## **SECTION 1. ISSUES**

The above stations have identified the following as some of the more significant community issues addressed by this station for the quarter specified. This listing is by no means complete, nor is the order in which these issues appear intended to imply any degree of priority or significance of the issue.

- A. **Education.** The change from intense COVID-19 protections in schools to a more relaxed classroom was welcome, but after-effects by students and teachers remain. Each school in our broadcast area had different rules, which was continued to monitor. Teacher shortages, however, remain.
- B. **Housing.** A migration from cities to rural areas like Montana has brought difficulties as home prices have skyrocketed and the homeless numbers are increasing in ways we weren't expecting. Our coverage dealt with everything from homeless camps and warming shelters to the lack of affordable homes.
- C. **Local Government.** We covered the usual topics of government, such as taxes and infrastructure, but also looked at other local government services such as fire protection, building permits and, of course, the upcoming election.
- D. **Economy.** Besides our great talks with people at the state's top economic research facility at Missoula's University of Montana, we looked at individual economic stories, including unusual success stories during this unusual time.
- E. **Law Enforcement.** Crime has so many topics, and we try to check on them all. We looked at Montana's response and our community's response to human trafficking, including what happens after someone is rescued. Drugs are again a top law enforcement priority.
- F. **History.** The saying is: Those who ignore the past are doomed to repeat it. With that in mind, we looked back at racism both globally and locally. And, on another subject, how did the whole state of Montana get so involved in Irish celebrations such as St. Patrick's Day?

	Local Government, First Responders, Public Safety - Gordy Hughes
2/26/22	is the new Missoula Fire Chief. One of Gordy's goals for the department is to accomplish construction of two more fire stations. The Fire
2/27/22	Department is committed to its gold standard of a six-minute response time. Fire call volume has grown astronomically, and is now
	at approximately 11,000 calls for service annually. That's more than 30 calls per day – anything from medical aid to structure fires and other first response situations.
3/05/22	<b>Economy –</b> Essential business survival was the topic. Missoula-based Center for Community Ownership director Andrew Connor, is joining with Crowdfund Montana. Elvis Nuno, President of the Pacific Northwest
3/06/22	Rural Broadband Alliance, also joined the conversation. Connor and his group work around Montana and around the country helping communities fill holes in their local economies by using community-owned business models to start and save essential businesses. Nuno's organization builds wireless networks to bring high-speed broadband internet to under-served rural communities around Montana and the rest of the Pacific Northwest.
3/12/22	<b>History -</b> The percentage of Montanans who can trace their heritage back to Ireland is high. Traolach O'Riordain is director of the Irish
3/13/22	Studies program at the University of Montana in Missoula. It's an interdisciplinary and inter-collegiate collaboration between the College of Humanities and Sciences and the College of Visual and Performing Arts. Montana's unique ties to Ireland, in part due to early copper mining in Butte, are still strong. Traolach talked about the program's focus on the central role of the Irish language and Gaelic heritage in Ireland's history and on the role of the Irish American diaspora in the western settlement of North America (including Montana), which makes this a unique course of study among Irish Studies programs in America. And, of course, we talked about the history of St. Patrick's Day.
