Topic: OBAMA AND IMMIGRATION REFORM

Synopsis: President Barack Obama renewed his push for U.S. immigration reform Thursday, reaching out to Hispanic voters despite minimal chances that Congress will pass such legislation this year. In a broad speech that did not break new policy ground, Obama, a Democrat, called for Republican support to pass a law to address the 11 million illegal immigrants in the country without disrupting the economy or violating American values. Obama has been under pressure to keep his promise from the 2008 presidential campaign to overhaul U.S. immigration rules. A tough new law in Arizona has brought the issue to the forefront of public debate, galvanizing Hispanics, who are an important constituency for November's congressional elections.

Topic: TRAINING POLICE IN ARIZONA

Synopsis: Arizona officials released a training program designed to teach police officers to enforce a tough new crackdown on illegal immigration without racially profiling. Gov. Jan Brewer ordered the Arizona Peace Officer Standards and Training Board to develop the training when she signed the law in April. The hour-long video and supporting paperwork will be sent to all 170 Arizona police agencies. Police bosses will decide the best way to teach their officers, but they're not required to watch the video before the law takes effect July 29.

Topic: UNEMPLOYMENT

Synopsis: More than 1.3 million laid-off workers won't get their unemployment benefits reinstated before Congress goes on a weeklong vacation for Independence Day. An additional 200,000 people who have been without a job for at least six months stand to lose their benefits each week, unless Congress acts. For the third time in as many weeks, Republicans in the Senate successfully filibustered a bill Wednesday night to continue providing unemployment checks to people who been laid off for long stretches. The House is slated to vote on a similar measure Thursday, though the Senate's action renders the vote a futile gesture as Congress prepares to depart Washington for its holiday recess.

Topic: "DREAM ACT"

Synopsis: President Obama took the opportunity to argue for a comprehensive overhaul of our immigration laws, while addressing some leading questions from both skeptics and supporters of reform. Enforcement-only advocates want to know why we should entertain a conversation about immigration reform with an insecure border. For the border-first hawks, Obama pointed to his recent (and some say politically-motivated) increases in border security funding and personnel as evidence of his get-tough stance. He also highlighted a key fact often lost in the national obsession with securing the Southern border: a significant number of undocumented immigrants actually came here legally and then overstayed their visas-therefore, immigration reform can't simply be about sealing boundaries and building walls.

Topic: US UNEMPLOYMENT

Synopsis: The United States added just 83,000 private-sector jobs in June; a dishearteningly low number that could add to the growing number of economists who warn that the economic recovery is stalling. Over all, the nation lost 125,000 jobs, according to the monthly snapshot of the job market released by the Labor Department on Friday. Most of the lost jobs came as temporary workers hired by the federal government to help with the census exited their jobs. The unemployment rate, based on a different survey, declined to 9.5 percent in June from the previous 9.7 percent.

Topic: TOYOTA RECALL

Synopsis: Toyota Motor Corp. says it intends to recall 138,000 Lexus vehicles in the United States to fix faulty engines in the latest quality problem at the world's No. 1 automaker. The company says flaws in valve springs, a crucial engine component, could make the vehicle stall while in motion. Toyota said in a statement Friday it plans to file paperwork on the recall with the government next week. The recall affects certain GS, IS and LS vehicles from the 2006-2008 model years.

Topic: OBAMA NEW JOBS

Synopsis: The government is handing out nearly \$2 billion for new solar plants that President Barack Obama says will create thousands of jobs and increase the use of renewable energy sources. Obama announced the initiative in his weekly radio and online address Saturday, saying the money is part of his plan to bring new industries to the U.S. The two companies that will receive the money from the president's \$862 billion

economic stimulus are Abengoa Solar, which will build one of the world's largest solar plants in Arizona, creating 1,600 construction jobs; and Abound Solar Manufacturing, which is building plants in Colorado and Indiana. The Obama administration says those projects will create more than 2,000 construction jobs and 1,500 permanent jobs.

Topic: CALIFORNIA BUDGET-MINIMUM WAGE

Synopsis: Some California state workers are preparing to tap into their savings while others already are cutting expenses as Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger's minimum wage order moved one step closer to reality. On Friday, the Schwarzenegger administration won an appellate court ruling saying it has the authority to impose the federal minimum wage of \$7.25 an hour on more than 200,000 state workers as California wrestles with its latest budget crisis. It was not immediately clear if the state controller, who cuts state paychecks on a decades-old payroll system, will comply. The office says its computers are unable to make the change until an upgrade is completed in two years.

Topic: OIL SPILL

Synopsis: A low pressure area moving west across the Gulf of Mexico led to the suspension of oil skimming operations again this morning, officials with the response effort said. Skimming in areas near Alabama, Mississippi and the Florida Panhandle was basically suspended Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday because of high seas associated with Hurricane Alex. Operations resumed Friday morning as seas calmed, but the weather system moving west about 150 miles south of the coast kicked seas up again Saturday. The low pressure area could keep waters rough until Monday.

Topic: USA-SPILL SUPERTANKER LATEST

Synopsis: A supertanker retrofitted to scoop up oil began testing its capabilities in the Gulf of Mexico Saturday and could soon be a major asset in the effort to block millions of gallons of crude from reaching shore. The vessel dubbed A Whale and described by its owners as the largest oil skimmer in the world, began collecting oil just north of the site where the Deepwater Horizon rig exploded on April 20, killing 11 workers and touching off what is now the largest oil spill in Gulf history.

Topic: ARIZONA BOYCOTT, SALT LAKE CITY

Synopsis: The City of Angels' City Council sent Salt Lake City a letter this spring calling on Utah's capital to boycott the Grand Canyon State over its immigration law. Arguing the law was analogous to profiling, the Los Angeles City Council had voted 13-1 to approve sanctions that could cancel \$8 million in contracts the Southern California city

had with Arizona businesses. L.A. wanted others to send the same message. If Salt Lake City had gone along, the hit to Utah's southern neighbor would have been substantial. Documents show the city does nearly \$21 million a year in business with Arizona firms.

Topic: TPS FOR HONDURANS

Synopsis: Temporary Protected Status Designated Country - HondurasTPS Extension Re-Registration deadline is this coming July 6, 2010. The TPS expiration date is January 5, 2012. All of those who are legally in this country under the TPS should file the forms to register and re-register: B7Form I-821, Application for Temporary Protected Status. The Form I-765, Application for Employment Authorization. To register or re-register you must file both forms together, even if you do not want work authorization. Make sure to use the most current version of the Form I-821, dated 10/17/07. All previous versions of the I-821 will be rejected.

Topic: TOYOTA RECALL

Synopsis: Toyota started recalling more than 90-thousand luxury Lexus and Crown vehicles on Monday in Japan, over defective engines, the latest setback for the automaker beset with quality problems. Toyota Motor Corporation said recalls in overseas markets will follow soon, totaling about 270-thousand vehicles globally. That includes: 138-thousand vehicles in the U.S., 15-thousand in Europe, 10-thousand in the Middle East, 6-thousand in China, 4-thousand in Canada, and 8-thousand in other regions. Toyota told the Japanese government on Monday it was recalling 91,903 vehicles for flaws in the valve springs, a crucial engine component, that could make the automobile stall while in motion.

Topic: OBAMA IMMIGRATION LAWSUIT

Synopsis: The Obama administration Tuesday sued Arizona over the state's strict new immigration law in a move that drew fire from Republicans who said the border needed more security. The Arizona law requires state and local police to investigate the immigration status of anyone they reasonably suspect of being an illegal immigrant, provoking criticism that it is unconstitutional and would sap law enforcement resources. The lawsuit, filed while Congress was on a week-long break, is part of a broader approach by President Barack Obama to deal with the 10.8 million illegal immigrants

believed to be in the country, arguing that immigration is the responsibility of the federal government not each state.

