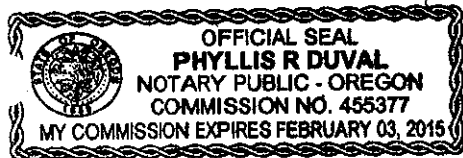

# Junction City Police Department Update

 e of complaints from the department, Police Chief Mark Chase has placed on paid nondisciplinary administrative leave until the city makes a decision about the results received from a private investigation that's currently in progress.

The city hired Local Government Personnel Institute (LGPI) from Salem to head the investigation. LGPI is a membership-based organization that offers human resources and labor relation assistance to cities, counties and special districts throughout Oregon.

The Council awarded

City Administrator Melisa Bowers the authority to make expenditures related to the investigation. Bowers reported at a Sept. 9 city council meeting, that she had crossed her normal spending authority, which was up to \$15,000. She said the project was currently at \$15,300 and she did not know what the final cost would be. The Council had given Bowers the authority to spend what was needed to complete the investigation, so this was just an update about how much the city was spending on that item at this time.

Officer Eric Markell will preside as acting police chief until a decision is made about Chief Chase.

## Kids Turn Dull Clay Into Fancy Flowerpots

**DONNA'S DAY: CREATIVE FAMILY FUN**

 Flowerpots are more than just containers for fragrant herbs, summer's begonias or fall's chrysanthemums. Grab a plain clay pot the next time you and your kids are at a nursery or garden center, hold it up and think of it as an artist's canvas, waiting for your creative expression. Purchase several, or repurpose empty clay pots you have at home, and you're on your way to this fun family activity.

such as plastic spiders or sea creatures, a pocket mirror, leftover game piece, badge, button or coin. Embed the pieces in the grout. Let dry thoroughly.

### SAND DESIGNS

Create a Southwest look, ideal for potting a cactus. Draw designs like zigzags, triangles and circles on the pot with a pencil or marker. Trace the design with white household glue on one section of the pot, then sprinkle clean, colored craft sand over the glue.

Or, cover the entire pot with tile grout (see above) and sprinkle colored sand over the grout. Embed small objects such as marbles into the sand and grout.

### SIMPLE PAINTING

Paint a clean clay flowerpot with acrylic paints using a paintbrush or a painting sponge. Experiment with a crazy, splashy design of swirls, stripes and spots (dip the eraser end of an old pencil in the paint to dab on the dots).

For a spattered look, older children can dip the bristles of an old toothbrush in paint and run their thumb across the bristles to spray flecks on the pot.



### WACKY JUNK

Slather tile grout on the outside of a clay pot like you are frosting a cake. Dig through your toy box, junk or desk drawer and choose tiny, lightweight, whimsical items

long-term foster costs. Permanent placements are important because they have been found to reduce juvenile delinquency, increase juvenile offender accountability and provide support for juvenile offender rehabilitation with education.

Although YS has successfully provided delinquent youth with critical services, these services have been limited because of a lack of funds. Title IV-E reimbursements will increase interventions, stabilize families and assist with costs for youth placement in shelters, foster homes and residential treatment facilities.

After researching the idea of Title IV-E reimbursement for YS eligible services, the county

discovered nothing negative. The state then offered Lane County a contract authorizing it to seek reimbursement for costs associated with eligible services under Title IV-E guidelines.

The services reimbursed include case management and court activities for youth at risk for foster care placements, particularly for youths in foster care or other out-of-home placements. Also covered are training activities related to treatment and youth interventions. Upon board approval, YS will work with Justice Benefits, Inc., to submit claims.

The second order benefited community corrections by extending an intergovernmental agreement made with the

Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP) to house inmates in the Lane County Community Corrections Center for \$121.33 a day.

The last agreement from 2012 generated about \$3.7 million in revenue over a three year period. The BOP requested to amend the agreement to extend it for another seven years from June 30, 2015, until June 30, 2022. The new agreement will generate about \$8.6 million in seven years.

The Community Corrections Center (CCC) is located in Eugene next to the main jail on West Fifth Avenue. It currently houses 33 offenders. Inmates participate in CCC programs to learn skills to get jobs or go to school.

The goal of the Community

Corrections program is to reduce recidivism by helping participants address criminal behavior, find employment, and also live clean, sober and productive lives.

Once in CCC, participants are responsible for financial debts, like fees for CCC stay, court-ordered restitution and other debts. Participants may also attend treatment programs, work with CCC staff to follow program objectives and maintain contact with parole and probation officers.

Along with the seven-year extension amendment, language from the Prison Rape Elimination Act of 2003 will be incorporated into the BOP agreement.



