Keep constant communication with your landlord or mortgage company, she says. She talked about the effect of the governor's order that no one could be evicted for 90 days. (you'll still have to pay at the end) She also discussed the order of importance for paying bills—starting off with housing first.

**Topic:** Rappahannock Area Health District Acting Director Dr. Don Stern talked about staying safe. The need to wash hands, to social distance, and the need to wear a facemask. Dr. Stern says you wear a facemask for others, not yourself. He talked about who usually gets the virus and the need to protect them. He discussed his early discussions with schools about the fall. Dr. Stern says the disease is endemic, meaning it won't be boxed in and instead we must learn to live with it.