Topic: CHICAGO MARCH

Synopsis: Thousands of U.S. citizen children are sending letters to President Obama asking him to declare a moratorium on deportations that separate their families. They are asking him to meet with five hundred of their representatives in Washington D.C. on July 28th. Saulito Arellano, the eleven year old son of Elvira Arellano who spent one year in sanctuary with his mother before she was deported, has returned to Chicago to make the trip to Washington on July 28th. Saulito will march with dozens of U.S. citizen children at 11 A.M. Wednesday from Lincoln United Methodist Church, where he is staying, to the post office on Ashland and 19th street to send a letter to the President to invite him and his family to meet with them on July 28th - and to stop the deportation of their families.

Topic: ARIZONA LAWSUIT FOLLOW UP

Synopsis: The federal lawsuit against Arizona's tough new immigration law focuses heavily on a question that has been in the spotlight repeatedly the past decade and dates to the Founding Fathers: The right of the government to keep states from enacting laws that usurp federal authority. The lawsuit filed in Phoenix federal court on Tuesday sidestepped concerns about the potential for racial profiling and civil rights violations most often raised by immigration advocates. Experts said those are weaker arguments that don't belong in a legal challenge brought by the White House to get the measure struck down.

Topic: OIL SPILL

Synopsis: Lake Pontchartrain north of New Orleans is the latest site where oil from the ruptured well in the Gulf of Mexico has appeared. The lake was rescued from pollution in the 1990s and had once again become a bountiful fishing ground and a popular spot for boating and swimming. Cleanup crews used nets to collect tar balls from marinas and docks yesterday. Meanwhile, officials say they'll know soon whether a new containment vessel is properly connected to the gushing well head in the Gulf of Mexico.

Topic: GULF OIL SPILL COULD BE STOPPED THIS MONTH

Synopsis: Governor Charlie Crist has called for a special session of the Legislature to permanently ban offshore oil drilling in Florida waters. Crist on Thursday said the session is called for July 20th to the 23rd. Crist wants the legislature to put an amendment to the state constitution on the November ballot asking to permanently ban drilling in state waters. The amendment would require 60 percent approval from the voters.

Topic: IMMIGRATION BILL GEORGIA

Synopsis: A handful of Republican state senators said today they plan to introduce legislation they say will provide for greater enforcement of federal illegal immigration laws in Georgia. Nationally, illegal aliens cost taxpayers \$113 billion per year, according to a new report from the Federation for American Immigration Reform (FAIR). Illegal aliens cost Georgians \$1.6 billion - or more, depending on the estimate - every year, according to Mullis.

Topic: MORTGAGE RATES

Synopsis: Nearly two years after the credit crunch virtually froze mortgage markets, high-end borrowers are seeing some relief: Rates for "jumbo" mortgages on pricier homes are at their lowest since 2003. Just a year ago, the average rate on a 30-year jumbo mortgage-a loan of more than \$729,750 not backed by government-sponsored agencies Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac was 6.86%, according to Greg McBride, a senior financial analyst at Bankrate.com. Now it is 5.48%-a rate that rivals those available during the height of the credit bonanza.

Topic: **ECONOMIC OUTLOOK**

Synopsis: Crude oil futures fell Tuesday for the sixth straight session, as the market failed to sustain an early rally in light of worries about slowing economic growth. Light, sweet crude for August delivery settled down 16 cents, or 0.2%, at \$71.98 a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange. Brent crude on the ICE futures exchange settled down 2 cents at \$71.45 a barrel. The drop continued the longest stretch of declines since mid-May as traders dismissed an optimistic economic forecast made by Australia's central bank after the Institute for Supply Management reported that the U.S. nonmanufacturing sector grew more slowly in June than expected.

Topic: IMMIGRATION DONATIONS

Synopsis: Retirees and other residents from all over the country were among those who donated nearly \$500,000 to help Arizona defend its immigration enforcement law.

The donations, 88 percent of which came through the Arizona defense fund's website, surged this week after the federal government sued Tuesday to challenge the law. A document from Gov. Jan Brewer's office showed that 7,008 of the 9,057 online contributions submitted by Thursday morning were made in the days following the government's filing.

Topic: CA SPINACH RECALL

Synopsis: There has been a recall announced by the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) of the Ready Pac Foods Inc. brand baby spinach products that could be contaminated with E. coli O157:H7. This E. coli was found during routing sampling and there haven't been any illness reported from this recall yet. The spinach was distributed to retailers in California, Oregon and Arizona between June 21st and June 27th.

Topic: OIL SPILL LATEST

Synopsis: The federal official leading the Gulf oil spill cleanup says a new containment cap and an additional ship collecting oil could effectively contain the spill as early as Monday. National Incident Commander Thad Allen said Friday that the work to replace a leaky containment cap on the well head with a tighter one will begin Saturday. At the same time, a ship connecting to a different part of leak is expected to come online Sunday.

Topic: OIL SPILL

Synopsis: The delicate work of removing and replacing a cap over the gushing oil well on the floor of the Gulf of Mexico is under way. BP officials say undersea robots have taken off the existing cap and oil is now gushing freely into the Gulf. The hope is to fit a tighter dome that will funnel more oil to collection ships on the surface a mile above. The next steps will prepare the seal for the new cap. If all goes well, the oil could be contained sometime Monday. A permanent solution is still weeks off. That involves an attempt to plug the well far below the gushing well head.

Topic: OBAMA WEEKLY ADDRESS

Synopsis: With the military fighting two wars, President Barack Obama said Saturday the country has a "solemn responsibility" to ensure that veterans with post-traumatic

stress disorder get the help they need. Veterans Affairs Secretary Eric Shinseki is to announce new regulations Monday intended to make it easier for veterans with PSTD to receive government benefits. The new rules will not only apply to veterans of the Iraq and Afghanistan wars, but also those who served in previous conflicts

Topic: PROTEST SB 1070

Synopsis: A document from Gov. Jan Brewer's office surged days after the U.S. government filed suit against the state's Immigration Law. Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer, who is under fire for her crackdown on illegal immigrants, is being met in Boston by immigrant advocates and their allies as she attends the annual National Governors Association meeting. A coalition of immigrant groups has bused in advocates from around the East Coast for a noon rally Saturday to protest Arizona's controversial immigration law, recently signed by Brewer. The law, which is facing a U.S. Justice Department challenge, requires police to question people about their immigration status while enforcing other laws if there's reason to suspect someone is in the country illegally.

Topic: USA IMMIGRATION AUDITS

Synopsis: The U.S. government is taking a new approach in its effort to crack down on illegal workers by quietly auditing the employment records of thousands of companies suspected of hiring undocumented immigrants rather than staging high-profile worksite raids, the New York Times reported Saturday. The Times said the Obama administration had conducted such audits at more than 2,900 companies so far -- a number it said dwarfed the number of companies affected by the immigration raids at factories and farms during the eight-year administration of Obama's Republican predecessor, George W. Bush.

Topic: ANTI-IMMIGRANT LAW LATEST

Synopsis: Attorney General Eric Holder isn't ruling out another federal lawsuit challenging Arizona's immigration law -- if there's evidence of racial profiling. The Obama administration sued Arizona on Tuesday, arguing that the state is impinging on federal responsibilities for dealing with immigration.

Topic: OIL SPILL LATEST

Synopsis: Hundreds of thousands of gallons of oil are being allowed to spew into the fouled waters of the Gulf of Mexico while BP engineers prepare to install a new containment system they hope will catch it all in the coming days. Officials say there's

no guarantee for such a delicate operation nearly a mile below the water's surface and the permanent fix of plugging the well from the bottom remains slated for the end of July.

Topic: WHITE HOUSE AIDS STRATEGY TO FOCUS ON PREVENTION
Synopsis: U.S. President Barack Obama released a domestic AIDS strategy Monday that aims to cut the infection rate by 25 percent, test 90 percent of those infected and get 85 percent of patients treated right away. The new plan, to be formally released Tuesday, also has modest aims to get 20 percent more of the most at-risk groups such as gay and bisexual men and blacks treated with drugs to control their infections.
"Unless we take bold actions, we face a new era of rising infections, greater challenges in serving people living with HIV, and higher health care costs," the report reads. The United States should be able to lower the annual number of new infections by 25 percent from 56,300 to 42,225 a year by 2015, the plan said.

