Quarterly Issues and Programs Report for wrpn | 1st Quarter 2024

The following is a listing of some of the significant issues responded to by the station wrpn, along with the most significant programming treatment of those issues. The listing is by no means exhaustive. The order in which the issues appear does not reflect any priority of significance.

Ripon Area Fire District/Ellen Sorensen/Community Report

The president of the Ripon Area Fire District Governing Board says the Report Card to the Community they released before the Christmas holidays is their way of informing residents about the strides they are making in improving the department. Ellen Sorensen says it shows how they moved forward, but also provides a record of what they still need to accomplish. For example they learned they needed FIT testing for the facemasks firefighters use during fires. If the mask doesn't fit well noxious fumes from burning materials could cause harm to a firefighter. The FIT testing was completed. They also updated their CO2 extinguishers and made sure their trucks and equipment were up to Department of Transportation standards. Much more is included in the report.

Fond du Lac County United Way/Amber Kilawee and Tammy Young/Big Brothers Big Sisters

One of the longest running associations the Fond du Lac County United Way has had with an agency it supports is with Big Brothers Big Sisters of Fond du Lac County. Big Brothers Executive Director Tammy Young says their priority is to match adults or "Bigs" with children or "Littles." The currently have 10 matches in the Ripon area, but there are 10 to 15 littles that need matches. Young says that they have both school-based and community-based matching. Although located in Fond du Lac they have people that will meet with potential "Bigs" at Barlow Park Elementary School. She notes there isn't a big time commitment for those who become "Bigs." Young has been a "Big" to an 11-year-old girl for the past three years.

Berlin Area School District/Emmett Durtschi/Recreational Department Formed

The Berlin Area School District has created a Community Education and Recreation Department. Berlin Schools Superintendent Emmett Durtschi says with the city of Berlin scaling back on recreational programs due to budget issues, the school district will fill that niche by opening some of its facilities to the community for recreational and educational programs. He says their motto for the programs is "B Active." They are starting out modestly by opening the pool to lap and open swim programs for only \$2. Anyone can take advantage of it whether they are community residents or not. Durtschi says with their facilities they will have all kinds of opportunities for adult programs as well. He says they can use the school kitchens for cooking classes or other classrooms for arts and crafts.

Envision Greater Fond du Lac/Amy Ries/Agricultural Showcase

Planning is still underway for the 20th Annual Fond du Lac Area Agriculture Showcase on Saturday, March 2nd. It will be from 9 am to 2 pm at the Fond du Lac County Fairgrounds Expo Building. The cost is \$5 for adults with those 10 and under getting in free. The event is hosted by the Envision Greater Fond du Lac Agri-business Council. Amy Ries is the Director of Agricultural Programs for Envision. She says it is a big year for the event since it is their twentieth anniversary. She says the \$5 you pay to get in will allow you to sample beer, wine, cheese and sausage, and enjoy the many educational activities that day. She says their

educational area will have a petting zoo, face painting, coloring for the kids and more. She also notes they usually have some presentations as well.

Fond du Lac County District Attorney/Eric Toney/Cardiac Issues

Fond du Lac County District Attorney Eric Toney says if not for the death of a friend from a heart attack in 2018 he would have ignored his own cardiac problems. Dennis Krueger was the County's Deputy District Attorney who passed away suddenly from a heart attack. Krueger lived in the Ripon/Green Lake area. Toney had open heart surgery before Thanksgiving to replace a heart valve that was destroyed a bacterial infection in his blood. He says when he began feeling fatigued and showing other symptoms he thought back on what happened to Dennis and got himself checked out. At 39-years of age and having run seven marathons Toney was used to an active lifestyle. Since his surgery he was able to run in a 5K race over the New Year's weekend.

Fond du Lac County Health Department/Johanna Brotz/Quitting Smoking

If quitting smoking or vaping was a New Year's resolution don't be disappointed if the first attempt doesn't accomplish your goal. Johanna Brotz is the Tobacco Prevention and Control Coordinator for Fond du Lac County. She says it is a hard habit to break. For that reason they recommend starting off with nicotine replacement therapies or NRT's such as patches, lozenges, and gums which they consider a harm reduction tactic. She says the NRT's are a short term solution designed to get you off tobacco and once you have then you have to ween yourself off of the NRT's. Brotz points out the Wisconsin Quit Line can be helpful and at the beginning of this year will supply you with 8 weeks of NRT's for no cost. They can be called at 1-800-QUIT-NOW, that's 1-800-784-8669.

