Who qualifies to get their records expunged?

This clinic is for people who have charges and convictions levied in Cumberland County for violations of North Carolina laws. It does not apply to charges from anywhere else in North Carolina, from any other state, or to federal charges.

More specifically, the clinic is for any of these situations:

- A case for which you were found not guilty.
- Certain cases in which the charges were dismissed.
- One non-violent felony conviction from more than 10 years ago.
- Multiple non-violent misdemeanor convictions from more than seven years ago.
- Non-violent convictions for crimes committed when you were under 18 years old.

Who will help you with the expungement?

If you qualify, volunteer lawyers, as well as lawyers from the Cumberland County Public Defender Office and Legal Aid of North Carolina will help participants fill out the paperwork, and the Cumberland County Clerk of Court will help them file the paperwork.

Does it cost anything?

This service is being done for free — court filing fees are being waived and the lawyers are not charging for their time.

Did You Know?

 Congenital heart disease (CHD) affects 1 in 120 babies born in the United States, making heart defects the most common birth defects.

 About 25% of babies with CHD have a critical form and generally need an intervention during their first year of life.

The Cardiac Center at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia team performs more than 950
pediatric heart surgeries a year, including open heart and closed heart procedures, and heart
transplants.

 Thanks to research and innovative treatments, more than 97% of children born with CHD are expected to reach adulthood.

Suggested Questions:

- How many babies each year are born with congenital heart disease? Do we know why?
- How are heart defects diagnosed and treated?
- What is the expected long-term outcome for babies/children who undergo a cardiac intervention?
- What options are available to children who experience heart failure and what is the future for treatment and interventions?

The birth of a child is a joyous occasion for an entire family. But for the families of the more than 40,000 American babies born each year with congenital heart disease (CHD), it can also bring fear and uncertainty. The research includes circulating tumor DNA (ctDNA) in colorectal cancer and new treatment options for pancreatic, liver, and esophageal cancers.

Discussion

Cooper was in Fayetteville as part of "The Year of Public Schools" education tour. He stopped by Smith, Cumberland County's premier STEM high school. The historically Black school has outgrown its location on Seabrook Road. Now there is debate over whether the new high school should be built on Fort Liberty. The targeted location on Fort Liberty would be near Stryker Golf Course. While some Smith students learn to fly drones and become pilots, the county commissioners and board of education must decide where the new school will be. Cooper enjoyed his time piloting drones and operating an airplane simulator during a tour of the school. He spoke about the importance of STEM-focused schools and the opportunities they provide. "We spend a lot of time working to get children ready for post-secondary education but now we've come to understand that a lot of students can make more money right out of high school than they can with a four-year Bachelor of Arts degree at a college," Cooper said. Several groups will have a say in the new location. The school district said they're looking at different options. Military leaders at Fort Liberty Support the plan to build the school there. "However, some say building the school on federal land jeopardizes the county's ability to take advantage of the economic engine building a new school generates. Whenever you build a school, you must look at the entire region. So, we should not just look at Stryker Golf Course in terms of economic possibilities," said Cumberland County Schools Superintendent Dr. Marvin Connelly. Ultimately, it's up to Cumberland County Commissioners to decide.

"The decision will be a tough one and I want to listen to the board of education because they're the people who run our education system in this county," said Cumberland County Commissioner Marshall Faircloth. "But when it comes to spending taxpayer's dollars, I want to make sure we get the best bang for our buck."

- o An estimated 6.5 million Americans aged 65 and older are living with Alzheimer's dementia, including 180,000 North Carolina residents, a number estimated to grow to as many as 210,000 by 2025.
- Nationally, more than 11 million caregivers of people with Alzheimer's disease or other dementias. In North Carolina, 369,000 caregivers provide a total of 533 million hours of unpaid care, valued at a total of \$8 billion.
- One in three seniors die from Alzheimer's or other dementia.
- Nearly two-thirds of those with Alzheimer's—3.9 million—are women.
- Older non-Hispanic Blacks and Hispanic Americans are disproportionately more likely than older whites to have Alzheimer's or other dementias.

First, a few basic facts. In the United States today, 1 in 36 children is born on the autism spectrum. These are kids who'll need help in varying degrees communicating, learning and socializing with others – but can also be intellectually gifted in other ways. (If you've ever seen the Tom Cruise movie 'Rainman', you've seen just one example of autism. Every child can be unique.) It's also estimated that 1 in 300 to 700 babies are born with Down's Syndrome, which also prevents so-called normal child development. Understanding how to nurture and increase the development potential of these children has made long strides,

as both parenting and teaching techniques have improved with insight and understanding.
