 2008, Gerhartsreiter, then claiming to be Clark Rockefeller, made headlines when he abducted his 7-year-old daughter. The Rockefeller family made it clear that he was not a part of their family. What he was, according to police, was a killer on the run. His arrest in the kidnapping case blew the lid off a 30-year con. All the other identities he had used came to light including the alias he was living under in 1982 in San Marino, California: Christopher Chichester, the 13th Baronet of Chichester. San Marino police believe he murdered John and Linda Sohus, who disappeared in 1985. Years later, the bones of John Sohus were found in the backyard of the house where they lived. At the time, Christopher Chichester lived in the guest house on the property. He went on trial for the murder of John Sohus and was found guilty. **On-Screen Text Graphic:** "Rockefeller" fired his lawyers and filed his own petition for a new trial. The judge denied the motion. His daughter is now twelve-years-old. She has no contact with her father. - 10/26/13 **48 HOURS: "The Ghosts of Greenwich" (9:00-10:00p)** - an updated rebroadcast about: (1) the murder of 15-year-old Martha Moxley in Greenwich, Connecticut, as detailed in "Never Forget" (OAD: 05/11/00), and "Above the Law" (OAD: 04/13/02); and (2) the new developments in Kennedy family member Michael Skakel's efforts to overturn his 2002 murder conviction of Moxley, which were detailed in the following 48 HOURS reports: "RFK, Jr: A Family's Defense" (OAD: 04/16/03); "The Ghosts of Greenwich" (OAD: 09/10/03, updated on 08/30/08). This broadcast takes a look at the recent developments in Skakel's case and his upcoming new trial. In 1975, Moxley was murdered. Members of the Skakel family were among those considered as suspects, but the case went cold. Years later, a new investigation, prompted by the publication of the book "Murder in Greenwich", led to the arrest and conviction of Michael Skakel. His brothers and his cousin, Robert F. Kennedy, Jr., believe he was wrongly convicted. In 2003, Kennedy wrote an article for The Atlantic Monthly, which outlined his reasons for claiming that Michael Skakel was wrongly convicted. Police immediately suspected Dan DeWild, but there was no murder weapon, no fingerprints, no blood. His identical twin, David DeWild quickly married his girlfriend, Roseanne. Heather's body was found one month later, bound and buried on a canyon road. Police came to the realization that Dan DeWild and his identical twin brother David were most likely responsible for her murder, but the case grew cold due to lack of evidence. In 2009, Russ Boatright was assigned full-time to the circumstantial case. Investigation led to a sex tape, and Dan's fascination with bondage and rope. Heather was found bound in a similar manner. In 2011, Dan DeWild, David DeWild and his wife Roseanne were arrested and charged with murder. David DeWild broke down and admitted that his brother Dan had killed Heather and that he had participated in the crime. Prosecutors then learned that the brothers had been watching television crime dramas and forensic shows. They believed that Heather had gone to the house to retrieve the sex tape and then was killed. David DeWild took investigators to the crime scene and re-enacted what happened. David had to pass a polygraph test in order to secure a plea deal. Roseanne's charges were dropped due to lack of evidence. Dan DeWild's trial hinged almost entirely on his brother's testimony and with the lack of physical evidence, prosecutors hoped it was enough. In the end, it wasn't. Jurors deadlocked on the first degree murder charge, but agreed on the lesser charges. Plans were started for a retrial, but a month after the conviction, Dan DeWild pled guilty to second degree murder in a plea deal. **On-screen text graphic:** The identical twins have been separated...they are housed in different prisons. Redding was found dead in her Santa Monica, California home. According to authorities, the killer hoped to erase any evidence of the crime; the killer tried to blow up the entire crime scene by leaving the gas on and a candle burning. This did not happen, and there was plenty of DNA evidence remaining at the scene. A sometime boyfriend, John Gilmore, who had a history of violent behavior had an alibi and was cleared. Further investigation led to the discovery that Redding had recently broken up with her wealthy boyfriend, Dr. Munir Uwayda after learning he had a wife and children in Lebanon. Investigators also learned of a lucrative business deal offered to Redding's pharmacist father. Less than a week after the deal fell apart, Redding was dead. Inside the home, police found evidence of a struggle and DNA evidence that led to a woman: Kelly Soo Park. Park was in the employ of Dr. Uwayda. She was arrested and within days Uwayda had vanished. Five years later, the trial commenced. While authorities thought the case was an easy win, the defense, with the help of jury consultant Lee Meihls, presented a bold argument of DNA transference. His wife's parents still believed Camm was guilty. The State decided to try him a third time. Defense attorneys used a different strategy, involving DNA. In this trial, Boney testified that he provided Camm with the gun and that any of his DNA was put there by Camm. Police arrested 20-year-old Cody Legebokoff in Leslie's murder. A patrolman pulled him over, thinking he was poaching game. He had Leslie's ID in his truck. Her body was just down the road. Legebokoff has since been identified as the alleged killer of three others, though police have not revealed how they've connected him to the murders that occurred in 2009 and 2010. Still, because of his age, police know Legebokoff couldn't be responsible for all of the murders along Highway 16. Just two months ago, officials at the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) got a break in some cases because they linked DNA samples from one of the highway's victims, Colleen MacMillen, found murdered in 1974, to Bobby Jack Fowler. Police also believe Fowler, a Texas native who worked as a roofer in Prince George, may have killed as many as twenty people in the United States and Canada. However, because of the statute of limitations, the Reines will remain unpunished. Melvin is now institutionalized, in a state of dementia. Police were summoned after Hill's boss drove to her home and found her car still in the driveway. She was found by police, at the bottom of the basement steps, barely breathing and covered in blood. Believing she was dying, Prairie Village Police Officer Bill Baldwin tried to coax out of her who was behind the vicious attack. Doctors were not sure that she would survive; she was beaten and her throat slashed open. They spent hours treating her. Police found out that Marti was a workaholic, and if she was not working, she was at home. Her ex-husband was ruled out as a suspect. Hill's mother alerted police towards Brian Pennington, a construction worker whom both she and Marti had hired to do work. Police questioned him and became suspicious, but needed to hear Marti's side of the story. They soon learned she was recovering and able to talk to police. She confirmed to police that Brian Pennington had attacked her; he was arrested for attempted first-degree murder. Frustrating to police was the fact that Pennington apparently had absolutely no motive. However, they found that he had a record of over sixty contacts with law enforcement officers, including several domestic violence incidents involving women. During the preliminary hearing, Pennington eventually agreed to a plea deal; the only issue would be how long he would be held in the Kansas State prison system. It took months, but finally a twenty-eight-and-a-half year prison sentence was agreed upon.
