ISSUE: Iran Protests

Decades-long economic disparity, and an oppressive religious governmental structure has pushed Iran into widespread social unrest... deeper and more far-reaching than we've seen before. As the young people and working class of the country take to the streets against their ruling parties... those in control claim the protests are the work of Iran's enemies, like the U-S, Israel and Saudi Arabia... fomenting the unrest.

During a Friday UN Security Council meeting called by the US to address the situation in Iran, the Iranian Ambassador to the UN accused the US of abusing its power in the security council...basically saying the US should butt out of what is an internal affair and should be outside the mandate of the UN.

Meanwhile, some crucial deadlines related to the Iran nuclear deal are just days away... with mixed messages coming from the trump administration. The president continues to threaten US withdrawal from the multi-national deal...but his Secretary of State is hinting at a legislative move to solve the situation.

Any new sanctions like abandoning the nuclear deal would further injure an already drowning Iranian economy.

Certainly the U-S, and other nations, have an interest in the internal affairs of Iran and

its influence in the region... but one of our most noted local scholars on the nation says what's happening in his homeland, with its people, is being driven internally...by a citizenry hungry to realize its full potential.

HOW NRA Money Stymies Legislative Solutions to America's Gun Violence Problem

Daniel Newman, President and Co-Founder of Maplight.org... a non-profit, non-partisan research organization that tracks money's influence on politics and public policy.

The horror of last Wednesday's mass school shooting in Florida continues to be revealed through details from those who survived it, and the funerals and mourning by family and friends of those who did not. Yet... here we are again, with nothing changed.

Today we explore one of the reasons being blamed for the political impasse on curbing America's gun violence epidemic... the unlimited and unidentifiable flow of money into and out of, the National Rifle Association, or NRA.

We are joined once again on InDepth by DANIEL NEWMAN, PRESIDENT AND CO-FOUNDER OF MAPLIGHT.ORG, a non-partisan research organization that tracks money's influence on politics and public policy.

You can use maplight.org to research any legislative topic, any legislator's voting record and any donor or lobby group and connect the money dots.

The influence of money on politics and gun policy has stymied public health studies of gun violence as well...something the medical community is pushing back against.

To explain that part of the issue, here's a portion of the discussion with UCSF's Doctor Andrew Bindman following the Las Vegas Mass shooting that left 58 people dead and 422 injured by gunfire... the worst mass shooting in US history, and that was just 4 short months ago:

Dr. Bindman is Professor of medicine, researcher and medical practitioner at Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital, and part of the Phillip R Lee Institute for Health Policy Studies.

The past two weeks have brought more indictments from Special Counsel Robert Mueller and his team of investigators trying to get to the bottom of Russia's campaign if disinformation and hacking during the 2016 presidential election... and who, if anyone, particularly in the Trump campaign, colluded in the effort.

New charges have been filed against former Trump campaign chair Paul Manafort, and his close associate Rick Gates has accepted a plea deal in exchange for cooperation... and 13 Russians and 3 companies were included in a sweeping indictment which outlined a vast network dedicated to pushing false and divisive information over social media.

You may remember that the heads and legal representatives of Google Facebook and Twitter got a first rate grilling in Washington DC in November... about their platforms being used by Russia's disinformation campaign that likely influenced the 2016 Presidential election...

Were you the target of any of those ads or postings? Might they have influenced your choice?

How do you, as a content consumer, tell if what you're reading...and passing along to your online friends and followers....is legitimate and truthful information?

Who should be responsible for this... if anyone? Does it fall under free speech? Should it be legislated... or should the private for-profit social media firms be liable for how their product is used?

In another big step forward in medical technology... CRISPR Gene Editing is ready for testing in humans...as early as this year.

In a very oversimplified explanation, the CRISPER technology can edit out

damaging genes that cause disease. Incredible news with the potential of improving and saving lives.

According to a report this week in the Financial Times, 2 biotech companies, one Swiss and one American, are applying for FDA permission to test gene editing on people with certain blood diseases and blindness.

When you consider that mapping the human genome was only completed in 1990, and the CRISPR-Cas9 gene-editing technology was first demonstrated only 5 years ago... the pace of advancement is break-neck.

It was only this past summer that CRISPR was used for the first time in the US to alter the genetic make-up of a large number of single-cell human embryos.

None of the edited embryos was allowed to develop and was never intended to be implanted.

But... it's this part of new medical technology that sparks fears ... that we're opening a Pandora's Box leading to so-called designer babies.

Reproductive technology is already a burgeoning global industry... and one without any consistent oversight to keep up with its rapid development. This is a big concern of this week's guest on In Depth... particularly the rights of the children brought into the world through the wonders of science, including multiple-parent surrogacy..., which is thriving in the U-S, and specifically California where laws are quite permissible.

Dr. Mary Ann Mason is Professor of the Graduate School of Law at UC Berkeley, and a Faculty Affiliate of the Berkeley Center for Law & Technology. Her area of expertise is child and family law and policy... an author of several books, her latest, co-authored with Tom Eckman, is **BABIES OF TECHNOLOGY: Assisted Reproduction and Rights of the Child**.
