A. COVID Vaccinations

Week in Review | Broadcast: April 18, 06:02 a.m. | Duration: 12 minutes By mid-April, rare cases of blood clotting condition had caused the FDA to temporarily halt the distribution of the one-shot Johnson & Johnson version of the COVID-19 vaccine. We spoke with Carrie Eldridge, the then-Director of the Franklin-Williamson Bi-County Health Department, for an explanation about the rare condition and to address vaccine hesitancy in southern Illinois.

Week in Review | Broadcast: April 25, 06:12 a.m. | Duration: 22 minutes Vaccine hesitancy is a real issue in southern Illinois. Four out of the five counties at the bottom of the list for vaccine administration are in southern Illinois. Physicians Joshua Miksanek and Jeff Ripperda took listener questions to help put to bed any falsehoods surrounding the vaccine.

Week in Review | Broadcast: May 2, 2021 06:20 a.m. | Duration: 4 minutes By early May, low demand had let to the closure of one of southern Illinois' two mass vaccination sites. Public health officials, like Jackson County Health Department Director Bart Hagston, were concerned. The low demand was due to vaccine hesitancy, not southern Illinoisans already being vaccinated.

Week in Review | Broadcast: June 20, 06:03 a.m. | Duration: 18 minutes After over a year of living with some type of COVID-19 induced restriction, Illinois entered Phase V, a full reopening, on June 11. But public health officials warned that the pandemic was not over yet. Illinois Department of Public Health Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike explained why a large number of the population needs to receive the COVID-19 vaccine for it to be effective in returning life to normal.

B. COVID-19 Effect on Local Economy

Week in Review | Broadcast: May 23, 06:12 a.m. | Duration: 8 minutes Restrictions put in place to slow the spread of COVID-19 had a devastating impact on the local economy. Some business shut down; some never reopened. The town of Marion was no exception. In this interview, Mayor Mike Absher lays out his plan to return the city to normal.

C. Crime

Week in Review | Broadcast: April 11, 06:02 a.m. | Duration: 18 minutes April is Child Abuse Awareness month. This interview with FBI Special Agent Ray Hart details one of the most heinous crimes against children: human trafficking. In this interview, listeners are taught how to spot the signs of human trafficking, which can often hide in plain sight.

Week in Review | Broadcast: May 16, 06:13 a.m. | Duration: 16 minutes A recent rise in gun crime in Carbondale has many of the city's resident concerned. In May, city leaders named a new police chief, department veteran Stan Reno. In this interview, Reno gives us some insight about his approach to keeping the peace.

D. 2020 Census and Political Redistricting

Week in Review | Broadcast: June 6, 06:10 a.m. | Duration: 18 minutes Political boundaries in Illinois will look different in the next election. Following the U.S. Census every ten years, boundaries are redrawn to reflect the current population. But this year was different, due to the pandemic census data was delayed, but Illinois lawmakers drew new boundaries using different data. In this interview, longtime Illinois Political Expert Dr. John Jackson explains the process.

E. Tourism

Week in Review | Broadcast April 11, 06:20 a.m. | Duration: 11 minutes Warmer weather means an increase in tourism in southern Illinois. In the Shawnee National Forest, tourists can see waterfalls, wildlife, and rock formations thousands of years old. But getting to the natural wonders can be dangerous. In this interview with Pope County Sheriff Jerry Suits, we learn the best practices for exploring the wilderness and what to do if you find yourself lost.

In April, Walker's Bluff developers receive initial approval from the state for a gaming license, which cleared the way for some construction to begin. Once completed, it's estimated the property will generate millions of dollars in tax revenue and provide hundreds of construction jobs and dozens of full-time jobs once the casino/resort is open for business. In this interview, Walker's Bluff owner Cynde Bunch and Elite Casinos CEO Dan Kehl provide us with an updated timeline for construction.