Topic: BP PUTS WELL CAP IN PLACE; US ISSUES NEW DRILLING BAN Synopsis: BP Plc said Monday it had installed and was ready to test a cap that, if successful, would for the first time stop the oil spewing from its ruptured well on the floor of the Gulf of Mexico. The breakthrough in efforts to curb the 84-day-old gusher was announced as the U.S. Interior Department unveiled a revised moratorium on deepwater oil drilling in the Gulf that it said would stand up to legal challenges. The prospect of protected court battles over the Obama administration's bid to limit offshore energy exploration already has had a chilling effect on drilling, putting tens of thousands of jobs at risk, industry officials and analysts said. But BP got a lift as its share price surged on news from sources that the British oil giant is in talks to sell assets worth up to \$10 billion to U.S. energy company Apache Corp and other potential bidders.

Topic: US CANCER GROUP ENDORSES NEWER BREAST CANCER DRUGS Synopsis: The American Society of Clinical Oncology issued new guidelines Monday for the use of hormone-based breast cancer drugs called aromatase inhibitors. They said most breast cancer patients past menopause should consider taking an aromatase inhibitor at some point, either right after surgery or after two to three years of the drug tamoxifen. Aromatase inhibitors include anastrozole, made by AstraZeneca under the brand name Arimidex, exemestane, made by Pfizer Inc., under the brand name Aromasin and Novartis's Femara or letrozole. Breast cancer is the second-leading cause of cancer death among U.S. women, after lung cancer. It kills 500,000 people globally every year and is diagnosed in close to 1.3 million people globally.

Topic: DIABETES PILL AVANDIA

Synopsis: The diabetes pill Avandia has been used by millions of patients and racked up billions in sales in more than a decade on the market. This week the Food and Drug Administration is trying to answer a seemingly simple question: Does it cause heart attacks? It's the type of crucial safety question that the agency was established to answer. But as the FDA began a two-day meeting Tuesday to determine Avandia's fate, it became clear that the agency's own scientists are divided. On Wednesday the FDA will ask a panel of advisers to untangle the mess of data that has stumped its own scientists for over three years. The group will vote on recommendations, including possible withdrawal of the drug. The FDA will make a final decision in coming months.

Topic: OIL SPILL LATEST

Synopsis: BP Plc prepared Tuesday to test a new cap on its runaway well in an effort to finally arrest the flow of oil gushing into the Gulf of Mexico for the last 12 weeks. The tests, due to last between six and 48 hours, will begin later Tuesday on BP's newly installed "capping stack", which has a better seal than the last cap placed on the well and aims to stop oil from spewing out of the failed blowout preventer. A critical test to gauge the integrity of the blown-out well is expected to start "in a couple of hours," a BP executive said at about 3:30 p.m. EDT. Regardless of the test results, BP should be able to contain the ruptured well's flow with oil-siphoning vessels by mid-July, said retired Coast Guard Admiral Thad Allen, the top U.S. official overseeing the oil spill. As the oil giant prepared for a potential turning point in the worst offshore spill in U.S. history, it also said its plans to sell some non-core assets, which will help pay for a \$20 billion clean-up fund, were moving forward. Both pieces of news had helped BP shares maintain their recent recovery in London, although they seesawed in New York with profit-taking erasing most of the early gains.

Topic: POLITICAL ASYLUM FOR GUATEMALAN WOMEN

Synopsis: A federal appeals court ruling Monday created the possibility that Guatemalan women could qualify for political asylum in the U.S. because of the high female murder rate in the Central American country. The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals issued a strongly worded ruling reversing the deportation orders of two immigration courts that such a claim applies too broadly. The San Francisco-based court ordered the immigration judges, who work in the U.S. Department of Justice, to reconsider granting asylum to Lesly Yajayra Perdomo, an illegal immigrant in her mid-30s who settled in Reno, Nev. Most important, the court ordered the Board of Immigration to determine whether all Guatemalan women can qualify - a decision that could open the door to similar claims from other countries such as El Salvador, Honduras and others with history of widespread gender abuse. More than 3,800 Guatemalan women have been murdered since 2000 and fewer than 2 percent of the

crimes have been solved, according to the Center for Gender and Refugee Studies at the University of California, San Francisco's law school.

Topic: UTAH IMMIGRATION LAW

Synopsis: Utah Gov. Gary Herbert's spokeswoman says it will likely be several days before it's known whether state workers leaked the personal information of more than 1,300 people who an anonymous group claims are illegal immigrants. The group mailed the list to several media outlets, law enforcement agencies and others this week, demanding that those on the list be deported.

Topic: BP OIL SPILL LATEST

Synopsis: BP Plc will go ahead with a key pressure test on its ruptured Gulf of Mexico well to determine if it can proceed with a plan to temporarily seal the well, a senior U.S. official said Wednesday. Retired Admiral Thad Allen, who is overseeing the U.S. effort to deal with the disaster, said the decision was taken after a day of intense deliberation that reached the level of President Barack Obama and his cabinet.

Topic: AIRLINE FEES

Synopsis: Finding the best deal on a flight has become a lot more difficult, thanks to hefty baggage and service fees that consumers often don't know about until they show up at the airline counter, congressional investigators say. Those fees are not part of the ticket price, meaning they can easily go unseen until it's too late for the consumer to shop around. Earlier on Sunday, BP officials had expressed hope that the test of the cap which began Thursday could continue until a relief well can permanently seal the leak next month. Synopsis: A Canadian study suggests another benefit from treating people who have the AIDS virus -- helping prevent new infections. Topic: VAGINAL GEL AND HIV

Synopsis: Most of the world's 33.4 million people who live with HIV/AIDS are in Africa, where the highest burden of HIV infection is among women younger than 30 years. The trial involved 889 women in Durban and a remote rural village in South Africa. Half the women were given the gel containing the medicine to use before and after sex, while half were given a placebo gel. After one year, the study results showed the gel lowered

the risk of infection by 50%. After two-and-a-half years, the gel reduced the rate of infection by 39%. The lower level of effectiveness in the second year was associated with a drop-off in usage by women who became infected with HIV. Also, there were 54% fewer infections among those who used the gel more than 80% of the time and a 28% reduction among those who used it least. While the study used the gold standard for clinical research, some flaws would prevent applying for regulatory approval of the gel.

Synopsis: Utah Governor Gary Herbert is still planning to hold his immigration summit later this month, in spite of the lawsuit filed by the Department of Justice on Tuesday. Herbert wants a diverse group of Utahans to sit down and talk about how Utah should deal with the problem of illegal immigration. During its last three sessions, the Utah legislature has tried to enact stronger immigration legislation. Employer verification for public employees, state contractors and recipients of public assistance went into effect with limited success in 2008. Proof of citizenship when renewing a driver's license created long lines at the Department of Motor Vehicles when it became law in 2009. On July 1, 2010, private employers began e-verifying immigration status of employees. There is no penalty for non-compliance.

But in Rhode Island, both sides of the debate agree that the executive order issued by Gov. Don Carcieri in 2008 is far less sweeping than the Arizona law, which takes effect this month. Comparisons of the two approaches are intended to rationalize the law in Arizona, generally more conservative than Rhode Island, by suggesting it's already more or less in place in a heavily Democratic state, said Steven Brown, a leading critic of the governor's order and executive director of the Rhode Island affiliate of the American Civil Liberties Union.

Synopsis: The confirmation of the death -- the sixth pertussis-related death this year in the state -- comes a day after the California Department of Public Health expanded criteria for those who should be vaccinated against the highly contagious disease amid what is shaping up to be the worst outbreak in 50 years. So far this year, nearly 1,500 cases of whooping cough have been reported statewide, about 289 in Los Angeles

County, including 184 laboratory-confirmed cases, officials said. All of those killed by the disease were infants.

