Suicide Prevention	Palm Beach Perspectives	<p>Talked with Jeffrey B. Lefton, Ph.D., LMHC, MCAP, Administrative Director, Behavioral Health Services, Fair Oaks Pavilion, Delray Medical Center; Troy "SABO" Caicedo, CEO, NSA Entertainment and Robert McQuaid, Commander, VFW Post 9610. With the increased number of celebrity deaths due to suicide in the news lately. We wanted to talk about suicide prevention for veterans and civilians. Jeff said the CDC has done studies and determined that suicide is a worldwide health crisis and the numbers are increasing. Also, 50% of the attempted suicides are by people who've not been treated for mental health issues. Anyone feeling depressed or suicidal can reach out to 211 or call 1-800-273-8255 or text TALK to 741741 and someone will be there to assist them. There 12 signs and 5 key "red flags" that Sabo and Robert look for in the "warfighter"/veteran community. Some include, behavioral changes, lack of self-care, talk of suicide. Other signs may be giving away possessions, talk about being a burden (especially in the elderly or those with severe illness). If you see a friend struggling reach out to them, let them know there's always hope and if they can't coordinate their care, help them out. NSA Entertainment in association with VFW Post 9610 created an event coming up on July 28th from 10a-4p at Bryant Park in Lake Worth called "Spartan Day Pledge" to help raise awareness. There are guest speakers, including folks sharing their personal experiences, the Mayor, plus some great entertainment and food trucks. The VFW is helping put it together along with great local sponsors and proceeds will go to a charity geared for suicide prevention in the veteran community. it's free and will provide education about suicide prevention and a great day of comradery with veterans and the public. The program, Fighting Aces, is designed to raise awareness about children who've experienced ACEs (Adverse Childhood Experience) how it impacts their health/wellness throughout their lifespan. It also offers screenings for children and then a trauma informed treatment approach. The GAL program was created so that the child's interest is protected and addressed via a team of Volunteer GAL's and the legal team representing them. The Guardian Ad Litem are court appointed and visit the children on their caseload at least every 30 days and help coordinate needed supplies, programs and services for their charge. Coleen works for the charitable arm of GAL, known as Speak Up for Kids. Since GAL is funded about 80% by the State, Speak Up for Kids raises funds to cover the gap as well as providing needed services to the kids. It can vary from tickets to a Broadway show at the Kravis to mental health counseling. They can both use volunteers and there is also a need for more Foster Families in PBC, listeners can go to Child Net for info on Fostering. <p>Florida Cancer Specialists Foundation</p>	<p>Palm Beach Perspectives</p>	<p>Talked with Dr. Daniel Spitz, MD, FACP. Florida Cancer Specialists. The doctors saw a patient need for help in paying bills (such as rent, car, utilities, etc) during their treatments. They pitched in and created Florida Cancer Specialists Foundation, http://foundation.flcancer.com/. They also cover the cost of the staff so that 100% of donations go towards helping cancer patients in need. The foundation is hosting several funding raising events in October/November (Wine, Women & Shoes) across the state. Listeners can find details on their website/Facebook Page. Dr. Spitz also talked about cancer, treatments, prevention tips and clinical trials. There is a wide variety of treatments and with new technology/medication; they are customized to each individual patient to provide them the best outcome. Prevention tips include: No Smoking, limit alcohol, prepare foods to avoid carcinogens, exercise, de-stress, do mammograms, prostate exams, colonoscopies, HPV vaccine, etc.. Listeners should talk with their healthcare provider about these. FCS does offer clinical trials. There are three types of trials: phase 1, 2, and 3. In phase 1, meds are new, patients are monitored very closely (the benefit of this type is that patients can get access to meds earlier before they reach the marketplace), phase 2 is looking at a specific question about a medication and then phase 3 looks to see if the new med is better than the current standard of care. Patients always receive standard of care during the trials. <p>Algal Blooms FAU Update</p>	<p>Palm Beach Perspectives</p>	<p>Talked with Dr. Bill Louda, Research Professor Environmental Biogeochemistry Group Dept of Chemistry & Biochemistry & Environmental Sciences Program, Florida Atlantic University. We talked about the algal bloom in Lake Okeechobee, in the Treasure Coast and the Red Tide in the Gulf. All of these are naturally occurring but, become massive due to all the extra nutrients in the water, nitrate and phosphorous. They are getting into Lake Okeechobee from the septic tanks, over fertilizing lawns, agriculture and cattle industries North of the lake. Ways to help include, redirecting the water flow into Lake Okeechobee to allow marshes to absorb nutrients, converting septic to municipal utilities, reducing the amount of fertilizer used on the lawn and electing officials who support environmental protection.
