Starting off In the Friendly City this morning...---

A Wheeling Park high school student has tested positive for COVID-19 who was participating in the athletic reconditioning program.

However, Ohio County Schools' Assistant Superintendent says their reconditioning safety plan has minimized the risk to other students.

Due to their policy of working in small pods, the student only came in contact with about eight or nine other people.

West Virginians are also being warned that the Mountain State is particularly vulnerable to the virus.

A new study names it the most at-risk state out of all of them.

Nearly half of those older than 18 have a chronic medical condition, which puts them into a higher risk category.

That's in addition to the relatively older population of West Virginia.

But COVID-19 is also a risk for younger generations, as people under 50 *have* become severely ill or died even if it isn't as common.

Starting today, you can remove your front license plate on your car if you live in Ohio.

A bill signed into law by the governor allows most drivers to only have rear plates.

But if you drive a commercial tractor, the plate still has to be on the front of the vehicle.

The Department of Public Safety reminds drivers that improperly displaying the back license plate is a misdemeanor and a strict liability offense.

All of the states bordering Ohio also do not require a front plate.

Starting off in the buckeye state this morning!

The Ohio State Highway Patrol says we're already in the Fourth of July reporting period--- which means they'll be cracking down on impaired drivers.

They say they have a zero-tolerance policy as part of the national 'Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over' campaign.

The days surrounding the Fourth of July holiday last year saw 16 fatal crashes, seven of which involved alcohol or drugs.

That's not including more than 700 O-V-I arrests made during the same time.

You can call pound 6-7-7 if you see an impaired driver on the road.

Ohio Congressman Bill Johnson says he has a plan to close the so-called digital divide. He has introduced the Wireless Broadband and Efficient Deployment Act to improve access to high-speed internet in rural areas.

In a statement he says the legislation will make broadband expansion more efficient from a regulation standpoint.

He added that the economic growth of eastern Ohio depends on faster internet access.

LOOKING TO THE BUCKEYE STATE NOW--

Cleveland officials are condemning gun violence after 20 people were shot and three killed over this Fourth of July holiday weekend. Police say a 57-year-old man, a 50-year-old man and a 47-year-old man were killed in shootings between 8 P-M Saturday and 5 A-M Sunday. Other victims included an 8-year-old girl shot in the arm while sitting in the back seat of a car. City officials say there was quote "no excuse for this violent activity" and police "are actively pursuing the perpetrators."

Face coverings are now required for West Virginians in all indoor places where social distancing cannot be maintained. If you go into work, from now on, the Governor is expecting you to wear a face mask when you walk in. But there are exceptions. If you work in an office with no one else or if everyone is completely social distanced, the Governor says you can take your masks off. You must wear a mask anytime you get up from your desk. Even in a retail store, a restaurant, or a bar, the Governor is urging you to wear some type of face covering.

GOOD NEWS THIS MORNING ---

The Wheeling Park Commission is announcing the grand opening of their new Community Education Center today at 11. Located at Wheeling Park, the center will house classrooms, satellite offices and headquarters for a number of organizations. Wheeling Country Day School will serve as their first community partner. STAYING IN OHIO COUNTY –

Just weeks ago, an elderly woman was struck and killed on Washington Avenue. Deceased 90-year-old Jean Och (OAK) was said to be jaywalking in the intersection and the driver was not charged. But this heavily trafficked area is frequently used by locals as a convenient spot to reach popular hubs and neighborhoods. So now relatives of Och want change, believing this intersection at least needs crosswalks to save others from a similar fate. After a 90-year-old woman was struck and killed by a car several weeks ago on Washington Avenue, her family went before city council to seek changes. City Manager Robert Herron said in the meeting that a crosswalk will come soon but some say that is not enough. This issue is not new with several residents coming before the board with the same concerns just two years ago. However, this time, council seems to hear and agree that something must be done. LOOKING TO THE BUCKEYE STATE –

Ohio Governor Mike DeWine has issued mandatory masks for the seven counties listed at level three under the state's Public Health Advisory System INCLUDING Franklin, Hamilton, Butler, Montgomery, Cuyahoga and Trumbull. The mandate requires people ages ten and up to wear masks in any indoor location that is not a residence. The order also calls for mandatory face coverings when outdoors and at least six feet of distance cannot be maintained. So far, public reactions have been mix to the new mandate. The executive order for those seven counties goes into effect tonight at 6.

