During Fox-TV's live broadcast of the "2003 Billboard Music Awards," "Simple Life" star Nicole Richie said:

"Why do they even call it the Simple Life? Have you ever tried to get cow sh*t out of a Prada purse? It's not so f*cking simple."

Video tape of the "2003 Billboard Awards" broadcast is available from the Parents Television Council.

COMPLAINANT believes that such material is:

- (a.) Clearly offensive according to the standards of my community; and
- (b.) Especially offensive because it was broadcast at an hour when millions of children were watching.

COMPLAINANT urges the Commission to exercise its responsibility to enforce the existing law against indecency on broadcast TV between the hours of 6 a.m. and 10 p.m. (Title 18, U.S. Code, Section 1464) by levying severe sanctions against the Fox stations which, by broadcasting this program, violated community standards of decency.

I am also at this time joining the Parents Television Council's APPEAL of the FCC Enforcement Bureau's ruling in File No. EB-03-1H-0116, that an earlier broadcast of the "F-word" was not indecent. THIS RULING WAS

AN OPEN INVITATION TO BROADCASTERS TO ALLOW THE "F-WORD," and the Fox "Billboard Awards" program on December 18 proved that some broadcasters will be all-too-happy to accept the FCC's invitation.

Enforcement responsibility under the law is your obligation as an appointed Commissioner of the FCC. I want to see a formal, public vote by the five Commissioners on the Enforcement Bureau's ruling, and I call upon you to do your duty under the law by voting to OVERRULE the Enforcement Bureau's reckless opening of the floodgates to obscenities like the "F-word."

Finally, I hereby request that you PLEASE KEEP ME INFORMED OF THE PROGRESS AND RESULTS OF YOUR INVESTIGATION INTO THIS COMPLAINT, AND OF YOUR REVIEW OF THE ENFORCEMENT BUREAU'S EARLIER RULING.