Ripon Area Chamber of Commerce/Mandy Kimes/Ripon 175th Anniversary

Ripon Area Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Mandy Kimes says 2024 is a special year for the City of Ripon. She says the city will be celebrating its 175th Anniversary. Kimes says they will be doing some special things throughout the course of the year to mark the special benchmark for the city. She says there are a lot of anniversaries for a variety of organizations this year. That includes the Kiwanis Club celebrating their 100th anniversary, the Historical Society is celebrating their 125th, and the Little White School House turns 170. Kimes says they may also incorporate some of the City's history into a learning opportunity at the schools.

Fond du Lac County Health Department/Kim Mueller/Respiratory Illnesses

Fond du Lac County Public Health Officer Kim Mueller says they have seen an uptick in respiratory viruses. She says that's particularly true of COVID-19, the flu, and RSV cases. Mueller says that is not really surprising as we spend more time indoors during the winter months. She says each is highly contagious and many people have had influenza at one time or another during their lives. Mueller notes all three respiratory illnesses will probably continue to peak over the next three weeks and typically the flu peaks in February and March. She says the current flu vaccine is designed for the particular strains of influenza A and B that they are seeing. She says the good news is that in addition to flu vaccine, vaccines are also available for COVID-19 and RSV.

Ripon Area School District officials got their first reaction this week to a proposal to combine the Barlow Park Charter Elementary School and Journey Project Schools in the next school year. The contract and federal grant for Barlow Park Charter ends on June 30th. Governance Councils and staff for both schools have already talked about combining the schools and after discussions a unanimous vote resulted in pursuing the creation of one elementary school. The next step was having an engagement session with parents, which was held at Barlow Park Journey Elementary School last evening. Barlow Park Journey Principal Shawn Gartzke says parents at the meeting were receptive to the idea of combining the K-2nd Grade schools.

SSM Health/Chris Schattschneider/Getting Healthy Resolution

An athletic trainer for SSM Health Ripon Community Hospital's Wellness Center says if you made a resolution to get healthy in the New Year stick to that commitment. Chris Schattschneider says the most difficult thing about physical exercise is getting started. He says most studies show people give up on their resolutions with 30 days. He recommends putting it on your calendar and using whatever reminder or peer pressure you need to stick to it. He says it may seem daunting at first, but it will get easier if you commit to it. Schattschneider says there are physical and mental benefits. He says he's also seen people become more social because they are working out with others or are feeling better about themselves.

Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office/Kevin Galske/Winter Driving Safety

Fond du Lac County's Chief Deputy Sheriff says if your vehicle slides off the road during a snowstorm stay with it until help comes. Kevin Galske says they already had two vehicles slide off the road within the first few hours of when the storm started today. He recommends having an emergency kit in your vehicle to sustain you until help arrives. He says it is important to stay in your vehicle if you can so you aren't accidentally struck by another motorist who might not see you or is distracted by the accident. He recommends safety flares, a safety kit, making sure you have enough gas, and have a cell phone to call for a tow truck or help. He says he's worked accidents where a tow truck got hit by another vehicle because that driver got distracted by the accident.

Rosendale Brandon School District/Wayne Weber/Rebranding Effort

The Rosendale-Brandon School District has decided to use the Laconia name for all of their schools when they consolidate down from four to two schools. The district name will remain Rosendale-Brandon, but the schools will be named Laconia Element, Laconia Middle School, and Laconia High School. District Superintendent Wayne Weber says they are also keeping the Spartan nickname but had to decide on the logo. They had a survey for that too which narrowed choices down from a field of twelve. Weber says as they were going through their building, they found they had a variety of different Spartan logos, he says they need to have one for consistency. The school board tonight reviews the final four choices for the logo.

Girl Scouts/Missy Brozek/Girl Scout Cookie Sale

The Girl Scout Cookie Program is underway and runs through March 31st. Missy Brozek of the Girl Scouts of the Northwestern Great Lakes, which covers 58 counties in Wisconsin and Michigan's Upper Peninsula, says there will be no increase in prices this year. They will remain at \$5 a box or \$6 if you prefer gluten free. She says selling the cookies has changed a little over the years and they still do door-to-door sales and set up booths at grocery stores, but they also have online or digital platforms for sales. All net proceeds from cookie sales stay local. Brozek says that pays for things like Girl Scout camps, travel experiences, Girl Scout properties, and they have a financial program for families of Girl Scouts who might not be able to pay for memberships, uniforms, or to go to camp.

U.S. Government/Senator Ron Johnson/Federal Budget

U.S. Senator Ron Johnson voted for two previous continuing resolutions to avoid a government shutdown but didn't support the one approved last week that continues funding the government until March 1st. He believes they will be right back in another 30 days being asked to approve another continuing resolution. He says Senator Majority Leader Chuck Schumer hasn't brought any appropriation bills to the Senate and that the New York Democrat wants a big omnibus spending bill loaded up with pork barrel spending, which Johnson says he will not support. Johnson had co-sponsored the Preventing Government Shutdown Act which would have been similar to what Wisconsin does continuing to fund government at the same level as the previous year until a new budget is passed. It went nowhere.