Synopsis: The "DREAM Act" is bipartisan legislation that would remove many of the barriers that immigrant youth confront due to their lack of legal status. The "DREAM Act" was reintroduced in Congress in March 2009, and this week youth and their allies will come together to show their support and ask Congress to advance this legislation. Topic: MEAT MAY PACK ON THE POUNDS OVER TIME

Synopsis: Being a little less carnivorous may help you stay slim, a study on hundreds of thousands of Europeans suggests. Dr. Anne-Claire Vergnaud of Imperial College London in the UK and her colleagues found that people who ate more meat gained more weight over 5 years than those who ate less meat, but the same amount of calories. The study included more than 100,000 men and 270,000 women from 10 different European countries participating in a study of cancer and nutrition and other lifestyle factors. Over the 5-year follow-up period, both men and women gained about a pound a year, on average, although women gained a little less. And the more meat a person ate, the more they gained; for every additional 250 grams of meat a person ate daily (the equivalent of a half-pound, 450-calorie steak), their 5-year weight gain would be 4.4 pounds greater, the researchers calculate.

U.S. District Judge Susan Bolton also went beyond dry legal analysis to point out some of the everyday realities of illegal immigration and how that applies to the new law. Without prodding from attorneys, the judge noted that the federal government erected signs in a wilderness area south of Phoenix that warn visitors about immigrant and drug smugglers passing through public lands. She said the stash houses where smugglers hide immigrants from Mexico before bringing them into the country's interior have become a fixture on the news in Arizona.

Synopsis: The Senate has passed an almost \$60 billion bill funding President Barack Obama's troop surge in Afghanistan after stripping out more than \$20 billion in domestic spending approved by the House. The spending bill is now limited chiefly to Afghanistan funding, foreign aid, medical care for Vietnam War veterans exposed to Agent Orange, and replenishing almost empty disaster aid accounts. He says if you live in Oakland and one of the above happens to you, you need to let police know on-line. Federal researchers say concentrations of underwater oil doubled last month over what they were in May. Synopsis: A federal judge stepped into the fight over Arizona's immigration law at the last minute Wednesday, blocking the heart of the measure and defusing a confrontation between police and thousands of activists that had been building for months. It sets up a lengthy legal battle that could end up before the Supreme Court -- ensuring that a law that reignited the immigration debate, inspired similar measures nationwide, created fodder for political campaigns and raised tensions with Mexico will stay in the spotlight. Protesters who gathered at the state Capitol and outside the U.S. Embassy in Mexico City cheered when they heard the news. Synopsis: A judge's ruling Wednesday putting on hold key parts of Arizona's new immigration law will head to the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, but legal experts said there are other options to settle the dispute with the federal government. Gov. Jan Brewer said the state would file an expedited appeal today and ask the appellate court to lift the injunction put in place Wednesday by U.S. District Judge Susan Bolton. The state also will ask the 9th Circuit, based in San Francisco, to fast-track court filings and a ruling. Synopsis: The officers sat in the cool of the Phoenix Municipal Court basement watching DVDs on laptop computers, reading books and dozing off with their riot

helmets as pillows, waiting patiently for the protesters to arrive. As the crowd swelled near Phoenix City Hall, the officers moved in formation to clear the street of protesters and journalists amid chants denouncing Senate Bill 1070. Phoenix deployed several hundred police along Washington Street and other busy downtown streets on Thursday, led by a core group of about 150 crowd-control officers carrying detailed protest plans.

Synopsis: New figures released Friday show that a total of 71 people were arrested in Phoenix during protests of Arizona's new immigration law. The protests were held Thursday as the new law took effect, although without its strongest provisions. Phoenix police say they arrested 45 people during protests in front of Maricopa County Sheriff Joe Arpaio's headquarters downtown and in surrounding areas. The Maricopa County Sheriff's Office arrested 23 people outside a downtown jail where protesters beat on the metal door and forced sheriff's deputies to call for backup. Officers in riot gear opened the doors, waded out into the crowd and hauled off those who didn't move.

Synopsis: Homeland Security says the raid was carried out by Border Patrol Agents in Las Vegas from Arizona to disrupt human and narcotics trafficking. Some in the local Hispanic community feel like they're caught in the middle of a political tug-of-war. Thursday's raid comes on the same day Arizona implemented its new anti-immigration law. People in the Valley say the raid was easy pickings for Arizona law enforcement; described as hyenas waiting for their prey. It's a scene that looks at the issue of immigration from a different pair of eyes. Those of a daughter saying goodbye to her mom as she is carried off by immigration and customs enforcement.

Synopsis: A federal appeals court has decided not to step into the controversy over Arizona's tough immigration law until November, leaving state officials to consider other steps they might take in the meantime. Republican Gov. Jan Brewer, who signed the law and appealed a ruling blocking its most controversial sections, said Friday she would consider changes to "tweak" the law to respond to the parts U.S. District Judge Susan Bolton faulted.

Synopsis: U.S. President Barack Obama Saturday accused Republicans of holding American small businesses "hostage to politics" after Republican senators refused to back a \$30 billion small-business lending package. Senate Republicans blocked the package Thursday, dealing a fresh blow to Obama's efforts to show Americans, in the midst of a tough election year, that his administration is focused on tackling stubbornly high unemployment. With opinion polls showing eroding support for Obama's handling of the economy, Democrats fear voters will punish them for the 9.5 percent unemployment rate come November, when 435 seats in the House of Representatives and 37 of the 100 seats in the Senate will be in play in mid-term elections.

Synopsis: BP's new boss says it's time for a "scale back" in cleaning up the Gulf of Mexico oil spill. Federal officials say there is no way the crude could reach the East Coast. And fishing areas are starting to reopen. There were several signs Friday that the era of thousands of oil-skimming boats and hazmat-suited beach crews is giving way to long-term efforts to clean up, compensate people for their losses and understand the damage wrought. Local fishermen are doubtful, however, and say oil remains a bigger problem than BP and the federal government are letting on. Other people contend the impact of the spill has been overblown, given that little oil remains on the Gulf surface, but Bob Dudley, who heads BP's oil spill recovery and will take over as CEO in October, rejected those claims.

Synopsis: Pregnant women with a history of pregnancy-related diabetes, also called gestational diabetes, have a good chance of developing the condition again, suggests a large new study. Suttles says "they wouldn't open these waters ... if it wasn't safe to eat the fish." He also says he would eat it and "would serve it to my family."

Topic: GULF CREWS PREPARE TO START PLUGGING WELL FOR GOOD Synopsis: Engineers plan to start shoving mud and maybe cement into the blown-out oil well in the Gulf of Mexico on Tuesday in what could be one of the final steps to plug it for good, BP said Monday. BP PLC Senior Vice President Kent Wells said crews will likely start the so-called "static kill" attempt Tuesday if tests Monday determine the well can withstand the mud. If it passes the test, he said engineers would spend most of Tuesday and likely part of Wednesday slowly pumping the heavy mud down the well. There's no guarantee of success, and BP PLC engineers may follow up the static kill days later by sending a stream of mud and cement into the bottom of the blown-out well through a relief well they've been drilling for months.

Topic: JUDGE LETS VIRGINIA HEALTHCARE CHALLENGE PROCEED Synopsis: A U.S. judge ruled Monday that Virginia could proceed with its challenge to President Barack Obama's landmark healthcare law, a setback that will force the White House to defend its reforms in the middle of a tough congressional election campaign. In the opening salvo of the legal fight, U.S. District Judge Henry Hudson refused to dismiss the state's lawsuit, which argued the requirement that its residents have health

insurance was unconstitutional. Hudson, who noted that his ruling was an initial step, decided the law was ripe for review. He said the issue the state raised -- whether forcing residents to buy something, namely healthcare, is constitutional -- had not been fully tested in court.