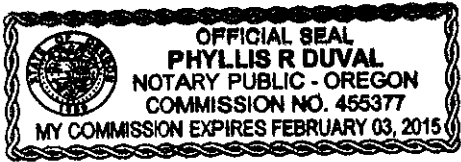

fountains, to shimmering trees, to black holes, to never-ending staircases and cotton machinery," Pavlanis said. "You will hear what interesting sounds the piano can create."

Pavlanis plans to perform significant works like Modest Mussorgsky's "Pictures at an Exhibition" and Maurice Ravel's "Gaspard de la Nuit." "I will be playing music from the 1850s to the year 1995, with contemporary classical music that takes more influence from genres like the blues," he says. His will also play the works of Franz Liszt and György Ligeti.

One piece will be an appropriation of both classical and blues called the "Winnsboro Cotton Mill Blues," a song written by classical pianist Frederic Rzewski that invokes the sound of a cotton mill, with the traditional blues theme coming through the machine sounds, all done by piano.

Raised in southwestern Michigan, Pavlanis began playing piano at 16. "I was a rock and roll guitarist at first who originally started playing piano to write songs," he says. "Then I fell in love with classical music, which changed my life a bit, and I've

stayed with classical piano ever since."

After cultivating an appreciation for the classical genre, he continued to study music and graduated in 2008 from Western Michigan University with a bachelor's in music. He then earned a master's in music from the University of Oregon in 2011 with an emphasis on piano performance, and has stayed in Eugene ever since.

Logging Accident Near Cheshire

CHESHIRE - Lane County Sheriff's Officer Sgt. Carrie Carver said in a news release to The Tribune News that a 50-year-old Alsea man has died in a logging accident off 36 near Lawrence Rd. Sgt. Carrie Carver said Richard Gray was hit by a falling tree on Thursday. Lane County Sheriff's officers and about 15 search and rescue volunteers hiked 2,000 feet down into a drainage area

to find Gray and carry him up a steep embankment. He was pronounced dead at the scene, located west of Cheshire. Occupational Safety and Health Administration and Lane County Fire District No. 1 personnel also responded to the scene.

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration will investigate the accident and the sheriff's office will investigate the death.

Dear friends, I want to share with you what God has been showing me personally, over the past 3 months, through my recent heart surgery and continuing recovery. Sometimes the things we go through can help others with issues they may be going through themselves. With what I share, I am not preaching to you, but just telling you what happened to me personally. If what I share speaks to you, that's great. If not, then you will at least understand what I have gone through and the lessons I have learned through the trials in my life.

About six or seven years ago, I began not feeling well, so I went to the Doctor for a physical exam. It turned out that I had developed type 2 diabetes and my blood sugar levels were extremely high. My Doctor put me on several medicines to try to help lower them.

Type 2 diabetes runs in my family. (My middle brother died from it a number of years ago, because he did not take care of himself properly.) I knew that it was a serious issue, but there was a part of me that did not want to accept it, so I did not take it seriously enough to change my eating habits or my lifestyle. As the diabetes worsened, the Doctor put me on two types of insulin to help control my blood sugar. This helped some, but I still fought the idea of having diabetes. I did not want to accept the fact or deal with it. I tried to ignore it and hoped God would just supernaturally heal me of it and overlook my lifestyle and eating habits.

As the years went on, my physical condition began to get much worse. I had no energy and at times I could not think clearly, but I continued to not take seriously what was happening to me physically. My first wake-up call came in March 2013 when I had a stroke in my right eye. At this point I realized I was in trouble and I could no longer

ignore the warning signs. I began to work harder at eating right and controlling my high cholesterol, high blood pressure, and sugar levels.

At that time, I began to pray for God to touch my heart and all my veins and arteries and to dissolve any plaque build-up in any of them. I prayed consistently for over a year. On February 28th of this year, I was out trimming my hedge and began to have a tightness in my chest unlike anything I had ever experienced before. I suspected it was a heart issue. Because I was home alone at the time, I drove myself down to Junction City Medical and walked in and said, "I think I am having a heart attack." They hooked me up to a heart machine and within minutes they called an ambulance which took me to River Bend Hospital. After further tests they scheduled me for triple-bypass heart surgery, two days later.

After the surgery, I spent five days recovering at the hospital. The third day of recovery, I was laying there just thanking the Lord that I was ok and that the doctors were able to successfully do the surgery; that now my body was actually healing itself. God did design our bodies to heal themselves. I was overwhelmed with the depth of God's love for me. The doctors did their part by doing the surgery. God had done His part by designing my body to heal itself. I was dally watching my incisions heal up - what a miracle!