Winnebago County Government/Jacob Floam/Capital Improvement Plan

The Winnebago County Board of Supervisors recently passed its 5-year Capital Improvement Plan. Supervisor Jacob Floam says typically they end up borrowing \$10 million to get a year's projects done. This year they may end up borrowing more because they also need to replace an old firehouse at Wittman

Regional Airport in Oshkosh. It is the oldest current firehouse in town and they also need to purchase a new fire truck for the station. The county will use some of its American Rescue Plan Act funds offset the cost of the firehouse and truck. Floam says they also included a facilities study in the plan which will be performed in-house. He points out that some of their legacy buildings like the County Administration Building and Human Services also are in need repairs.

Fond du Lac County United Way/Amber Kilawee/Ride United

The Fond du Lac County United Way is expanding its Ride United program to the Ripon area. United Way Executive Director Amber Kilawee says the national United Way program launched the program at the beginning of the pandemic as a way of getting people around to necessary medical or other appointments if transportation was a challenge for them. In the Fond du Lac area they have provided bus tokens, cab vouchers, and even gas cards for the program. Kilawee says they are just starting the program in Ripon and have gotten the school district involved to get people to appointments, get to school, get home, to after school, and extracurricular activities. She says Ride United isn't meant to take someone to work, but there are plenty of acceptable reasons.

City of Ripon/Adam Sonntag/Ripon Public Works Building

The Ripon Common Council this week got an update on the progress of the Department of Public Works Project. Project Manager Trevor Frank told them design work is 60 percent complete. Franks informed them they will be looking at a building just under 40,000 square feet in size. Bids will be let in May with construction starting in June. City Administrator Adam Sonntag says due to materials price volatility the cost has gone up since design work began. He says in the last six months the estimated cost has increased \$100,000 to \$200,000, but they are still hoping to keep the overall cost at \$10 to \$11 million. Sonntag says the build itself will take up to a year-and-a-half. They hope to move in by the beginning of winter next year.

SSM Health/Dr Andrea Aul/Respiratory Illnesses

RSV, Flu, and COVID cases are on the increase according to a Pediatrician with SSM Health's Fond du Lac Regional Clinic. Dr. Andrea Aul sees patients at Ripon Community Hospital. She says locally they are seeing increased cases of the respiratory illnesses, but she says across the state the three illnesses have reached a moderate level. She says the good news is that there are vaccines available for all three. Aul recommends checking with your primary care physician or pharmacy about the availability of vaccine depending on which you or your child need to be vaccinated with. Dr. Aul says vaccine for RSV in particular for children is in shorter supplies.

Boys & Girls Club of the Tri-County Area/ Kassidy Walters/Wearin' and \$harin'

people. But prices go up on February 7th. All proceeds raised will benefit the Boys & Girls Club of the Tri-County Area with sites in Berlin, Green Lake and Ripon.

Green Lake County Sheriff's Department/Matt Vande Kolk/Ice Not Safe

Green Lake County Chief Deputy Sheriff Matt Vande Kolk says with the recent thaw the ice is not safe on area lakes and water ways. Vande Kolk says during a typical winter Big Green sees a lot of ice fishing and other winter recreation. He says they also use it for cross country skiing, snowmobiling and other activities. He says it is important for people to recognize we are not having a typical winter and ice activities may not be advisable for quite some time. The Sheriff's Office does have snowmobile patrols during the winter and a couple of weekends ago did have some patrols. Vande Kolk says there were a couple of crashes, but nothing significant and no major injuries were reported. Temperatures will continue to be above freezing next week.

Fond du Lac County Government/Sam Kaufman/County Fair Stage

A couple of Fond du Lac County committees Wednesday will discuss a resolution to accept several donations for construction of a new stage at the Fond du Lac County Fairgrounds. The county had originally set aside \$600,000 for the stage, but it will cost over \$1.2 million for the project. County Executive Sam Kaufman says the City of Fond du Lac has chipped in \$375,000 for the stage and now National Exchange Bank Foundation is willing to pay \$300,000 for the naming rights. He says they will get the naming rights for the next 15 years. Kaufman says it would be great to see the new stage ready for this July's fair, but that is probably too optimistic.

