Nov. 5 - Election Epilogue 2014.

Republicans effectively walloped Democrats in these mid-term elections—sweeping into power with a majority in both Chambers on Capitol Hill. At the state and local levels, election results generally mirrored the national pattern. Voter turnout in North Carolina was impressive this election cycle. In fact, with Early Voting shortened by a week, voters still set a record for turnout in mid-term elections. And last night, the State Board of Elections announced a new record for overall turnout in the state for a midterm election. Nearly 44% of registered voters cast ballots. • Nov. 12 - The Complicated Psychology Behind Intimate Partner Violence.

Investigations over alleged cases of domestic violence continue to populate newscasts on a near-daily basis. Why are we hearing more about abusive dynamics in relationships – and what resources are available to help victims and perpetrators?  Nov. 19 - NHC's Special Use Permit — Environmental Gatekeeper or Economic Liability? The Special Use Permit is only about three years old in New Hanover County. Since its creation in 2011, it's served as a gatekeeper – giving local officials the final say over whether an industry can set up shop within the County. But the County recently paid nearly \$100,000 for an economic development study entitled *Pathways to Prosperity: New Hanover County's Plan for Jobs and Investment.* Also known as *The Garner Report*, the study concludes that the SUP is a major deterrent to potential investment. Dec 3 - Modernizing Transportation in the Cape Fear

Dec. 10 - Film Incentive Change Slowing 2015 Production.

The debate over film incentives in North Carolina erupted on the public stage last year when two state Representatives—Rick Catlin from New Hanover County and Chris Millis of Pender County—sponsored a bill that would fundamentally change the structure of the tax rebate. There was an immediate outcry from the film community. If the film incentive changed, advocates said, producers would go elsewhere and the industry in the Tar Heel state would die on the vine. That bill died in committee, but it was just the beginning of a series of proposals to change what film industry insiders say was a competitive package helping to set film production and spending records in the state.
