How what we eat, drink, medicines we take, affect our brains and therefore, ourselves.

Among his many messages about how better understanding our brains can mean a more productive and just world...Dr. Eagleman is putting that knowledge to work in the realm of criminal justice. He heads the Center for Science and Law, a national non-profit working to better our criminal justice and corrections systems by understanding brain damage and illness in crime and rehabilitation.

Our guest today is Doctor Anna Lembke, Chief of the Addiction Medicine Dual Diagnosis Clinic at Stanford. She's written a book on the prescription addiction crisis called 'Drug Dealer, M.D.': How Doctors Were Duped, Patients Got Hooked, and Why It's So Hard To Stop.

Surprising his staff and department heads a few days ago, president trump said that an emergency declaration on the national opioid crisis would be coming out this next week.

You may remember Mr.Trump also promised an emergency declaration in August which was supposed to include a plan to tackle the drug epidemic.

Politico has reported that federal health officials were blindsided by the President's unexpected announcement and are now scrambling to develop a plan. But funding for, and the type and reach of an plan remain unclear...

Other impediments to implementing an emergency declaration on the opioid crisis include empty desks at several top administration departments, which would have to be involved in the implementation:

The health department is without a secretary. Tom Price resigned last month after spending more than \$1 million in taxpayer money on private and government planes for travel.

The ACTING Director of the Drug Enforcement Administration ...Chuck Rosenberg...resigned last month in protest of the president's statements including those condoning police roughing up prisoners.

Mr. Trump's nominee to lead the Department of Homeland Security has not yet been confirmed. This is the department, which would work to stop the flow of illegal drugs including opiods...

And, the president's choice to head up the Office of National Drug Control Policy, Rep. Tom Marino , withdrew his nomination amid reports, including this network's program 60 Minutes, that he may have actually helped fuel the opioid crisis through a 2014 bill he introduced designed to make it harder for the DEA to stop distribution to drug abusers.

But, whether or not an emergency declaration is announced this week, any plan to tackle this health crisis must acknowledge how it began... and be willing to do what it would take to get a grip on what the Centers for Disease Control call an epidemic....

We spoke with Doctor Anna Lembke... Chief of the Addiction Medicine Dual Diagnosis Clinic at Stanford. She's written a book on the prescription addiction crisis called 'Drug Dealer, M.D.': How Doctors Were Duped, Patients Got Hooked, and Why It's So Hard To Stop.

Today she discusses; the drug industry's lie that opioids were not addictive when selling them to the medical community; doctor's reluctance to say no to patients asking for pain mediation; lack of help for patients addicted and in need of alternative pain mitigation; and poor response from the government in recognizing the epidemic.

If you are on social media, at all... odds are your favorite platform was the target of a first rate grilling in Washington DC this past week...

Legal representatives from Google, Facebook and Twitter were called to testify before Congress about their platforms being used by Russia in a disinformation campaign that likely influenced the 2016 Presidential election...

Were you the target of any of those ads or postings? Might they have influenced your choice?

How do you, as a content consumer, tell if what you're reading...and passing along to your online friends and followers is legitimate and truthful information?

And, who should be responsible for this... if anyone? Does it fall under free speech? Should it be legislated... or should the private for-profit social media firms be liable for how their product is used?

#### **ISSUE:** Iran Protests

Decades-long economic disparity, and an oppressive religious governmental structure has pushed Iran into widespread social unrest... deeper and more far-reaching than we've seen before. As the young people and working class of the country take to the streets against their ruling parties... those in control claim the protests are the work of Iran's enemies, like the U-S, Israel and Saudi Arabia... fomenting the unrest.

During a Friday UN Security Council meeting called by the US to address the situation in Iran, the Iranian Ambassador to the UN accused the US of abusing its power in the security council...basically saying the US should butt out of what is an internal affair and should be outside the mandate of the UN.

Meanwhile, some crucial deadlines related to the Iran nuclear dear are just days away... with mixed messages coming from the trump administration. The president continues to threaten US withdrawal from the multi-national deal...but his Secretary of State is hinting at a legislative move to solve the situation.

Any new sanctions like abandoning the nuclear deal would further injure an already drowning Iranian economy.

Certainly the U-S, and other nations, have an interest in the internal affairs of Iran and its influence in the region... but one of our most noted local scholars on the nation says what's happening in his homeland, with its people, is being driven internally...by a citizenry hungry to realize its full potential.

Our guest on In Depth is Doctor Abbas Milani... He joined us from Stanford University where he is the Director of Iranian Studies and co-Director of the Iran democracy Project at the Hoover Institution.
