Federal health officials have warned for years about the possible side effects, and now they've issued their strongest warning so far. The FDA ordered that several popular types of prescription sleeping pills, including Ambien, Lunesta and Sonata, will now come with a prominent "black box" warning slapped on the box. The labels and patient guides will alert consumers to the possibility of some dangerous side effects.

About 5,300 Nicaraguans in the U.S. are currently relying on a court decision to continue working and living legally in the United States after the Trump administration announced that it wants to end Nicaragua's Temporary Protected Status. Two Miami lawmakers are trying to end the uncertainty. Republican Rep. Mario Diaz-Balart and Democratic Rep. Donna Shalala introduced a bill Tuesday that would provide TPS to Nicaraguan nationals already in the United States, a population concentrated in South Florida.

The Caribbean nation of St. Lucia has quarantined a cruise ship on the island after identifying a confirmed case of measles on board. Passengers and crew aboard the large ship were not permitted to leave, Dr. Merlene Fredericks-James, the nation's chief medical officer, said on Tuesday. The highly infectious disease, which can be prevented by a common vaccination, is in the midst of its largest outbreak in a quarter century in the United States, with more than 700 cases reported.

California public health officials are warning moviegoers who went to see "Avengers: Endgame" and other films at an Orange County movie theater last Thursday that they may have been exposed to measles by a woman in the audience. The woman attended a midnight screening of the "Avengers" blockbuster at the AMC Dine-In Fullerton 20 on Thursday from 11 p.m. to 4 a.m, the Orange County Health Care Agency said. Everyone who was in the building may have been exposed, not just at that particular screening room, the agency said. The warning also applies to people who went to buildings at 5 Hutton Centre Drive in Santa Ana from last Wednesday through Friday.

All that is missing is the approval of the governor of florida, "ron desantis", for the state to approve the initiative that forbids the so-called "sanctuary cities". In the last few hours the state congress passed legislation sb-168, which obliges local agencies to cooperate with immigration authorities in the arrest of undocumented immigrants. Democratic lawmakers say the law affects all communities, including venezuelan, cuban and nicaraguan, whose members have fled dictatorships.

Measles can have very serious consequences on the youngest children, such as encephalitis, which is an inflammation of the brain, and blindness. The MMR vaccine gives them immunity against that disease, mumps and rubella, with 97% effectiveness if they receive two doses: one between 12 and 15-months, and another between four and six years of age. Through this break, the centres for the control and prevention of diseases, advanced the first dose to the six months, for those babies that will leave the country. Remember that when you vaccinate your child, you will not only be protecting him but other small children such as "walter".

An oklahoma man was on the brink of death after suffering a stroke as a result of this practice. 28-year-old "josh hader" tried to stretch the muscles in that area and accidentally dislocated them. the procedure tore arteries right where the neck meets the skull at the base of the brain. No sudden movements in the neck area, because it could be fatal. Experts recommend moving it from side to side, and not twisting it for any reason.

The Trump administration is making an additional 30,000 seasonal worker visas available for 2019, according to a joint rule published Monday by the Department of Homeland Security and Department of Labor. The additional visas come on top of the visas already made available for the year. The work visas, which allow employers to hire foreign workers for temporary, non-agricultural jobs, will only be available to workers who already received H-2B status in the past three fiscal years. Availability is also restricted to businesses who would "suffer irreparable harm" without the additional workers, US Citizenship and Immigration Services announced on Monday.

Brian Kemp signed legislation on Tuesday banning abortions once a fetal heartbeat can be detected. That can be as early as six weeks, before many women know they're pregnant. Kemp said he was signing the bill "to ensure that all Georgians have the opportunity to live, grow, learn and prosper in our great state." The signing caps weeks of tension and protests at the state Capitol, and begins could be a lengthy and costly legal battle over the law's constitutionality. But a legal showdown is exactly what supporters are looking for, and Kemp said "we will not back down. We will always continue to fight for life."

