We are in a housing crisis. Lawmakers have introduced a bill that would allow Georgia cities and counties to enact rent control which will limit rent increases levied by landlords. This is very necessary here in that landlords charge high rent to VSU students thereby setting the price per rental out of reach for local citizens. A bill to require landlords to structures with working plumbing, running water, heating, ventilation and working locks has passed.

At the start of the COVID-19 pandemic the city of Valdosta began requiring people to take their recyclables to different locations. 3. Issue: SWATTING CALLS RAMPANT IN OUR AREA Date/Time: 01/29/2024 2P Duration: 1 HR					
A prank call called 'Swatting' is an unlawful request for emergency services assistance. A person who makes a swatting call can be charged with a misdemeanor of a 'high and aggravated nature.' If the swatting interferes with critical infrastructure it becomes a felony punishable by incarceration for no less than 5 years and no more than 10 years, a \$100,000 fine, or both. Is this really enough to stop the potential danger.					
4. Issue: MEASLE CASES REPORTED IN OUR STATE PART 1 Date/Time: 02/12/2024 2P Duration: 1 HR					
Measles cases are up around the United States, with some reported in Georgia according to the CDC. Most of the national cases occurred in children without a measles vaccination. The incubation period for measles is typically 7-14 days and can be as long as 21 days. When 100 susceptible people are exposed to the virus 90 will contract it. he CDC notified doctors to be on high alert for all symptoms of measles.

rooms for long periods of time.
