Some people have a predisposition to addiction and can't control their use whether its drugs or alcohol. In the U.S. 1 in 10 people have alcoholism and in Luzerne County its 1 in 9. We have one of the highest rates of alcoholism in the county. Studies from the police force have shown that on a typical Friday or Saturday night on the road 1 out of 3 cars have drivers that are legally drunk. She talks about heroin and how it has become so prevalent in our community. Has to do with economics. The average user in our community is young Caucasian ages 18-30 from upper class families and they are mostly females. Keep your prescriptions locked up because teenagers are and have always been curious.

Denison House, is a historic home located at 35 Denison Street in Forty Fort, Luzerne County, Pennsylvania. It was built about 1790, and is a 2 1/2-story, frame building with a central chimney in the New England style. A rear addition and full-width front porch were added in the mid-19th century. It was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1970. Today we take a walking tour with our docents throughout the various rooms to see what life was like 200 years ago in the Wyoming Valley. We discover how important Nathan Denison was as a founding father of the Wyoming Valley and a patriot of the Revolutionary War. In part 5, we see the boys bedroom, take a closer look at their clothes and the bed and how it was made. We visit the girls room and we see 2 photos of the daughters Mary and Sarah. We see some of the furniture such as a clothes chest and a vanity. No surviving image of Nathan Denison has ever been found. There is an attic that they can describe to us but it is not part of the tour.