And she says it would help eliminate junk food in vending machines. In an op-ed essay appearing in Monday's edition of The Washington Post, the first lady says Americans "owe it to the children." Previously, Virginian officers could only perform such a check for individuals arrested or jailed.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION

Synopsis: The California Supreme Court ruled Monday that Proposition 209, the ballot measure that banned affirmative action by government, did not violate the federal Constitution. In a 6-1 ruling, the majority rejected a defense argued by San Francisco after it was sued over a program that gave women and minorities an advantage in obtaining city contracts. The court said the affirmative action program may continue only if the city shows it was narrowly tailored to address intentional discrimination by the city

against businesses owned by women and minorities and that preferences were necessary to rectify the discrimination.

Topic: CITIZENSHIP RIGHT

Synopsis: Leading Republicans are joining a push to reconsider the constitutional amendment that grants automatic citizenship to people born in the United States. Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky said Tuesday he supports holding hearings on the 14th Amendment right, although he emphasized that Washington's immigration focus should remain on border security. His comments came as other Republicans in recent days have questioned or challenged birthright citizenship, embracing a cause that had largely been confined to the far right. The senators include Arizona's John McCain, the party's 2008 presidential nominee; Arizona's Jon Kyl, the Republicans' second-ranking senator; Alabama's Jeff Sessions, the top Republican on the Judiciary Committee, and Lindsey Graham of South Carolina, a leading negotiator on immigration legislation.

Synopsis: No more oil is likely to leak into the polluted Gulf of Mexico, the government's point man on the massive oil spill declared Wednesday as efforts to plug a blown-out well succeeded. A relieved President Barack Obama said the fight to stop the leak is "finally close to coming to an end." At the White House, National Incident Commander Adm. Thad Allen said the effort to plug the leak was progressing; giving officials "high confidence" that there will soon be no more oil leaking into the environment. That upbeat assessment came as a government report released Wednesday said only about a quarter of the spilled oil remains in the Gulf. The rest has been contained, cleaned up or has otherwise disappeared.

Synopsis: The Obama administration plans to send \$600 million to help unemployed homeowners avoid foreclosure in five states. The Treasury Department said Wednesday that mortgage-assistance proposals submitted by North Carolina, Ohio, Oregon, Rhode Island and South Carolina received approval. The states estimate their efforts could help up to 50,000 homeowners. The administration is directing \$2.1 billion from its existing \$75 billion mortgage assistance program to a total of 10 states. Each state designed its own plan. Treasury approved money in June for Arizona, California, Florida, Michigan and Nevada.

Topic: GAY MARRIAGE

Synopsis: One day after a federal judge struck down California's ban on gay marriage, supporters of the voter-approved law Thursday filed notice with the court that they would appeal, firing a new salvo in what experts say will be a long legal battle ahead. The one-paragraph document, which is largely a formality, informs U.S. District Court Judge Vaughn Walker that the defendants intend to appeal his decision to the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. That appeal had been expected in a politically charged case that most believe will ultimately be decided by the U.S. Supreme Court and could inject a divisive social issue into U.S. congressional and state elections this fall, including California's race for governor. Walker overturned California's voter-approved ban on gay marriages, known as Proposition 8, Wednesday after finding that it violates the due process and equal protection provisions of the U.S. Constitution.

Topic: BORDER SECURITY BILL

Synopsis: The U.S. Senate approved a large H-1B fee increase on Thursday to help offset a \$600 million "emergency package" to improve security along the Mexican border. The fee increases, which also affect the L-1 visa, will help pay for 1,000 new border patrol agents and drones or unmanned aircraft, as well as long list of agencies, including prisons. The Senate measure increases the H-1B visa application fees by \$2,000 per application on those firms that have 50% of their employees on this visa. This fee increase will have the biggest impact on the large Indian offshore firms, such as Infosys Technologies Ltd., Wipro Ltd., and Tata Consultancy Services, which use thousands of H-1B visas to service U.S. customers.

Synopsis: Saturday shopping was hot and heavy at local retailers as customers ignored 92-degree temperatures to cash in on back-to-school deals and a weekend without sales tax. Parking lots at shopping centers and malls were full of folks looking to get items checked off teacher-required lists or to buy school clothes and supplies at a savings.

Synopsis: Private employers added new workers at a weak pace for the third straight month, making it more likely economic growth will slow in the coming months. The

jobless rate was unchanged at 9.5 percent. The Labor Department said Friday that companies added a net total of 71,000 jobs in July, far below the roughly 200,000 needed each month to reduce the unemployment rate. Overall, the economy lost a net total of 131,000 jobs last month, as 143,000 temporary census jobs ended. The department also said that businesses hired fewer workers in June than it had previously estimated. July's private-sector job gains were revised down to 31,000 from 83,000. May was revised up slightly to show 51,000 net new jobs, from 33,000.

Synopsis: BP is confirming that it plans to use a relief well to shove mud and then cement into the underground reservoir feeding the blown-out Gulf of Mexico well. Chief Operating Officer Doug Suttles said Friday that crews still "plan to move forward with the bottom kill" at this point. The company has been hedging on what exactly it will do with the 18,000-foot relief well when it's finished later this month. Crews have already plugged up the well from the top with mud and cement. But federal officials want BP to plug it from the bottom to make sure it's permanently sealed. Suttles says crews are preparing to drill the final 100 feet of the primary relief well.

Synopsis: President Barack Obama says Medicare will exist for many more years, thanks to new legislation that helped put the health care program for America's seniors on stronger financial footing. Obama said the law and efforts by his administration to eliminate waste, fraud and abuse both in Medicare and across government generally are making the program stronger and cutting health care costs for seniors.

Synopsis: A week into their summer break, members of the House are about to return to Capitol Hill to take up a \$26 billion jobs bill. The House is being called back into session on Tuesday to vote on the package that supporters say will save the jobs of as many as 145-thousand teachers. Dave Ebersbach's job as a math teacher in Toledo, Ohio was recently cut. He says the gains the students at his high poverty school made are at risk.

Republicans charge the measure is a giveaway to public employee unions while nothing is being done to help workers in the private sector.

Topic: HIGH CHOLESTEROL DANGEROUS IN YOUNG ADULTS

Synopsis: Adults as young as 20 need to pay attention to their cholesterol because unhealthy levels may already be damaging their arteries, researchers reported Tuesday. They followed a group of 18- to 30-year-olds for 20 years and found that higher cholesterol at a relatively early age increased the risk of heart disease and stroke later. Pletcher and colleagues looked at data from more than 3,200 young adults -- roughly evenly divided between black and white, male and females. Those with high levels of low density lipoprotein -- LDL or "bad" cholesterol -- in youth were more likely to develop heart disease later, regardless of their cholesterol levels later in life.

Synopsis: Honda Motor Co. is recalling the popular Accord and Civic passenger cars from the 2003 model year to address problems with an ignition switch that could allow the key to be removed without the transmission being shifted into park. The recall involves 384,220 vehicles and also includes 2003-2004 model years of the Honda Element. Honda says in a posting with the government that the problem with the automatic transmissions could lead to a vehicle rolling away and increase the risk of a crash. A Honda spokesman did not immediately comment. The recall is expected to begin in late September

Topic: BP MAKES \$3 BLN INITIAL DEPOSIT TO SPILL FUND

Synopsis: The Justice Department and BP announced Monday that they have finished negotiations to implement a \$20 billion fund for victims of the Gulf oil spill and that BP has made a \$3 billion initial deposit. Associate Attorney General Tom Perrelli said the department is pleased that BP made an initial contribution and had taken "an important

step toward honoring its commitment to the President and the residents and business owners in the Gulf region." The company still needs to ensure that all the necessary funds will be available if something happens to the BP subsidiary that established the trust and that the Justice Department looks forward to completing an appropriate security arrangement in the near future, said Perrelli.