GOOD NEWS THIS MORNING—

We finally have an opening date for the new sports complex at the highlands. On Saturday, August 1st, officials are holding a grand opening event that is free and open to the public. The complex features six basketball courts, a turf field, arcade, and many other amenities. A fitness center and outdoor adventure course are expected to arrive next year. Governor Justice has set a target date for reopening schools in West Virginia. September 8th is the plan right now, but it all depends on how things develop between now and then. In Wednesday's briefing, he also addressed questions regarding his statewide mask mandate that went into effect Tuesday. Critics say the mandatory mask order may need fines and penalties to force people to comply.

School officials in Ohio are also facing difficult decisions about the upcoming academic year. Some reopening guidelines set by Governor DeWine appear to be functionally impossible for many local districts. In Bridgeport, they can only fit 15 to 18 students to a classroom using the six-foot distancing rule. But with 22 to 30 in every class and no additional classrooms, there is nowhere to put the overflow. They will send out a questionnaire to parents, However, some parents have already called, saying they won't be sending their children back.

We are excited to tell you about some great programming on Sunday. Due to concerns over the Coronavirus, John Marshall and Cameron High Schools will have their graduation ceremony broadcast, instead of doing it in person. WTRF will be airing Cameron's graduation ceremony at noon Sunday on CBS. John Marshall's senior graduation will be from noon until 2 Sunday on WTRF-ABC. This video was shot in the spring, but it will be a very special moment for seniors and parents to see their graduation on air.

A new coronavirus outbreak in Wetzel and Tyler Counties has officials urging the public to cooperate with the health department. Sources report that it originated with a party in New Martinsville where 70 to 100 young people attended. Contact tracing has revealed that it's caused the virus to spread to nursing homes and area industries. The Health Department has identified 16 new cases in Wetzel County and five in Tyler, with the number expected to grow. They're asking people who want to hold a party or attend one to hold off on it and stay home instead. Prosecutors say the fine for breaking quarantine can range from 25 to 200 dollars.

The D-H-H-R in West Virginia is continuing their effort to test at-risk communities this weekend, this time in Marshall County. You can be tested at McMechen City Hall today or at the Health Department office in Moundsville tomorrow, from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. on both days. It's open to anyone living in Marshall County, even if you're not showing any symptoms. Insurance isn't required---just bring a driver's license or proof of address.

An exciting new development in Ohio County now as the Highlands Sports Complex will finally be shown off today. Commissioners and Development Authority officials will be on hand for a preview today at the new building just off of Cabela Drive. The building will reportedly have six basketball courts, an arcade and more. Just this week, officials announced that the complex will have its grand opening on August 1st. Tune in later today as we give you a look at what you can expect at the new facility.

Coronavirus testing is still available at the off-site Wheeling Hospital testing clinic, Doctor's Urgent Care and MedExpress.

7News spoke with store managers at the Highlands to see if customers were complying with the Governor's mandatory mask mandate.

All retailers say they're strongly encouraging customers to wear a face covering.

The manager at Cabela's says 90 percent of customers have been wearing a mask, and the store has been encouraging customers to wear one, but not enforcing it.

Now several wrongful death lawsuits and a congressional investigation will aim to find out why she was ever hired in the first place.

With more than four-thousand new covid cases reported across Ohio in the last three days, Governor Mike DeWine says he is **still** considering a statewide order.

Nearly 60-percent of the state's population is currently under a mask mandate but the governor says that number could grow this week.

As a coronavirus crisis approaches the Buckeye State, he continues to urge Ohioans to take immediate action before its too late.

And a large crowd gathering over the weekend earned one bar a citation in Belmont County.

The Ohio Investigative Unit cited the Riverside Restaurant and Bar in Powhatan Point for violating COVID-19 health orders.

The Health Department says the bar was hosting what they called a 'Jambo Party' on Friday with what they believed to be a large crowd.

The O-I-U says none of the employees were wearing masks and many of the patrons were crowded shoulder to shoulder.

IN OHIO COUNTY ---

A car has been vandalized on Wheeling Island, with tires slashed, mirrors broken, and racial slurs carved into the paint.

The owner Tevon Minor says it happened when he parked his car on North Wabash Street. Pictures of his car have since been shared around social media, prompting a GoFundMe page to be made for him.

After hearing the news, many community members felt compelled to help; rallying behind Tevon with more than 55-hundred-dollars already raised.

7News reached out the Wheeling PDt but a comment has not been given at this time.
