Paris, Tenn.—Henry County Medical Center officials have addressed the claims of 'false positive' readings of COVID-19 tests.

This is the statement from HCMC:

"We have received calls and messages regarding our testing at

Henry County Medical Center, and specifically tests that are suspect of being false positives.

"Our laboratory uses two different references labs to process COVID-19 tests. The tests we use are referred to as "PCR" tests. These are not rapid screening tests, but are a true diagnostic test. A PCR test detects the genetic information of the virus, and that is only possible if the virus is present.

"We understand there is so much misinformation. Please know our statistics are available daily, Monday through

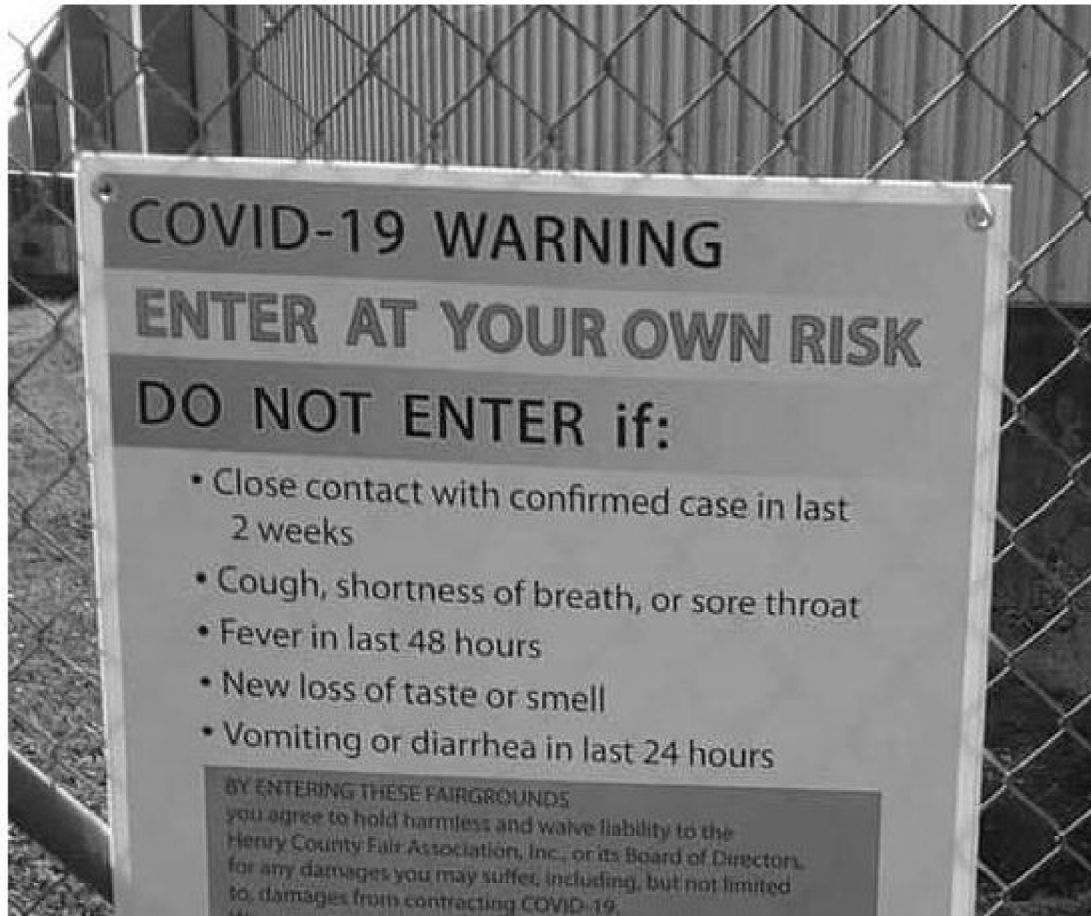

HENRY COUNTY SCHOOLS BOARD VOTES TO DELAY SCHOOL OPENING UNTIL AUGUST 31

Paris, Tenn.—At a lengthy emergency meeting Tuesday morning, the Henry County Schools board of education voted unanimously to delay the opening of the 2020-2021 school year until August 31.

The vote followed much discussion among Director of Schools Dr. Leah Watkins, board members and community members in the audience, which included two county commissioners, Kreg Kyle and Marty Visser.

The county district (and Paris Special Schools) had been slated to begin August 3, but a significant increase in COVID-19 cases in Henry County over the past week prompted the board to call today's emergency meeting. The Paris Special Schools board will meet in special session on Wednesday to discuss the opening for the PSSD district.

Dr. Watkins said the increase in cases has transitioned the county school district into the orange, or moderate spread, phase, which puts more precautions in place for students, including remote learning for students. Before the increases over the past week, the district had been ready to open in the yellow, or low spread, phase.

"This is unprecedented for all of us and we need to make decisions in the best interests of everyone," Dr. Watkins

NO MASK MANDATE SET FOR HENRY COUNTY

Paris, Tenn.—With the announcement that Gov. Bill Lee granted local authority to each county to declare mask mandates, Henry Countians are wondering what requirements will be made for them as cases of COVID-19 continue to spike across the state and West Tennessee. Local officials have decided that a mask mandate will not be required in Henry County.

On a conference call Monday, members of Paris and Henry County government and the medical community discussed Gov. Lee's executive orders from July 3 and what circumstances would create the need for Paris and Henry County for required masking to be ordered.

All agreed at this time, if the community continues to follow social distancing, good hand washing hygiene, gatherings only in small groups, and wearing masks where appropriate, a mask mandate will not be a necessity for our community.

"It is so important that our community continue to adhere to masking if possible, washing hands frequently, and social distancing at least six feet as much as possible," said Henry County Medical Center CEO Lisa Casteel. "We have done well in our county, doing our part to make sure that our healthcare system has not been overwhelmed. But, the threat is not over and we need to not give up these practices to ensure that we continue to stay healthy and avoid having to require masking like Jackson, Nashville, Memphis, Gatlinburg, and other locations across the state. PARIS UTILITY AUTHORITY HOLDS BRIEF SEPTEMBER BOARD MEETING

Paris, TN – In a brief and regular meeting of the Paris Utility Authority Board of Directors, the Board reviewed and approved monthly financials for the utility.

In his President's report, Paris BPU President and CEO, Terry Wimberley, reported on the utility's progress towards fulfilling the requirements of a Wastewater Consent Order from the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC). Wimberley explained in June of 2016 the utility signed a Consent Order with TDEC for Wastewater System improvements. The three-year time clock for improvement of Wastewater Treatment Plant priority elements started in 2017. As of this June, Paris BPU notified TDEC that they had completed the work at the Wastewater Treatment Plant on-time

and in accordance with the compliance schedule.

Wimberley also reported that results from our recent TDEC required, Lead and Copper Testing have been returned. Every three years, Paris BPU tests 30 locations on the utility's system for lead and copper levels. Wimberley, noted that, "Paris BPU received optimal results on our most recent testing." He added, "Monitoring these levels are important to public health, and a part of our mission to provide safe and reliable utility services to our customers."

The October meeting of the Board will take place on Tuesday, October 27, 2020.
