SECTION A: NEWSCAST OVERVIEW AND QUARTERLY ISSUES ADDRESSED

WNCC-FM airs four local newscasts during its broadcast day, Monday through Friday at 7:03am, 8:03am, 12:02pm, and 5:02pm, following three to ten minutes of world and national news from NBC Radio News. WNCC reports local and area news events and issues on an ongoing basis.

News Treatments: The nominal length of each of our lead or feature news stories described below is between 30-seconds and one minute 30 seconds.

Some of the issues covered in these newscasts and programs during the **fourth** quarter are as follows:

1-Voter Education / Elections

News Treatments: January 27, 30; February 8, 17, 23; March 3, 7, 14, 15, 16, 17

New Voter Laws brought changes to the local voting process in our listening area. Local elections throughout the area were taking place in the First Quarter. We informed citizens about the elections that were taking place, new voter laws, and candidate's stances on issues that impact the public.

2- Crime / Police

News Treatments: January 11, 21; February 4, 11; March 3, 11, 14, 17, 18

Our coverage area saw several different examples of major crimes through the first quarter, along with sentencing for earlier crimes. We kept the community informed of the crimes and sentencing throughout the entire first quarter.

3-Jobs

News Treatments: January 8; February 5; March 8, 22, 31

First quarter unemployment rate was relatively stagnant in Macon County. There were many Maconians considered unemployed and actively seeking work. We wanted to connect listeners to job opportunities and employment resources during some of our newscasts.

4- Education / Schools

News Treatments: January 20, 26; February 1-4, 9, 11, 16, 26, 29; March 4, 18, 30

There were several changes to area schools in terms of policies as well as construction. We informed listeners on changes taking place at local schools during the first quarter. Our news stories provided information on school calendar changes, upgrades to local schools, and general changes to the school system.

5- Public Safety

News Treatments: January 20, 26; February 15, 16, 17, 26

There were several issues with Public Safety that made an impact on our listening area. Our treatment was to inform the public in quick and timely fashion. Weather conditions, highway incidents, and other key public safety issues were addressed in some news casts during the first quarter. With numerous accidents and weather events, we strove to keep the community informed and updated on dangerous weather and driving conditions.

6-Poorly Informed Citizens

News Treatments: January 22, 28; February 4; March 12, 16, 23;

Several changes were made to policies and regulations that affected the listening area. We provided critical information not necessarily obtained easily for our listeners. This may include government issues, transportation projects, and new or changing regulations. Issues mentioned during our news casts have an impact to Macon County and its residents, so it is paramount to connect our listeners with what they need to know.

7-Public Health

News Treatments: January 8, 26, 28; February 26, 29; March 24

Public health has been an ongoing issue in our listening area and it is a responsibility we have to inform the listening community. We provided key information on public health issues, such as Radon testing in homes and preparedness for flu season during the winter months. We are hopeful that our citizens will heed these public health messages and create a healthier, safer community.

8-Food Insecurity

News Treatments: January 5, 12; February 12, 26; March 4, 23

Food insecurity remained a top issue in the county for the first quarter. Fortunately, there are many programs and opportunities for local citizens to help fill the gap. We reminded residents about the need in the community to help spur donations to food banks Carenet and The Community Table. We also provided information about events and places residents could check with to get food.
