worked out, Walker insists trying the measure to helping people gain employment could allow him to achieve the results he's looking for.

A northeast Wisconsin woman and a former Green Bay Packers' star raised awareness of organ donations, by riding on a float in yesterday's Tournament of Roses Parade. Jackie Pische of Gillett (jill'-ett) and 1970's Green Bay running back John Brockington -- both organ-or-tissue recipients -- were among 30 people who rode on the "Donate Life" float in Pasadena.

Brockington's wife Diane was among a dozen who walked with the float.

Pische is the mother of Joshua Richards, who was shot-and-killed in a shooting in Appleton in December of 2013. Richards was an organ-and-tissue donor.

Several people, including his mother, have received those. Brockington met long-time Packer fan Diane Scott when he moved to San Diego after his playing days. Diane offered to give Brockington a kidney in late 2001 -- and it still works perfectly 14 years later. When he returned to health, Brockington and Scott married. Today, they run the John Brockington Foundation to raise awareness of organ and tissue donations, while raising funds for those on dialysis who wait for transplants. Brockington became the first running back in N-F-L history to rush for a-thousand yards in

Wind chills to 40-below prompted warnings for most of the day. A thin layer of snow has also created some slick spots on the roads this morning and forecasts are calling for three inches tomorrow. The woman found dead in downtown Presque Isle last Friday died of natural causes. 61-year old Corrine Gerster did have a history of health problems. Vilas County investigators are still waiting for lab results on the exact cause of her death. Voters in the Wausau School District may soon see a referendum and the eventual closing of schools.</p>

The School Board is weighing several options to combat overcrowding and aging buildings. Each one moves students and closes facilities. Depending on which way they go, costs could range from 11 to 37-million dollars. The board meets again tomorrow in hopes of crafting a proposal they could approve next week.

As his second term gets started, Governor Scott Walker plans to keep his current leadership team. Walker announced his cabinet appointments yesterday, a day after he took the oath of office at the state Capitol. The list includes the names of 17 heads of state agencies. While the current agency leadership remains, changes are still possible. Walker has indicated he's

Arctic air moves into the state	News	1/7/15	1230p,530p	1:30	A new batch of Arctic air moved into Wisconsin this morning. But the National Weather Service said it arrived later than expected. As a result, wind-chills were a bit warmer this morning than anticipated -- generally in the minus-teens-and-20's in southern Wisconsin, and the minus-20's-and-30's in the north. The majority of Wisconsin's 424 school districts are closed today -- including mid-sized systems like Kenosha, Janesville, Beloit, Eau Claire, La Crosse, and Wausau. The Arctic air is supposed to stay in place through Friday. By Sunday, forecasters say it will be

back in the upper teens and 20's statewide. State attorneys will ask the U-S Supreme Court today to preserve Wisconsin's ban on night-time deer hunting. D-N-R lawyers will ask the justices to throw out a federal appeals court ruling from October. It ordered Madison District Judge Barbara Crabb to reconsider her 1991 decision which barred hunting after dark. The ruling was considered a victory for Chippewa Indians in northern Wisconsin who've been trying for years to be able to harvest deer at night. They filed suit in 2012 to seek a reversal of the night-time hunting ban -- but Crabb said circumstances had not changed significantly since her original order 24 years ago. The federal appellate court disagreed. It

					<p>disputed the state D-N-R's contention that night-time hunting is unsafe. The court noted that Minnesota, Michigan, Oregon, and Washington State all allow tribal hunts at night, and the sport has become much safer in the years since Judge Crabb's original rejection.</p>

The cold weather often leaves many people scrambling to heat up their homes and Tod Pritchard with Wisconsin Emergency Management says that, sometimes, they turn to unsafe solutions. There are cases each year of people bringing charcoal or gas grills and propane heaters inside. Those devices can</p>

release dangerous levels of Carbon Monoxide which, if not vented safely, can quickly lead to CO poisoning and even death.

