The SUVs were originally sold or registered in 20 states and Washington, D.C. where salt is used on the roads to clear snow and ice. The sub frames can rust, allowing a control arm to separate and hamper steering control.
SAFETY	UniMás News Briefs	4/9/14	Various	:30	Toyota recalled nearly 1.8 million vehicles in the U.S. to fix a number of problems including air bags that might not inflate. This is part of a worldwide recall of \$6.4 million cars and trucks. This year the two automakers, General Motors and Toyota, are under government scrutiny and facing bad publicity and allegations that they concealed safety issues.
SAFETY	UniMás News Briefs	5/9/14	Various	:30	Ford is recalling more than 692,000 Escape small SUVs and C-Max gas-electric hybrids in North America due to a software glitch causing the side curtain air bags from inflating in certain rollover crashes. The recalls cover vehicles from the 2013 and 2014 model years. Dealers will reprogram the air bag control computer for free.
SAFETY	UniMás News Briefs	5/20/14	Various	:30	A major meat recall is now underway because of possible E-Coli contamination. Nearly two million pounds of ground beef has been pulled from stores and restaurants nationwide. It's believed the meat came from the Wolverine Packing Company in Detroit. This strain of E-Coli is serious and can even be deadly. At this time, eleven people in four states have been sickened with the E-Coli contamination.
SAFETY	UniMás News Briefs	5/20/14	Various	:30	General Motors issued four recalls covering 2.4 million cars and trucks. That brings a total of 29 recalls of 13.6 million vehicles for General Motors in the U.S. so far this year. Most recalls involve ignition switches.
SAFETY	UniMás News Briefs	5/22/14	Various	:30	Toyota is recalling 370,000 Sienna minivans due to salt water corroding parts under the vehicle and causing the spare tire splash protector under the vehicle to possibly fall off. The splash protector is supposed to keep water from reaching the spare tire carrier but it may not have been installed properly and could fall off during normal usage. The recall affects those minivans that were sold or registered in cold weather states where salt is routinely used to keep roadways ice-free. It includes model years 2004-2011.
SAFETY	UniMás News Briefs	6/17/14	Various	:30	General Motors recalled another 3.36 million vehicles worldwide Monday for a problem the company has linked to eight crashes and six injuries. The new recall affects cars from model years 2000 through 2014. The ignition switch can move out of the run position, turning off power steering and power braking while the car is being driven.
SAFETY	UniMás News Briefs	6/23/14	Various	:30	Faulty air bags are being blamed for a new round of recalls in the U.S. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the government's auto safety agency, said that BMW, Chrysler, Ford, Honda, Mazda, Nissan and Toyota will recall cars sold in places where hot, humid weather can potentially affect the air bags. The older model cars have air bag inflators that can rupture. If that happens, the air bags might not work properly in a crash, and shards from the broken system could fly out and cause injury. In letters to the government, the automakers are all cooperating with the recall even though they haven't yet determined whether the air bags are a safety hazard. Dealers will replace the inflators for free.

Letting them remain in their place on the waiting lists, they say, would lengthen the wait for others by a few months.
