SECTION A: NEWSCAST OVERVIEW AND QUARTERLY ISSUES ADDRESSED

WFSC airs four local newscasts during its broadcast day, Monday through Friday at 7:06am, 8:10am, 12:30pm, and 5:04pm, following three to ten minutes of world and national news from CBS Radio News. WFSC reports local and area news events and issues on an ongoing basis.

News Treatments: The nominal length of each of our lead or feature news stories described below is between 30-seconds and one minute 30 seconds.

Some of the issues covered in these newscasts and programs during the first quarter are as follows:

1-Disease Prevention

News Treatments: January 6, 12, 14, 22; February 9, 10, 11, 18, 23; March 3, 5, 9, 10, 20, 24, 26;

Becoming proactive in one's healthcare is very helpful in preventing many of the chronic diseases in Macon County including heart disease, diabetes, and cancer. We teamed with the health department, hospital, and other agencies to inform listeners on various programs and outlets that could help them begin a more proactive health approach and take better care of themselves.

2-Those in Need

News Treatments: January 7, 27; February 3, 6; March 5, 23;

Many residents of Macon County continue to struggle financially and are considered food insecure. These stories aimed to connect listeners with types of resources that could help them bridge the gap during times of crisis.

3-Public Safety

News Treatments: January 7, 12, 16; February 19; March 16, 18;

Public Safety issues were a major concern in the first quarter for our listeners. From transportation notices to inclement weather information, we strove to provide the critical information to the public to help them make safer decisions.

4- Scams

News Treatments: January 20; February 5; March 5;

Scams were a topic of interest in Macon County during the first quarter of 2015. One particular scam we notified listeners of was a man targeting local gas stations and short-changing them. With the help of Franklin Police, we provided tips on how clerks could avoided being duped.

<u>5- Jobs</u>

News Treatments: January 16, 26, 29; February 2, 5; March 19, 23, 25, 27;

The first quarter was tough on the local job market as a Caterpillar in Franklin announced it would be closing. Additionally Shaw announced a small layoff. We worked with the NC Works Career Center to provide helpful information to those facing job loss and those seeking employment. We also provided the latest unemployment rate data and industry sector performance.

6-Poorly Informed Citizens

News Treatments: January 22, 28; February 4; March 12, 16, 23;

As part of our ongoing mission of community service, we provide critical information not necessarily obtained easily for our listeners. This may include government issues, transportation projects, and new or changing regulations. Issues mentioned during our news casts have an impact to Macon County and its residents, so it is paramount to connect our listeners with what they need to know.

7-Environmental/Public Health

News Treatments: January 6, 22, 23, 27, 30; February 2, 3, 9, 27; March 12, 25;

Public Health issues such as the flu season and others, such as radon awareness, that pertain the environment, emerged during the first quarter. We provided prompt reports on flu data which included preventive measures one could take to avoid the illness, which demographics were more susceptible, and information on flu vaccines.

8- Mental Health

News Treatments: February 13; March 16;

Macon County leaders and others across western North Carolina continue to realize the significance of mental health in the mountains. We strove to air relevant information raising awareness of mental illness and various resources available, such as the NAMI Family-to-Family Workshop and the opening of a new mental health facility in western North Carolina. We also provided information about the critical state of mental health and the costs that taxpayers incur as a result. Again, our mission was to raise more awareness of the issue and provide links for help.

1-Citizens Making A Difference in Macon County

Program host Dr. Gordon Mercer, Political Science Professor and President Emeritus of the Public Policy Institute at Western Carolina University in Cullowhee, NC, sits down and discusses local issues with different organizations and groups in Macon County and western North Carolina each Saturday morning for 30 minutes on WNCC-FM at 5:30 a.m. – 6 a.m. They are produced and aired weekly.

Macon Co Humane Society (Appalachian Animal Rescue Center)

The Humane Society has just recently changed their name to the Appalachian Animal Rescue Center. Ken Gievel who is a volunteer with the Macon County Humane Society Shelter and Susan Slater the office manager at MCHS. The duo discussed why they changed the name and funding for 2014 and their upcoming adoption days event. They also discussed the value of the Humane Society to the county and the advantages of supporting and maintaining the shelter and how the Thrift Store provides funding for the Shelter.