Topic: STUDENTS SPARED AMID AN INCREASE IN DEPORTATIONS
Synopsis: The Obama administration, while deporting a record number of immigrants convicted of crimes, is sparing one group of illegal immigrants from expulsion: students who came to the United States without papers when they were children. In case after case where immigrant students were identified by federal agents as being in the country illegally, the students were released from detention and their deportations were suspended or canceled, lawyers and immigrant advocates said. Officials have even declined to deport students who openly declared their illegal status in public protests.

Topic: JOBS BILL

Synopsis: The jobs bill, which narrowly passed the Senate, is being described in starkly different political terms. Democrats say it could save the jobs of more than 300,000 teachers, police officers and other public health workers. Republicans see it as more profligate government spending and a pre-election gift to teachers' unions and other public service unions that are crucial to helping keep Democrats in the majority. The legislation provides \$10 billion to school districts to rehire laid-off teachers or ensure that more teachers won't be let go before the new school year begins. The money could keep more than 160,000 teachers, including 16,000 in California and 14,000 in Texas, on the job, advocates say. The other half of the bill has \$16 billion for six more months of increased Medicaid payments to the states. That would free up money for states to meet other budget priorities, including keeping more than 150,000 police officers and other public workers on the payroll. Some three-fifths of states have already factored in the federal money in drawing up their budgets for the current fiscal year.

status during a lawful stop. The measure would also require Florida businesses to use a national registry to make sure that new hires are authorized to work in the United States. The proposed measure also would require anyone who is not a citizen to carry immigration documentation or face a misdemeanor with a sentence of up to 20 days in jail.

Synopsis: Fresh Express is voluntarily recalling some of its salad products because of a possible health risk from Listeria monocytogenes. The Salinas, Calif.-based company is recalling 2,825 cases of Veggie Lovers Salad. The recalled salad mix has a product code of I208 and use-by date of Aug. 10. Officials say the product is being recalled after one package tested positive for the bacterium. No illnesses have been reported. The product was distributed to 13 states: Missouri, Michigan, Ohio, Illinois, Wisconsin, Indiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, New York, Kansas, Kentucky, Pennsylvania and New Jersey. It also could've been redistributed in Arkansas, Tennessee, West Virginia, lowa, Minnesota, Virginia, Vermont, New Hampshire, Nebraska, Rhode Island, Pennsylvania, Mississippi and the District of Columbia.

Synopsis: The number of U.S. workers filing new claims for unemployment insurance unexpectedly rose last week to its highest level in close to six months, a fresh signal of a weak jobs market. The number of new claims for jobless benefits rose 2,000 to 484,000 in the week ended August 7, the second straight increase, the Labor Department said on Thursday. Economists had expected claims to edge down to 469,000. U.S. stocks opened lower on both the data and a disappointing revenue forecast from Cisco Systems Inc, while U.S. Treasury debt prices pared losses and the dollar trimmed gains against the yen. The data comes two days after the Federal Reserve downgraded its assessment of the economy's health and said it would take steps to ensure its support for the fragile recovery.

Synopsis: The government's point man on the Gulf oil spill says BP's blown-out well is not securely plugged to his satisfaction and that the drilling of the relief well must go forward. Retired Coast Guard Adm. Thad Allen says "We will kill the well." Work on the

relief well was suspended earlier this week because of bad weather. It could take four days to restart the operation. Then, it could be only a matter of days before the "bottom kill" is complete and the blown-out well is no longer a threat. Louisiana Gov. Bobby Jindal, who was among local officials who met with Allen today, says a redundant bottom kill "makes sense." Jindal and coastal officials say they're moving toward an agreement with federal authorities over the deployment of clean up equipment. Jindal says parish leaders would have a say in how resources are deployed in their areas.

Synopsis: President Barack Obama has signed into law a \$600 million border security bill that will put more agents and equipment along the Mexican border. Obama signed the bill in the Oval Office Friday alongside Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano. The measure will fund the hiring of 1,000 new Border Patrol agents to be deployed at critical areas along the border, as well as more Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents. It also provides for new communications equipment and greater use of unmanned surveillance drones. Some Republicans, including Arizona Sen. John McCain, say that while the legislation is a start, it falls short by not dramatically increasing the number of customs inspectors along the border and not funding a program that charges illegal immigrants with a low-level crime.

Synopsis: The number of cases awaiting resolution before federal immigration courts reached a new all-time high of 247,922 by mid June 2010, says the Transactional Records Access Clearinghouse (TRAC). The case backlog has continued to grow - up 2.1 percent - since TRAC's last report three months ago, and is 33.1% higher than levels at the end of federal fiscal year 2008. Wait times have continued to inch upward. The average time these pending cases have been waiting in the Immigration Courts of the Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR) is now 459 days

Synopsis: A hotly-anticipated illegal immigration bill is finally unveiled at Utah's State Capitol Friday. It's patterned after Arizona's immigration law, though the lawmaker behind it says it's very different. The bill is sponsored by Rep. Stephen Sandstrom, R-Orem, and is supported by many other Utah Legislators. However, critics say like the Arizona law, it amounts to little but racial profiling. The core intent of this bill is still very much like Arizona's illegal-immigration crackdown law. The differences are in fine legal details, meant to adhere to a federal judge's concerns about the Arizona law. Sandstrom was literally standing alone among protesters, who heckled him while he detailed the bill. He faced down a crowd of more than 50 protesters Friday and even took some of their questions.

He said that because of the cleanup efforts, Gulf Coast beaches are clean, safe and open for business. The new result is one of a number of remarkable recent findings about Alzheimer's. Among other groups, the letter was signed by the Citizen's Education Project, the Disabled Rights Action Committee and the Anti-Hunger Action Committee. Synopsis: In an effort to bring more consumers into the financial mainstream, the board of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. is scheduled to vote today on a program to encourage banks to offer no-frills, low-cost checking and savings accounts. The FDIC model checking account would allow customers to open an account for as little as \$10. While banks may decide to charge a low monthly maintenance fee, the accounts won't have the kind of surprise fees - such as overdraft protection fees - that have led consumers to abandon banks, says FDIC Chair Sheila. If the plan is approved, the FDIC will seek applications from banks willing to offer the accounts as part of a one-year pilot program. The FDIC hopes that data from the program will persuade other banks to offer the accounts, Bair says.

Synopsis: An Iowa egg producer is recalling 228 million eggs after being linked to an outbreak of salmonella poisoning. The federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said eggs from Wright County Egg in Galt, Iowa, were linked to several illnesses in Colorado, California and Minnesota. The CDC said about 200 cases of the strain of salmonella linked to the eggs were reported weekly during June and July, four times the normal number of such occurrences. State health officials say tainted eggs have sickened at least 266 Californians and seven in Minnesota. The eggs were

distributed around the country and packaged under the names Lucerne, Albertson, Mountain Dairy, Ralph's, Boomsma's, Sunshine, Hillandale, Trafficanda, Farm Fresh, Shoreland, Lund, Dutch Farms and Kemp.

He said that almost 2,000 cases of the strain of salmonella linked with the eggs were reported between May and July, and that's about 1,300 more than usual. She said the outbreak could have been prevented if new rules to ensure egg safety had been in place a few months earlier. They were put in place in July.

Food and Drug Administration investigators have yet to determine the cause of the salmonella outbreaks at Wright County Egg and Hillandale Farms. Feinberg also ran the government compensation fund created after the 9/11 attacks, and there was a similar no-sue provision. Topic: PEW STUDY ON IMMIGRATION

Synopsis: The annual inflow of unauthorized immigrants to the United States was nearly two-thirds smaller in the March 2007 to March 2009 period than it had been from March 2000 to March 2005, according to new estimates by the Pew Hispanic Center, a project of the Pew Research Center. This sharp decline has contributed to an overall reduction of 8% in the number of unauthorized immigrants currently living in the U.S.-to 11.1 million in March 2009 from a peak of 12 million in March 2007, according to the estimates. The decrease represents the first significant reversal in the growth of this population over the past two decades.

