LOCAL ISSUES ADDRESSED DURING THE QUARTER

Local Issue/Concern and Brief Description

Still Standing: Breast Cancer Awareness and Survivors

With breast cancer awareness month in October, WUSA 9 honored breast cancer survivors across DC, Maryland and Virginia. All month, we highlighted survivors, told their stories and underscored the importance of early detection. On October 26, WUSA 9 hosted over 100 breast cancer survivors in the studio on Get Up DC. The show was dedicated to celebrating their stories alongside family and friends.

**IMPACT Give Back:
USO Turkeys For Troops**

WUSA 9's Impact team brings together our journalists with community organizations dedicated to serving those in need. There are hundreds of thousands of active-duty military personnel in the DC metropolitan area. For the tenth year in a row, WUSA 9 thanked them by providing Thanksgiving holiday food baskets. We teamed up with the USO of Metropolitan Washington for an initiative called Turkeys for Troops. On Monday, November 12, 2018 (Veterans Day) we held a telethon asking for donations from the public to cover the cost of the baskets for local, active-duty junior enlisted military families in need.

Throughout the day, we told the stories of local military personnel to honor their duty and sacrifice. On November 12, WUSA 9 raised over \$129,000 through online and telephone donations during our air time. Enough to provide meals to 2,580 military families over Thanksgiving.

Stop and Frisk

The WUSA 9 Special Assignment Unit continued its in-depth investigation into a practice employed by the Washington, DC police department known as "Stop and Frisk" policing. The investigation, which began in August, 2017, has led to changes in city law. WUSA 9's team uncovered money that had been set aside by the DC Council to collect data on the individuals stopped and frisked by DC police, yet the police department had not properly collected any of that data. As a result of our reporting and a half-hour special dedicated to the topic, there's renewed calls for change and oversight by the city's elected leaders.

Mothers Matter

Hundreds of women die each year in the United States from pregnancy-related causes. Black women are three to four times more likely to die than white women, and in Washington DC, 17 of the 18 women who passed away after giving birth in a four-year period were black. WUSA 9 investigated the problem through a series of interviews and document reviews, uncovering a startling lack of access to care in lower-income areas of the city.

School Safety

Following a rash of shootings and other threats of violence plaguing schools nationwide, including a shooting at a high school in Maryland, WUSA 9 investigated ways that administrators and architects are combining forces to keep students safe during their school day. In a three-part series on air, and a 30-minute special, we explored potential solutions ranging from high-tech classroom locks to building design, all with the goal of preventing another tragedy where children should be safest.

Neighborhood Heroes

WUSA 9 continued its series on neighborhood heroes. Profiles and stories of someone doing something positive in their community. Many times, these people go above and beyond to make their neighborhoods a better place, while never getting any recognition for it. The people who are featured in this segment are dedicated to their communities and helping those who may not be able to help themselves. WUSA 9 reporter Marcella Robertson tells the stories of these people and their mission.

Still Standing

October 1, 2018 (5am and 6am/1:36 length)

Sheila Marshall

Sheila Marshall was diagnosed with breast cancer after finding a lump in her breast. She was on vacation when she found it. Soon after, aggressive treatment started and today she is cancer free. She wants other women to be vigilant about their health and to perform self-breast exams as often as possible.

October 3, 2018 (5am and 6am/2:05 length)

Siata Swaray

Siata fought and beat breast cancer twice. She was first diagnosed at 29. One month after her final treatment, she was diagnosed again. She launched the now annual "Siata's Think Pink" Walk on her 30th birthday in March 2017. She was still having treatments. She raised \$8,000 for Johns Hopkins the first time and \$5,000 for a women care center in Sierra Leone this year. Her goal is to start a foundation that will help young survivors.

October 8, 2018 (5am and 6am/1:34 length)

Allison Fisher

Allison Fisher was diagnosed with breast cancer at 39 years old. She was in the shower one day when she found a lump. The mother of 4 thought she was going to die. 7 months after her diagnosis, she is now cancer free and is sharing her story to push others to be vigilant about their health.

