The following issues were identified as significant and addressed by WUAB-TV in the 1st quarter to serve the community and act in the public interest as set forth by the Federal Communications Commission:

Alcohol and Drugs including alcohol and drug awareness, abuse prevention, and illustrations of behavioral acts/consequences.

Consumer including information to assist viewers in making informed purchasing decisions, recall & safety information, etc.

Crime and Justice including crime, crime prevention, court proceedings, police conduct, fire safety, et al.

Economy including local issues, job opportunities and the state of the economy.

Education including education standards, school safety, efforts to keep up with growth in the area, budget matters, etc.

Employment including job opportunities, the state of local/regional employment, unemployment statistics, etc.

Housing including mortgage and housing issues, mortgage fraud, community beautification and revitalization efforts, et al.

Investigative including in-depth coverage of city hall departments, public officials, legislative bodies, regulatory agencies.

Leadership/Politics including state, county and local political issues/events, profiles, and headlines re: political leaders and newsmakers, governmental corruption, etc.

World Events/Local Impact including all state, county and local efforts, profiles, and headlines re: local impact to a national and/or global issue.

He created a diversion program entitled "Compass" to help give those who come before him a chance to straighten out their lives. The program teaches soft skills and other job readiness skills including anger management and coping skills. It also helps find offenders employment.

Synopsis: Professor Ayesha Bell Hardaway talked about legal inequality and lack of civil rights and the difference in racial perspectives. Many African Americans' experience is one in which many of the gains made in the 60s have been either rolled back or are being eroded in the courts and state houses under conservative judges and lawmakers. In her opinion, many citizens look at legal rights on paper and conclude that we all have the same legal protections when blacks live in a separate and unequal society. Some examples of the discrepancies include inequalities in education and unemployment and health care. Professor Hardaway opines that racism, discrimination and prejudices make it harder for people of color to move ahead.

Kevin Clayton, from the Cleveland Cavaliers, also feels that there is an unequal playing field that for black citizens. The Cavs' organization is playing a role in improving the plight of those who have often been left behind or "left out of the loop". The CAVS and the NBA have teamed up in the wake of the murder of George Floyd to pledge a \$1-million-dollar donation per team/per year to offer scholarship to blacks attending institutions of higher learning. The Cavs have also created a scholarship program under The Cavaliers Community Foundation Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) Scholarship Program. Cavs' guard Donovan Mitchell's SpidaCares, Inc. joined the Cavs Foundation to help provide \$50,000 for the scholarship's inaugural year of 2024. Students interested in receiving one of the five \$10,000 scholarships have until March 18th to apply. Each student must be a permanent resident of northeast Ohio, and either be enrolled in or committed to an accredited HBCU during the 2024-2025 school year.