Results of the 2020 Diversity Visa Program, popularly known as the Green Card Lottery, will be available online starting tomorrow, May 7th, 2019. The results are for individuals who participated in the lottery during the open registration period last year, between October 30, 2018 and November 6, 2018. Starting tomorrow, entrants will be able to confirm if they won by entering their confirmation number and personal information. The US State Department will then conduct background checks and interviews on winners before granting them permanent.
<u>HEALTH:</u> COLORADO MAGIC MUSHROOMS	DESPIERTA AMERICA	05/07/19	8:00am	VO 0:30 sec.	As criminal penalties for drug use fall across the country, Denver could be setting another first. "Magic mushrooms" are now on the ballot in the city. Voters in Denver will head to the polls tomorrow to vote for city leaders and to sort out two ballot questions, including Initiated Ordinance 301, or the Denver Psilocybin Mushroom Initiative. The ordinance's text seeks to "deprioritize, to the greatest extent possible" criminal penalties imposed by the City of Denver "for the personal use and personal possession of psilocybin mushrooms." A range of mushroom species naturally contain the compound psilocybin, which has hallucinogenic properties. The US Department of Justice lists psilocybin as a Schedule I controlled substance, meaning official federal policy states the fungi have no medicinal properties.

Drivers for ride-hailing giants Uber and Lyft are planning to turn off their apps to protest what they say are declining wages at a time when both companies are raking in billions of dollars from investors. Organizers are planning demonstrations in 10 U.S. cities Wednesday, including Chicago, Los Angeles, New York, San Francisco and Washington, D.C. They're timing their protests in advance of Uber's initial public stock offering, which is planned for Friday. Uber aims to raise \$9 billion from investors and is expected to be valued at up to \$91.5 billion. It's not the first time drivers for ride-hailing apps have staged protests. Strikes were planned in several cities ahead of Lyft's IPO last month, although the disruption to riders

					appeared to be minimal. This time more cities are participating.
SOCIAL: OR TEACHERS WALKING OUT	DESPERIETA AMERICA	05/08/19	7:30am	VO 0:30 sec.	It's national Teacher Appreciation Week, but you wouldn't know that by talking to teachers in Oregon. Tens of thousands of frustrated teachers will air their grievances at protests across the state Wednesday. But unlike with other teacher walkouts, these educators aren't fighting for higher raises. They're fed up with overcrowded classrooms and a lack of support staff, including school nurses and mental health counselors. "Nearly 45% of all reported classes in Oregon have 26 students or more," said John Larson, a high school English teacher and president of the Oregon Education Association. Some classes have 56 or more students, he said.

A new report by the non-profit Environmental Working Group and Northeastern University finds people in nearly every state in the country are exposed to unhealthy drinking water. According to the researchers, 43 states have locations, including drinking water sites, contaminated with PFAS chemicals. The CDC says these chemicals have been linked to health issues that include birth defects, cancers and infertility. The study compiled information taken from Pentagon data and water utility reports. It shows an estimated 19 million people are exposed to contaminated water. Researchers found at least 610 contaminated locations ranging from public water systems and military bases to civilian airports, industrial plants, dumps and firefighter training sites.

On Tuesday, the U.S. Commerce Department announced the termination of the 2013 Suspension Agreement on Fresh Tomatoes from Mexico. This means the U.S. will impose a 17.5% tariff on imported Mexican tomatoes, a move that experts say may lead to shortages and price hikes. According to estimates from Arizona State University, consumers could pay 40% to 85% more for vine-ripe and other fresh tomatoes. Prices could rise 40% from May to December, according to the university analysis by economists led by Timothy Richards, the Morrison chair of agribusiness. During the cooler months, when there are fewer domestic supplies of tomatoes, prices could escalate up to 85%, according to the estimate.
ECONOMY: SANDWICH DEBT	DESPERIETA AMERICA	05/08/19	8:00am	VO 0:30 sec.	Students at a Rhode Island school district who owe money on their lunch accounts will have the sole option of a sunflower butter and jelly sandwich until they are

					able to pay their balances, the district announced Sunday. Warwick Public Schools, which has more than 9,000 pre-kindergarten through 12th grade students, said the district-wide policy will go into effect on May 13. "If money is owed on a paid, free, or reduced lunch account a sun butter and jelly sandwich will be given as the lunch choice until the balance owed is paid in full or a payment plan is set up," said a post from the district on Facebook. Public schools in Rhode Island are mandated by state law to provide lunches to students, but legislation that requires schools to provide hot lunches has not yet been passed. Nearly 70 percent of school lunches are served for free or at a reduced price based on family income, according to the state. But some parents who commented on the announcement from Warwick Public Schools said even though they qualify for free lunches, their children still owed money because they had added something to their trays that wasn't included with the free lunch, like milk.