Cherry Blossom Intimates

Jasmine Jones, the former Miss District Columbia USA 2016 lost her grandmother to breast cancer. Jones and a local breast care surgeon, Dr. Regina Hampton, have opened Cherry Blossom Boutique, a lingerie store for women who've had mastectomies and also open for all women. It is the first of its kind in Prince George's County, Maryland. Women will have bra fittings for prostheses. This is a store for women of all shapes, sizes and skin tones.

David Garnett

David Garnett was diagnosed with breast cancer nearly 20 years ago. He found a lump but never did anything about it because he believed men could not get breast cancer. It wasn't until a new doctor pushed him to get a biopsy that he was diagnosed. Now he's made it his mission to let other men know that they too can be impacted.

October 17, 2018 (5am and 6am/2:05 length)

Linda Wilkerson

Over a 10-year period, Linda had three breast cancer scares. Her first scare happened while her mother was dying in 2004. Linda was diagnosed in 2014. She never missed a checkup. She is a huge fan of Buddy Check 9. She still calls family and friends every month to remind them about their monthly exams.

Kristen Berset

WUSA 9's very own Kristen Berset was diagnosed twice before the age of 35. She was first diagnosed in her late 20s. No family history. She was diagnosed a month before her wedding in 2016 again.

Kelly Bugden

Kelly Bugden was 24 years old when she was diagnosed with breast cancer. She found a lump in her breast and immediately knew something was wrong. Because she was so young, doctors told her not to worry about it, that it was likely just a cyst. Knowing her body, she insisted on more tests, which ultimately revealed she had a very aggressive form of breast cancer. She now advocates for other young women to check themselves and to be vigilant about their health.

Jackie Woody

She was Andrea Roane's first interview for Buddy Check 9 when Andrea launched the initiative in 1993. Jackie talks about her breast cancer journey and Andrea's impact.

Oct. 25, 2018 (5am and 6am/1:48 length)

The Pink Fireman

Marshall Moneymaker was a career firefighter for years. He was eventually dubbed "The Pink Fireman" after his coworkers gifted him a pink fire uniform. For years he made it his mission to spread awareness about breast cancer. He is as close as someone can get to breast cancer without ever actually being diagnosed. Marshall lost three of his sisters to breast cancer. Marshall turned that heartbreak into something good. He and his wife started an organization called "For 3 Sisters." They provide a range of services for people fighting breast cancer and survivors. They do everything from helping connect people with resources, to keeping the lights on for others.

Diane Mantoni

Diane has four sisters and a brother. Four had breast cancer, including her. She was diagnosed again this year. Her oldest sister was also diagnosed this year. Her youngest sister never had it, but got a mastectomy to prevent it.

IMPACT: Give Back USO Turkeys For Troops

November 12, 2018 (9am/15:00 length) Cooking with White House Chef Andre Rush Live Shots

Transitioning from military to civilian life comes with its challenges, but one retired Army Master Sergeant is now a White House chef.

Originally from Mississippi, Chef Andre Rush was inspired by his mothers' cooking to have a healthy diet and healthy mind. The White House chef uses that mentality to cook for the president, other high-ranking government officials and for WUSA 9's Great Day Washington show. He also talks about his own bout with PTSD and how he works with the USO to train other former military personnel about cooking and how it can help with the effects of war. Following his segments on the show, and during his cooking segments, we asked viewers to donate to Turkeys for Troops to provide families with holiday food baskets.

November 12, 2018 (12noon/4:31 length) Art Saves Jon Meadows

Jon Meadows volunteered to serve after September 11th. The man who came home from war, says his wife, is not the same man who left. Severe brain trauma from IED blasts caused major side effects for Meadows--including severe PTSD. But through programs at the USO Meadows discovered art. And through art, Meadows was able to find purpose again in the civilian world. Following the airing of his story, we asked viewers to donate to Turkeys for Troops to provide families, like the Meadows, with a holiday food basket.

November 12, 2018 (12noon/2:30 length) USO Interview

We interviewed the CEO of the USO Metropolitan Washington about Turkeys for Troops. What it was about. What food came in the basket. Who would be receiving the baskets. We asked viewers to donate via phone to our call takers or via online.

