Issue: The Covid 19 Pandemic and Vaccinations

The second quarter of 2021 saw dramatic improvement in the situation surrounding the pandemic. The main reasons were the steady increase in vaccinations. The New York, New Jersey region led the nation in the amount of people receiving vaccines and the number of people who were inoculated. People were anxious to find out where vaccines could be obtained. Many businesses and restaurants continued to provide safety measures to limit the spread of the infections.

Programming: WSOU continued to keep its audience informed on the status of the pandemic. That included regular public service announcements on vaccine availability, on changes in statewide restrictions and the latest numbers on infections. Regular daily newscasts covered the issue and reported the latest information. The weekly program Pirate News Desk also reported on the pandemic in greater detail. Several hundred hours of reporting were conducted on WSOU airways. Coverage also included the latest news on the source of the virus and its connection with the WuHan Laboratory in China.

Issue: The battle over Voter Suppression.

Efforts to suppress voter access continues to be a major issue in the country. 14 states have already passed laws restricting voter eligibility. Efforts by the democratic majority have been blocked by the republican party, in particular the GOP senate minority. Protest have continued around the country in support of a national voting rights bill.

Programming: Coverage over the voting right issue has been a regular part of WSOU news reporting. Daily news updates have reported on the battle in congress and the efforts across the nation to limit voting. The topic has been discussed in great detail on the stations weekly news program PND. It has also been a topic in several other public affairs shows, Making Contact and Global Current. Each deals with broader issues such as voting rights. Making Contact spent several shows dealing with related voting rights issues such as civil rights and violence.

Issue: Violence in the street.

Nationwide violence continues to rise with mass shootings reaching 250 this year alone. The nation has been fighting to install gun restrictions and it has met with severe opposition from the gun lobby and a certain segment of the public.

Programming: Daily newscasts have covered the issue of violence as part of WSOU news reports. It has been a major topic with the station Weekly News Program PND. The topic was

covered in great detail on Making Contact on May 22 and June 5. Another program, Quest, which deals with social issues also discussed the issue with local community leaders.

Issue: Economic recovery in the wake of the Pandemic.

Businesses and jobs suffered during the Covid pandemic. The government provided some relief but the result has been difficult with many businesses going under and unemployment high.

Programming: WSOU provided numerous Public service announcements on services available to people affected by the covid restrictions. In addition news coverage of the effects on the economy were regular parts of news coverage. That coverage included the latest numbers on unemployment and the overall effect on the local economy. Pirate News Desk also continued its ongoing coverage of the problems faced by people and businesses. Shows such as Leadership, a businesses centered program, and Making Contact also dealt with economic issues that included guest who discussed ways for people to handle the issues.

Issues: Coverage of international news in light of changes in the administration.

Programming: The Diplomacy department of Seton hall University provides a weekly program called Global Current. Programming: Several programs dealt with the issue of civil rights. Kinship, a religious based locally produced show, covered the topic in its April 4 show. In addition Making Contact dealt with the issue on April 17 and June 19. The WSOU news department also provided coverage of Juneteenth rallies throughout the region. The weekly Pirate News Desk show highlighted the event which marked the end of slavery in America.

Issue: Current Events

Programming: In depth news coverage on major news events, locally, nationally and across the globe are handled by the WSOU News Department through its weekly program, Pirate News Desk. The show airs on Sunday 1t 11:30 and features experts along with student reporters.

- April 4: Stories covered: The Restructuring of voting policy in the state of Georgia. This was the result of the 2020 election which saw Democrats make gains. The show also reported on the changes in New York to legalize the use of marijuana.

- April 11: Stories covered: Many in the military have been hesitant to get the covid vaccine. Concern centers on trust and the quick development of the drug. The start of the major league baseball season in light of relaxed covid restrictions.
- April 18: Stories covered: the suspension of the J and J vaccine. It was the result of side effect concerns. Also a review of reports of meteors flooding the skies.
- April 25: Stories covered: The trial surrounding the death of George Floyd. The conviction of Officer Derek Chauvin. The response to the decision.
- May 2: Stories covered: The show focused on the status of covid cases in the New York-New Jersey region. With numbers going down the restrictions have been loosened.
- May 16: Stories covered: The CDC decides to change Covid restriction guidelines. Infection numbers are dropping. Also Seton Hall University requires full vaccination for all students and staff for the upcoming fall semester.
- May 23: Stories covered: The state issues new guidelines for mask usage during the covid crisis. Also Israel ends bombing in its battle with Hamas. Over 100 have been killed. The United States gets involved to force the cease fire.
- May 30: Stories covered: The governor of New Jersey announces a lifting of some covid restrictions. The changes include more accessibility to restaurants and stores and sporting events. New York followed suit.
- June 13: Stories covered: The latest on covid restrictions. Also a review of the June 8 primary elections in New Jersey. Phil Murphy won the democratic nomination and Jack Ciattarelli is the republican nominee.
- June 20: Story covered: Juneteenth was the main topic. The program reviewed the decision to make Juneteenth a national holiday. A number of interviews were conducted off site to get reaction to the new holiday that marks the anniversary of the end of slavery.

Issue: International Relations and News

Because of the incredible diversity in this region of the country, what happens in other parts of the world has a major impact. Interest is high among the different cultures. WSOU is aware of the interest by many people in the area. The news department does deal with these issues but other programming is produced.

Programming: One of the key ways the station has approach the problem is through the program "Global Current". The show is produced with the support of the Seton Hall School of Diplomacy. The program airs on Sunday mornings and runs only during the fall and spring semesters.

- April 4:** The Yemen Civil War is addressed. Discussion considered The effect of the Sunis and the Saudis.
- April 11:** North Korea is discussed with a focus on the current relations with the United States in light of recent missile launches.
- April 24:** Russian Troop buildup along the Ukranian boarder is the topic this week. Experts discuss US pressure on the Soviets to back off and stop its block of critical water supplies to the Ukrainians.
- May 2:** The discussion focuses on the planned withdrawal of US troops from Afghanistan. 2500 troops will be removed and the issues of what effect this will have is evaluated.
- May 9:** The Global Climate Summit is the topic. A main issue is whether to include Vladimir Putin as part of any talks. It's a 2 day summit with 40 world leaders.