Advocates say the kids' version of Amazon's Alexa won't forget what children tell it, even after parents try to delete the conversations. For that and other alleged privacy flaws they found while testing the service, they're now asking the Federal Trade Commission on Thursday to investigate whether it violates children's privacy laws. Amazon said in a statement that its Echo Dot Kids Edition is compliant with COPPA.
HEALTH: OBAMACARE COVERAGE	DESPIERTA AMERICA	05/09/19	8:30am	VO 0:30 sec.	Government reports Obamacare coverage gains are starting to retreat. The uninsured rate for those ages 45 to 64 jumped to 10.3% in 2018, up from 9.3% a year earlier, according to a report from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention published Thursday. It's the first time a government study has shown an increase in the rate, though polling and research groups had previously found that people had been losing their health insurance since President Donald Trump took office.

There have been 736 cases of mumps reported in the United States this year as of April 26, according to the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. That's an increase of 310 cases of the illness in the last month. Previously, the CDC reported 426 cases of mumps as of the end of March. The cases have been reported in 41 states and the District

					of Columbia. Mumps is a vaccine-preventable disease that is caused by a virus. It is spread through saliva or mucus by coughing, sneezing or talking and by sharing eating utensils or cups, according to the CDC.
HEALTH: FLORIDA BUGS IN KIDS BACKPACK	DESPIERTA AMERICA	05/13/19	8:00am	VO 0:30 sec.	Hundreds of bugs crawl from child's backpack; Florida woman arrested. A teacher at Bagdad Elementary School knew something wasn't right at home when she saw a second grader wearing the same outfit for a whole week last month. Deputies arrested Jessica Stevenson on May 3 and charged her with five counts of child neglect without causing great bodily harm. She made bail the next day and was released from custody. The child's body odor had become impossible to ignore, likely caused by the layer of dirt, fecal matter and urine covering her clothes, the Pensacola News Journal reported. In the cafeteria, hundreds of bugs crawled out of her backpack. The teacher said the girl repeatedly cried, had meltdowns and showed signs of depression. She couldn't tell the teacher the last time she'd taken a bath or showered.

According to a study conducted by insurance company Netquote, new research shows that the average rideshare vehicle has about 219 times as many germs as the average taxi. Analysts also say these backseats are nearly three times dirtier than the average toothbrush holder and contain more than 35,000 times more germs than the average toilet seat. Most of the germs were reportedly found on the window buttons and seat belts. On average, researchers found more than 5 million colony-forming units per square inch on the tiny buttons and more than 1 million colony-forming units per square inch on the seat belts. The Netquote study examined three rideshare vehicles, three taxis and three rental cars.

From high-stakes rulings for the Trump administration to revisiting battles over the separation of church and state, here are five big decisions to watch for. Census citizenship question. The Trump administration's efforts to add a question about citizenship landed in front of the justices last month, just weeks before the deadline to get the query added to the census. Opponents argue that asking about citizenship will cause non-citizens and other immigrants to skip the question or the census altogether, leading to an

					inaccurate count of the population. Census data is used to determine congressional representation as well as federal funding. But the Trump administration argues that it needs to collect the data in order to assist the Justice Department in its enforcement of the Voting Rights Act.
ECONOMY: MONSANTO TO PAY \$2 BILLION	DESPERTA AMERICA	05/14/19	7:00am	VO 0:30 sec.	A jury on Monday ordered agribusiness giant Monsanto Co. to pay a combined \$2.055 billion to a couple claiming that the company's popular weed killer Roundup Ready caused their cancers. The jury's verdict is the third such courtroom loss for Monsanto in California since August, but a San Francisco law professor said it's likely a trial judge or appellate court will significantly reduce the punitive damage award. The state court jury in Oakland concluded that Monsanto's weed killer caused the non-Hodgkin's lymphoma Alva Pilliod and Alberta Pilliod each contracted. Jurors awarded them each \$1 billion in punitive damages in addition to a combined \$55 million in compensatory damages.

The number of measles cases in the United States is now at 839 for the year, according to the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's weekly measles update. That's 75 more cases than the agency reported last week, inching closer to the 963 reported in 1994, which is the highest number of cases in a year in the past 25 years. This includes cases reported to the CDC as of Friday but does not include any cases identified or reported since then. Last month, the number of cases this year became the highest number in a single year since the virus was declared eliminated in the United States in 2000. The designation means measles was no longer being transmitted within the country.

