ISSUES COVERED: Columbia Public Schools have two issues on the April 5th ballot

LENGTH: 3:30

DATE/TIME AIRED: 04/02/16

GUESTS AND PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

- Columbia School Board member Jan Mees

One proposition would increase the operating tax levy by 65 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation for general school operating purposes. The other would allow the district to issue its general obligation bonds of \$30 million for the purpose of improving school facilities and acquiring land

ISSUES COVERED: Nearly 25,000 Boone Countians cast votes in this week's Municipal Election

GUESTS AND PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

Those numbers represent a 25.78% voter turnout among registered voters in the county. Noren says several school related ballot issues, and the Mayor's race in Columbia helped to drive people to the polls.

ISSUES COVERED: Newly elected Columbia Mayor Brian Treece is ready to get to work. His first city council meeting as Mayor is this week.