Assembly Republicans are proposing a system where public schools that consistently fail to meet state standards could be converted to independent charter schools. The bill, introduced yesterday at the Capitol, would also remove taxpayer funding from private schools in the state's voucher program, if they fail to meet expectations. The legislation would establish a new accountability system for taxpayer-funded schools in Wisconsin, setting up a method for testing those institutions and assigning a letter grade. It would also set up a 13 member board to oversee the grading

the hiring of an experienced political adviser is not a sign that he has decided to run for president. The governor brought on Rick Wiley last month to serve as a senior adviser, as he weighs a potential presidential bid for 2016. Wiley has worked with the Republican National Committee, Republican Governor's Association, and was also a liaison for the RGA to Walker's campaign during his reelection bid. Walker says that, since the election in November, he has received many inquiries from people around the country who are interested in helping with a potential campaign. Walker says "we wanted someone we could trust who had national experience to figure out if the people who were reaching out to us were

legitimate and how to deal with that." Walker insists he has no set timetable for making a decision on a presidential run.

Republican Brad Schimel says 26 states have signed onto a petition to have the U-S Supreme Court consider throwing out the requirement. He said if the ordinance is upheld, it would create problems for gun owners in other states. A federal appeals court has upheld the measures, which requires guns to either have trigger locks or be placed in locked boxes while at home -- except when a person is directly carrying the weapon. Schimel said yesterday that appellate ruling restricts</p>

freedom for people in their own homes.

Ron Johnson's rapid rise to power in the U-S Senate became official yesterday. The Wisconsin Republican was named the new chairman of the Senate's Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee. Later in the day, Johnson introduced a bill to cut off funding for President Obama's executive orders on immigration.

sentenced for illegally distributing painkillers on the Lac du Flambeau Indian reservation. Fifty-four year old Thomas Old Coyote and his 30-year-old son Ryan are the latest to get federal prison time. The two men supplied Oxycodone for Andrew and Charlie Meshigaud, who made numerous trips to Milwaukee to buy over a-thousand Oxy pills in 2013. Andrew Meshigaud received the longest prison term last summer, with just over 12-and-a-half years. Charlie was given five years. Three others who distributed painkillers for the Meshigauds had earlier sentences ranging from probation to 40 months in prison. An emergency rule reducing the daily bag limit of lake trout in the Apostle Islands region of Lake

Superior is in effect. The DNR reduced the limit from three to two, one 20-25 inches and over over 35 in effort to protect the species. Lake trout numbers have been falling the last eight years and the state wants to ensure a quality fishery. The recreational and commercial lake trout season runs through the end of September. Gov. Walker's state of the state address	News	1/14/15	630a,730a,830a	1:30	Governor Scott Walker's state of the state address last night was short on policy details but challenged lawmakers. Delivering his fifth address in the assembly chambers Walker, among other things, called for passing a school accountability package that doesn't include common core standards and directed the merger of some state offices. He's expected to provide far more detail – including how to deal with a projected \$2.2 billion deficit – when he delivers his budget address in two weeks, which is what his fellow republicans are waiting for. Northwoods representatives Mary Czaja and Rob Swearingen both noted how positive the address came across and

State Senator Tom Tiffany said he's eager to get going on the agenda. Democrats however quickly pointed to GOP policy failures for Wisconsin's budget deficit, lagging jobs and wage growth and an underfunded educational system. They also were critical on the length of the speech, just over 25 minutes.

Several members of Congress will introduce a bill to take wolves in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan and Wyoming off the endangered list. It's an effort to undo recent court decisions blocking the four states from allowing hunting and trapping of wolves for sport and predator control. U.S. Rep. Reid Ribble of Wisconsin is leading the effort. Co-sponsors include U.S. Rep. Collin Peterson of

					<p>Minnesota. The bill uses a strategy that succeeded in taking wolves in Idaho and Montana off the endangered list after court challenges by environmentalists blocked those efforts. Congress took matters into its own hands in 2011 and lifted the federal protections in those two states.</p>