November 12, 2018 (5pm/2:45 length) Veteran Grows Produce Package

WUSA 9 told the story of a Maryland military veteran who is dedicating his life to helping other military families. He has a farm, where veterans can live and help grow produce, for other veterans. Following the story, we asked viewers to donate to Turkeys for Troops.

November 12, 2018 (5pm through 6pm/3:00 length) USO Turkeys for Troops Voice Overs of Phone Bank

Between the hours of 5pm through 6pm, we showed live shots of our phone bank of call takers taking donations for Turkeys for Troops. We explained what the initiative was about and asked viewers to donate.

November 12, 2018 (6pm/5:35 length)
Chef Andre Rush Package

We told the story of retired Army Master Sergeant Andre Rush, then asked viewers to donate to Turkeys for Troops.

In the taped package, we told the story of transitioning from military to civilian life, and how it comes with its challenges. But Rush is using his new-found celebrity as the "Buff White House Chef" to help other soldiers thrive outside the military.

A picture of Chef Andre Rush and his 24-inch biceps went viral on Twitter and catapulted him to international fame. Now he's using the spotlight to help others. They call him Tiny. He does 2,222 pushups every single day. He is no average 45-year old from Mississippi

Rush is a White House chef, baker, expert ice carver, motivational speaker and life coach. He spent 24 years in the Army serving in Korea, Afghanistan and Iraq. It was after that last deployment that he returned to his base working for top Army leaders at WestPoint Military Academy in New York.

Then one day he had a conversation that initially crushed his spirit but eventually saved his life.

"I always dove into my job 100 percent always doing countless hours," he explained. "My General Superintendent pulled me into the office one day, sat me down and said to me 'on a personal basis Andre you served your Country now it's time to take care of you.'"

It was an offer to help cope with the Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) Rush thought he was hiding well.

"I felt like he saw a chink in my armor, but it was a realization that hit me." But Rush, who recalls being very depressed and crying at home said he knew he had PTSD, "since 9-11."

That conversation led him to the United Service Organizations at Fort Belvoir.

In their kitchen he found healing. Now he's back in the kitchen using cooking as therapy to help other soldiers recover.

"To see him be able to be successful and push his message and mission and push others it really is awesome," said USO Center Manager Casey Pizzuto.

But for all his success there have been dark moments like the suicide of his mentee Sergeant Wesley Durden in 2011.

So, those 2, 222 pushups are for Sgt. Durden and the 22 service members who take their own lives every day.

"I'm trying to save a life while I'm cooking, or we can cook together and save lives," said Rush.

Duty. Honor. Country. U.S. Army General Douglas MacArthur used these words back in 1962. They still have meaning today. Especially for Herbert Valle of Loudoun County.

Valle served in the U.S. Navy from 1987 to 1994. He was there for Desert Shield, Desert Storm and Operation Provide Comfort, when the United States provided humanitarian support to the Kurdish people in northern Iraq.

Valle is also a survivor of September 11 attacks on the Pentagon.

Today, you will find Valle volunteering for the USO-Metro, supporting and volunteering for the Warriors to Lourdes Pilgrimage, and at the Civil Air Patrol of Leesburg. He also volunteers for VFW Post 1177 of Loudoun County and America Legion Post 2001 of Ashburn and the Marine Corps League of Purcellville, Virginia.

DC Police Body-Worn Camera Video of Incident Erased

A WUSA 9 investigation uncovers a body worn camera video critical to a major civil rights lawsuit against a DC Police Officer has been erased. It's the latest development in our series "DC Police: Stop and Frisk."

DC Police Body-Worn Camera Video of Incident Erased

In this story, part of our ongoing, year-long investigation "DC Police: Stop and Frisk," reporter Eric Flack uncovered that key video from a body-worn camera assigned to a D.C. Police officer involved in a questionable search had been erased. WUSA 9 obtained video of the search from a bystander. In this report, we reveal that the officer in question had been dismissed following an internal affairs investigation, and that the video from his camera had not been properly saved during the inquiry into his behavior during the search. Further, WUSA 9 learned that the video should have been saved for up to 5 years.

