These breweries, and many others outside Montana, all start with high-quality ingredients. Montana produces some of the best barley, hops and other ingredients used by those breweries. But, how do growers and producers know the quality and performance characteristics of those ingredients? The Barley Breeding Program at MSU, which includes the Barley, Malt & Brewing Quality Lab often plays a role. The MSU Barley Program utilizes innovative methods to create improved varieties, increases and disseminates the knowledge base, fosters sustainability practices, and helps train the next generation, in all sectors of the barley industry. The Lab provides testing services to growers and producers throughout Montana, across the U.S. and even into Canada. Lab Director, Hannah Turner, joins the panel this week to help us understand how the lab helps develop those tasty products.

Education Challenges	Montana Ag Live –“ School Safety in Rural Montana”	1/9	11am	56 mins.	Our schools are normally a safe place for our children and for teachers, administrators, and guests. Even the best laid plans can go awry, though. Sometimes inclement weather presents a problem, leaving parents and school administrators with the responsibility of safely transporting students to and from school, and managing the student population when regular plans and schedules must change. Corona Virus has reinforced that communicable disease can seriously disrupt school and all of normal life activity. Perhaps students are faced with the death of a fellow student or teacher. Natural disasters like earthquakes, floods, or fires can compromise building infrastructure, putting occupants at risk. All of these challenges can strain any school district's budget & resources, but rural schools are often hit even harder. Dr. John Dudley, world-renowned expert on school safety, answers questions about school safety. Through his organization, School Crisis Management, John has trained well over a thousand Montana educators on techniques used to maintain safety in Montana schools.

This documentary from Montana PBS goes beyond the plate, painting portraits of the people recovering traditional food sources and following their efforts to share this knowledge with others. SOVEREIGN TABLE is produced in the traditional homelands of the Amskapi Piikani, Anishinaabe Apsaalooke, Chippewa Cree, Ktunaxa, Shoshone and Selis people, and in the sovereign nations of the Blackfoot, Chippewa Cree of Rocky Boy, Confederated Salish and Kootenai, Crow, and Eastern Shoshone and Northern Arapahoe tribes.</p> <p>Northern Arapaho tribal members travel to Pennsylvania to retrieve the stories and the remains of children who died at Carlisle Indian boarding school in the 1880s.
