The following is a list of programs which WKHK-FM, Richmond, Virginia, aired from July 1 to September 30, 2023. These programs addressed issues that were determined to be of significant concern to the Richmond, Virginia community during the third quarter of 2023.

Focus Richmond (six hours per quarter) – a twenty-five-minute talk show hosted by Local Midday Show Host from K95, Lori Kelly, and airing Sunday mornings at 0630. The program focuses on local public affairs and community issues.

Viewpoints (six hours per quarter) – a thirty-minute issues program produced by Mediatracks airing Sunday mornings at 0600.

Local News Stories - WKHK-FM has locally produced newscasts weekday mornings between 5:00 and 9:00. These newscasts are approximately 60 seconds each and cover pertinent topics for the day ranging from local schools and weather to national politics and health concerns.

Community-wide dog adoption Richmond SPCA

Across metro Richmond and beyond, with a concentration of regional shelters performing offsite adoptions on Saturday, August 12 from 11 a.m. – 3 p.m. at the Richmond SPCA.

Eighteen participating municipal shelters and private animal rescue organizations are conducting a fee-waived or fee-reduced adoption event this weekend thanks to a grant from the Community Foundation for a greater Richmond. Along with the Richmond metro area,

13 additional localities from Piedmont to the Middle Peninsula are taking part in the event. Coordinated by the Richmond SPCA and Ring Dog Rescue, these 18 groups will offer reduced or waived adoption fees to send hundreds of homeless dogs into loving homes, freeing up much-needed space at public and private animal welfare organizations across metro Richmond and beyond.

To boost dog adoptions and create more kennel space in shelters across the region, the Community Foundation for a greater Richmond provided a grant to waive or reduce dog adoption fees during a three-day adoption promotion dubbed the "Community Snoutreach Event."

What is the difference between a screening mammogram and a diagnostic mammogram?

A screening mammogram is done on a woman without any symptoms or concerns. Screening mammograms are a way for breast cancer to be detected in its earliest stages of development before symptoms may be present.

A diagnostic mammogram is done on a woman who has noticed a change in her breast, such as a "lump" or thickening, focal and/or persistent pain, nipple changes, spontaneous nipple discharge, etc., or if the referring clinician has a concern on a patient's clinical breast exam. While a screening mammogram usually takes about 15 minutes, a diagnostic mammogram may take a little longer if the tech needs to take more images and/or focus on a specific area of interest.

What is a radiologist looking for in a mammogram?

When reading a mammogram, a radiologist is looking for the presence of a new mass, a grouping of calcifications, an asymmetry, architectural distortion, skin thickening, nipple changes, lymph node enlargement, and more. The radiologist will compare your most recent mammogram with your prior mammograms to detect any changes. Each of these descriptors can be benign (non-cancerous) or malignant (cancerous). As a result, if any of them appears on your mammogram, you may get called back for extra mammogram views and possibly an ultrasound.

If you're called back, please don't worry until we tell you to worry. Most patients who are brought back for additional views and/or an ultrasound do not have cancer.

How should women best prepare for a mammogram?

It's best to be as relaxed as possible and not wear deodorant the day of your mammogram. If possible, make sure your provider has access to your prior mammograms. Learn more about <u>how</u> to prepare for your screening mammogram at VPFW.

Why can't you wear deodorant to a mammogram?

Deodorants and antiperspirants have tiny aluminum particles that help prevent sweat from coming to the surface of the skin. These tiny particles can affect how accurately your mammogram can be read by a radiologist. On a mammogram, the particles show up as tiny white dots that can look like calcifications. There are many different causes for calcifications, most of which are benign; but sometimes calcifications can be an early sign of breast cancer. If these white dots appear on your mammogram, your radiologist will likely order more tests to determine their source.

United Way Literacy Kits

United Way of Greater Richmond & Petersburg has announced the assembly of 2,366 Literacy Kits that the nonprofit is distributing to elementary school students this summer and fall with the support of more than 170 volunteers.

United Way Literacy Kits include essential school supplies, an age-appropriate book and information for families so students can be prepared for kindergarten and reading at grade-level by third grade.

The Literacy Kits will be distributed to elementary schools in Richmond, Chesterfield, Goochland, Dinwiddie, Powhatan, and United Way's seven Kindergarten Countdown Camps.

Getting Back-to-School Ready

While many families are still enjoying summer vacation, school is just around the corner. Now is the time to start getting your child ready for a healthy start to school.

Scheduling pediatric medical and dental appointments is sometimes lost in the shuffle of summer daycare, sports, and vacation planning. It's important to start making these appointments now before the end-of-summer rush to make sure your child has the necessary health records and immunizations when school starts again.

Virginia requires all children entering daycare, public and private schools to give proof of vaccination before entering Kindergarten, 7th, and 12th grades. Children who do not meet the vaccination requirements for school may not be able to start on time.

Immunizations are just one of several areas of overall health that parents and guardians should be paying attention to, including routine medical and dental checkups which are critical to a child's

overall health. Especially coming out of the recent COVID pandemic, overall mental health is another key element of a child's health that needs attention.