DC Government Settles Lawsuit After Questionable Search

For this story, reporter Eric Flack interviewed M.B. Cottingham and his attorney. Cottingham, who had been the subject of a questionable search caught on camera, sued the city for violating his civil rights in that search. The city agreed to a settlement. The officer who performed the search was dismissed earlier in the year. In this installment, we report that he'll attempt to get his job back at an administrative hearing.

Another day of major developments in our yearlong investigation "DC Police: Stop and Frisk". The Fight for Care

This report documents the struggle for Washington, D.C. residents living on the eastern end of the city, across the Anacostia River from the bulk of D.C. With the help of Tanzazia Matthews, we tell the story of her pregnancy, which required nearly an hour commute by public transit for pre and post-natal care. We also highlight the closure of the maternity ward at Providence Hospital, located in the eastern section of the city, which was closed by the health department after a mother died in childbirth, and another reported a new HIV infection following birth.

Surviving Childbirth

A CDC expert sums up the piece with this quote: "the experience of being black in America is so fundamentally different from the experience of being white in America that it translates to health outcomes." Story includes a checklist of what you can do to stay safe before and after childbirth.

Crossing Guard Volunteer

Mr. Allen has been volunteering at Hampton Oaks Elementary School for 15 years as the crossing guard. It is something he feels has given him a purpose since he retired. He spends hours making sure the kids get to and from school safely and also helps out during the day and during lunch time. All of his kids attended the same school, and this was his way of giving back to his community.

Fields for Valor

A veteran started his own organization after struggling when he got out of the military. He didn't realize how many military families have a hard time putting a meal on the table until he went through it himself. He started growing his own produce, providing military families with healthy meals.

Gillian Lochata fought breast cancer once, and was diagnosed a second time. After beating breast cancer the first time, she told herself she was going to do what many people find impossible. She climbed Mr. Kilimanjaro. She now started an organization that helps other women complete similar tasks and adventures after fighting breast cancer.

Village Café

Three DC high school graduates started a café that features entrepreneurs from underserved wards in the district. They themselves grew up in those communities and saw the need to give those entrepreneurs a chance to showcase their businesses. The three young men are just 23 years old.

Mr. Dias

Mr. Dias is a teacher at Aiton elementary, one of the most underserved schools in the district. He goes above and beyond for his students, making sure he fills their needs both inside and outside the classroom. He recently noticed many of his students were coming to school with dirty uniforms. For some students, a dirty uniform caused them to not want to come to school period. Mr. Dias applied for a grant with the Washington Redskins to put a laundry facility in the school. He was approved for that grant and the laundry room is expected to be up and running by February.

Shoes for the homeless

Every weekend Buddy Harrison brings clothing donations into the city for the homeless. One woman saw his story and felt compelled to help out. She donated 100 pair of brand new shoes and 100 pair of brand new socks for Buddy to hand out. The woman's husband recently passed and he used to help the homeless, so she wanted to do something to continue his legacy. She didn't want her name out there or to be interviewed, she just wanted to bring a little bit of kindness to the community her husband cared so much about.