On Monday, Amazon announced a new initiative to pay employees to quit and start their own delivery business Opens a New Window. to help them meet its goal of one day delivery for Prime Members. The new incentive is an expansion of its Delivery Service Partner Program that allows current Amazon employees a chance to start their own small business delivery company with its backing. The company said it now plans to fund startup costs, up to \$10,000, as well as supplement three months of the former employee's last gross salary to get the delivery business of the ground.

The country's strictest abortion bill was previously approved by the Alabama House of Representatives and will now go to Republican Governor Kay Ivey, who has withheld comment on whether she would sign but is generally a strong opponent of abortion</p>

Immigration Customs Enforcement is accessing location data from license plate readers owned by major cities across the country in order to track and facilitate deportation of immigrants.</p>

The task of the TSA workers, which a source said will include air marshals, will be to assist temporarily with immigration duties. TSA acknowledged in an internal email the "immediate need" comes with the acceptance of "some risk" of depleted resources in aviation security. TSA plans for the deployments to involve up to 175 law enforcement officials and as many as "400 people from Security Ops," according to two sources and the email. At least initially, the efforts will not involve uniformed airport screeners, according to the email, which says that some parts of TSA would be asked to contribute "around 10%" of its workforce.</p>

Births last year dropped to the lowest number in about three decades, a new CDC report says. The number of births was about 3.79 million, down 2% from 2017. The nation's fertility rate also hit a record low in 2018, with just 1,728 births per 1,000. That's down 2% from 2017. The fertility rate was so low in 2018 that it's considered below the level needed for the population to replace itself.

President Donald Trump announced a broad plan to reform border security and legal immigration during a speech on Thursday afternoon, calling for changes that would favor young, educated immigrants instead of those with family ties to the US. Yet even as Trump cast the measure as a consensus plan that would finally solve one of Washington's most intractable challenges, there were signs the proposal faces an uphill battle for consensus even among the Republican Party's own ranks. And Democrats are all but certain to oppose it, deeming its reforms drastic and inhumane. The measure calls for replacing long standing family-based immigration rules with a points-based system that would favor highly-skilled, financially self-sufficient immigrants who learn English and pass a civics exam.

The Federal Communications Commission's chairman proposed letting telephone companies block robocalls, a step that consumer groups welcomed but said wasn't enough to squelch a growing scourge that has millions of people dodging unwanted calls. Under the proposal, the FCC would step away from decades of insisting that the phone network connect nearly all calls, and move into pressuring phone companies to shield consumers from unwanted interruptions including scams and sales pitches. The changes need approval in a vote by the full commission set for June 6.

The law's sponsors want to give conservatives on the U.S. Supreme Court a chance to gut abortion rights nationwide. Democrats and abortion rights advocates criticized the legislation as a slap in the face to women. The abortion ban would go into effect in six months if it isn't blocked by legal challenges. The legislation Alabama senators

					passed Tuesday would make performing an abortion at any stage of pregnancy a felony punishable by 10 to 99 years or life in prison for the provider. There is no exception for pregnancies resulting for rape and incest.
HEALTH: EAR INFECTION APP	DESPIERTA AMERICA	05/16/19	8:12am	VO 0:30 sec.	A new smartphone app is able to sound out possible ear infections in children. Scientists developed the app using a "user-friendly" method that can quickly detect the presence of fluid in the middle ear – a likely indicator of ear infections. Researchers say that the new system, which was tested on 98 young patients in a pediatric surgical centre, could provide a "low-cost and effective" tool for parents to detect ear infections such as acute otitis media (AOM), a leading cause of visits to doctors. Some cases of AOM can lead to severe complications such as meningitis, while other pediatric ear conditions (such as otitis media with effusion) are associated with delays in speech and poorer school performance.

The immigration plan unveiled by President Donald Trump includes a proposal to allow public donations to pay for his long-promised southern border wall. A fact sheet release by the White House on Thursday evening says the president's proposal "will safeguard our homeland by continuing to add to the 400-plus miles of border wall underway in strategic locations" and "will also enable public donations for the wall." One GoFundMe campaign launched by war veteran Brian Koflage has raised more than \$20 million for wall construction.