Synopsis: An outbreak of salmonella illnesses linked to shell eggs has prompted a nationwide recall of 13 popular egg brands produced by an lowa company and triggered a multi-state investigation that is expected to grow, federal health officials said Tuesday. So far, clusters of illnesses linked to eggs have been confirmed in at least three states, California, Colorado and Minnesota, the Centers for Disease Control said. But the agency is looking into a four-fold spike in reported cases of salmonella Enteritidis with a

particular genetic fingerprint in late June and early July, said Lola Russell a CDC spokeswoman. In addition, many states have reported increases in the specific pattern since May. That could indicate perhaps hundreds of illnesses tied to the outbreak, Russell said.

Synopsis: President Barack Obama will ask Congress Wednesday to increase and permanently extend a tax credit for business research as a way of boosting job growth, an administration official said Sunday. The proposal would cost \$100 billion over 10 years, and Obama would pay for the plan by closing other corporate tax breaks, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity. Obama will call on Congress to increase to 17 percent from 14 percent one of two credit options available to businesses, the official said.

Synopsis: President Barack Obama is asking Congress to approve at least \$50 billion in long-term investments in the nation's roads, railways and runways in a pre-election effort to show he's trying to stimulate the sputtering economy. With November's elections for control of Congress approaching, Obama planned to discuss the proposal later Monday at a Labor Day event in Milwaukee. The proposals would require congressional approval, which is highly uncertain at a time when many legislators and voters are worried about adding to federal deficits that are already sky-high. Even if lawmakers could pass a bill in the short window between their return to Capitol Hill in mid-September and the elections, it's unlikely the spending would give the economy a significant boost by the time voters head to the polls.

Synopsis: Very timely Justice Department data show that Immigration Judges are declining substantially fewer requests for asylum. Denial rates have reached the lowest level in the last quarter of a century according to a new analysis by the Transactional Records Access Clearinghouse (TRAC). This was one of many new findings to emerge from TRAC's fifth annual monitoring report focusing on the processing of asylum requests by these specialized courts. In FY 1986, almost 9 out of 10 (89%) of such requests were declined. During the first nine months of FY 2010, only half (50%) were turned down. The analysis of hundreds of thousands of case-by-case records also found that the total number of asylum requests has been falling, that a higher proportion of asylum seekers are now represented by counsel, and that judge-to-judge disparities in denial rates remain a pervasive problem.

Synopsis: President Barack Obama, fighting to keep Democrats in charge of Congress, said Wednesday the United States could not afford to extend Bush-era tax cuts for the rich and accused Republicans of being fiscally irresponsible. On a campaign trip to Ohio roughly two months before Nov. 2 midterm elections, Obama admitted his economic policies had not worked as quickly as hoped, but said his party and proposals were still better placed to boost the U.S. economy. Obama's comments, laced with political rhetoric, came amid a growing verbal battle with Republicans over tax cuts for wealthy Americans enacted under former President George W. Bush and set to expire at the end of this year.

Synopsis: "We were not about apportioning fault or blame," BP Plc's top safety official told reporters as the company released its internal investigation into the world's worst offshore oil spill. But lawyers involved in oil spill lawsuits say the 193-page report into the deadly April 20 explosion of the Deepwater Horizon rig in the Gulf of Mexico sets the stage for court battles between BP and its top contractors.

Topic: ILLEGAL IMMIGRANT CRACKDOWN

Synopsis: A federal appeals court has largely upheld a ruling that Hazleton, Pa., may not enforce its crackdown on illegal immigrants. The decision Thursday by an appeals court deals a blow to regulations that inspired copycat measures around the nation, including Arizona. The northeastern Pennsylvania city had sought to deny business permits to companies that employ illegal immigrants, fine landlords who rent to them and require legal tenants to register and pay for a rental permit. Hispanic groups and illegal immigrants had sued to overturn the laws, saying they usurped the federal government's exclusive power to regulate immigration. The laws were never enforced.

Synopsis: The Obama administration is changing the federal immigration enforcement strategy in ways that reduce the threat of deportation for millions of illegal immigrants, even as states such as Arizona, Colorado, Virginia, Ohio and Texas are pushing to accelerate deportations. The changes focus enforcement on immigrants who have committed serious crimes, an effort to unclog immigration courts and detention centers. A record backlog of deportation cases has forced immigrants to wait an average 459 days for their hearings, according to an Aug. 12 report by Syracuse University Transactional Records Access Clearinghouse (TRAC), which analyzes government data.

The act allows young people who attend college or join the military to become legal U.S. residents. Synopsis: Toyota Motor Corp. has moved to dismiss hundreds of lawsuits over claims stemming from sudden acceleration in its vehicles. The auto giant filed a motion Tuesday with a federal court in Santa Ana, saying attorneys for Toyota drivers had failed to identify any defects in the vehicles. Hundreds of lawsuits were filed against Toyota after the automaker began recalling millions of vehicles because of acceleration problems in several models and brake glitches with the Prius hybrid. All of the federal cases were consolidated and assigned to a federal judge in Santa Ana. Some plaintiffs claimed Toyota's electronic throttle control system has a defect. On Tuesday, lawyers for Toyota said there was no evidence of a flaw.

Synopsis: Rep. Luis V. Gutierrez (D-IL) will be joined by Sen. Robert Menendez (D-NJ) and Rep. Nydia Velázquez (D-NY) at the White House for a meeting with President Barack Obama. They plan to discuss immigration reform strategy and the plan the three Members of Congress laid out today at a Capitol Hill rally. The plan includes a vote in the coming weeks in the Senate on the DREAM Act immigration bill, the introduction of a Senate comprehensive immigration reform bill, a call for a halt to the deportation of non-criminal immigrants, and changes to federal policy related to state and local police enforcement of civil immigration law. Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-NV) announced Tuesday that there would be a clean up or down vote on the DREAM Act to in the Senate as part of the Defense Department Reauthorization Bill expected on the Senate floor next week. Sen. Menendez announced earlier today that he intends to introduce a comprehensive immigration reform bill in the Senate as soon as possible

and Reps. Velázquez and Gutierrez joined Sen. Menendez in announcing these concrete steps towards passage of immigration reform this year.

Synopsis: FedEx says it expects "moderate growth" in the global economy going forward. But the world's second-largest courier service also says it will cut 17-hundred full-time workers and close about 100 facilities as it consolidates two of its divisions. In its quarterly earnings report released this morning, the company said net income was up more than 110-percent over the same quarter a year ago rising to 380-million. FedEx's top executive cited "improved global economic conditions" as one factor boosting demand for shipping services. FedEx is viewed as an economic bellwether because of its size and global presence.

Synopsis: The White House is pushing back against criticism of its \$814 billion economic stimulus bill and highlighting scores of projects that it says are creating jobs and turning around a weak economy. With unemployment at nearly 10 percent, Republicans argue that the stimulus has been a costly failure. A new White House report highlights projects ranging from the rehabilitation of the Staten Island Ferry Terminal in New York at a cost of \$175 million to building a new highway in Nelsonville, Ohio, to help freight traffic get through Appalachia. Ohio's Department of Transportation is using \$138 million in stimulus money on that project.

Synopsis: A permanent cement plug sealed BP's well nearly 2.5 miles below the sea floor in the Gulf of Mexico, five agonizing months after an explosion sank a drilling rig and led to the worst offshore oil spill in U.S. history. Retired Coast Guard Adm. Thad Allen, the federal government's point man on the disaster, said Sunday BP's well "is effectively dead." Allen said a pressure test to ensure the cement plug would hold was completed. He said the federal Bureau of Ocean Energy Management Regulation and Enforcement has confirmed that the cementing operation was successful.