Kasian, a tax attorney, in what seemed like a charmed life, immigrated to the United States to be a translator. While living in California, she met Blake Leibel, the son of a wealthy Canadian real estate family. He lived a complicated life, but longed to make it big in the Hollywood film industry. Almost a year before he met Kasian he was obsessed with the notion that his family would be harmed by someone tied to his brother Cody, who had big gambling debts. At the time Kasian was killed, Leibel was divorcing his wife, living with Kasian and his newborn daughter Diana. He was also romantically involved with another woman. Kasian’s mother, Olga Kasian, became concerned when she could not reach her daughter. She called the police, who eventually gained access to the home she shared with Leibel -- authorities were shocked by what they found. Leibel was barricaded inside a bedroom and Kasian was discovered dead in the bathroom. Her body covered with a blanket, she was extremely pale, and she was scalped. It was a horrible, sadistic killing, just like a scene in one of Leibel’s movies. Police arrested Leibel. Investigation led to the discovery that Kasian’s body was drained of blood. It took 6-8 hours for her to die. Leibel stood trial and the scenes from his graphic novel and the film he directed took center stage. He was found guilty of first-degree murder without parole. **On-screen text graphic:** Olga has filed a wrongful death lawsuit against Blake Leibel. Any proceeds would go to Diana. Diana is an American citizen. Olga is still hoping to raise her in the United States. Sosa owned the popular Woodlands Boxing and Fitness in Montgomery County, Texas. He had a family and a beautiful second wife who helped him run their booming business. After six years together, things began to sour between Sosa and his wife -- he learned of a divorce attorney and missing money from the business. And then someone wanted him dead. A friend of Sosa's named Mundo, who worked out at the gym, overheard Sosa's wife Lulu and was sure she had murder on her mind. They came up with a sting operation to protect the boxer, in which Mundo posed as a hit man. When they had evidence, they contacted the police, who then took over the case. Mundo still played along, agreeing to kill Sosa, and provided photographic proof of the death. Police staged the death scene, with Sosa's "dead body" photographed in a ditch with a bullet hole in the head. Lulu Sosa was arrested, and claimed she was innocent. She was charged with solicitation of capital murder. After 15 months, she gave up the fight and agreed to a plea deal to reduced charges and twenty years in prison. **On-screen text graphic:** Lulu Sosa comes up for parole once a year. This past Tuesday, she was denied parole for a second time. Vander Heyden went out with her live-in boyfriend Doug Detrie and other friends for a night on the town in Green Bay, Wisconsin and never made it home. A day later, she was found beaten and strangled in a field. Her live-in boyfriend became the prime suspect and was arrested because he had separated from the group during the barhopping and went home without Nicole. Detrie was wearing a Fitbit device and the data recorded during the time of Vander Heyden's murder corroborated with what Detrie had told police, therefore clearing him of suspicion. He was released 18 days after his arrest. Over the next several months, clothes and other items found at the murder scene were processed by the police for DNA, which led police to George Steven Burch, a man who had moved from Virginia to Green Bay for a fresh start. Burch was questioned about a hit-and-run and had handed over his cell phone to police. The phone was an Android device with a Google account, which stores and tracks a person's exact location within Google's servers and is viewed with a tool called Google Dashboard. Investigators got a warrant to view Burch's account and discovered that on the night of the murder, the data tracked him to Nicole's house – the crime scene – where he stayed for nearly an hour. He was arrested and charged with first-degree intentional homicide. On February 19, 2018, George Burch went on trial for Nicole's murder. The technology evidence from Fitbit and Google played an important part of the proceedings. Also in the courtroom, the sister and fiancé of Joey White, a man Burch killed in Virginia twenty years ago. Neither is surprised that Burch is on trial again. Only this time, they hope he is found guilty, and is not acquitted. It took the jury three hours to find Burch guilty. **On-screen text graphic:** Doug Detrie continues to raise Dylan, now two. 10/20/18 **48 HOURS: "Cold-Blooded Killer" (10:00 - 11:00p)** – a report about Mike Williams, a missing Florida man who was believed to have been eaten by alligators in December 2000, and his mother's belief that something sinister happened. Williams, a successful real estate appraiser, left home to go duck hunting on Lake Seminole on his sixth wedding anniversary. When he did not return home, his wife Denise started looking for him. A massive search ensued. It ended after 44 days with Williams listed as "still missing." People wondered