Health

Sunday, July 7, 2013 – Radio Health Journal 6:30 a.m.

30:00

Host: Reed Pence. Guests: Dr. John Caffaro, Distinguished Professor, California School of Professional Psychology; Nancy Kilgore, PTSD trainer, abuse survivor, and author, Girl in the Water; and Dr. Mandy Morrill, Assistant Professor of Psychology, Valparaiso University.

Psychological or physical abuse by siblings is much more common than most people realize. This type of abuse can leave severe psychological scars on the individual. In some cases parents often downplay this type of abuse, referring to it as sibling rivalry. Reed discussed with Dr. Caffaro, Ms. Kilgore, and Dr. Morrill the extent sibling abuse can have on the family, warning signs of abuse, and how parents can prevent this type of abuse from endangering the family.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guests: Dr. George Sawaya, Professor of Obstetrics, Gynecology, and Reproductive Sciences, University of California - San Francisco; and Dr. Susan Spear, Senior Vice President of Medical Affairs, EHE International.

The bi-annual pelvic exam is a part of the vast majority of visits health professional urge women to obtain from their obstetrician-gynecologist. Nancy discussed with Dr. Sawaya and Dr. Spear that the frequency of these tests are unnecessary, that these types of tests may not assure detection of disease, and some of these tests may even cause more harm than good.

Host: Reed Pence. Guest: Dr. Xavier Amador, Professor of Psychology, Columbia University, Director, LEAP Institute, and author, I Am Not Sick, I Don't Need Help: How to Help Someone with Mental Illness Accept Treatment.

One of the most difficult aspects of schizophrenia treatment is a frontal lobe disability that occurs in half of patients which causes them to deny that they are ill, in turn prompting rejection of medication or therapy. Reed discussed with Dr. Amador the effects of this disability on patients, families, and therapists, and how families can get patients with schizophrenia into treatment despite this problem.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guests: Dr. Yvonne Kaplan-Liss, Associate Professor of Preventive Medicine, Stony Brook University and Director, Advanced Graduate Certificate in Health Communications; Ashwin Malhotra, medical student, Stony Brook University; and Dr. Zack Berger, Assistant Professor of Medicine, Johns Hopkins University, and author, Talking to Your Doctor: A Patient's Guide to Communication in the Exam Room and Beyond.

Doctors and scientists have long been criticized for seemingly being unable to speak in understandable language. Most patients have trouble understanding medical terms and health professional jargon. Nancy discussed with Dr. Kaplan-Liss, Mr. Malhotra, and Dr. Berger how medical schools are now beginning to teach students a less advanced way to speak to patients.

Guests: Dr. Laura Carstensen, Professor of Psychology, Stanford University, and Director, Stanford Center on Longevity; Dr. Steven Austad, Professor, Barshhop Institute for Longevity and Aging Studies, University of Texas Health Science Center, San Antonio; and Nancy Berlinger, Research Scholar, Hastings Center and lead author, Guidelines for Decisions on Life-Sustaining Treatment and Care Near the End of Life.

Recent advertising campaigns claim that a 150-year lifespan is imminent. Reed discussed with Dr. Carstensen, Dr. Austad, and Ms. Berlinger what experts know about the limits of aging, quality of life and care for the aged, the relationship of research and lifespans, and whether people would actually want to live a century and a half even if they could.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guests: Dr. Barry Gordon, Professor of Neurology and Cognitive Science, Johns Hopkins University; and Dr. Rodney Roediger, Washington University, St. Louis.

Some people who remember things extremely well may claim they have a “photographic memory”, but some experts say such a thing doesn't really exist. Nancy discussed with Dr. Gordon and Dr. Roediger how memory works and the interworking of an individual's ability to retain memories.

Host: Reed Pence. Guests: Deborah Hersman, Chairman, National Transportation Safety Board; Jan Withers, National President, MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Driving); Ray Peck, Head of R. C. Peck & Associates, and Project Chief Research Scientist, Pacific Institute of Research and Evaluation; and Gary Biller, President, National Motorists Association.