Wisconsin Government/Senator Joan Ballweg/Year of the Worker

During his State of the State speech Tuesday night Governor Tony Evers declared 2024 "The Year of the Worker." The Governor acknowledged the workforce shortage. State Senator Joan Ballweg says that's been a problem for several years and will continue to be as more baby boomers retire. The state lawmaker from Markesan says we have shortages in nearly every career field. Governor Evers pointed with pride to the record low unemployment rate of 2.4 percent last April and how the state's labor force participation rate is consistently above the national average. Ballweg says unfortunately the labor force participation rate has also been falling because some people are basically sitting on the sidelines, taking part-time work, or taking cash-paying jobs and aren't counted in.

Wisconsin Government/State Representative Jon Plumer/Redistricting

State Representative Jon Plumer says until the State Supreme Court makes a decision which redistricting maps will be used no one knows what their district will look like for the elections in the fall. Seven maps were submitted to the court and one was thrown out. Plumer, who represents the 42nd State Assembly District, says one map took the 42nd District all the way up to Lake Winnebago. He says the maps submitted by Governor Evers pitted 26 Republicans and 2 Democrats against each other. The state lawmaker from Lodi says the end to Gerrymandering is a lesson in frustration around the State Capitol right now. The Wisconsin Supreme Court was hoping to make a decision by the second week of February, but legal challenges could throw that timeline off.

Wisconsin Government/State Representative Alex Dallman/Wolf Population Goals

The State Assembly recently sent a bill to Governor Evers asking him to have the state's Department of Natural Resources to mandate a population goal for wolves. Under current state statute the population cap for wolves is supposed to be 350. State Representative Alex Dallman says the problem is that the Natural Resources Board last year approved a wolf population management plan that did away with that number. They opted instead for a plan focused on adapting to changing populations in different areas of the state. The state lawmaker from Green Lake says he's talked with constituents from Marquette and Adams counties whose trail cameras document the movement and number of wolves. He says it is a real problem in that area.

Fond du Lac County United Way/Amber Kilawee and Jeanette Morales/Community Impact Strategist

The Fond du Lac County United Way is filling the void created by the dissolution of the Drug Free Communities of Fond du Lac County Coalition. United Way Executive Director Amber Kilawee says they were part of that coalition and also provided funding to it. She says a community health assessment and plan subsequently showed a need to continue the work of the coalition. On December 1st Jeanette Morales started as the Community Impact Strategist for the United Way and Drug Free Communities Grant Coordinator. She will be handling outreach and programs such as the distribution of narcan kits and a pouch for disabling prescription medication at community events and programs. Morales is getting acquainted with Fond du Lac County communities including Ripon.

Wisconsin Government/Michelle Reinen/Top Consumer Complaints of 2023

Landlord-Tenant issues once again topped the list of complaints the state's Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection received from residents in 2023. Consumers filed 2,208 complaints when disputes between landlords and tenants could not be resolved. It was a slight increase from the previous year. Michelle Reinen is the Administrator for the Division of Trade and Consumer Protection. She says it is not surprising to see landlord-tenant issues again top the list of complaints because where you live is a priority for people. Number two on the list were telemarketing complaints. Reinen says a lot has been done to stop scam and robocalls over the years, but they still want people to report them when they receive them.

Berlin City Government/Luke Dretske/Nativity Display

Berlin City Alderperson Luke Dretske says the city was able to resolve an issue over a Nativity display at a city park. The Council approved putting up the display at a park this past Christmas season, but then had to resolve the issue of ownership. No one was sure about who owned it but the Berlin Ministerial Association originally raised the money for the Nativity display. Dretske says the ownership issue was worked out between the City's Parks and Recreation Commission, Berlin Ministerial Association, and the Achieving a Better Community or ABC Group. It was decided the Ministerial Association owned the display. Dretske says in the future the Ministerial Association will have to work with the Parks and Recreation Commission and the ABC Group about holiday placement of the display.

Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources/Margaret Stadig/Sturgeon Season

Registration stations will be manned around Lake Winnebago when the season opens Saturday. Stadig says they are hoping at some point during the 16-day season for colder weather to salvage part of the season.

SSM Health/Jesse Schulz/Pelvic Therapy

A physical therapist for SSM Health's Ripon Community Hospital says an enlarged prostate is common for men once they hit the age of 70. Jesse Schulz says it's not always prostate cancer. King Charles III of England was being treated for an enlarged prostate when they found cancer, which was treated and removed through surgery. An enlarged prostate can cause problems with the urine stream, dribbling afterwards, and increases the frequency. Schulz says sometimes back and hip problems can also cause those issues. After prostate surgery he can help with strengthening the muscles in the pelvic area or pelvic floor. He also provides therapy for the hip and back. He recommends having your primary care physician check you out if you believe you have an enlarged prostate or something more serious.

The 13th isn't up for election this fall, but the 14th State Senate seat is. Ballweg would have to move to continue to represent the 14th after the fall election.
