SECTION A: NEWSCAST OVERVIEW AND QUARTERLY ISSUES ADDRESSED

WNCC-FM airs four local newscasts during its broadcast day, Monday through Friday at 7:06am, 8:10am, 12:30pm, and 5:06pm, following three to ten minutes of world and national news from CBS Radio News. WNCC reports local and area news events and issues on an ongoing basis.

News Treatments: The nominal length of each of our lead or feature news stories described below is between 30-seconds and one minute 30 seconds.

Some of the issues covered in these newscasts and programs during the **fourth** quarter are as follows:

1-Voter Education / Elections

News Treatments: April 7, 29; May 7, 17, 23; June 1, 2, 6, 7, 8, 20

New Voter Laws brought changes to the local voting process in our listening area, as a primary election was being held, with different initiatives on the ballots. We informed citizens about the elections that were taking place, the initiatives that were up for vote and reminded them about new voter ID laws in the state.

2- Crime / Police

News Treatments: April 11, 21; May 4, 11; June 3, 13, 14, 18

Our coverage area saw several different examples of major crimes through the second quarter, along with sentencing for earlier crimes. We kept the community informed of the crimes and sentencing throughout the entire second quarter.

3-Food Insecurity

News Treatments: April 27, 29; May 2, 6; June 6, 8, 10, 28, 27

Food insecurity remained a top issue in the county for the third quarter. Fortunately, there are many programs and opportunities for local citizens to help fill the gap. We reminded residents about the need in the community to help spur donations to food bank Carenet and the Community Table. We also provided information about events and places residents could check with to get food.

4-Transporation/Public Safety

News Treatments: April 10, 27; May 8, 9, 15, 23, 24; June 20, 28

Many road projects were going on in the second quarter and to help listeners be better informed of traffic delays and problems we aired stories letting them know about anticipated road projects and the detours and delays associated with them. Additionally, we aired several stories regarding public safety issues, such as outdoor burning conditions and traffic enforcements that could help Maconians avoid public safety problems.

5-Economy

News Treatments: April 13, 23; May 15, 25, 31; June 6, 18, 21, 25

Despite some improvements, economic conditions remained tough in the second quarter for our listening area. The jobs picture gradually improved but unemployment rates for the second quarter remained higher than pre-recession levels. We aired a variety of stories with information on job fairs in the area, in addition to news stories with information on businesses expanding and adding more jobs in the future.

6-Poorly Informed Citizens

News Treatments: April 22, 28; May 4; June 13, 18, 22

Several changes were made to policies and regulations that affected the listening area. We provided critical information not necessarily obtained easily for our listeners. This may include government issues, transportation projects, and new or changing regulations. Issues mentioned during our news casts have an impact to Macon County and its residents, so it is paramount to connect our listeners with what they need to know.

7-Financial Awareness

News Treatments: April 8, 26, 28; May 26, 30; June 24

Several scams were reported throughout out listening area during the second quarter. Many of these scams were reported after the victims had given information or money to the scammers. We provided information to the public so that they would be more informed and not fall victim to scammers.

8-Mental Health

News Treatments: April 27; May 1, 19; June 23

Mental Health is an ongoing issue throughout our listening area. Many in the area struggle with mental illness and addiction. There were several changes to local and state protocols involving those with mental illnesses. Our news programming included features on the state of mental health services, new information on treatment, and what kinds of mental health problems are occurring in our area.