Topic: COURT TO HEAR ARIZONA IMMIGRATION APPEAL NOV. 1

Synopsis: A federal appeals court says it will hear arguments Nov. 1 in Arizona Gov. Jan Brewer's appeal of a ruling that put parts of the state's new immigration law on hold. Brewer asked the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco to reverse the ruling that arose out of a lawsuit by the U.S. Justice Department. Her lawyers say a judge erred by accepting speculation that the law might burden legal immigrants and by concluding that the federal government would likely prevail. Justice Department attorneys argue that the law that was designed to draw local police into the fight against illegal immigration is disrupting the United States' relations with Mexico and other countries and that the state law is trumped by federal law.

Topic: DISTRACTED DRIVING DEATHS FALL IN 2009

Synopsis: The number of people killed in car crashes connected to driver distraction declined last year but the government said the problem remains an epidemic for motorists in the U.S. The Transportation Department said Monday that 5,474 people were killed in 2009 in crashes reported to have involved distracted driving, a 6 percent decline from the 5,838 people killed in 2008. Distraction-related deaths accounted for 16 percent of all traffic fatalities in 2009, the same percentage as in 2008. The latest data came as the overall number of highway deaths dropped last year to its lowest level since 1950. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood said the problem of drivers failing to keep their eyes on the road -- often because of mobile devices, cell phones or other forms of distraction -- remained an epidemic.

Topic: ECONOMIC PANEL SAYS RECESSION ENDED IN JUNE 2009

Synopsis: The longest recession the country has endured since World War II ended in June 2009, according to a group that dates the beginning and end of recessions. The National Bureau of Economic Research, a panel of academic economists based in Cambridge, Mass., says the recession lasted 18 months. It started in December 2007 and ended in June 2009. Previously the longest postwar downturns were those in 1973-1975 and in 1981-1982. Both of those lasted 16 months. NBER's end date for the recession was consistent with the thinking of many private economists. The economy started growing again in the July-to-September quarter of 2009, after a record four straight quarters of decline.

Topic: DREAM ACT SENATE VOTE

Synopsis: Senate Republicans filibustered the defense authorization bill Tuesday afternoon, ending a push by Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-Nev.) to pass the DREAM Act which would provide legal status to some undocumented immigrants in exchange for school or military service, and a repeal of Don't Ask, Don't Tell as amendments to the legislation. The defense authorization bill has been passed for the past 48 consecutive years. It failed to move to the Senate floor today in a 56-43 vote, with no "yea" votes by Republicans. The main argument marshaled against continuing with the defense bill was that both Don't Ask, Don't Tell repeal and the DREAM Act have too little relevance to defense.

Topic: DON'T ASK DON'T TELL MILITARY

Synopsis: The U.S. Senate Tuesday blocked a measure that would let homosexuals serve openly in the military, in a setback for one of President Barack Obama's policy goals. Sixty votes were needed for debate to begin on the bill authorizing defense programs and repeal of the policy known as "don't ask, don't tell." Just 56 senators voted yes and 43 no, but the measure will probably have another chance this year.

Synopsis: Republican candidate Susana Martinez said that she will repeal the law that allows illegal immigrants to have drivers license and will revoke the licenses that have been issued. The Democratic candidate also supports the cancelation of the drivers' license. The immigration issue plays an important role in this race.

Topic: MEDICARE COSTS

Synopsis: Elderly and disabled Americans enrolled in private Medicare health insurance plans will pay slightly lower premiums in 2011 while gaining more benefits from recently passed healthcare reforms, U.S. health officials said Tuesday. The plans, called Medicare Advantage, are offered by health insurance companies as an alternative to traditional, government fee-for-service Medicare. Rates are expected to be 1 percent lower next year than in 2010, the government's Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) said.

Topic: TRUCK DRIVERS REGULATIONS

Synopsis: Targeting distractions behind the wheel, the Obama administration proposed Tuesday to bar truck drivers from sending text messages while hauling hazardous materials. The requirements would complement new rules being finalized by the Transportation Department that prohibit commercial bus and truck drivers from sending

text messages on the job and restrict train operators from using cell phones and mobile devices on duty.

Topic: GAY ADOPTIONS

Synopsis: A Miami appeals court has upheld a ruling overturning Florida's law banning adoption by gays. The 3rd District Court of Appeal issued its decision Wednesday affirming a lower court's decision that the ban is unconstitutional. Florida is the only state with a law flatly banning gays from adopting children without exception. Gays can be foster parents in Florida. A Miami-Dade County judge ruled the gay adoption ban unconstitutional in 2008, but the state appealed. The case will ultimately go to the state Supreme Court. Martin Gill and his male partner, along with the American Civil Liberties Union, filed the lawsuit in their attempt to adopt two brothers who have been their foster children since December 2004.

Topic: HEALTH CARE REFORM LATEST

Synopsis: Some changes won't apply to plans that are considered "grandfathered" under the law, meaning they existed when the law was signed March 23 and haven't substantially changed. Those plans are supposed to notify policyholders of their grandfathered status, Tolbert said. Once plans make a substantial change - such as significantly raising co-payments or significantly reducing benefits or the amount an employer contributes - they are no longer grandfathered. The Thursday changes are designed to help consumers between now and 2014, when the most significant provisions of the health law take effect. That's when new health insurance marketplaces, called exchanges, will be created and most Americans will be required to purchase insurance.

Synopsis: Amid continued public confusion over what's in it, some provisions of President Barack Obama's health care overhaul take effect today, including an end to lifetime caps on medical costs. Also, some preventive care will no longer require copayments. Consumers whose insurance plan year begins Jan. 1 will have to wait until then for these changes.

Synopsis: President Barack Obama says the U.S. will offer help to those developing nations that commit to democracy and economic revival. But Obama, speaking to world leaders gathered at the United Nations, offered no new commitments of U.S. dollars to developing nations. Obama has told world leaders at the U.N. that Iran must prove to the world that its nuclear program is for peaceful purposes.

Synopsis: About five million cans of Similac powdered infant formula are being recalled. Abbott Laboratories says a beetle was found in the product made at a manufacturing plant in Michigan. The recall includes certain Similac powder that comes in 8-ounce, 12.4-ounce, and 12.9-ounce cans. None of the liquid formula is affected. The company has stopped production and shipment of the affected formula, and the plant is being fumigated. The FDA said that if anyone ate this type of beetle, it could irritate the G-I tract, causing a loss of appetite.

Topic: FDA DIABETES DRUG AVANDIA

Synopsis: The FDA announced it's putting major restrictions on the use of the diabetes drug Avandia. It can now be used only by patients with Type 2 diabetes whose condition hasn't been helped by other medications. The drug has been linked to raised risks of heart attack and stroke. But its maker, GlaxoSmithKline, has long defended it as safe and a necessary option for people with diabetes. Also Thursday, the European Medicines Agency recommended that Avandia be taken off the market. To go into effect, the decision must be ratified by the European Commission. Avandia had sales of nearly 1.2 billion dollars last year.

Synopsis: House Republicans are reaching out to discontented voters with a 21-page plan of action. They unveiled their "Pledge to America" today at a suburban Washington hardware store. It promises to cut taxes and spending, reduce government regulation, repeal the new health care law and end the president's stimulus program. It pledges to "put government on a path to a balanced budget," without specifying how it will do that. The unveiling capped a private debate among Republicans who wanted a public agenda and those who worried it would open their candidates to criticism.

Synopsis: Democrats controlling Congress are sending President Barack Obama a long-delayed bill to help struggling small businesses with easier credit and give them other incentives to expand and to hire new workers. It establishes a \$30 billion government fund to help Main Street banks lend to small businesses and cut taxes on both big and small

businesses. The legislation is aimed at easing a small-business credit crunch that worsened dramatically after the financial crisis two years ago.

The new regulations that would be sent to Congress next year would affect American and foreign companies that provide communications services inside the U.S. It would require service providers to make the plain text of encrypted conversations -- over the phone, computer or e-mail -- readily available to law enforcement, according to federal officials and analysts.


