Section I: Issues

Environmental/Energy Issues: Almost \$15 Million dollars have been federally awarded to modernize the states electrical grid with projects such as improving flood prevention and recovery systems, and hardening power lines. The fine for not reporting the deer harvest has been reduced to a onetime fee of \$150 dollars and can be reported online using the DNR app. Four new Electronic Waste Recycling Drop Off sites have opened in the Upper Peninsula making it easier than ever to protect the environment; additional sites are in the works for the Iron Mountain area. ABC10 sent a reporter to get an exclusive interview and footage regarding the fire damages the Goose Marsh Fire left. Two fast electric car stations will be installed in downtown bring sustainability and clean energy right here to the Upper Peninsula. The DNR stocked a little over 9 Million Fish with their Tribal Partners, and the fish included splake, walleye, lake trout, and so much more.

Education: Bay College hosted rapid enrollment information sessions for adults that meet these qualifications: they are 25 years or older, a Michigan resident (minimum one year), and has not yet completed an associate or bachelors degree. Bell Hospital hosted a fundraiser for the non-profit company, Bell Auxiliary which focuses on patient education, youth education and senior assistance. Student Debt forgiveness will be given to nearly 27,000 Michiganders who have accumulated minimum 20 years of qualifying payments. MDARD will be reminding schools to practice safe integrated pest management, and under their requirements all k-12 schools must establish an IPM program and notify guardians before pesticides are used. Education is one of the most used tools for the fight against drug dependency and overdoses, our reporter looked into it further with the help of a foundation helping to educate their community. Starting in 2024, parents that are seeking education for themselves have an opportunity to have childcare at the Northern Michigan University with help/partnership of Gretchen's House.

Public Health Care:

Six new residents started at UPHS- Marquette, pledging the next three years of their lives to our communities health. Tru-North Federal Credit Union is committed to the health and safety of our community as they awarded money for the local fire department to receive new defibrillators and other necessities for Cliffs Shaft Mine Museum. Teen vaping is making it hard for surgeons to give safe operations due to increased risks during surgery. \$400,000 dollars in federal funding will be used to give the first responders the best chance at being safe and efficient in the field. Childhood obesity awareness month was September and parents are encouraged to talk to their children about having healthy habits and relationships with food to decrease their risk of getting the disease.

Local Culture:

The 55th Annual Rodeo event took place to help cowboys and cowgirls get the points they need for the national competition in Las Vegas and is the only PRCA sanctioned event in the state of Michigan. The Fiber Festival is back and will be a family oriented event showcasing quilts, crafts, a fashion show and much more. Reporter Jessica Potila met with Mayor Chapman on why the Ishpeming businesses are thriving in downtown. The Parade of Nations in Houghton showcased 35 countries while offering dances, food and other activities to fully immerse the community members into. A new shooting range was opened to bring a safe environment together for all gun and bow enthusiasts, it was also dedicated to two men who were murdered there in 1926.

Section II - Responsive Programs

ENVIRONMENTAL/ENERGY ISSUES:

 The U.S. Department of Energy will be awarding the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy almost \$15 million dollars in federal funding. This money would be used to modernize the state's electrical grid. The funding will be used for projects such as hardening power lines and electric facilities, improving flood prevention and recovery systems, replacing electric cables, and more. - Governor Whitmer signed a senate bill into law on Tuesday that reduces the penalty for failing to report a deer harvest. (Insert V.O. titled DEER HARVEST 07.12.23). Last year the Michigan DNR began requiring hunters to report their deer harvest online within 72 hours. The initial fine for failing to report was up to \$500 plus a misdemeanor resulting in up to 90 days in jail. Under the new law, the penalty for failing to report your harvest is a one—time fine of \$150 dollars. Reporting a deer harvest can be done online or on the phone using the DNR app. The DNR says the deer harvest reporting system is streamlined and can be completed in about five minutes or less. - To encourage and facilitate sustainable transportation and clean energy in the region the superior watershed partnership has received a Charge Up Michigan grant from the Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy. (Insert V.O. titled CHARGEUPVO09.13.23). The grant, which amounts to nearly 169,000 dollars, will go to installing two fast electric vehicle charging stations downtown. Carl Lindquist, SWP Executive Director said quote, "Installing more fast chargers not only furthers clean energy and climate adaption; it also furthers sustainable economic development locally. - Visitors, local residents and local businesses all benefit when we work together to secure state funding for these important projects." These charging stations will be located in the lakeshore parking lot, under the iconic ore dock, and will be installed in the coming months. These charging stations are state of the art, with a max output of 62.5 kilowatts, and should fully charge the average electric vehicle in about 30 minutes. Joe Thiel, CEO of innovate Marquette said quote, "We approach sustainability by collaborating with partners and providing equitable and inclusive access to necessary resources for entrepreneurs that will benefit the people of Marquette from a social, economic, and environmental perspective. In this case, the new chargers will benefit anyone with an electric vehicle in our city." stocked fish at 705 different sites. So, expect great fall fishing. The Marquette State Fish Hatchery stocked 340,000 lake trout, brook trout, and splake (a lake and brook trout hybrid). Thompson State Fish Hatchery in Manistique stocked 997,000 fish that included yearling steelhead and fingerling chinook salmon. 2.7 million walleye spring fingerlings were also stocked by the DNR and Tribal Partners. The public is welcome at any of Michigan's State Fish Hatcheries to see firsthand the fish rearing process. They will incorporate inpatient and outpatient medicine experiences as well as rotations in rural areas within Michigan's Upper Peninsula. Program Director, Dr. Brian Waite, states quote, "Our new class of residents have arrived, and are enthusiastically going through their orientation, we're looking forward to a great three years with them." The group recommends that parents talk to their children about the harmful effects of vaping and that teens who undergo surgical procedures are honest with their doctors about any vaping history.

- Pediatric anesthesiologist Dr. Rebecca Nause—osthoff said: "it's important patients and their parents understand that vaping can literally be a life and death decision." End quote.