The National Transportation Safety Board has recommended lowering the DUI threshold from .08 BAC to .05 as a means of reducing drunk driving. Advocates on this movement are divided on whether such a reduction would have much effect. Reed discussed with Ms. Hersman, Ms. Winters, and Mr. Biller how reducing the DUI threshold would affect drivers and other movements that might have a larger and more immediate impact.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Dr. Danielle Ofri, Associate Professor of Medicine, New York University, and author, What Doctors Feel: How Emotions Affect the Practice of Medicine.

Doctors are often accused of having poor bedside manner and being emotionless with their patients. Nancy discussed with Dr. Ofri the importance of emotion in the practice of medicine and how this coincides with their patients' treatment and recovery.

Host: Mimi Lawson. Guest: Margo Rey, Singer-Songwriter and Brides Against Cancer Volunteer.

Mimi discussed with Ms. Rey how she is helping breast cancer survivors and their families by providing low cost bridal gowns during the Brides Against Breast Cancer trunk show. Ms. Rey explained that by selling gently used or new gowns to survivors at a greatly reduced cost, they are bringing awareness to the disease and helping to raise money for programs and services to patients, caregivers, and families affected by the disease.

Guests: Robin Nagle, Clinical Professor of Anthropology and Urban Studies, New York University, Anthropologist in Residence, New York Sanitation Department, and author, Picking Up: On the Streets and Behind the Trucks with the Sanitation Workers of New York City; and Sam Shick, franchise operator, 1-800-GOT-JUNK.

Studies show refuse workers have the most dangerous municipal job with more occurring injuries than police officers or firefighters. Reed discussed with Ms. Nagle and Mr. Shick the massive job sanitation workers have of hauling our garbage away and the injuries that can occur.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Nathan Belofsky, author, Strange Medicine: A Shocking History of Real Medical Practices through the Ages.

Nancy discussed with Mr. Belofsky how far medicine has come by focusing on past practices. Mr. Belofsky explained that in his research he concluded that doctors in ancient Greece provided better health care than those in the United States over a 150 years ago.

Editor, NBC's "Today", and Contributing Editor, Supermarket News; and Sharon Palmer, Registered Dietitian and author, The Plant Power Diet.

One of the hottest food store trends is the rapidly increasing number of supermarket dietitians. Reed discussed with Ms. Tringali-Piho, Mr. Lempert, and Ms. Palmer the extra value that health providers can have on consumers by offering advice to customers in the very place food purchase decisions are made.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Dr. Steven Lamm, Director, New York University Men's Health Center, and author, No Guts, No Glory.

Irritable bowel syndrome affects a surprisingly large proportion of Americans, yet many do not get help or treatment. Reed discussed with Dr. Lamm the new treatments for IBS that could ease the suffering of millions.

Host: Reed Pence. Guests: Dr. Michael Jacobson, Executive Director, Center for Science in the Public Interest; Michael Taylor, Deputy Commissioner for Foods, U. S. Food and Drug Administration; and Dr. Marcie Schneider, adolescent medicine specialist, Greenwich, Connecticut.

Caffeine used to be present in only coffee, tea, and some sodas. Once caffeine was introduced to energy drinks, food distributors saw an increase of caffeine being added in all kinds of foods, from pancake syrup to candy. Reed discussed with Dr. Jacobson, Mr. Taylor, and Dr. Schneider if food makers have overstepped limits of safety and propriety, and whether the Food and Drug Administration needs to lower the limits of acceptable caffeine in food and drinks.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Dr. Nassir Ghaemi, Professor of Psychiatry and Director, Mood Disorders Program, Tufts University, and author, A First Rate Madness.

Studies show that in good times "level headed" leaders do well. Nancy discussed with Dr. Ghaemi that, in turn, during times of war and crisis, leaders such as Lincoln, Franklin Roosevelt, and Martin Luther King, who had traits of mental illness, may be more effective.