if he had run off. After six months, his waders, hunting license and a flashlight were discovered at the lake and another explanation was offered: he was eaten by alligators. Mike's mother, Cheryl Williams, always believed there was more to the story. For nine years, she wrote to the governor of Florida urging him to re-open the case. She even contacted wildlife experts, who told her that alligators do not feed in cold winter months. In the meantime, Denise Williams moved on with her life, cashed in life insurance policies and completely cut off contact with Mike's mother. She eventually married Mike's best friend Brian Winchester. Seven years later, the re-opened investigation led to suspicions that both Cheryl and Brian were involved, but police could do nothing because they were married to each other. Soon after, their marriage disintegrated. Police saw an opportunity when Brian cracked after assaulting and kidnapping Denise, to which he pleaded guilty and cut a deal with prosecutors: he finally admitted to killing Mike Williams. Brian revealed the location of the body, with the understanding he that would not be charged with murder. He said it was all Denise's idea -- she was not willing to be divorced, but wanted to be with Brian. She was arrested and charged with murder and is currently awaiting trial. **On-screen text graphic:** Denise Williams is scheduled to stand trial for the murder of her husband on December 10, 2018. Mike and Denise's daughter is nineteen and in college. She is said to be close with Denise's sisters. Included are excerpts of the bodycam footage, and of a recorded diary McDaniel started after being released on bail. She took her own life sixteen days later. Leon Jacob has pleaded not guilty. Dilione provided information that made no sense to Comunale's father or his friend Max Branchinelli, who had located Dilione on Instagram. Dilione then provided information about Rackover and Max Gemma, whose father was once the mayor of Oceanport, NJ to the police. The investigation revealed that after the murder, Comunale's body was dumped out of a window at the Sutton Place address, driven to Oceanport, NJ and left in a hole in the ground in a wooded area behind a florist shop. Rackover and Dilione were charged with the brutal murder of Comunale and other crimes. Max Gemma was charged with hindering prosecution and tampering with physical evidence. After the arrest, police discovered that Rackover, was not really the son of the celebrity jeweler, but an ex-con from Florida named James Beaudin, who Jeffrey Rackover had befriended, explaining that he was the son he never knew about. At trial, both Rackover and Dilione said the other was responsible. The star witness in the case was Louis Ruggiero, the troubled son of popular New York television anchor Rosanna Scotto. Ruggiero, a close friend of Rackover's, testified about what Rackover told him happened that night, becoming the first witness who directly implicated James Rackover in the crime. On November 2, 2018, the jury reached a verdict: the former James Beaudoin, now James Rackover, was convicted on all counts for the murder. Dilione's trial is set for January, with Gemma being tried at a later date. **On-screen text graphic:** James Rackover will be sentenced on December 5th. Kasem was diagnosed with Lewy Body Dementia before his death and his condition left him unable to speak during his final months. Jean prevented contact with his children, but they fought to see him, saying they were in charge of his health care. Each side accuses the other of neglect. Nothing was ever proven. After Kasem’s death, as the widow, Jean Kasem was in charge of the body, eventually having him buried in Norway in an unmarked grave. **On-screen text graphic:** The Kasem family's wrongful death suit against Jean is scheduled for court next spring. 48 HOURS: “Defending DJ” - a report about Danroy “DJ” Henry and the dedication and struggles his family endured trying to restore their son’s reputation after he was shot dead in Pleasantville, New York, by police officer Aaron Hess in 2010. This event triggered a seven-year journey for the family as they searched for answers about what really happened. During a night out with his teammates, a fight broke out among other restaurant patrons and police were called to the scene. DJ and his friends decided to leave. They were waiting in his car in a fire lane prior to their departure. Police approached the vehicle and told DJ he should move; his friends said DJ started to slowly move away. The police claim that DJ tried to mow officers down with his car when Officer Hess approached and that was how Officer Hess ended up on the hood of the car, shooting his weapon and fatally injuring DJ as he sat behind the wheel. The police claimed Officer Hess shot because he feared for his life. DJ’s friends painted a far different version of the incident. Witnesses agreed, also saying that medical attention was slow to respond. The Henry family vowed to learn the truth – even it was bad. They wanted to know what happened to their son and filed a lawsuit. Four years after the shooting, the family was still hopeful. In 2016, the Henry family accepted the decision in a wrongful death suit against the Village of Pleasantville and Aaron Hess and were awarded \$6 million. In 2017, they settled a wrongful death suit with the town of Mount Pleasant for an undisclosed amount and something more valuable to them: a public apology. Seven years after DJ’s death, they cleared his name. No criminal charges were brought in the case. Today, Aaron Hess works in private security. The Henry family has founded the DJ Henry Dream Foundation to honor their son’s memory. **On-screen text graphic:** Chief Louis Alagno retired in 2013. In 2015 New York State law changed. 