Issue: The battle over reproductive rights continues. It is expected to have a major impact on the 2024 elections. Protests across the country continue and have had an effect on New Jersey and the metropolitan region.

Program: The issue was discussed on several programs. The July first episode of Making Contact made it the primary story with representatives from Planned Parenthood and Right to life groups . The WSOU weekly news show, Pirate News Desk , covered the issue from the side of the courts and efforts to reverse the Supreme Court ruling in 2022.

Pirate News Desk featured a full report on its July 9th program. In addition the story was the focus of Making Contact on July 22nd. Making contact is an issue based program that runs weekly on WSOU.