Guests: Dr. Ruth Hughes, Chief Executive Officer, CHADD (Children and Adults with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder); Dr. Alan DeSantis, Professor of Communications, University of Kentucky; and Dr. Ted Grace, Director of Student Health Services, Southern Illinois University - Carbondale.

Studies show that on some college campuses, half or more of all students will have used an illicit ADHD drug to get better grades by the time they graduate. Reed discussed with Dr. Hughes, Dr. DeSantis, and Dr. Grace the attitudes of students toward these

drugs and the new moves by many student health services to crack down on their easy availability.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Dr. Ronald Pies, Professor of Psychiatry, State University of New York Upstate Medical University, and Clinical Professor of Psychiatry, Tufts University; and Danny Gregory, author and illustrator, [A Kiss Before You Go](#).

Everyone deals with grief at one time or another. Nancy discussed with Dr. Pies how grief is experienced by most people and what separates normal grief from more problematic depression.

Host: Mimi Lawson. Guests: Carol Borden, Founder and Director of Guardian Angels Service Dogs; Karen Gamblish, the wife of a service dog recipient; and Robert Brigante, Afghanistan war vet and service dog owner.

Mimi discussed with Ms. Borden, Mrs. Gamblish, and Mr. Brigante the upcoming evening to raise money for Guardian Angels and the work they do with veterans and medical service dogs. Ms. Borden discussed how her group raises, trains, and pairs highly skilled federally-protected service dogs with qualified veterans. Mr. Brigante shared his unique story and showed how his dog has helped him regain his life and independence. In closing, Ms. Borden shared that the success rate is 100% with the dogs assisting disabled veterans in restoring their independence, dignity, and self-worth.

Childhood stories and activities have become more censored because of the violence some of these provide. Books have become censored because it's all "too violent". Teachers in schools worry that allowing violent play as well as violent images will desensitize children to violence. Reed discussed with Dr. Logue and Ms. Katch that some of these worries are unfounded, and that children grow in many ways through play.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guests: Stacy Horn, author, [Imperfect Harmony: Finding Happiness Singing With Others](#); Dr. Barbara Reuer, Chief Executive Officer and Founder, Musicworx, Inc. music therapy practice, San Diego; and Karen Hesley, speech pathologist and director, Tremble Clefs singing group.

Research shows that singing in a group, like a church choir or garage band, has health benefits as well as simply making people feel good. Nancy discussed with Ms. Horn, Ms. Reuer, and Ms. Hesley the increasing singing trend in society.

Guests: Paul Tabachneck, IT professional, musician, and misophonia sufferer; Judy Krauthamer, author, Sound Rage: A Primer of the Neurobiology and Psychology of a Little Known Anger Disorder; and Dr. Aage Moller, Professor of Behavioral and Brain Sciences, University of Texas at Dallas.

A study shows a surprisingly large number of people have a condition called misophonia in which the individual becomes agitated or even enraged when they hear “mouth sounds” such as chewing, slurping, sniffing, or crunching of paper. This disorder is largely unknown, but researchers believe audio processing of these sounds is mis-routed to rage centers in the brain. Reed discussed with Mr. Tabachneck, Ms. Krauthamer, and Dr. Moller this very rare syndrome and how it affects its patients.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Dr. Andre Choulika, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer, Sceil biotech firm.

Scientists have learned how to make stem cells from skin cells, opening the door to regeneration of tissues and organs from a patient’s own cells to bypass tissue or organ rejection. Nancy discussed with Dr. Choulika how this method works and how the process could be used in future treatment.

Studies show that medical professionals are second only to family members as a source of bias against obese and overweight people. Reed discussed with Dr. Puhl, Dr. Arya, and Dr. Gudzone why this might occur, the medical harm that can result, and how medicine might be able to reverse its behavior.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Katy Butler, author, Knocking on Heaven’s Door: The Path to a Better Way of Death.