48 HOURS: "Dear Savanna" - a report on how Dorothy Lee Barnett ("Lee Barnett") eluded the FBI for over two decades after fleeing the United States with her daughter Savanna, after losing custody of the child. Their 1994 disappearance launched an international search for Barnett and Savanna that did not end until she was arrested in Australia. Lee Barnett was in the midst of a bitter divorce with then-husband Harris Todd. Barnett had married him even though he said he did not want children. Problems began after she became pregnant. They went to counseling, and during this period a doctor diagnosed her as having hyperthymic temperament, a form of bipolar disorder. After Savanna was born, she filed for divorce. Harris counter-sued. The judge sided with Todd. Barnett then started to make plans to leave with 11-month-old Savanna. She obtained fake documents (birth certificates and passports) and disappeared. An FBI manhunt ensued. She was vilified in the press. In 1999, Harris Todd told 48 HOURS that she was mentally ill. Barnett countered with her side of the story: she cut off all contact with her family and headed to Europe, then Malaysia, Singapore, South Africa, Botswana and Australia. Along the way, she met and married Alex Geldenhuys, and had another child, Reece. Unbeknownst to Savanna, she became Samantha Geldenhuys. While they were on the run, Barnett also kept a secret diary for her daughter, planning one day to tell her the story of her life. In 2011, the FBI got a tip that Barnett was living in Australia. Samantha learned about her past from the agents. In 2013, Barnett was extradited to the United States. Samantha has read all the transcripts and the diaries and has a new understanding of her mother. Barnett pled guilty to all charges and spent 21 months in prison. Samantha eventually met her father and described it as a surreal experience. 12/15/18 **48 HOURS: “Don’t Scream” (9:00 - 10:00p)** - an updated rebroadcast on Tiffany Mead of Davis County, Utah, a young mother who called 911 claiming she had sliced her own throat while her ex-husband and child watched. When first responders arrived, the cut was so deep, police questioned whether it was really a suicide attempt. Medical experts claim there is no physical way she could have committed the act herself. Later, Mead changed her story: it wasn’t suicide, it was her estranged husband Kris Ertmann, who tried to kill her. Mead claimed she met Ertmann in a secluded park to get a child support check. He suddenly grabbed her in a bear hug and slit her throat. Thinking she was about to die, she drove the car to a parking lot which became a second crime scene. An investigation led to Ertman being arrested and charged with attempted murder. He claimed he could not remember anything and had PTSD. Additional investigating revealed Ertmann ultimately trying to arrange a hit on his estranged wife, resulting in an undercover cop posing as a hit man and getting instructions from Ertmann to kill his wife. The case never went to trial. Prosecutors offered a deal to plead no contest, and will spend the rest of his life in prison. Tiffany Mead lives with her new husband and her emotional support dog. When Huisentruit did not arrive at the station for her morning assignment, police were alerted. Outside her apartment, they found signs of a struggle, but her car was still at the scene. An extensive search was conducted, but she was never seen again and her body has never been found. An investigation led authorities to information that Jodi had reported a possible stalker nine months before her disappearance. Several people became suspects, including close friend John Vansice, who some of her friends suspected wanted a romantic relationship, despite their 22-year age difference. Another was Tony Jackson, a serial rapist who lived nearby at the time of Jodi’s disappearance. Throughout the years, friends and family members have kept up the search for Jodi, despite her family declaring her dead in 2001 as a means to settle her estate. In 2003, a group of journalists created a website to keep the story alive and to crack the case. As of 2017, John Vansice, living in Phoenix, is still considered a suspect. Mason City police believe they are close to solving the case. On June 5, 2018, which would have been Jodi’s 50th birthday, four billboards were unveiled in Mason City, Iowa, keeping her memory alive with the hope of solving her disappearance. **On-screen text graphic:** FindJodi. 