Oct. 27, 2023 Community conversations, led by the Co-Founders of Trust Marketing Beverly and Howard Robertson, were recently held around the Memphis and Shelby County area. Part of a Daily Memphian series, these conversations were aimed at gathering the public's opinion on local crime. So far, Young says that crime is a main concern among citizens, as well as improving public services / goods like the conditions of roads and MATA. The Director of Safety and Hospitality for Downtown Memphis Commission Lawrence Green says the plan will aim at making Downtown Memphis more welcoming and accessible, which in return will have a major impact on investments and citizen satisfaction. As of December 1st, there have been over 360 homicides in Shelby County with over 580 unsolved homicide cases spanning over the years. Conducting an investigation on crime in the Mid-South, reporter for The Daily Memphian Ben Wheeler says that there are many aspects worth taking a hard look at when considering the new data that has resulted from his investigation, including crime hot spots, why cases go unsolved, laws playing a role in crime rate uptick, and more. This week on Channel 10's *Behind the Headlines* Eric Barnes hosts a journalist roundtable with The Memphis Flyer's Toby Sells and The Daily Memphian's Abigail Warren and Ben Wheeler. In addition to crime, guests talk about education — school vouchers, reading requirements, funding and more. Behind the Headlines 30 minutes Oct. 6, 2023

Shelby County's 2023 municipal Election Day was Thursday, October 5. Despite early voting numbers, voter turnout was among some of the lowest in the city's history, says *The Daily Memphian* reporter Bill Dries. Dries and *The Memphis Flyer's* Toby Sells discuss election results with host Eric Barnes, including Paul Young's journey to winning the ticket for mayor of Memphis. Wrapping up, guests talk the process of runoff elections and what is on the ballot for November's runoff.

Behind the Headlines

Oct. 13, 2023

The summer of 2023 brought heavy rains and severe storms across the Mid-South area. As a result, the City of Germantown ended up losing power and had to rely on back-up generators to provide electricity to everyday city essentials. In late July, it was discovered that there was an overfill in a diesel tank that powered the generators. Germantown Mayor Mike Palazzolo says "That [diesel] leaked into the ground and then it made its way to a very small, quarter size, hole in a pipe that goes into our [water] basin," Palazzolo adds. It took the City of Germantown six days before their tap water was safe again. Palazzo discusses the Germantown water crisis that happened in July, when he joins this week's WKNO-TV *Behind the Headlines* with host Eric Barnes and *The Daily Memphian* reporter Abigail Warren. In addition, Palazzo talks about education, public safety, Blue Oval, and more.

Oct. 20, 2023

Out of seventeen people on the ballot for Memphis City Mayor, the President and CEO of the Downtown Memphis Commission Paul Young won. "Mayoral elect Young received [roughly] 25% of the vote, which means 75% of the people voted for another mayor," says Memphis City Councilman JB Smiley, Jr. An amendment, 50% + 1, has been proposed to city council. If passed, the amendment would require a mayoral candidate to receive at least 50% of the vote, or the election would go into a run-off. Smiley, Jr. and Memphis City Councilman Chase Carlisle discuss the 50% +1 amendment, as well as the results of the recent municipal election when they join this week's WKNO-TV *Behind the Headlines* with host Eric Barnes and *The Daily Memphian* reporter Bill Dries. In addition, guests talk about MLGW, MATA, and the future of Liberty Park & Mid-South Coliseum.

### Nov. 17, 2023

At the end of December 2023, Memphis Mayor Jim Strickland will leave office as Mayor-elect Paul Young takes his place. With just a handful of weeks left in office, Jim Strickland is "optimistic but not positive" he can help close major deals involving local arenas, parks, and stadiums. Memphis Mayor Jim Strickland joins this week's Channel 10 *Behind the Headlines* with host Eric Barnes and the Daily Memphian reporter Bill Dries for part one of two episodes that are centered around Strickland's 8 years of being mayor, as well as his plans for the remainder of his time in office. In this part one, Strickland specifically discusses crime, sport complexes, some challenges of being mayor, bail reform and more.

Nov. 24, 2023

After two terms, Memphis Mayor Jim Strickland will leave office at the end of the year. Joining this week's Channel 10 Behind the Headlines with host Eric Barnes and the Daily Memphian reporter Bill Dries, Strickland discusses what his priorities would be if he had been, theoretically, elected mayor for a third term. Strickland explains that there are certain things the city could do better, however, the "real challenge is state and federal laws, and court systems which has allowed for a revolving door with inadequate punishment." In this second and final part, Strickland reflects on the last eight years in office. In addition, Strickland talks about infrastructure, MATA, public spaces, local youth programs, and more.

#### Dec. 8, 2023

Memphis City Council has approved an overall 12% rate increase for MGLW, 4% for the next three years. MLGW President and CEO Doug McGowen says outages have become twice as frequent and three times as long since 2020, and that electric has been underfunded for decades. McGowen joins this week's Channel 10 *Behind the Headlines* with host Eric Barnes and the Daily Memphian reporter Keely Brewer to discuss how the rate increase will help fund infrastructure upgrades to combat outage issues, as well as MGLW and TVA's plans for reliable power to meet the increasing demand for electric-operated products, such as electric vehicles. Wrapping up, McGowen talks about the scrapped plan to relocate MGLW's headquarters from Downtown and the possibility of purchasing a new space in Cordova to house the System Operations Center.

Dec. 22, 2023

Projected to start construction in 2026, Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT) has announced a replacement of the I-55 old bridge. Greater Memphis Chamber's Chief Economic Development Officer Gwyn Fisher says this would be a replacement, not the construction of a third, new bridge. The price tag to replace the bridge is set to cost roughly \$800 million, Fisher adds. \$200 million from Tennessee and Arkansas each and the remaining paid for with federal funding (pending approval). This week on Channel 10's *Behind the Headlines* Greater Memphis Chamber's Chief Economic Development Officer Gwyn Fisher joins host Eric Barnes and the Daily Memphian reporter Bill Dries. Sponsored by the Organization of Black Airline Professionals (OBAP) - and named for a WWII fighter pilot and local hero - the Luke Weathers Flight Academy provides support and mentorship to a diverse student body - and has set a goal of training 100 Black women to fly by 2025. Col. Luke Weathers was a Tuskegee Airman from Memphis.