There is a fine line between preserving life and prolonging death. Nancy discussed with Ms. Butler her personal experience observing how medical professionals and patients differ in their acceptance of impending death, and what families need to know to navigate the end of life toward a “good death”.

Host: Mimi Lawson. Guest: Dr. Tommie Robinson, Former President of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association.

The American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) finds that more than 45 percent of certified experts report lack of awareness among parents as the leading barrier to early detection of communication disorders. In addition, more than 60 percent of respondents said parents are unaware of the early warning signs of speech disorders. Mimi discussed with Dr. Robinson that more than half of patients have reported their patients' view untreated hearing loss as an acceptable part of aging. Dr. Robinson explained that ASHA aims to educate parents, caregivers, and educators about the early warning signs of speech, language, and hearing issues.

Guests: Dan Schuyler, Director of Exchange Technology, Leavitt Partners; Paul Ginsberg, President, Center for Studying Health System Change; Kevin Lucia, Senior Research Fellow, Center on Health Insurance Reforms, Georgetown University; and Laura Summers, Director of State Intelligence, Leavitt Partners.

State insurance exchanges that are central to the Affordable Care Act are scheduled to begin enrolling on October 1. Reed discussed with Mr. Schuyler, Mr. Ginsberg, and Mr. Lucia the likely problems that consumers may face as they enter the market.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Joanna Poppink, Psychotherapist and author, Healing Your Hungry Heart: Recovering From Your Eating Disorder.

Eating disorders are widespread among teenage girls, but these disorders do not disappear as women age. Women just get better at hiding them. Nancy discussed with Ms. Poppink the causes and treatment for eating disorders.

Host: Mimi Lawson. Guests: Nicole Duritz, AARP; Kathy Schoen of the Commonwealth Fund; and Laura Siegel, Director and Report Author of FAT, an Obesity report from The Trust for America Foundation.

Open enrollment for the Affordable Care Act begins October 1. Mimi discussed with Ms. Duritz, Ms. Schoen, and Ms. Siegel the coverage changes and the resources available to people of all income levels. Ms. Schoen discussed the changes in store for workers in all income levels and how the new law will affect patients and household incomes now that we will be required to carry health insurance by law. Ms. Duritz provided several resources for people to research the changes in the health care law and see how they can become more informed about its implementation.

Ms. Kemper also discussed the rising cost of a higher education and how it has affected what we study, where we study, and how long we will spend in school.

Mr. Gay explained that one of the goals of their non-profit group, West Tampa Community Development Corporation, is working towards getting young men living in the central city to become more involved in agriculture. Mr. Gay presented ways to have young adults in the community focus on better career choices that not only will benefit the community but themselves as well.

Mimi discussed with Mr. Riviera fire safety and how to prevent and deal with wildfires. Mr. Riviera explained that from January to April of this year, approximately 1,100 wildfires have destroyed more than 22,000 acres of land in Florida. Mr. Riviera explained that as we reach the height of the dry season, Hillsborough County Fire Rescue has provided residents with suggestions on the prevention of setting an unintentional brush fire. Mimi and Mr. Riviera discussed the precautions which include proper ways to discard cigarettes, fireworks safety, and safe cooking techniques in case of a stove fire. In closing, Mr. Riviera expressed how important practicing fire safety is with your family and how to discuss these rules with your children.

Mimi discussed with Mr. Suit and Ms. Huau the camp for children with special health concerns and needs that is located in the Tampa Bay area called Camp Boggy Creek. Mr. Suit and Ms. Huau explained that the camp serves children with a myriad of clinical health issues from cancer to heart disease. The camp is a non-profit organization that does not charge campers for their stay and raises funds through donations and events. In closing, Mr. Suit and Ms. Huau provided examples of how doctors, students, and other adults can contribute to the experience of these seriously ill children during their stay at the camp.