God spoke to me and said, "Ed, I am answering your prayer. You have asked me for 20 more years of successful life and ministry and to remove any plaque build-up from your veins so blood will flow freely. I answered your prayer, but not the way you expected. The doctors gave you new veins and arteries through surgery. NOW, what are you going to do to change your lifestyle and begin to take care of yourself so this doesn't happen again?"

Wow! It hit me like a ton of bricks. I must not fight against having diabetes, but actually take responsibility and change my lifestyle. I recalled seeing a sign once that said: "If you don't take care of your body, where are you going to live?"

I have corrected my diet. I am exercising at the gym five days a week, and watching my blood sugar levels closely as I truly want to see at least 20 more years of life. I am not afraid to die - since going Home to be with Jesus will be wonderful - but I do not believe that my time on earth is done yet.

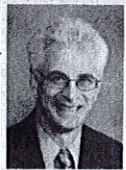
My purpose in writing this letter is not to preach at anyone about taking better care of themselves. I have decided that, for me, I am taking seriously the understanding that if I don't take care of my physical body, there will be consequences that I may not want. It's like jumping off a cliff and hoping that the principle of gravity doesn't come into effect. Whether we are a Christian or not, if we violate principles of a healthy lifestyle, there will be serious consequences.

This has been a difficult time in my life because recovery takes a long time; it has also been one of the best times in my life as I believe I am a lot wiser and very thankful to have a second chance. I already have more energy than I have had for years. My thinking and memory have totally increased for the better. At the rate I am recovering, I can't imagine just how good I am going to feel.

In closing, I would like to encourage anyone who reads this article: don't be stubborn as a donkey, like I was. It almost cost me my life. Remember it's never too late to make life changes that will add many more years of successful life. I have more years of marriage, family, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and ministry ahead of me. This article written by a now wiser man and pastor.



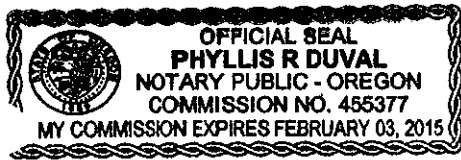

something a little different to get people out of their homes and away from their computers."

That Sunday starting at 5:30pm at the restaurant, about 12 actors will begin mingling with dinner guests during a half-hour cocktail party to prime the audience for solving the murder mystery. The restaurant is typically closed on Sundays, so murder mystery dinner guests are guaranteed a captive performance that day.

"We will bring the fully rehearsed show and will intersperse the actors with the dinners," Marti says. "Actors will be seated with the diners, who won't know

which ones are the actors. It's not a period show, so actors will look like everybody else. It's a murder mystery and the object is to solve the murder."

Folks will start the evening after arriving at 5:30pm to Our Daily Bread Restaurant with a half-hour cocktail party featuring local vineyards or breweries that will take place in the parsonage, located downstairs in the building. Folks will mingle with actors and receive a 'clue pack,' providing guests with a timetable of that evening's events.

"Each person will be given correct information or red-herring information (misleading) and they won't

know which it is," Marti says, "but instructions are to pass that information along at the table."

At 6pm, everyone will go upstairs to be seated at community tables with actors and guests. Actors will then serve salad, dinner and dessert with clues provided throughout the meal. The goal is for each table to solve the murder mystery. The table with the correct response will win a prize at the end of the evening before 8pm.

actual truth about who did the dastardly deed," Marti says.

## Local Resort To Temporarily Pause Business

**HARRISBURG** - River Life Resort, formerly known as Riverbend Resort, announces a temporary, one-month closure this spring to allow the current owner to develop the property for a future building.

From May 5 to June 5, the resort's 19 motel rooms, 95 RV pads and 5,000 square foot event center will be offline while Life Bible Church preps the land for building expansion.

The church acquired the resort last year with the idea of making it a dual use property. "Our intention is to keep

the resort open and enhance our ability to reach and serve the community," said senior pastor, Brad Neuschwander.

The closure will allow development of utility infrastructure needed for the addition of a sanctuary and church offices.

General manager, Andy Jenness assures potential guests will still have the ability to make reservations. "The resort will continue taking online and over-the-phone reservations during the short-term closure."

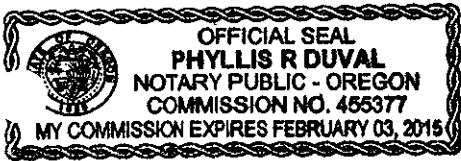



