From April 1, 1999 through and including June 30, 1999, KFSN-TV presented regularly scheduled locally produced public affairs programs, syndicated programs, and 19½ hours of local news programs a week. A new task force was formed to promote programs that improve campus safety, and foster a positive learning environment. It was conceived by State Attorney General Bill Lockyer, as a partnership between education and law enforcement.

The law keeps sexual criminals who are mentally ill locked up only if they have been sentenced to "two" determined prison terms. Only one of West's rape sentences was determined for a certain amount of years.

The research summary is everything that cannot fit into a minute-and-a-half story. It includes further research, story contacts, costs and other cities or countries that are performing the same procedure or research.