48 HOURS: "Cold-Blooded Killer" – an updated rebroadcast about Mike Williams, a missing Florida man who was believed to have been eaten by alligators in December 2000, and his mother's belief that something sinister happened. Williams, a successful real estate appraiser, left home to go duck hunting on Lake Seminole on his sixth wedding anniversary. When he did not return home, his wife Denise started looking for him. A massive search ensued. It ended after 44 days with Williams listed as "still missing." People wondered if he had run off. After six months, his waders, hunting license and a flashlight were discovered at the lake and another explanation was offered: he was eaten by alligators. Mike's mother, Cheryl Williams, always believed there was more to the story. For nine years, she wrote to the governor of Florida urging him to re-open the case. She even contacted wildlife experts, who told her that alligators do not feed in cold winter months. In the meantime, Denise Williams moved on with her life, cashed in life insurance policies and completely cut off contact with Mike's mother. She eventually married Mike's best friend Brian Winchester. Seven years later, the re-opened investigation led to suspicions that both Cheryl and Brian were involved, but police could do nothing because they were married to each other. Soon after, their marriage disintegrated. Police saw an opportunity when Brian cracked after assaulting and kidnapping Denise, to which he pleaded guilty and cut a deal with prosecutors: he finally admitted to killing Mike Williams. Brian revealed the location of the body, with the understanding he that would not be charged with murder. He said it was all Denise's idea -- she was not willing to be divorced, but wanted to be with Brian. She was arrested and charged with murder. Original on-screen text graphic: Denise Williams is scheduled to stand trial for the murder of her husband on December 10, 2018. Mike and Denise's daughter is nineteen and in college. She is said to be close with Denise's sisters. **12/22/18 Update:** The trial began in December 2018. The prosecution's star witness, Brian Winchester, admitted he killed Mike Williams. Defense attorney Ethan Way was so confident the state had no hard evidence that he did not want the jury to consider any charges less than murder one. The jury took eight hours to reach a verdict: Denise Williams was guilty on all counts. - 12/29/18 **48 HOURS: "Breaking Point" (9:00 – 10:00p)** – the first hour of back-to-back editions dealing with the investigation into the 2012 death of 29-year-old lawyer Ryan Poston, at the hands of his on-again/off-again girlfriend Shayna Hubers, who admits to killing him, but who claims it was self-defense. At the time of his death, Ryan Poston was a young successful attorney with a bright future ahead of him. Shayna Hubers' family and friends also thought she would be successful in all she did. The couple met on Facebook and dated on and off for 18 months. Ryan was busy with his career and not ready to settle down, but found it hard to let go of Shayna. According to Ryan's friends, Shayna's behavior became obsessive. He told her he was not seeing her on the weekend of October 12, 2012, but did not tell her that he had a date with another woman. He did not make the date: a 911 call to police was made by Shayna, telling police she had shot her boyfriend in self-defense. Police were suspicious from the start. She had shot him six times. Shayna also talked endlessly during the 3-hour interrogation video and then, when alone, she danced and sang songs. Friends said Ryan was not an abuser. She was charged with murder. Investigation revealed that, after the shooting, she waited 10 minutes to call 911. She also texted endlessly; there were thousands of text messages to Ryan, most of which he did not answer. Yet, because of Kentucky laws, he could not get a restraining order. Prosecutors believe that Shayna could not deal with Ryan's rejection and that her rage sent her over the edge. She believed it was over for good and would have none of it. Now it is 2014, and she has been jailed since 2012 awaiting trial. There were no signs of a violent struggle, as Shayna had suggested happening. Shayna's mother, Sharon Hubers, cannot comprehend what is happening to her daughter. The defense must convince the jury that Ryan was the aggressor. A verdict is reached: guilty of murder. The court re-convenes for sentencing. Shayna Hubers, who has been diagnosed as a narcissist, addresses the court, but never apologizes to Ryan's family. Shayna Hubers is sentenced to 40 years. 07/15/17 Epilogue: One year later, a surprising development: a new trial is ordered. The verdict was overturned due to a problem with the jury. Shayna will be tried all over again, in about a year. Ryan's family is ready. **12/29/18 Update:** In August, 2018, newly married Shayna Hubers is prepared. She now claims that Ryan was abusive and she suffers from a borderline personality disorder. Her stories about that night have changed as well, and the prosecutor hones in on that. The jury finds her guilty. The next day, after the victim impact statements, the jury calls for life in prison -- more time than Shayna received in the original trial.
